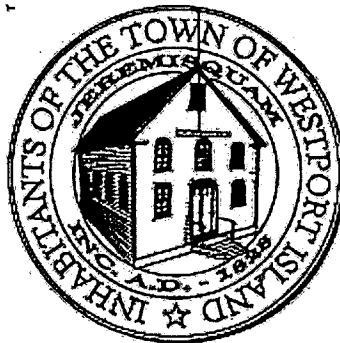

Dedication

We dedicate this year's Annual Report "in remembrance of all those men and women, both in and out of uniform, who contribute to the expansion and preservation of freedom for future generations throughout the world by their personal sacrifices and putting their lives on the line, and especially to my friends of long standing." Those words come from Westport Island veteran, Joseph Hoerth, to whom we also specifically dedicate this report. He is a 26-year resident of Westport and a World War II veteran with a story emblematic of service to country.

The following account is excerpted from the article, "Westport Island WWII veteran shares his experiences", by Charlotte Boynton (*March 23, 2016, Lincoln County News*). Her article drew from Hoerth's memoir:

...Joseph Hoerth, John Mason, and Bruce Fisher have been friends since seventh grade. They graduated from high school together, went to college and basic training together, and graduated as second lieutenants from officer training school together. They were assigned to the 106th Infantry Division, trained in England, saw front-line combat, and were captured in the Battle of the Bulge.

Today, the men remain close friends. Hoerth calls them "friends of long standing," or "FOLS" – which is the title of a memoir they wrote. The memoir includes each man's account of their capture by the Germans, imprisonment in a POW camp, their escape, and their dangerous, six-day trek through German-occupied territory to the American lines. They were captured on December 19, 1944 – surrounded, outgunned, outnumbered. The first night of captivity was in a warehouse without food. The next day, German guards marched them to a railroad where 60-70 men were loaded into railcars designed for 40 men and eight horses. Their journey lasted several days with cars so crowded "only half of the men could lie down to rest at a time. There was...no food and it was very cold" – constant themes throughout the men's ordeal. On Christmas Eve, the Royal Air Force bombed the yard, hitting several of the boxcars, killing a number of American troops.

The men were transferred to the prison camp Bad Orb, where interrogations began. Officers were separated from enlisted men, put back on boxcars and sent to Offlag 13, a prison camp for officers in Hammelburg. There, prisoners were allowed some correspondence home and were allowed to receive packages. Hoerth became a lifelong supporter of the American Red Cross for its support of POWs and their families during WWII.

He says letters and packages from home and finding humor in "everything" kept the prisoners going. A month or so after imprisonment, additional American POWs arrived, including Gen. George Patton's son-in-law. In March 1945, Patton sent a liberation force; but it was only able to free about 300 of the estimated 2,500 prisoners. In Hoerth's words, "Not knowing what the Germans would do with us, seven of us took off: Fisher, Mason, a fellow named Ed Roberts, and three other Americans."

The seven Americans split up to increase their chances of making it back to American lines. Hoerth and Mason were in one group. They escaped on Tuesday, March 28 and had to walk 35 to 40 miles across enemy territory to reach American lines.

No one in Hoerth's group spoke German; they relied on wits and bartered for food. On Easter Sunday, Hoerth and Mason became separated briefly from their companions and were recaptured at gunpoint by a German soldier. They feigned injury and illness. When opportunity presented, they fled, and surprisingly, were not chased or fired upon. They narrowly avoided a second capture by giving a Hitler salute from under their blankets when awakened by a curious German soldier. The next morning, April 3, 1945, they arrived at a town that had been taken over by Americans the night before. They learned that friends, Fisher and Roberts, had arrived a day earlier.

Hoerth spent about 30 days in the hospital being treated for malnutrition and frozen feet – he had lost about 40 pounds; but he survived and was sent home – most of Patton's small force who came to liberate the POW's and those that had been liberated from the prison camp were believed to have been killed or captured in a counter-offensive.

In January 2016, U.S. Sen. Angus King presented Hoerth with the Bronze Star, the Prisoner of War Medal and the Combat Infantry Badge. Some might wonder why it took so long; there were lots of reasons, including a commanding officer hospitalized with tuberculosis. Hoerth says, "When I got out of the service, I wanted to get on with my life, and wasn't interested in medals." He believes his experience was a cost of protecting freedom – which is worth fighting for, and that "the loss of anyone's freedom is a loss to everyone."

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DATES TO REMEMBER

- ❖ Property is assessed each year to the owner of record as of April 1st. Property tax bills are mailed to owners in August. Property Taxes are Due 30 days after they are mailed out.
- ❖ Snowmobile & ATV Registrations Expire: June 30th
- ❖ Boat Registrations Expire: December 31st
- ❖ Hunting & Fishing Licenses Expire: December 31st
- ❖ Shellfish Licenses Expire: April 30th
- ❖ Dog Licenses: Dogs must be licensed with the Town Clerk. Annual licensing runs from October 15 to December 31st; a late fee accrues after January 31st.
- ❖ Annual Town Meeting: one of the two last Saturdays in June beginning at 9:00 a.m. at the Town Hall. Selectmen will post the actual date on the website in March.
- ❖ Annual Municipal Election: A day within the 14-day time period before the Annual Town Meeting in June. The date will be posted on the Town Website in March.
- ❖ School District Budget Meeting & Budget Validation Election – to be determined by the School Board. When possible, the election will be in conjunction with the Municipal Election.
- ❖ The Town Office is closed on the following holidays: New Year's Day, Presidents Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Veterans Day, Thanksgiving Day, and Christmas.

REMINDERS FOR CONDUCTING TOWN BUSINESS

WHAT TO BRING WHEN REGISTERING A VEHICLE:

Re-Registration: Your old registration, current insurance card & mileage.

New Registration (Dealer Sale): Proof of sales tax paid (this is usually found on the financing statement), blue title application form, window sticker (if new vehicle), current insurance card & mileage.

New Registration (Private Sale): Bill of Sale, title for vehicles 1995 or newer, insurance card & mileage.

New Registration (Transfer): Same as private sale registration above PLUS registration of the vehicle the plates are being transferred from. This vehicle must no longer be owned by you in order to receive excise tax credit.

WHAT TO BRING WHEN REGISTERING A SNOWMOBILE/ATV/BOAT/CAMPER:

Re-Registration: Old registration.

New Registration (Dealer Sale): Proof of sales tax paid (this is usually found on the financing statement), ME-assigned number on used recreational vehicles.

New Registration (Private Sale): Bill of sale, ME-assigned number and serial number; horsepower and length for boats.

New Registration (Transfer): Same as private sale above PLUS registration of the vehicle the plates are being transferred from.

WHAT TO BRING WHEN LICENSING A DOG:

Current rabies certificate and neutering/spay certificate if not already on file with the Town Clerk
Call the Town Clerk if you need information about low-cost programs for rabies vaccinations or spaying/neutering

The Selectmen wish to thank our dedicated staff members who work hard to look out for taxpayers' needs and best interests. They go beyond what they have to do in their required duties. We, as a Board, thank Martha, Tax Collector, Treasurer and Administrative Assistant; Dedee, Municipal Agent; and Gaye, Town Clerk and Registrar.

We thank all our elected and appointed Town Officials and Committee members for their dedicated service to our community.

We thank our Volunteer Fire Department members for their dedication to our town's protection.

We are also thankful for our Helping Hands members who reach out to our citizens with needed help and food from the food pantry.

The Selectmen and Road Committee will be presenting an article at Town Meeting to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money to construct a salt & sand facility next to the Town Office. 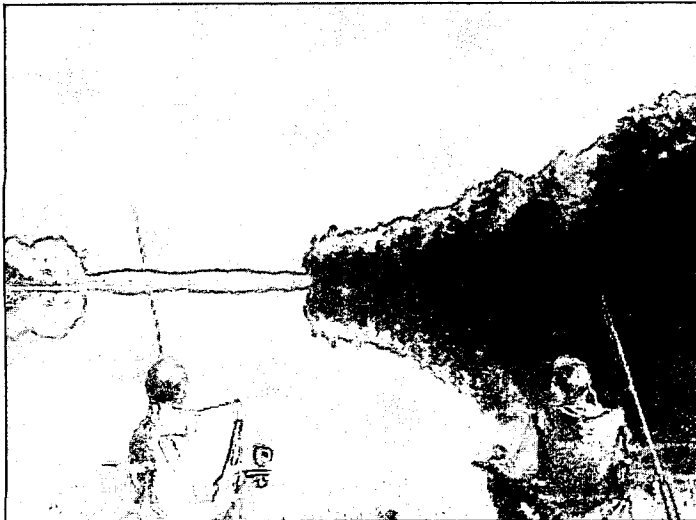

Tree Warden's Report

A reminder to residents that if you are interested in cutting or limbing trees that may be in the Shoreland Zone, consult the Shoreland Zoning Ordinance which is available on the town website. If you have additional shoreland tree removal questions, call Gary Richardson, our Code Enforcement Officer.

