he lakes are great, the woods are wonderful, the outdoor recreation is at its best and...there is always a downtown. Historically, seasonal vacationers didn't set-

tle in this region to be too far removed from the amenities of a larger central community, an observation that writers and travelers documented over the decades. The lakeside villages were great for daily errands, but the larger towns were the supply depots.

Before automobiles, trolley cars and even boats provided transportation between the towns and the lakes. With the development of private vacation cottages and private transportation, visitors and vacationers, and probably year-rounders, too, traveled routinely to town, usually Oakland, for groceries, dry goods and the privileges of a library. On a big day, Waterville was the destination.

Due east was the preferred travel pattern. Perhaps it was because the waters of the region flowed eastward towards the Kennebec River? Or perhaps no one had measured yet that the mileage is almost equi-distant from the center of the Belgrade lakes to the center of a town in any direction.

Today, vacationers and visitors still appreciate the proximity of the lakes to the town hubs, and residents do, too, and although the stores in many cases have shifted to the outskirts (shopping centers) the downtowns, those original main streets, are up and coming. What's up, downtowns?

Organization is up. Alliances, business groups and Main Street associations are up. Skowhegan is celebrating its 10th Anniversary as a Main Street community. Augusta through its Downtown Alliance has just joined the Main Street network. Waterville and Gardiner have well-established Main Street offices. Oakland is embarking on a Downtown Revitalization. Farmington has an active Downtown Association. Hallowell has a strong Board of Trade.

Business is up. Small shops, boutiques, store fronts, and restaurants are providing a renewed attraction for going downtown. Business and community organizations are proactively filling vacant buildings and sponsoring or encouraging enrichment activities, festivals, plays, movies, farmers' markets, more.

Art is up...everywhere. From displays on restaurant and shop walls, to designs on the sides of buildings and the insides of bridge tunnels, to

art walks and exhibitions. Hallowell and Gardiner have well-established galleries, Augusta has rotating exhibits in its government buildings. Winthrop has over 25 pieces of public art on its buildings. Gardiner has a quarterly art walk. Farmington added a First Friday Art Walk starting in May.

Renovation is up. Skowhegan has redone its downtown parking lot. Gardiner has gone green with planters. Waterville has installed flower boxes. Augusta is focusing on its historic buildings.






towns have walking trails and museum in the street trails.

Colby College Museum of Art: Special Summer Exhibitions and Programs

Colby College Museum of Art is fun, informative and impressive. This summer special exhibitions and programs feature:

"Paper Trail: Contemporary Prints, Drawings, and Photographs from the Collection" at the Davis Curricular Gallery through August 30, 2015. Featuring numerous recent acquisitions, Paper Trail presents selections from the Colby College Museum of Art's holdings of contemporary works on paper. Many of the artists represented are new to the collection and are known for their accomplishments in printmaking. And photography, an area of the collection experiencing tremendous recent growth, is also well represented.

"An Artist's Gift: Acquisitions from the Alex Katz Foundation" in the Jette Galleries through September 6, 2015. The Alex Katz Foundation, incorporated in 2004, has played a central role in the development of the Colby College Museum of Art's collection, has given nearly 450 works of modern and contemporary art to the Colby Museum and has become a model of artist-led philanthropy. This exhibition area features a selection of artworks by contemporary artists, artists of Katz's generation and foundational early 20thcentury modernists.

"Brand New & Terrific: Alex Katz in the 1950s," will open in the Paul J. Schupf Wing for the Works of Alex Katz, July 11 and run through October 18, 2015. The 1950s saw American Artist Alex Katz take up and master painting directly from nature, lay claim to Abstract Expressionism's size and scale and innovate with colleges and cutouts. It was a decade in which he looked to the portraiture of Edouard Manet, the one in which he met Ada, his most enduring model and a period during which he destroyed hundreds of canvases. This major exhibition will introduce audiences to an overlooked body of work. "Brand-New & Terrific: Alex Katz in the 1950s" features sixty-five paintings, cutouts and collages, including many on loan from the artist and major public and private collections.

"Lively Spaces," the Colby College Museums of Art's free summer camp offers three weeks of art making, dancing, poetry reading and writing. Students between second and eighth grade can attend each Monday through Friday from 12-2:45 pm at the Museum to work with a group of highly talented instructors. Lunch will be provided each day. Space is limited and campers need to be able to attend the entire three-week period. To Pre-register call 859-5613.

Program Director Starts 2nd Successful Season

Conservation Corps Starts 20th Successful Summer

In the summer of 1995 a brand new venture was tested in the Belgrades: a fledgling team of high school students from throughout the watershed set out under the guidance of a Messalonskee High School teacher to help protect and preserve the chain of lakes through an offer most property owners couldn't refuse: a streamlined permitting process for conservation projects and free labor. Owners had to pay for the materials but the planning, ordering and use of them was coordinated by the team leader.

The name of the new youth group was the Belgrade Lakes Conservation Corps and it was established at a first time ever meeting of representatives from all the Belgrade lakes, the Lake Associations of the Belgrades (LABs), who were concerned about water quality and chose the youth corps as the best plan of action. In order to operate as a nonprofit and to simplify payroll procedures, the BLCC was soon placed under the auspices of the BRCA. LABs eventually became part of the older alliance, too.


