Michael Murphy to Receive Mid-Life Achievement Award



The Maine International Film Festival has selected actor Michael Murphy as the winner of the 2015 Mid-Life Achievement Award. Murphy will receive the moose trophy on Thursday, July 16 at the Waterville Opera House. Each year, MIFF presents this award to a film-maker who has made and is expected to continue to make "significant contributions to the art of cinema." The most recent past winners are actress Glenn Close (2014), actor Keith Carradine (2013), film editor Thelma Schoonmaker (2012),

actor Malcolm McDowell (2011), screenwriter Jay

Cocks (2010), and director Arthur Penn (2009).

This year's presentation will follow a 6:30 pm screening of *Fall*, Murphy's latest movie, in which he portrays Father Sam, an elderly priest contentedly serving the faithful in Niagara Falls. When Father Sam unexpectedly receives a letter about an incident forty years earlier involving a 14-year-old boy whom he befriended in a parish in northern Ontario, he is forced to reflect deeply on his actions then and since. Questions abound. What exactly happened? Was it improper? Can four decades of goodness overcome the sins of one's youth? Made in Canada, the film has been nominated for five 2015 Canadian Screen Awards, including Best Motion Picture and Best Leading Actor for Murphy himself. The MIFF

screening is the film's U.S. premiere.


"When you look at Michael Murphy's filmography, you have to be amazed," states MIFF Programming Director Ken Eisen. "Always a disarming presence in films, even when playing, as he sometimes does, essentially scurrilous characters, Murphy has the ability to make us comfort-

ably feel as though we know and like this guy."

During his five-decade career, Murphy has appeared in diverse roles in over one hundred films and television series. He has worked with many directors, including Tim Burton (*Batman Returns*), Oliver Stone (*Salvador*), Woody Allen (*Manhattan*), Elia Kazan (*The Arrangement*), Robert Aldrich (*The Legend of Lylah Clare*), Paul Thomas Anderson (*Magnolia*), Peter Weir (*The Year of Living Dangerously*), John Sayles (*Silver City*), and most notably, Robert Altman (*Nashville, McCabe and Mrs. Miller, Kansas City*, and *M.A.S.H*, among others.)

Besides *Fall*, MIFF will present several other Murphy films, which he will introduce. They are *Away from Her* (Friday, 7/17, 3:30), in which he plays a stroke sufferer who can barely speak; *Manhattan* (Saturday, 7/18, 6:30), in which he plays a college professor who is cheating on his wife; and *The Front* (Thursday, 7/16, 3:30, Railroad Square), where he stars as a formerly successful television writer who can no longer get work due to his left-wing politics. A fifth Murphy film, *M.A.S.H.* (Friday, 7/17, 6:30), will be introduced by Kathryn Altman, the director's widow. Except for *The Front*, all screenings of the Murphy films are at the Waterville Opera House.


Legacies

Since the Belgrade Historical Society was reorganized in June, 2014, its Board of Directors has been working hard to fulfill the mission to preserve Belgrade's history for future generations. Under the leadership of Board Chair Dennis Keschl, lateral file cabinets and archival bookcases were purchased for the Belgrade History Room at the Center for All Seasons, and a committee has been organizing its collections there. Soon the room will be staffed one afternoon a week by BHS volunteers who will help people find information about various aspects of Belgrade's history, enjoy the many historical pictures in the collections, and trace family genealogy.

Last fall the historical society launched a website where it posts current happenings and a number of web articles on aspects of the town's heritage. Visitors to the internet on BelgradeHistoricalSociety.org can browse through a Picture Gallery of some amazing old Belgrade photographs and bone up on a history of Belgrade, among many other things. A historical document on the website lists all the marriages that took place in the town going back to the 19th century. The Belgrade Historical Society also has a Facebook presence, where news and early photographs are posted.

Recently an exhibit titled "Belgrade in Bygone Times" was mounted in the Belgrade History Room at the Center for All Seasons. The exhibit paints a picture of prosperous farmers in the 19th century who used the railroad to ship their apples, corn, and potatoes to faraway markets. This was the peri-

od of the Golden Age of Tourism, when visitors fled the increasingly crowded and dirty cities to get back to nature in the Belgrades, where they could enjoy clean air, pure water, and excellent fishing in the lakes. A portion of the exhibit highlights the life of Frank Farnham, whose roadside market was for decades a Belgrade fixture. The free exhibit is open

from 8am-4pm Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, & Friday, and from 12 noon-4pm on Wednesday.