I recently received an inquiry about a browntail moth infestation on the island. Early summer is the time to get ahead of such an infestation in your trees. Browntail moths feed on leaves of many hardwood trees and shrubs -- including oak, apple, cherry, hawthorn, serviceberry, rugosa rose and bayberry. They can completely defoliate a tree or shrub. In the spring/summer months, chemical sprays are the only treatment option. During the winter, you can manually disturb their cocoons by clipping the webs off while the caterpillars are still inside and then soak them in water and detergent to destroy them. For those interested in chemically treating infected trees on their property, I have been referring them to WellTree, Inc. in Brunswick. Feel free to call me with questions.

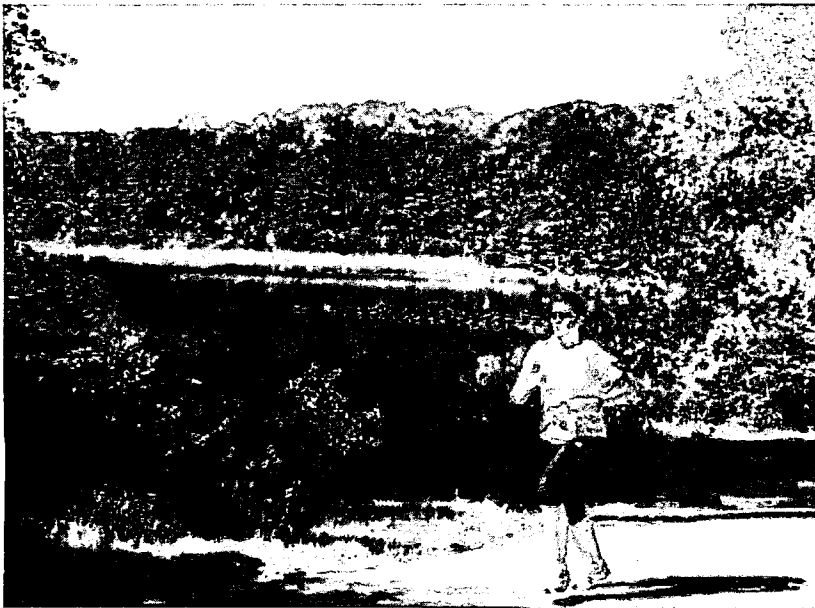

Local Health Officer's 2015 Report

Maine law requires every municipality in the State to employ an official who is known as the Local Health Officer (LHO). The Maine Center for Disease Control & Prevention (CDC), Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS), mandated that all Local Health Officers had to be certified beginning in 2009. The legal duties of the Local Health Officer are, but are not limited to:

- Being an overall health resource to the community;
- Investigating and enforcing complaints that cannot be resolved;
- Mediating and problem-solving the resolution of complaints;
- Reporting to and informing the Board of Selectmen on the community's public health status; and
- Reporting to Maine CDC, DHHS any perceived local health threats.

During this past year, I have been involved in one significant concern involving a potential health and safety issue of an elderly person. This concern involved an organization, Helping Hands, who contacted me in November 2015. They were concerned about an individual on Westport Island who was alone and potentially at risk. I called this individual for a wellness check on November 17, 2015. We spoke for a while and I determined that they were safe at that time but asked if I could contact them regularly to speak with them; and they stated yes. I called again twice in the next two months, but they had moved per information from the Westport Town Office. George Richardson, First Selectman of Westport Island, was made aware of this situation. After some consideration and discussion at the town office, we determined that it was appropriate to close this case. This individual does have concerned adult children who are able to assist. George Richardson is aware of the situation.



On a timely public education note: The Maine CDC has received confirmation of an influenza-associated death the first week in April. The child was less than five years old and tested positive for influenza B/Victoria strain. This was the first influenza related child death in Maine this season. Please be aware that influenza in Maine is still increasing, and the vaccine is still strongly encouraged and is widely available especially to at-risk groups. It is not too late to get vaccinated.

I would like all residents of Westport to be aware that I have posted all available DHHS Hotlines and Crisis numbers at the Westport Island Town Office Building on the bulletin board in the front doorway.

Please feel free to go in and write down any number that you may need to contact for help.

Road Commissioner's Report

It's been a fairly quiet year for Westport Island roads with no major storms. The mild 2015-2016 winter was good to us in general; but freezing, thawing and water intrusion always leave us with potholes and plenty of spring grading to do.

This last year's focus was on smaller back roads which have been neglected – many off West Shore Road including Junction and Back Door roads. We added gravel, cut brush to help widen the travelled portion and put in culverts. We also did some ditching on the Main Road. Ditching is important, as draining water away from the roads helps to maintain the road surface after repairs and grading. Discussions are underway with the Selectmen to do some repaving where it is most needed.

I welcome all calls about problem areas and will correct them in a timely manner when possible.

Animal Control Officer's Report

This year, we had more issues with dogs running at large than usual, including: a resident who was attacked in her yard; a resident who was "nipped" while walking; two killed chickens; an unknown, unlicensed dog running around on the Main Road and a dog killed by a vehicle. A reminder: when there are complaints and an owner cannot be identified, the dog will be taken to the shelter. To minimize problems for your neighbors and your family, supervise your dog as a valued member of your family.

Once again, there were multiple calls about porcupines and one about a raccoon. Three of the porcupines were dead and were collected and buried. Other calls concerned possible risk to pets; none of the porcupines exhibited signs of illness. Two feral cats – one with four kittens – were picked up this year and taken to the shelter; and we had one resident bitten by a cat.

Make sure your dogs and cats are vaccinated against rabies. In October 2015, a skunk tested positive for rabies in Wiscasset – a reminder that transmission of this deadly virus is always a potential threat. The animals that most frequently tested positive for the virus last year were raccoons, bats and skunks, all of which are present on Westport Island.

For those who can't afford rabies vaccines at the vets office, the Coastal Humane Society, Brunswick, hosts a low-cost rabies vaccination (\$10) and microchipping (\$25) clinic. See their online calendar for dates and times. If you can't afford to neuter your animal, call the Community Spay/Neuter Clinic, 721-8395, in Topsham to see if you are eligible for assistance.

Thank you to those who have licensed their dogs. Per Maine state law, all dogs six months or older must be licensed each year with the Town Clerk. Fees collected from dog licensing help pay for the Animal Control Officer and for state animal welfare programs. Call the Town Clerk, 882-8477 ext. 3, for questions about licensing your dog.

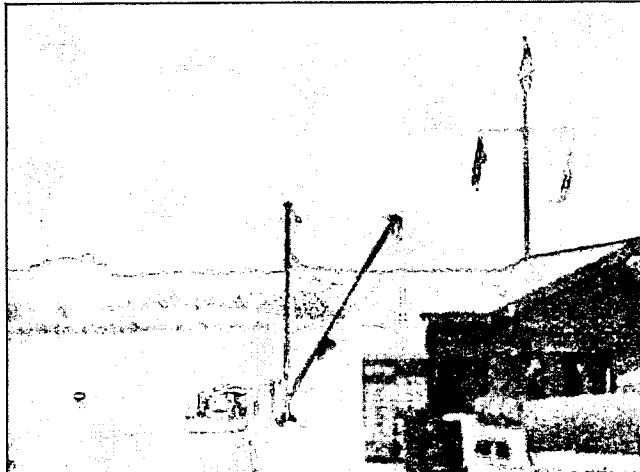

Westport Island Harbor Master Report 2015

Boat registrations are due in January. Make sure your registration is up to date before you launch your boat for the season. Boats that are **registered out of state** and reside in Maine waters for 30 consecutive days need to be registered here. For documented boats, the tax needs to be paid at the Town Office every year.

For those who use their moorings year round, you need to have U.S. Army Corps of Engineers permits and notify the Harbor Master of the mooring used and the owner of that mooring. The mooring owner is responsible for any possible damages if their boat gets free of the mooring.

Worn or lost mooring stickers need replacing. Mooring stickers need to be placed on the mooring ball or high buoy as visible as possible to help with the assignment of coordinates. This is the owner's responsibility. Please put these stickers on in the spring or early summer. The stickers aid us in getting the grid work done and help us in recovery and assistance, if needed.



This year's "happenings": Trees floating all around the island, boats sinking, floats adrift after full moon tides and boats breaking free from moorings that haven't been maintained. We have had boats, long-term moorings and floats sink. Mooring owners are responsible for all damages caused by their faulty mooring hardware. We continue to receive calls on row boats lost while towing, missing kayaks, and people missing or lost in the fog.

Moorings need maintenance each and every year to insure that your vessel is safely secured. A chain that is half worn out (the half-life is usually three years for a ½-inch chain) is considered gone, or not safe. Clean and inspect your chain out of the water every year. Moorings that are used for rental properties need Army Corps Permits, and moorings used for winter stowage of floats also need Army Corps Permits.

Reports of trees floating around the Island continue to rise. Please, if your trees fall into the river, don't just push them out. Cut them up and remove them. Floating trees are a great danger at night for all types of water transportation as well as to boats on moorings and to piers and floats in the flow of the currents.

Emergency Management Assistance (EMA) Report 2015

As EMA Directors, our duties are: to help the Island prepare for and respond to natural and man-made critical incidents that can cause damage to persons or property. We are also responsible for helping to “mitigate”, or moderate, the impact of future disastrous events. Mitigation requires assessing and documenting physical and financial loss from each event -- this includes damage to utilities, roads, and town infrastructure; so that, if possible, improvements can be made to eliminate or minimize risk-causing conditions when emergency conditions arise.