This summer marks the start of Nathan Durant's second season as Program Director for the Belgrade Regional Conservation Alliance Youth Conservation Corps (YCC). Nathan hails from Williamsburg, a township located new Brownsville, Maine. He attended the University of Maine at Farmington where he assisted Dr. Dan Buckley in his research pertaining to shoreline surveys and invasive aquatic plants for the Rangeley Lakes Heritage Trust in 2011.

After graduation, Nathan was accepted for the Margaret Chase Smith summer internship program. The next summer he worked with the Forest Health and Monitoring program as an entomology assistant. He then began working on a trail crew with the Maine Conservation Corps,

spending time building a 60-foot bridge through brackish wetlands in Damariscotta, cutting new trails on the Schoodic Peninsula, setting stone steps in Grafton Notch State Park and resurfacing bike trails in Yarmouth. His 900 hours of service in the Maine Conservation Corps ignited in Nathan a passion for conservation.

In addition to leading the YCC, Nathan is qualified as a LakeSmart screener and works as part of the interim sampling crew collecting data for the Water Quality Initiative.

Conservation -

n May 29, staff and providers from Belgrade Regional Health Center visited Belgrade Central School to lead a Walk Across Maine. The event began with a wellness assembly. Amy Madden, MD and Rob Cianfarano, PA—providers at the health center and parents of Belgrade Central students-talked to kids about what it means to be healthy. Front office and nursing staff members from the health center were also present. Next, students took to the field to walk the total combined miles from Escourt Station (Maine's northernmost point) to the Portland Sea Dogs Hadlock Field. The health center simulated a walk across Maine by posting signs reading "You are now leaving Escourt Station" and "Welcome to Moosehead Lake." The walk also included obstacle courses to simulate walking through the forest and swimming across the Kennebec River. Students rounded the bases as they reached their final destination of Hadlock Field, and were greeted with hugs and high fives from special guest Slugger, mascot of the Sea Dogs.

Belgrade Regional Health Center is proud to partner with Belgrade Central School as part of the HealthReach Youth Initiative, a program to promote nutrition and physical activity to children and families in HealthReach communities. Through the Youth Initiative, Belgrade Regional Health Center participates in the Let's Go! 5-2-1-0 childhood obesity prevention program, collaborates with Healthy Northern Kennebec to offer SNAP-Ed courses, and offers educational programs for schools. This year's Walk Across Maine is meant to be the first of many. Let's hope for the same perfect weather for next year's Second Annual Walk Across Maine!

Summertime in the Belgrades **Gaslight Theater Presents American Classic and Announces Auditions**

aslight Theater is pleased to present Harvey, **U**a classic of the American stage. Written by Mary Chase and directed by Bob Gilbert, the play opens Friday, June 19, in the Hallowell City Hall auditorium. Subsequent performances will be on June 20, 21, and 26 - 28. The Friday and Saturday performances are at 7:30 p.m.; the Sunday matinees are at 2:00.

Garnering a Pulitzer prize for the playwright, Harvey premiered on Broadway in November 1944. The show ran for 1,775 performances, closing in January 1949. Although there have been subsequent revivals both on Broadway and in London, the play is probably best known today through the 1950 film version starring Jimmy Stewart.

The play's lead character, Elwood Dowd, is a genial eccentric. When he starts to introduce his invisible friend Harvey, a six-and-a-half-foot tall rabbit, to society matron Ethel Chauvenet and the other guests at his sister Veta's dinner party, Veta decides that enough is enough. Aided by Judge Omar Gaffney, an old friend and the family's lawyer, she seeks to have Elwood committed to a local sanitarium, lest her daughter Myrtle Mae and their family suffer any further embarrassment.

A comedy of errors ensues as hotshot young psychiatrist Dr. Sanderson mistakenly concludes

that Veta is the one who should be committed, much to the the consternation of the sanitarium's director, Dr. Chumley. When the mix-up is discovered, the hunt is on for Elwood, as Nurse Kelly, whose affection for Dr. Sanderson goes unrequited, fumes over his inattention.

Elwood later shows up at the sanitarium on his own looking for Harvey, but it turns out that his imaginary companion has had a peculiar effect on Dr. Chumley, among others. Only at the end of the play does Veta realize that Elwood's having an invisible friend isn't so bad after all.

Gaslight has presented Harvey twice before, in 1998 and in 1954, when the theater company was known as the Augusta Players. The current production stars Henry Quintal as Elwood, Jenny Benjamin-Rider as Ethel, Kathleen Brainerd as Veta, Charmian Christopherson as Myrtle Mae, Frank Omar as Judge Gaffney, Galen Hall as Dr. Sanderson, Bruce Hertz as Dr. Chumley, and Abby Crocker as Nurse Kelly. Rounding out the cast are John Rider as a burly orderly, Karen LaPlante as Dr. Chumley's longsuffering wife, and Andy Tolman as a cynical cab driver.