What Sweeter Music:

Atlantic Music Festival Offers Three Weeks of Free Concerts at Colby By Gregor Smith

Tow in its seventh summer, the Atlantic Music Festival will again bring the IN finest undergraduate and postgraduate classical musicians to Colby College for four weeks, July 6 to August 2, for private lessons, master classes, rehearsals, and performances. Starting on the festival's first Friday, there will be nearly two dozen performances, all free and open to the public.

Similar to last year's enrollment, at least 150 striving musicians, both tuitionpaying students and scholarship-receiving fellows, are expected to attend. A majority will come from the U.S., but over 40 are expected from other parts of the world, including Canada, Central America, Europe, the Middle East, Asia, and Australia. There will also be around 40 faculty.

The festival's series of performances will begin with a concert by the prizewinning, Manhattan-based Cassatt String Quartet on Friday, July 10. This allwomen ensemble also opened last year's festival. This year, they will perform works by Franz Schubert and by the festival's special guest John Corigliano, a popularly and critically acclaimed composer who has won a Pulitzer, an Oscar, and five Grammys.

On Saturday, July 11, David Amado, music director of the Delaware Symphony Orchestra, will lead the AMF Orchestra in performances of Corigliano's "Elegy," Maurice Ravel's Le Tombeau de Couperin, and, after the intermission, Schubert's Symphony No. 9. The festival will have two additional orchestral concerts, on July 25 and August 1.

The next concert is on Wednesday, July 15, when the Institute's pianists will perform solo works for keyboard. From this point on, there will be a performance nearly every night until the festival's close, including a second piano recital, on Tuesday, July 28.

Thursday nights will dedicated to vocal music. On Thursday, July 16, aspiring opera singers will perform art songs, and the following Thursday, they will perform opera arias. On the final Thursday, July 30, they will present full scenes from famous operas with costumes and some props and set pieces. This per-



10 Days, 100 Movies, 50 Filmmakers!

Astraea

That's what the Maine International Film Festival promises movie goers for ten days each July. The eighteenth annual MIFF runs from Friday, July 10 to Sunday, July 19, at the Waterville Opera House and Railroad Square Cinema in Waterville. The festival offers movie buffs a rare chance to see new movies before they are officially released, to rediscover forgotten classics, and to talk to film-makers from around the world both at post-screening question-and-answer sessions at the theater and over appetizers and drinks at informal receptions at local restaurants.

This year's festival opens Friday, July 10, at 6:30 in the Opera House. After welcoming remarks by festival organizers and various dignitaries, the festival will offer the Pine State premiere of Tumbledown, a film by two Portland-based filmmakers that is set in Western Maine. Their website describes Tumbledown as a "a comedic love story with a serious soul" about Hannah (Rebecca Hall), a young widow trying to put her life back together after the suicide of her singer-songwriter husband, and Andrew (Jason Sudeikis), a brash New Yorker who shows up to investigate the death, hoping to make it "the centerpiece of his book about artist suicides." During a winter month in her cabin at the base of Tumbledown Mountain, a 3068-foot peak north of Weld popular with hikers, they "clash, collaborate, and strike up a connection that begins to feel strangely like love."

While *Tumbledown* was shot in Massachusetts, , the festival's first week will present three other feature films that were made in Maine. The first of these is *Astraea*, which was shot in the winter of 2013 in Fryeburg and nearby towns on the New Hampshire border. The story takes place after an epidemic nearly destroys humankind. A telepathic teen with visions of survivors in New Brunswick leads her skeptical brother on a 5,000 mile trek north across the wasteland that was the United States. When they meet a young couple living by a rural Maine lake, our heroine is torn between the joy and relief of finding other "normal" humans and her desire to keep moving toward what she believes will be salvation in Canada. Screenings

will take place at the Opera House on Sunday, July 12 at 6:30 pm and Tuesday, July 14 at 9:30 pm and at Railroad Square on Wednesday, July 15 at 9 pm.

With showings on Monday, July 13, at 6:30 pm at the Opera House and Saturday, July 18, at 9:15 pm at Railroad Square, *The Hungry Years* chronicles two years in the life of Joel Carpenter, a talented, but homeless and mostly jobless, aspiring Portland rock musician in his early twenties. Carpenter strives to put and keep his band together, while continually seeking shelter and food. This documentary will have its world premiere at the festival, and Joel Carpenter will play afterward at the Monday showing.