This last year, we were grateful to report no damage-causing weather events. EMA efforts were all about planning and mitigation. The state and county conducted a process to update the Lincoln County Hazard Mitigation plan. We added an additional priority to the plan for Westport Island – a generator that can handle the current electrical load at the Fire Department. As all islanders know, power outages are a common “emergency event” on the island.

Preparing for and moderating the impact of storm and other critical incidents means ensuring that the Westport Volunteer Fire Department (WVFD) has the capacity to respond. If a storm or other critical incident were to block the bridge, there was an extended power outage or mutual aid partners were unable to provide mutual aid because of needs in their own communities, the WVFD needs to be able to act autonomously if needed.

To this end, EMA and the WVFD secured funding from Lincoln County Regional Planning to conduct a structural evaluation of the station for future planning. We then collaborated on, and succeeded in obtaining, an Assistance to Firefighters grant to purchase code compliant personal safety and maintenance equipment. And, we collaborated on a Hazard Mitigation grant to purchase the WVFD a 50KW generator capable of operating the station and all its equipment for at least three days. A final determination on this grant is pending.

We will continue to pursue funds to support our fire department and keep our volunteers safe. We owe our volunteers a debt gratitude for the time they commit to Island readiness.

In closing, a reminder: in any storm-related emergency, call 911 first. After-the-fact, report property, road and utility damage in disaster events to EMA, Fire officials or the Road Commissioner to ensure all damage on the island is assessed and documented (you can email: wagnerhiggins11@gmail.com).

We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Management's Discussion and Analysis
Fiscal Year Ending June 30, 2015**

As management of the Town of Westport Island, Maine we offer readers of the Town's financial statements this narrative overview and analysis of the financial activities of the Town of Westport Island for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2015 and 2014. We encourage readers to consider the information presented here in conjunction with additional information that we have furnished in our Annual Report of the Town of Westport Island, Maine 04578.

ADMINISTRATIVE NOTES

Overview of Finance

At the 2015 town meeting the Town voted on many articles. The total appropriations approved for 2015 were \$2,276,006.04 of which the education expenditures were \$1,016,371.53 and the Lincoln County tax expenditure was \$264,883.70.

THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The financial statements presented herein include all the activities of the Town of Westport Island, Maine (the Town) using the integrated approach as prescribed by GASB Statement No 34.

The Government-Wide Financial Statements present the financial picture of the Town from the economic resources measurement focus using the accrual basis of accounting. They present government activities and business activities separately. These statements include all assets of the Town (including infrastructure) as well as all liabilities. Additionally, certain eliminations have occurred as prescribed by the statement in regards to interfund activity, payables and receivables.

The Fund Financial Statements include statements for each of the three categories of activities - government, business-type, and fiduciary. The government activities are prepared using the current financial resources measurement focus and modified accrual basis of accounting. The business-type activities are prepared using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. The fiduciary activities are agency funds, which only report a balance sheet and do not have a measurement focus. Reconciliation of the Fund Financial Statements to the Government-Wide Financial Statements is provided to explain the difference created by the integrated approach.

REPORTING THE TOWN AS A WHOLE

The Statement of Net Position (see Exhibit A) and the Statement of Activities (see Exhibit B) report information about the Town as a whole and its activities. These statements include all assets and liabilities of the Town using the accrual basis of accounting, which is similar to the accounting used by most private sector companies. All of the current year's revenue and expenses are taken into account regardless of when cash is received or paid.

These two statements report the Town's net position and changes to it. Net Position is the difference between assets and liabilities, which is one way to measure the Town's financial health or financial position. Over time, increases and decreases are one indicator of whether its financial health is improving or deteriorating. Other factors to consider are changes to the Town's property tax base and the condition of the Town's infrastructure.

In the Statement of Net Position and Statements of Activities we separate the Town's basic government activities as:

Property taxes, excise taxes, fees, interest income, and state and federal grants finance the activities. Detail relating to the activities is in Schedule A-2 and A-4.

REPORTING THE TOWN'S MOST SIGNIFICANT FUNDS

Fund Financial Statements

The fund financial statements provide detailed information about the most significant funds, not the Town as a whole. Management established many funds to help it control and manage money for particular purposes to show that it is meeting legal responsibilities for using certain taxes, grants, or other money.

Government Funds

All of the Town's basic services are reported in government funds, which focus on how money flows into and out of those funds and the balances left at year end. The government fund statement provides a detailed short-term view of the Town's general government operations and the basic services it provides.

Government fund information helps determine whether there are more or fewer financial resources that can be spent in the near future to finance the Town's programs. The differences of results in the Government Fund financial statements to those in the Government-Wide financial statements are explained in reconciliation statements.

THE TOWN AS A WHOLE
(Government-Wide Financial Analysis)

As noted earlier, net position may serve over time as a useful indicator of the Town's financial position. In the case of Westport Island, assets exceeded liabilities by \$1,874,852.47 at the close of fiscal year 2015 compared to \$1,555,586.57 at the close of fiscal year 2014. This shows an increase in net position of \$319,265.90 for the year 2015.

Government Activities

The cost of all Governmental Activities was \$1,940,264.56 for 2015 compared to \$2,078,099.13 for 2014. Charges for services were \$44,566.92 for 2015 and \$53,103.95 for 2014. Operating grants and contributions for 2015 totaled \$35,447.64 and \$54,590.43 for 2014. The Town's programs listed below show the net cost (total cost less revenues generated by the activities). The cost shows the financial burden that was placed on the Town's taxpayers by each of the functions.

DEBT ADMINISTRATION

The Town had three loans outstanding at June 30, 2015. The balance of the loan to purchase the Wright property was \$200,321.70 at the start of the year and was reduced by \$21,600.87 to a balance of \$178,720.83. This loan is expected to be paid off in the year 2023.

The second loan was \$1,300,000.00 and used to fund the 2009 tax commitment. Principal paid on the loan totaled \$251,094.68 for the current year leaving a balance of \$239,661.55 as of June 30, 2015.

The third loan was \$251,299.00 and used to purchase a fire truck. Principal paid on the loan totaled \$19,574.85 for the current year leaving a balance of \$165,155.57 as of June 30, 2015.

CAPITAL ASSET

During the year the Town Office parking lot and Fowles Point Road were paved at a cost of \$38,400.00.

NOTE A - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

The accounting policies of the Town of Westport Island conform to generally accepted accounting principles as applicable to governmental units.

1. Financial Reporting Entity

The Town of Westport Island was incorporated on February 5, 1828. The Town operates under a town meeting form of government.

In evaluating the Town of Westport Island as a reporting entity, management has addressed all potential component units. The primary criteria for including a component reporting entity is the exercise of financial accountability by the Town of Westport Island's municipal officials.

The Town's financial statements are prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is responsible for establishing Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) for state and local governments through its pronouncements (Statements and Interpretations). Governments are also required to follow the pronouncements of the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) issued through November 30, 1989 (when applicable) that do not conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements. The more significant accounting policies established in GAAP are used by the Town as discussed below.

In June 1999, the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) unanimously approved Statement No. 34, *Basic Financial Statements – and Management's Discussion and Analysis – for State and Local Governments*. Certain significant changes in the Statement include the following:

1.) The financial statements now include:

- A Management's Discussion and Analysis (MD&A) section providing an analysis of the Town's overall financial position and results of operations.
- Financial statements prepared using full accrual accounting for all of the Town's activities, including infrastructure (roads, bridges, etc.).

2.) A change in the fund financial statements to focus on the major funds.

These and other changes are reflected in the accompanying financial statements (including notes to financial statements).

2. Basic Financial Statements - Government-Wide Statements

The Town's basic financial statements include both government-wide (reporting the Town as a whole) and fund financial statements (reporting the Town's major funds). Both the government-wide and fund financial statements categorize primary activities as governmental. The Town's fire protection, recreation, public works, and general administrative services are classified as governmental activities.

2. Basic Financial Statements - Government-Wide Statements (Cont'd)

In the government-wide Statements of Net Position, the governmental column is presented on a consolidated basis by column, and is reported on a full accrual, economic resource basis, which recognizes all long-term assets and receivables as well as long-term debt and obligations. The Town's net position is reported in three parts - net invested in capital assets; restricted; and unrestricted. The Town first utilizes restricted resources to finance qualifying activities.

The government-wide Statements of Activities reports both the gross and net cost of each of the Town's functions and business-type activities (fire, public works, administrative, etc.). The functions are also supported by general government revenues (property, certain intergovernmental revenues, fines, permits, and charges, etc.). The Statements of Activities reduces gross expenses (including depreciation) by related program revenues and operating and capital grants. Program revenues must be directly associated with the function (fire, public works, etc.). Operating grants include operating-specific and discretionary (either operating or capital) grants while the capital grants column reflects capital-specific grants.

The net costs (by function or business-type activity) are normally covered by general revenue (property, intergovernmental revenues, interest income, etc.).

This government-wide focus is more on the sustainability of the Town as an entity and the change in the Town's net position resulting from the current year's activities.

3. Basic Financial Statements - Fund Financial Statements

The financial transactions of the Town are reported in individual funds in the fund financial statements. Each fund is accounted for by providing a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, reserves, fund equity, revenues, and expenditures/expenses. The various funds are reported by generic classification within the financial statements.