Tickets cost \$12 for adults and \$10 for students and senior citizens (aged 60 and up). One can reserve tickets by going online to



Gaslight also invites area actors to audition for its August show, Picasso at the Lapin Agile. This first full-length play by television and movie funnyman Steve Martin (The Jerk, Pink Panther, Saturday Night Live) envisions a fictional meeting between Albert Einstein and Pablo Picasso at a Parisian bar in 1904. Both men are in their twenties and each is on the verge of a singular achievement: For Einstein, it is his theory of relativity, and for Picasso it is the painting "Les desmoiselles d'Avignon."

The two debate at length about the value of genius and talent, while the other denizens of the bar — a grumpy Frenchman, the sympathetic bar owner, his not-so-sympathetic girlfriend, an unctuous art dealer, and a lovable buffoon — listen and interject. The final surprise is the arrival of a mysterious dark-haired singer from the future. In all, there are roles for seven men and up to four women.

Summertime in the Belgrades

– Take It Outside

une 6th was National Trails Day. To celebrate, I led a nature walk on BRCA's Mountain Trail. We did the Long Pond Loop followed by the Outer Loop, a roughly 2.6 mile trip. Many Lady's slippers were still in bloom along with Star flowers, Canada mayflowers and Bunchberries, a minute member of the dogwood family. We talked a lot about various trees, flowering plants, lichens, fungi, rocks, birds, and animals. I think everyone learned something..

As we came to some of the Great Pond overlooks on the Outer Loop, we caught up to my neighbors, the Millers, having lunch on a cliff overlooking Hoyt's Island. Their daughter Lydia was wearing a t-shirt that read, "Dirt makes me cuter," not that she needed anything to make her cuter.

Last week I talked a bit about the "Alphabet Soup of Conservation" in the Belgrades. There are a few important additions to the "soup" that I didn't have room to discuss. These include the Maine Department of Environmental Protection (DEP), the Kennebec County Soil Water Conservation District (KCSWCD) and the Maine Volunteer Lake Monitoring Program (VLMP). The DEP provides important technical support to the lake associations and local Code Enforcement Officers (CEOs), especially in the area of invasive plants (both aquatic and terrestrial) and shoreland zoning issues. They also provide some funding for plant control and water quality programs administered by the BRCA and FOM. The KCSWCD provides technical support throughout Kennebec County for programs involving gravel road maintenance, and soil and water programs, especially those involved with agriculture and water quality. The VLMP provides important training and quality assurance (QA) in the areas of aquatic invasive plant identification and removal as well as water quality monitoring. They certify citizen-scientist monitors throughout the State and analyze the collected data, producing both an annual written report and an on-line database (http://www.lakesof ⇒maine.org/). Check out the data for your lake. Better yet, volunteer to help collect more.





Roads as Stream Barriers

Over the past few years many towns, road associations and land owners have begun to address problems with roadways that cross streams *i.e.* Stream Crossings. In most cases this is a culvert. There seems to be two primary issues:

1] The current culvert is too small. With changes in how severe a rain storm may be, the culvert may no longer to large enough. Or, given changes in land use upstream, the stormwater runoff may behave much differently and overwhelm the current culvert.

2] The current culvert was installed without attention to habitat protection. Fish and other aquatic "critters" are not able to use the stream to move up and downstream. The culvert creates high water velocity or may be "perched" so that animals, usually fish, are not able to travel upstream to other parts of their habitat.

Road crossings are, by their nature, narrow choke points in a stream's path to the ocean. Ideally the water would move slowly enough and through a wide enough channel to maintain an environment conducive to fish passage and all the other aquatic critters that may move up and down streams. But a road crossings 'choke point' can alter the natural flow and action of the stream. That change can result in changes in the stream environment and its water quality.

Occasionally the road crossing is a bridge. Usually better than a culvert because the water flow is more gradual and the stream bed beneath the bridge is closer to a "natural" channel. But in the case of a culvert they may be so small and/or steep that wildlife is unable to travel up them. Or they may be so damaged that critters, and certainly fish, can't travel through them. Or the classic - a culvert where the water runs out the lower end, drops a couple feet and scours out a large hole beneath the outlet. That is a "perched" culvert.

The 'fix' for such barriers is usually replacement. The replacement is nearly always larger and installed deeper. Replacement is expensive. The



improved life span of the properly sized culvert makes the cost more realistic as a long term investment. The initial installation cost can be high. But the vast improvement for aquatic plants and animals up stream can be priceless!

It is estimated that about 40% of a watershed's area may be impaired because water flow is hampered by culvert barriers. A program called Stream Smart includes a number of Federal, regional, State and local partners to help people identify stream barriers, judge their impact on the stream habitat and help identify prospective "fixes". They sponsor workshops around the State. A recently released Request for Proposals [RFP] from the Maine DEP is available with grant funds provided by the 2014 General Fund Bond to Ensure Clean Water & Safe Communities. Grant applications are due by July 15 with much of the money targeted at culvert replacement. Contact Lislie Anderson at Maine DEP for more information.

Remember... the objective is improved water quality and managing the waterways for native plants and animals is a big part of that.