On Wednesday, July 15 at 6:30 pm in the Opera House, MIFF will present its Centerpiece film. Shot on Monhegan Island and with the Maine State House standing in for the U.S. Capitol, *The Congressman* was written and directed by Robert Mrazek, a retired, five-term congressman from New York who now lives half the year on the island. A work in progress, the film stars Treat Williams (*Hair, Prince of the City*) as Maine Congressman Charlie Winship, who retreats to Monhegan after knocking out another House member, confronting his angry ex-wife, and being condemned in the media for not standing and reciting the Pledge of Allegiance.

Besides these Maine movies, the festival's first seven days will feature other special treats. First among these is a workshop with Golden Pond playwright and perennial MIFF guest Ernest Thompson at noon on Sunday, July 12 at Railroad Square. With various musical collaborators, Thompson has written most of the songs for his recent stage plays and his two latest films, *Time and Charges* and *Heavenly Angle*, which were shown at MIFF 2013 and MIFF 2014, respectively. After premiering a three-minute video, "You Are Loved," which he shot last year in Bar Harbor, Thompson will lead a discussion on the use of music to heighten emotion in films, whether the film lasts three minutes or two hours.

Immediately afterward, at 3:30 pm, audiences at the cinema will get to see *Altman*, a new documentary about the iconic film director, introduced





live by the documentary's director, Ron Mann. Considered by many as the greatest American director of the past 50 years, Robert Altman (1925–2006) was staunchly independent. According to the MIFF website, "refusing to bow down to Hollywood's conventions, or its executives, Altman's unique style of filmmaking won him friends and enemies, earned him world-wide praise and occasionally scathing criticism, and proved that it IS possible to make truly independent films — and truly great American ones."

Altman is clearly a favorite of the festival's organizers, as they presented six of his films (Kansas City, McCabe and Mrs. Miller, A Prairie Home Companion, Short Cuts, Nashville, and Thieves Like Us) two years ago, partially in conjunction with the Mid-Life Achievement Award to actor Keith Carradine, a frequent collaborator. This year, on Friday, July 17, the festival will screen his classic war satire MASH, with an introduction by the director's widow Kathryn.

Each festival also includes several "re-discoveries," overlooked classics that are worth a fresh look. The best known of this year's crop are the 1964 Sergio Leone Western *A Fistful of Dollars* (Sunday, 7/12, 6:30 pm, Railroad Square), which made Clint Eastwood, "the man with no name," a star, and *The Third Man*, the atmospheric 1949 murder mystery set in post-War Vienna, which will close the festival (Sunday, 7/19, 7:00 pm, Opera House).

The other re-discoveries are *Forbidden Games* (France, 1952), a WWII drama about two children





- Conservation Too -

A s Maine's landscape continues to change, wildlife habitat is quite often lost. Besides preserving large tracts of land, which is always worth doing, there are other ways we can preserve or restore habitat at a small scale. By paying attention to what's around us, it can be simple to create habitat that we and wildlife both enjoy. Even in rural Maine, it's easy to loose our connection with the natural world. By keeping it close to us, around our homes and within our sight it becomes part of out everyday experience and allows us to lead richer lives. And since much of that "habitat" is vegetation, it can also be placed in a manner to serve as a vegetate buffer.

Attracting wildlife to your yard, whether in town or in the country, can be accomplished by providing what they need. A diversity of food, cover type and space is required to attract a wide range of species. Native trees, shrubs and perennials planted in combination can provide the necessary conditions. A variety of plants in the yard also adds interest and year round beauty. Enhancing backyard habitat is beneficial for more than just native wildlife. It can increase real estate value by adding natural beauty. It can also reduce the impact of your yard on water quality and enhance area air quality, particularly in heavily developed areas. Perennial or "wild" gardens produce less stormwater runoff than lawns. If the majority of homeowners in a neighborhood work to enhance backyard habitats, the neighborhood begins to resemble the forest that it once was.

Backyard habitat management can also conserve energy, by providing cooling shade in summer and providing windbreaks for heat loss prevention in winter. By reducing the size of lawn, and enhancing the soil's ability to retain moisture, water conservation is also achieved. Pest control can also be a side benefit of backyard habitat enhancement. Many of the species we hope to attract by providing habitat feed on insects. Species such as swallows, frogs, dragonflies and bats depend heavily on insects as part of their diet. Natural pest management can replace the use of chemical pest controllers.

If you enjoy bird or butterfly watching or simply think it reasonable to share your little piece of the world with other natural inhabitants, then think about backyard habitat enhancement. It's a small way to give a little back and get a lot in return.