The following fund types are used by the Town:

a. Governmental Funds:

The focus of the governmental funds' measurement (in the fund statements) is upon determination of financial position and changes in financial position (sources, uses, and balances of financial resources) rather than upon net income. The following is a description of the governmental funds of the Town:

1. General Fund:

General Fund is the general operating fund of the Town. It is used to account for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

2. Fiduciary Funds:

Fiduciary Funds are used to report assets held in a trustee or agency capacity for others and therefore are not available to support town programs. The reporting focus is on net assets and changes in net assets and is reported using accounting principles similar to proprietary funds.

a. Governmental Funds (cont'd):

2. Fiduciary Funds (cont'd):

The emphasis in fund financial statements is on the major funds in either the governmental or business-type activities categories. Nonmajor funds by category are summarized into a single column. GASB No. 34 sets forth minimum criteria (percentage of the assets, liabilities, revenues, or expenditures/expenses of either fund category) for the determination of major funds.

The Town's fiduciary funds are presented in the fiduciary fund financial statements. Since by definition these assets are being held for the benefit of a third party and cannot be used to address activities or obligations of the government, these funds are not incorporated into the government-wide statements.

4. Basis of Accounting

Basis of accounting refers to the point at which revenues or expenditures/expenses are recognized in the accounts and reported in the financial statements. It relates to the timing of the measurements made regardless of the measurement focus applied:

a. Accrual:

Governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements and fiduciary fund financial statements are presented on the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized when earned and expenses are recognized when incurred.

b. Modified Accrual:

The governmental funds financial statements are presented on the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under the modified accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recorded when susceptible to accrual; i.e. both measurable and available. "Available" means collectible within the current period or within 60 days after year end. Expenditures are generally recognized under the modified accrual basis of accounting when the related liability is incurred. The exception to this general rule is that principal and interest on general obligation long-term debt, if any, is recognized when due.

5. Financial Statement Amounts

a. Cash and Cash Equivalents:

The Town has defined cash and cash equivalents to include cash on hand, demand deposits, and cash with fiscal agents. Statutes authorize the Treasurer of the Town, as directed by the municipal officers, to invest all municipal funds, including reserve and trust funds, to the extent that the terms of the instrument, order, or article creating the fund do not prohibit the investment, in financial institutions as described in Section 5706 MRSA and securities as described in Sections 5711 through 5717 MRSA.

b. Capital Assets:

Capital assets purchased or acquired with an original cost of \$1,000.00 or more are reported at historical cost or estimated historical cost. Contributed assets are reported at fair market value as of the date received. Additions, improvements, and other capital outlays that significantly extend the useful life of an asset are capitalized. Other costs incurred for repairs and maintenance are expensed as incurred. Depreciation on all assets is provided on the straight-line basis over the following estimated useful lives:

Buildings	12-40 Years
Machinery and Equipment	5-40 Years
Improvements	30-40 Years
Other Infrastructure	30-40 Years

c. Revenues:

Substantially, all governmental fund revenues are accrued. Property taxes are billed and collected within the same period in which the taxes are levied. In applying GASB No. 33 to grant revenues, the provider recognizes liabilities and expenses and the recipient recognizes receivables and revenue when the applicable eligibility requirements, including time requirements, are met. Resources transmitted before the eligibility requirements are met are reported as advances by the provider and deferred revenue by the recipient.

d. Expenditures:

Expenditures are recognized when the related fund liability is incurred.

e. Use of Estimates:

The presentation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

f. Fund Balance:

In accordance with GASB Statement No. 54, the Town employed new terminology and classifications for fund balance items during the fiscal year ending June 30, 2011.

Committed fund balances are amounts that can be used only for specific purposes because of a formal action taken by town government. The fund balances in the Capital Projects Fund and Cemetery Maintenance are in this category.

Assigned fund balances are amounts that the Town intends to use for specific purposes. The Board of Selectmen approved carryovers are included in assigned fund balances.

f. Fund Balance (cont'd):

Unassigned fund balances are all amounts in the General Fund that are not assigned to another category. Only the General Fund can have an unassigned fund balance.

NOTE B - CASH:

Cash

The Town's cash is categorized to give an indication of the level of risk assumed by the Town at year end. These Categories are defined as follows:

Category #1 - Insured or collateralized with securities held by the Town or by its agent in the Town's name.

Category #2 - Collateralized with securities held by the pledging financial institution's trust department or agent in the Town's name.

Category #3 - Uncollateralized (This includes any bank balance that is collateralized with securities held by the pledging financial institution, or by its trust department or agent but not in the Town's name.)

NOTE C - GENERAL FUND BUDGET:

The Town operates on a net budget as compared with a gross budget. All revenues are not estimated, but are credited to the particular operating account. Certain revenues are dedicated for particular purposes by vote of the townspeople at the annual town meeting or at special town meetings.

NOTE D - REVENUE RECOGNITION - PROPERTY TAXES:

The Town's property tax for the current year was levied August 18, 2014 on the assessed value listed as of April 1, 2014 on all taxable real and personal property located in the Town. Taxes were due September 19, 2014 with interest accrued at 3.5% commencing September 20, 2014.

NOTE D - REVENUE RECOGNITION - PROPERTY TAXES (CONT'D):

Tax liens are filed against delinquent real estate taxpayers after eight months but within one year of the original tax commitment. If the tax, interest, and costs have not been paid eighteen months after the filing of a lien certificate then the lien is automatically foreclosed.

The National Council on Governmental Accounting (N.C.G.A.) Interpretation No. 3 requires that property tax revenue be recognized only to the extent it will be collected within sixty days following the year end. The deferred tax revenue shown on the balance sheet represents property taxes not expected to be collected within sixty days after the year end.

Property taxes are recognized when they become available. Available includes those taxes expected to be collected within sixty days after year end as stated above.

NOTE E - ASSIGNED FOR OTHER PURPOSES:

Historically, the townspeople vote to carry certain departmental unexpended balances forward to the following year for expenditure. This is usually in lieu of additional appropriations in any particular account.

NOTE H - PROPERTY, PLANT, AND EQUIPMENT (CONT'D):

Depreciation expense for the period totaled \$66,420.00. The breakdown of the depreciation in the accrual basis financial statements is \$44,058.00 to General Government, \$13,285.00 to Protection, and \$9,077.00 to Highways, Bridges, and Snow Removal.

NOTE I - RISK MANAGEMENT:

The Town is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; and natural disasters. All significant losses are covered by commercial insurance. There has been no significant reduction in insurance coverage. Settlement amounts have not exceeded insurance coverage for the current year or the three prior years.

NOTE J - OVERLAPPING DEBT:

The Town of Westport Island is situated in Lincoln County and is therefore subject to annual assessments of its proportional share of County expenses. Long-term debt outstanding in Lincoln County for which the Town of Westport Island would be proportionally responsible in the event the County defaulted amounted to \$6,790,000.00 at December 31, 2014. The Town of Westport Island's share would be 3.2% of the debt or approximately \$217,280.00.

The Town of Westport Island is a participant in Regional School Unit 12 (RSU #12) and is subject to annual assessment of its proportional share of school expenses. Long-term debt outstanding in RSU #12 for which the Town of Westport Island would be proportionally responsible in the event the school defaulted is approximately \$21,306,835.00 at June 30, 2015. The Town of Westport Island's share would be 14.47% of the debt or approximately \$3,083,099.00.

NOTE K - EXPENDITURES IN EXCESS OF APPROPRIATIONS (APPROPRIATIONS IN EXCESS OF REVENUES):

During the current year expenditures/revenues did not exceed total appropriations in any general fund categories.

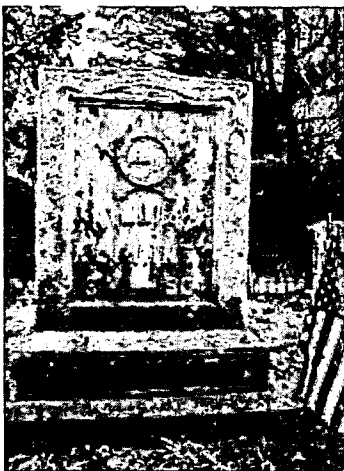

Town Hall Committee's 2015 Report

In 2015, the Town Hall elected not to undertake a large project -- such as painting the sides of the building. Instead, several small miscellaneous repairs/improvements were accomplished, including:

- Repairs were made to correct an unsecured "hot wire" in the utility room that was uncovered as part of an inspection by the State of Maine Workplace Safety Division. Actions to correct the deficiency were reported to the state.
- Repairs were made to trim boards and some clapboards on the front south corner and on the restroom extension.
- A new, improved well cap was put on the well head. This new cap considerably improves the security and safety of the well and water supply to the Town Hall.

Westport Island History Committee

The Westport Island History Committee is a volunteer organization dedicated to advising Westport Island Selectmen on the pursuit, preservation and promotion of the Island's proud history and rich cultural heritage.

For the History Committee, 2015 was consumed with the "Westport Island History & Heritage Preservation Project," undertaken with funding from a successfully completed Maine State Archives grant, History Committee funds and individual donations. The project had three broad objectives:

- 1. A Plan to Maximize and Improve Space;**
- 2. Improved Archival Storage; and**
- 3. A Cataloging System to Expand Public Access.**

Our accomplishments under this project included:

- Developing an overarching Strategic Plan for the History Committee – that is updated annually -- and presented to the Selectmen for review and approval;
- Developing policies and forms to create accountable tracking of donated historical items;
- Cleaning, repainting, installing UV light filters and re-shelving the Town Office vault and the History Committee storage room;
- Installing window insulation units, new shades and a file caddy in the History Committee storage room;
- Hiring intern Morgan Leavitt to assist History Committee members with rehousing and initial cataloging of both permanent municipal records and History Committee holdings; and
- Beginning the process of populating an archival collection database.

Bowdoin College students volunteered time through Common Good Day to digitize and document photographs from the Colby-Greenleaf Collection. History Committee members continued digitizing and cataloging work during winter work sessions. Several collections are now cataloged and 100 photographs and historic letters are available for viewing on the Maine Memory Network, www.mainememory.net. A link has been added on the "History & Cemeteries" page of the town website for convenient access to Westport Island's Maine Memory Network pages.

The History Committee exists because of donations of time and resources from committed volunteers and donations of historical items and narratives from many friends. Special thanks to 2015 contributors, including:

- The Town Hall Committee, Fire Department and community volunteers who helped with both donated time and materials to renovate the History Committee storage room;
- Calvin Cromwell for donated photographs and time assisting with cataloging photographs;

Report of the Westport Island Conservation Commission

The mission of the Conservation Commission is to encourage the *protection and preservation of the natural resources of Westport Island and its coastal waters for the use and enjoyment of residents and their families*. In carrying out these functions, the Commission works with local officials, the planning board, citizens, private organizations and regional, state and federal agencies, as appropriate. In our view, “conservation” is not just “preservation”; it’s the intelligent and ecological use of our natural resources to benefit all present and future residents of our island.

The specific projects the Commission undertakes are determined by the interests of the members and the Town. During the period from 16 April 2015 to 15 April 2016, the following projects were undertaken:

1. Clough Point Town Preserve - The Commission continued to maintain and improve this property, with periodic clean-up and the maintenance of trail signs. The Town’s website includes a map of the trails. In the past year we completed construction of a boardwalk and interpretive display overlooking a possible vernal pool that we have identified on the property. This boardwalk provides the opportunity for people to approach and observe a vernal pool and learn about its environmental significance with minimal disturbance.
2. Bonyun Preserve - Members of the Commission have periodically assisted other volunteers with the building and repairs to several footbridges in the preserve. This scenic coastal property is open to the public and has an extensive trail network for hiking.
3. Island Clean-Up Day- The Commission continues to host this yearly event when Westport Island residents join together to clean the litter from our roadsides. We will be at it again this spring. We urge residents living along roads to periodically pick up litter adjacent to their property.
4. Coastal Stewardship Guide – During the past year, our Commission has been working with people from three local towns to prepare a regional guide that is intended to help residents learn how to best protect water resources, conserve local habitat and provide a healthy community for generation to come. The guide, which will be mailed to all Island residents in early summer 2016, will include several Westport Island specific pages providing information on conserved lands that are open to the public and a list of regional and local contacts.
5. Protecting Open Space – Westport Island is relatively rural with large tracts of privately-owned undeveloped land. Unfortunately, compared to other towns in coastal Maine, we have a significantly smaller percentage of our total land area permanently protected. During the past few years we have identified several undeveloped parcels of land that would be excellent candidates for permanent protection as conservation property. Several of these parcels include significant freshwater wetlands and some have salt water frontage. We are currently working with local conservation groups and have embarked on a fundraising campaign with the goal of permanently protecting at least one of the identified parcels. We welcome any input to help us identify additional Island areas of special interest with respect to: (1) Wildlife/Nature Habitat, (2) Recreation, (3) Water Quality, (4) Scenic/Historic Value, and (5) Hunting/Fishing. The Commission continues to work on the draft “Open Space” Plan for the Town. We welcome any other ideas regarding how we can help the town secure more permanently protected open space on the Island.
6. Island Trails Project - We continue to explore the potential for establishing a network of trails on the Island. We have identified several potential routes along existing trails and former roads that pass along property lines, through remote sections of some of the larger undeveloped parcels, through permanently protected privately-owned conservation property and through town-owned land. We are pleased to confirm that by state mandate, permission by residents to allow a walking trail on or adjacent to their property creates virtually no liabilities on their part. The Commission is pleased to work with land owners to ensure that any concerns they have are addressed and that any agreement, whether written or verbal, could be changed at any time. We welcome input from Island residents regarding their knowledge of old roads and trails that we may explore as part of this effort.

The Commission wishes to invite any Island residents with an interest in conservation and in helping maintain our unique Island environment to join the Conservation Commission. Please contact any of the persons listed below.

The Web Site and Mapping Committee Report

The Westport Island Web Site and Mapping Committee has begun the transition of the web site, tax maps and GIS management to a sustainable and professional level of management. This transition will be less volunteer dependent and more Town Office staff centered. Newer technology available today makes these tasks simpler and more cost effective. The transition is planned for completion by the end of 2016.

A new hosting platform for the town web site was selected based on "WordPress". This platform will be compatible with digital devices in common use today like tablets and smartphones as well as desktop and laptop computers. A WordPress based web site will allow all common site content to be updated and maintained either by town office staff or a volunteer "Webmaster". Maintenance will be simple and require no complex computer coding. We are seeking a volunteer or contractor to take the lead in designing the new web site.

As in past years, the town's tax maps were updated in 2015 to reflect lot splits, mergers and other parcel configuration changes. The new maps were posted on the town web site along with current assessing data. All of this data was posted as "static" copies. In years past, DeLorme hosted this data as an interactive full GIS database linked to Westport Island's web site. Unfortunately, DeLorme discontinued their web hosting service several years ago. In order to restore the features lost, the Committee has recommended that tax maps and GIS data be transferred, subject to voter approval, to a new state of the art interactive GIS system provided by CAI Technologies. The town's web site will link directly to CAI hosted database allowing users to quickly search for parcels and see assessment data. In addition, full GIS data will be available including layers for shoreland and other zoning, wetlands, conserved lands, cemeteries, aquifers, soils, etc.

The Westport Island Shellfish Committee Report

The Westport Island Shellfish Committee oversees and supports efforts in the conservation of soft shell clams within the town's clam flats.

The committee worked with the Department of Marine Resources (DMR) in opening Squam Creek to clamming during the months when water quality is at its best. The opening dates allow for the taking of softshell clams in Squam Creek from November 1, 2016, through May 31, 2017. The closure dates are June 1, 2016 through October 31, 2016. These dates will remain the same annually unless otherwise noted by the DMR.

It is the responsibility of all licensed clam diggers of Westport Island to know the open and closed areas for taking clams and to know about red tide closures. The Red Tide Hotline phone number is 1-800-232-4733. Maps are provided by the Town Office to all commercial and recreational clam harvesters of Westport Island so that they are aware of the areas where clams may be harvested. For the most up-to-date information, consult the DMR website (http://www.maine.gov/dmr/rm/public_health/closures/closedarea.htm) for closure information.

Road Committee Report

The Road Committee was established to create a long-range plan for the town roads. It appears the priority at this point would be a sand and salt shed, which most towns have. The present storage of sand is at G&D Cromwell's Main Road facility. By law, no salt can be mixed with the sand in an outside pile. Salt is purchased in the bag by the ton. This could present a problem in the future should the Cromwells not snowplow for the town.

Should an out of town contractor end up snowplowing for the town, where would they keep the sand and salt? The town purchases the sand and salt; therefore, it should be stored at a town-owned facility. The sand should be stored on the island to reduce response time. If an emergency need arises for the fire department, an ambulance or a school bus, there would be no time to wait for sand to come from out of town. The cost savings of bulk purchase of salt would also save thousands of dollars per year.

Towns with salt sheds are finding it hard to find bidders to do their snowplowing. With no sand and salt facility, Westport could find itself with no bidders in the future.

It is better to build this facility now than to find the town under the gun to build one to entice contractors to bid on snowplowing. Funds to build a sand and salt shed will be voted on at town meeting. I urge you to attend. We have also researched costs and recommendations on updating town pavement; but more work is necessary on a long-range pavement plan.

Westport Planning Board Activity 2015

The Planning Board reached full membership with five members and two alternates as follows: Dick Barker, Archie Bonyun, Michelle Chartier, Don Leis, and Chair Ruth Nelson. Chris Malliet has requested to remain as a permanent alternate, and Richard Gray returned to the Board as an alternate. Although there is no person who is designated as the Secretary, Archie Bonyun has frequently performed this duty for several years.

The Board reviewed a number of pier permits and Building Permits during the year and held noticed Public Hearings as needed. Much time was spent on the Model Addressing Ordinance because of the need for emergency personnel and vehicles to access locations at night as quickly as possible. Ordinances from other towns were reviewed and a draft was created. The Fire Department felt that the reflective address signs should be mandated and should meet certain standards. There was agreement on some aspects of the ordinance and not on others. The issue was tabled until the next Town Meeting.

The Planning Board agreed to advertise the importance of the reflective address signs at their events and in discussions with property owners. The goal was to encourage the public to realize the importance of reflective address signs and voluntarily request them, so that the First Responders and the Fire Department can quickly access locations where emergency assistance is needed.

Our future goals include the completion of a Manual that would provide generic formats of the forms used by the Planning Board, such as Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law and checklists for review of a submitted Building or Pier Permit Application. New members can now easily access these materials which has decreased the learning curve for members.

We look forward to a bright future with seasoned and experienced members on the Planning Board.

Wright Landing Committee

Through the hard work of its volunteer committee members, the Wright Landing continued to be neat, well maintained, and welcoming to the public. Donna Curry and her Horticulture Committee are a blessing. As a result of their planting and gardening, the landing is a pristine picture of what a Public Landing should look like. Richard DeVries hooked up hoses – donated by many islanders – from his house to several points on the landing to give Donna's team the ability to faithfully water the flowers and shrubs.

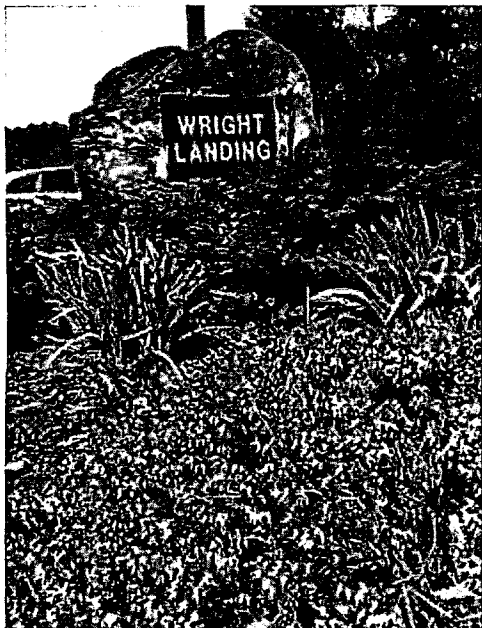

Westport Volunteer Fire Department Annual Report

2015-2016 has been an interesting year. In 2015, we responded to 97 calls: 45 of those calls were medical, 6 were fires, and 26 were public service responses. With the majority of our calls being for medical assistance, we have the good fortune that Deputy Chief Jason Abbott has completed Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) – Advanced level training. Firefighter Kristin Draper is in the process of obtaining the same advanced training. EMT advanced training is an intense six-month course with 150 hours of classroom; a minimum 150 hours of clinical work in hospital ER's, ambulances and surgeries; ending with a written national licensing examination.

Other members of the department have been busy with other trainings that have given our department a broader skills base to benefit our community. James Richardson is taking the Firefighter I & II class. Much like EMT training, this is an intense six-month course with two nights a week and all-day Saturday classroom and practical instruction. The majority of time is spent outside applying the skills required to be a safe and effective firefighter. One of the trainings requires the trainees to bail-out of a 2nd story window head first, secure themselves on a ladder, and get safely to the ground as quickly as possible. (Don't Try This At Home!)

This past March, Paul Arthur, Lou Babineau, and Michael Hughes completed an all-day training to become qualified Ice and Cold Water Rescue Technicians. Over 75% of the training time was spent out on the ice or in freezing water learning and practicing rescue skills and techniques.

In other matters, we have been improving our Facebook Page to keep people informed and make it more interesting. We also have a new website -- go to www.wvfd-me.org and check it out. See pictures and our organizational chart and read our Mission Statement and a brief history of the department. We continue to add content, including safety information and links to informative sites. We have also included a way to donate to the fire department online with PayPal. Your contributions make it possible to continue to train and equip our men and women.

Hopefully, many of you have noticed some new address number signs appearing around the island. The green and white reflective number signs are being offered by the fire department for \$15 each. For \$15, you receive a two-sided reflective number sign, a metal mounting post and installation by the fire department. This project improves emergency response and acts as a fundraiser. First Responders need to find your address without delay in an emergency. Most address numbers are on one side of a mailbox; but responders come from both ends of the island – and many numbers are not visible at night, in the rain, or either. The \$15 cost includes a small margin of profit to fund training and maintenance of the department.

With the collaboration of volunteer grant writer Gaye Wagner, our department has been successful in obtaining a \$57,000 Assistance to Firefighters Grant. With a small 5% match, we have been able to purchase six sets of turnout gear – boots, coats, pants, helmets and safety hoods; a high-pressure air compressor with a refilling station for our breathing apparatus bottles; and a commercial clothes washer to clean our firefighting gear. With careful budgeting, we were approved to purchase three additional sets of firefighting gear. In a second grant application, we are seeking to purchase a 50,000 watt generator to replace our 13,000 watt unit to meet current emergency needs. This grant has passed state review; and awaits the federal review outcome.

The department was also successful in getting eight new breathing apparatus bottles through a Maine Municipal Associations' Safety Enhancement Grant. These bottles, at \$755 each, were needed to replace bottles near their 15-year expiration dates. We had to contribute one-third of the total cost of the bottles.

In conclusion, we have had an active year. Training and practicing is the most important thing we do. Our goal is to do whatever is required of us safely and successfully... Our mission in a nutshell: Save Lives, Contain Emergencies, and Save Property if possible, in that order.

Helping Hands of Westport Island Annual Report 2015

Helping Hands of Westport Island (formerly known as the Human Resource Committee) is a benevolent and charitable group of volunteers offering aid, comfort and companionship to all residents of Westport Island -- especially the aged, infirm, lonely, or persons facing personal, medical or family difficulties. Our services vary yearly according to the needs of the residents.

We applied for and received 501 (c)(3) non-profit status in 2015 and changed our name accordingly. All donations received from residents are now fully tax deductible for those who itemize their taxes.

The Westport Island Cottage Pantry was established in September of 2010. Last year, we served approximately 21 households. We receive food from TEFAP (The Emergency Food Assistance Program/USDA); and we shop at the Good Shepherd Food Bank in Auburn where we are able to purchase \$600 worth of food for every \$100 spent. The pantry also benefits from a variety of community donations. The Community Association places donation boxes at its functions during the year to collect non-perishable food items and paper products for the benefit of the Island Cottage Pantry. Treats of Wiscasset donates bread each month. We also receive produce from the Tarbox Farm during the growing season, as well as from local establishments when they have a surplus.

Helping Hands also receives donations of food, paper products and other household commodities from donations to the Town Offices. You are welcome to call Michael Cromwell (380-5885) or Linda Davis (882-5464) to see if your level of income qualifies you to receive help from the pantry. We deliver the food to those who qualify. Each year, we send an annual fundraiser newsletter to inform residents of our activities and of other resources available to Westport residents. Helping Hands' activities include,

- At Thanksgiving and Christmas we provide baskets for many residents;
- Emergency fuel assistance is provided to those in need during the heating season;
- We co-sponsor the annual Halloween Dance with the Community Association;
- Our members and volunteers respond to requests for rides to and from doctor's appointments, grocery shopping and other errands; and
- Our members and volunteers check on older residents during storms and respond to a variety of requests for assistance. We are especially vigilant of our residents during ice and snow storms and during power outages to assure that they are safe.



Thank you to all who have volunteered their time and have donated to our committee. With your ongoing support, we hope to be able to continue our level of help to those in need. Superintendent's Message

Dear Citizens of Westport Island,

The 2015-2016 school year has been an exciting year for the Sheepscot Valley RSU 12 school district. The Sheepscot Valley RSU 12 school district includes the towns of Alna, Chelsea, Palermo, Somerville, Whitefield, Windsor, and Westport Island. RSU 12's vision is to "build a foundation of lifetime learning for our students, families, and communities." RSU 12 continues to move forward working towards this vision. This year, RSU 12 Board of Directors and staff have worked to expand PreK programming for four-year-olds. RSU 12 successfully established four PreK classrooms this year. There are two classrooms located at Chelsea Elementary School, one classroom at Whitefield Elementary School, and one classroom at Somerville Elementary School. There are plans to add a PreK classroom at Windsor. Transportation is provided to these programs. All programs filled with a total of sixty-four students attending. Funding was made possible for these programs by working in collaboration with regional Headstart agencies and leveraging Federal grant funds. It is hoped that RSU 12 can continue to expand and maintain these programs in order to accommodate all PreK students in RSU 12 in the future.

Educators in RSU 12 continue to work towards implementing a proficiency-based learning environment. This type of learning environment provides a structure that creates flexibility and allows students to progress as they demonstrate mastery of academic content regardless of time or pace of learning. Proficiency-based strategies provide flexibility in the way that mastery can be accomplished, and provide students with personalized learning opportunities. This type of learning leads to better student engagement because the content is relevant to each student and tailored to their unique needs. It also leads to better student outcomes because the pace of learning is customized to each student. By enabling students to master skills at their own pace, a proficiency-based learning environment helps to save both time and money.

RSU 12 is currently working on the goals in our Long Range Plan. You can find this plan under Goals on the www.svrstu.org website. Below are the broad goals of the plan.

1. *Maximize the use of resources to serve students and the community to their highest potential.*
2. *Enhance school involvement with communities.*
3. *Hire, develop and retain talented and dedicated staff, to serve as positive role models for students and the community.*
4. *Enhance parental involvement in student learning.*
5. *Develop a cohesive, personalized and rigorous curriculum that is relevant and directed toward the fulfillment of the future aspirations of our students.*
6. *Foster a comfortable, safe environment; providing an atmosphere of support and respect for others, where the complexity and diversity of individual learners is recognized and accommodated.*

At the time of this writing, the 2016-2017 RSU 12 school budget has been approved by the RSU 12 Board of Directors and is headed to voters for approval. There is an overall local increase of 2.8%. State subsidy has once again decreased proportionally to last year as the state is asking towns to raise more locally. In spite of this decrease in state funding, the RSU 12 Board has worked hard to develop a FY17 budget that maximizes programming while remaining fiscally conservative. I look forward to working with the community and strengthening the collaboration between the member towns in RSU 12.

Winter 2016 School Report for Sending Towns

Lincoln Academy is an independent secondary school chartered in 1801 to serve the midcoast area. It offers a comprehensive program, including courses at all levels in the areas of English, Mathematics, Science, Social Studies, World Languages, Fine and Performing Arts, Technology Education, Physical Education, and Health. Regional Vocational, Alternative Education, and Special Education programs are available. On a ten-year cycle Lincoln Academy is accredited by the New England Association of Schools and Colleges (NEASC), and was most recently reaccredited in 2015.

In 2015 three new facilities opened on the Lincoln Academy Campus. The Cable-Burns Applied Technology and Engineering Center (ATEC) now offers 10,000 square feet of classroom space for engineering, science, art, and technology courses. The new dormitory houses 57 of the 84 residential students currently attending Lincoln Academy. The William A. Clark Athletic Field is an artificial turf field where the soccer, field hockey, and lacrosse teams now play.

Governance

Lincoln Academy is governed by an independent Board of Trustees. The Student Body

Lincoln Academy has a current enrollment of 587 students in the 2015-16 school year. The majority of students come from 16 local towns. 84 residential students come from 16 countries around the world. After 4 consecutive years of growth, the Residential population has met available housing capacity and for the foreseeable future will remain between 80 and 90 students.

Graduates

Of the 109 graduates in the Class of 2015, 80 enrolled in post-secondary education; 70 enrolled in 4-year colleges/universities, 10 enrolled in programs shorter than 4-year (2 year and certificate programs), 24 are employed/seeking employment, and 5 enlisted in military service.

Curriculum

Lincoln Academy remains committed to its comprehensive curriculum as we strive to meet the needs of all our students. We have added new courses this year, including engineering, metal sculpture, AP Chemistry, and BC Calculus. The new courses take advantage of the space and tools in the ATEC building, as well as serve our increasingly diverse population of both day and residential students.

Finances

Unlike most independent schools, The Board does not set day tuition. Because most students' tuition is paid by their sending towns, the tuition is established by the State Department of Education using a formula based on average per pupil expenditures of Maine public high schools during the previous two years. The tuition for the 2015-16 school year was increased by 3.9% from the prior year to \$10,131.00 per pupil. The Insured Value (IV) factor is an amount in addition to tuition intended to fund capital maintenance and debt service. The legislated IV factor amount of 10% was reduced in 2009 to 5% and remained at 5% through last year. The legislature voted to partially restore the IV by voting to increase the amount to 6% of the calculated tuition figure for 2014-15. The 6% rate was carried over into 2015-16 and is \$607.86 per pupil for this year. While towns are allowed to continue to pay the full 10% and some of our area towns have done that in the past, this year all towns have elected to pay at the 6% rate.

Supporting Lincoln

While the sending towns do pay tuition for each student, that amount is calculated each year by the state. The tuition allowance is simply not enough to provide the quality educational experience that Lincoln Academy promises each and every student. LA depends on support from the Lincoln Fund (the Annual Fund) to fund the deficit, but the gap is widening between the cost of operating the school and incoming tuition revenues. Private contributions have allowed Lincoln to support both programs and capital improvements. Money raised through the Lincoln Fund supports students and faculty, and is vital to the life of the school. Since 1997, over \$1.4M has been contributed to general operations, over \$650K for specific programs, and about \$10M for capital projects. Contributions to annual and capital campaigns provide for the perpetuation of and improvements to LA's programs and physical plant without increasing local taxes.

Lincoln County Television (LCTV) Annual Report

Lincoln County Television (LCTV), established in 1991, is a non-profit organization that teaches video production, provides production equipment, and manages and distributes videos made and/or requested by individuals and organizations from supporting towns in Lincoln County, which currently include Alna, Bristol, Damariscotta, Edgecomb, Newcastle, Nobleboro and Waldoboro. LCTV programming can be seen on Time Warner Cable Channel 7, Tidewater IPTV Channel 7, and on the internet at www.lctv.org.

New Producers and Shows in 2015 (not inclusive):

Tam Green of Wiscasset: Young Composers Inspired by Nature (DRA & Salt Bay Chamberfest). Tam also manned a camera for several Annual Town Meetings, the Pumpkinfest Parade and the Pumpkinfest Regatta.

Chris Kenoyer of Alna: producer of the CLC YMCA Annual Meeting, Downtown and Locally Owned Businesses Forum, and Maine's Economy and Climate Change. Chris also created and produced a promo for Hidden Valley Nature Center.

Students from Lincoln Academy's Digital Media Production class: several creative student film shorts, highlights of the Senior Trip to Costa Rica, the Baccalaureate, music from the Lincolnaires, a Tour of the LA Campus, and the Lincoln Academy Graduation.

(LCTV). LCTV also provides a TV Bulletin Board for local non-profits to advertise their services and events.

New Developments:

LCTV has been steadily adding to our online archive of locally produced shows by converting and uploading videos produced prior to late 2010, including Lincoln Academy Basketball tournament and championship games; Art Mayer's Lincoln County Oral History shows; and Wuzzup Classics.

LCTV was fortunate to have two summer interns, *Sammy Zaidi* and *Kyle Livingston*. Sammy helped develop our new website (coming online in 2016) and Kyle helped repair and update our computer hardware.

After retiring for the second and last (we hope!) time, *Dave Svens* moved back to Bristol (Chamberlain). Dave has an extensive background in television production and gives generously of his time and talent to LCTV, local producers and the Town of Bristol. Dave produced a video of the Seacoast Community Orchestra concert held at the Lincoln Theater with the help of camera crew *Tam Green* and *Athena Taylor*.

LCTV purchased three High Definition cameras. At the current time, Time Warner Cable TV and Tidewater IPTV only send out our video in Standard Definition, but LCTV does upload the High Definition version to LCTV's Video on Demand webpage: www.lctv.org/vod.html.

Sheepscot Valley Conservation Association



The Sheepscot Valley Conservation Association is an accredited land trust and advocacy group that has worked with many conservation-minded landowners to protect 15 miles of riverfront and more than 3,700 acres of working farms, forests and important habitat in over 50 conservation properties, including seven preserves open to the public for low-impact recreation like hiking, snowshoeing, hunting and fishing.

SVCA has joined with neighboring land trusts in a number of collaborative conservation projects including the 12 Rivers Conservation Initiative, a group of 10 local land trusts seeking to accelerate conservation of the forested landscape from the Kennebec to the St. George to achieve a network of conserved lands that protects the Midcoast's ecosystems.

Our programs this past year focused on meaningful citizen science projects that our members could contribute to on a regular basis. We built on this idea by partnering with Hidden Valley Nature Center to offer an educational program ("Kids Outside Doing Science") to Whitefield and Great Salt Bay elementary schools, engaging students with hands-on, long-term science projects at the Nature Center that can be carried forward year after year. Volunteers in the community are helping with this project and other SVCA citizen science programs such as the duck box and Sheepscot River water quality monitoring programs. This year through a new Partnership with the Maine Coastal Observing Alliance, we expanded our 21-year-old water quality monitoring program into the Sheepscot River Estuary, collecting samples at five estuary locations during late summer and early fall.

In addition to helping teach local fourth graders in the "Kids Outside Doing Science" program with HVNC, educator and naturalist Lynne Flaccus opened windows to nature for folks of all ages who joined her in 2014 to explore the watershed, including walks on the new trail at SVCA's Stetser Preserve and paddles down the Sheepscot. We also held two well-attended migratory fish day events to explore how our rivers connect to the Gulf of Maine and how important these connections are for the migratory fish that depend on the Sheepscot River.

SVCA also launched our flash walk program, giving quick notice when we know the weather and/or circumstances will be just right. There are many ways to join the fun, including meeting new people who share an interest in conservation, the outdoors, and outdoor recreation, including opportunities to assist in trail maintenance, preserve stewardship, easement monitoring and other volunteer activities.

We hope you will get a chance to attend an event or visit one of the SVCA's seven public preserves: Marsh River Preserve (Newcastle); Griggs Preserve (Newcastle); Bass Falls Preserve (Alna); Stetser Preserve (Jefferson); Trout Brook Preserve (Alna); Whitefield Salmon Preserve; and Palermo Preserve.

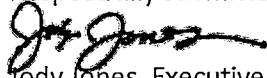

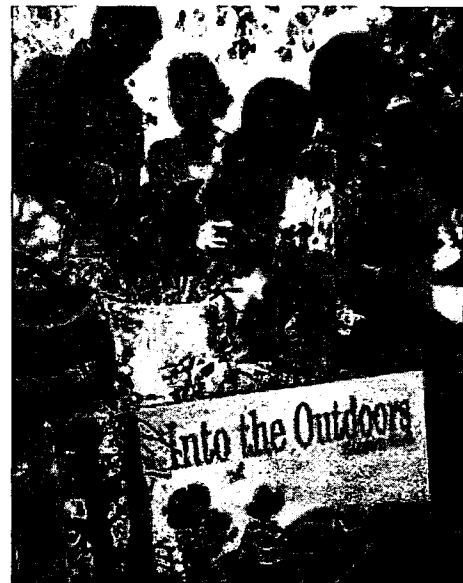

Kennebec Estuary Land Trust Annual Report to Westport Island

Dear Westport Island Residents,

Your Bonyun Preserve continued to see growth in use in the last year as word spreads of its beautiful trails and views. We hope you and your families have explored this treasure of a preserve. Looking towards the future, Kennebec Estuary Land Trust (KELT) continues to search for ways to improve and expand the Bonyun preserve. We hope to expand along Junction Road in the years ahead. Our Bailey Point easement, across from Bonyun Preserve, continues to protect the scenic views from Thomas Point over to Bailey Point, the site of a 19th century steamship landing called "The Junction". Annual inspections show the easement property is well cared for.

We also continue to look at areas specified in the Westport Comprehensive Plan and the areas in town identified as valuable areas to be protected. One such area is Squam Creek, where we are exploring options to protect that very valuable wetland habitat for future generations to enjoy.

KELT now serves nine towns in the Kennebec Estuary region. In 2015, we acquired two new properties and now protect a total of 2,685 acres. We have increased land protection by 1000 acres since 2009! We are focusing on 4-6 new properties we hope to protect in 2016. We opened the 275-acre Morse Pond Preserve in Georgetown in 2015 and constructed a 2-mile "Carousel Trail".

We are proud to report that we held 90+ events involving 2500 people, including 1000+ kids involved in education programs. Two important restoration projects for fish passage came fully on line as well last year with 130,000 fish using the new fish ladders; one in Woolwich leading to Montsweag Pond and a new customized box culvert in Arrowsic, leading to Sewell Pond. 80 volunteers helped to count them as they made their way to their breeding waters.

Our 642 members and 172 volunteers are dedicated to supporting our member towns, like Westport Island, and we look forward to working on ways to further protect the natural beauty, priceless habitats and special places in your community.

I hope this letter finds you and your family well. I appreciate the opportunity to give you an update on my work in Maine and Washington. It continues to be a great honor to serve the people of Maine's 1st District in Congress.

Over the last year, I have introduced a number of bills to address the problems my constituents face. One of the most concerning issues is hunger. Nearly 50 million Americans don't have reliable access to enough food. At the same time, 40 percent of the food produced in the country goes to waste. That is why I introduced the Food Recovery Act, comprehensive legislation to cut food waste while providing more food to the people who need it.

The Safe and Affordable Drugs from Canada Act takes on another serious concern for Maine families—the high cost of prescription drugs. Just over the border in Canada, the same medications are available at half the price on average. My bill would lift a ban that prohibits consumers from importing those medications. Other bills I introduced touch on a number of issues, from helping veterans secure benefits to protecting our coastal economies. My seat on the House Appropriations Committee—which has a powerful role in setting federal funding levels—has also put me in a position to influence policies and programs that affect Mainers. A couple of examples from the last year include pushing to make Lyme disease a higher federal priority and working to protect funding for a program that has extended pre-school to hundreds of Maine children.

But not all my work takes place at the Capitol. Here at home, I had the chance to visit many communities to help celebrate their victories and discuss their concerns—critical feedback to take to Washington. And over the last year, my hard-working staff has helped hundreds of constituents on their issues with federal programs and agencies.

Dear Friends of Westport Island:

It has been a privilege to serve the State of Maine since being sworn into the U.S. Senate.

Protecting our homeland and the people of Maine from terrorism and violence remains one of my top priorities. Through my work on the Armed Services Committee, I was able to secure several provisions in the 2016 National Defense Authorization Act that benefit Maine. The legislation authorizes the construction of an additional DDG-51 Arleigh Burke Class Destroyer that could be built at Bath Iron Works and expands the HUBZone program to stimulate economic growth at former military installations like the former Brunswick Naval Air Station.

Returning control to teachers, school districts, and states has also been a primary concern of mine. I am encouraged that the Every Student Succeeds Act has become law. It eliminates the burdensome requirements of the No Child Left Behind Act and ensures access to a quality education for all students. A provision I helped author in the bill will give states the opportunity to pilot the use of their own proficiency-based assessments in lieu of federally-mandated standardized tests.

Communities across Maine have taken bold action to improve their broadband connectivity, and I have been proud to foster federal support for these types of projects. My actions on the Every Student Succeeds Act and the Community Broadband Act will support local efforts to increase broadband access.

After extensive negotiations, the Senate passed a five-year transportation bill that will increase highway and transit funding in Maine and provide stability to improve our transportation infrastructure. The legislation contains provisions to streamline the federal permitting process for large infrastructure projects. Also incorporated in this bill are my provisions to relieve financial regulations on Maine's community banks and credit unions and to reauthorize the Export-Import Bank, a critical tool that supports communities and small business across the state.

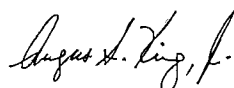
Following my inquiries in the Energy and Natural Resources Committee, the National Park Service has announced they will begin exploring strategies to allow park visitors to purchase electronic passes online and will pilot the program at Acadia National Park. These passes would improve access to our nation's most treasured landscapes. I remain deeply engaged in preserving Maine's natural beauty and strengthening our outdoor recreation economy.

It is with solemn responsibility that I have focused my energy addressing the opioid epidemic in Maine. This work includes convening roundtables with a wide-range of health care and law enforcement professionals to combat addiction; introducing a proposal to safely dispose of excess prescription drugs; cosponsoring a Senate-passed bill that addresses mothers struggling with addiction and the alarming effect it has on newborns; cosponsoring the TREAT Act, which expands the ability of medical specialists to provide life-saving medication-assisted therapies for patients battling heroin and prescription drug addiction; and calling on the Commander of U.S. Southern Command to increase efforts to stop the flow of heroin at our southern border.

I've made it a priority to stay connected with people from all over Maine who e-mail, write, and call with suggestions or questions. If I can ever assist in your interaction with a federal agency, or you have thoughts, concerns, or personal input on a matter that is currently before Congress I hope you will contact me, let me know where you stand, and engage in this critical part of democracy. Dear Friends:

It is an honor to represent Maine in the United States Senate. I am grateful for the trust the people of our State have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to share some key accomplishments from 2015.

Growing the economy by encouraging job creation was and remains my top priority. The tax-relief bill signed into law at the close of last year contains three key provisions I authored to help foster job creation and provide small businesses with the certainty they need to invest, grow, and, most important, hire new workers. Another provision I authored that became law last year gives a boost to both Maine's economy and traffic safety. This provision permanently changed the federal law that previously had forced the heaviest trucks onto our country roads and downtown streets, rather than allowing them to use Maine's federal Interstates. In addition, I was glad to help secure another significant award for the University of Maine's deepwater offshore wind initiative, which has the potential to advance an emerging industry and create thousands of good jobs in our state.

Maine's historic contributions to our nation's defense must continue. In 2015, I secured funding toward a much-needed additional Navy destroyer, likely to be built at Bath Iron Works. Modernization projects at the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard that I have long advocated for were also completed, as were projects for the Maine National Guard.

I was also deeply involved in crafting the new education reform law to better empower states and communities in setting educational policy for their students. The law also extends a program I co-authored that provides additional assistance to rural schools, which has greatly benefitted our state. A \$250 tax deduction I authored in 2002 for teachers who spend their own money on classroom supplies was also made permanent last year.

As a result of a scientific evaluation of the nutritional value of potatoes required by a law that I wrote, the wholesome fresh potato finally was included in the federal WIC nutrition program. I also worked on other issues important to Maine's farmers and growers, including research on wild blueberries and pollinating bees.

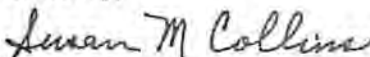
As Chairman of the Housing Appropriations Subcommittee, I have made combating veterans' homelessness a priority. This year's housing funding law includes \$60 million for 8,000 new supportive housing vouchers for homeless veterans. Since this program began in 2008, the number of homeless veterans nationwide has dropped by one third. Maine has received nearly 200 vouchers to support homeless veterans.

Last year, I became Chairman of the Senate Aging Committee. My top three priorities for the committee are retirement security, investing more in biomedical research, and fighting fraud and financial abuses targeting our nation's seniors. I advocated for the \$2 billion increase in funding for the National Institutes of Health to advance research on such diseases as diabetes and Alzheimer's. The Senate also unanimously passed my bill to support family caregivers. The Aging Committee's toll-free hotline (1-855-303-9470) makes it easier for senior citizens to report suspected fraud and receive assistance and has already received more than 1,000 calls.

A Maine value that always guides me is our unsurpassed work ethic. As 2015 ended, I cast my 6,072nd consecutive vote, continuing my record of never missing a roll-call vote since my Senate service began in 1997.

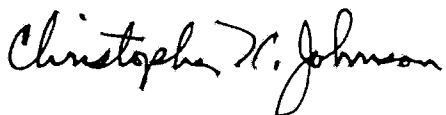
