

# **Come Celebrate Smithfield's** 175th Anniversary!

aine's only leap year town is celebrating 175 years and we want you to join us for an unforgettable celebration! Mark your calendar for Friday, July 31 through Sunday, August 2nd, 2015. More on this later...let's start with a bit of Smithfield's history so you can get to know us a little better before you arrive!

Smithfield was incorporated on February 29, 1840 making it "Maine's only Leap Year Town." It was incorporated from parts of Dearborn to the south, Mercer to the west and East Pond Plantation to the north and east. Prior to the incorporation, this area was known as "Greeley's Mill," a farming and lumbering community. There were numerous farms back then with two still in operation today along with a few family owned lumbering businesses as well. Smithfield has since become a favorite destination for travelers from all over the world who come to recreate on North and East Ponds located on either side of our beautiful town.

In the late 1800s and early 1900s the town boasted a hotel, store, post office, restaurant, and blacksmith shop; a true destination. In 1895 the town built its first and only church, the Smithfield Baptist Church. In the early 1900s two major fires in the Village of Smithfield changed the center of town and many businesses did not rebuild. Today in the village there is still a mechanic for hire, a public beach at Sunset Camps, where families have returned to the



same cabins each summer for 100 years and the Sunbeam Roller Rink. Starting out as a dance pavilion known as North Pond Casino and later North Pond Roller Skating Rink, it is Maine's only open air, wooden floor rink. Built in 1922, most children who come to enjoy the fast paced action today are direct descendents of original roller skaters.

Another piece of history in the heart of the village is the Fairview Grange #342. It's managed by an active and lively group of volunteers who have grown the membership and visibility over the past few years with collaborative efforts from the North Pond Association and Duratherm Windows. The original hall, built in 1913, burned in 1915. That structure was destroyed again in 1986; the current hall was built on the same spot along the shore of North Pond.

The rock is chiefly a variety of granite. The soil is a clay loam, yielding well in hay, oats, and potatoes, --which are the crops principally cultivated. The beech, birch and maple are the principal forest trees. The manufactories consist of one saw-mill for long lumber, one shingle-mill, a grist-mill and a fuel saw-mill. The nearest railroad station is at south Norridgewock, 5 miles distant. The stations at North Belgrade and at West Waterville are each 8 miles. Smithfield was formed from parts of Mercer and Dearborn, and called East Pond Plantation. It was incorporated under its present name Feb. 29, 1840. Among the valued citizens should be mentioned Rev. Henry Smith, Caleb Gilman, John Copeland, Francis Allen, Wales Gould, Dennison Haynes, Peter Libbey, Barnabas Allen, S.N. Marston, John Piper, Oliver Parsons and others. The town has quite a number of residents over 70 years of age, and one that is 93. It sent about 70 men to aid in the war for the Union, and lost 14 of them. There are two Free Baptist societies which sustain meetings in Smithfield. The number of schoolhouses is seven, --valued at \$1,125. The population in 1870 was 704. In 1880 it was 564. The valuation in 1870 was \$168,599. In 1880 it was \$142,662. The rate of taxation is 23 mills on the dollar.



# **Angkor's Children: MIFF Film** With a Great Pond Connection

ngkor's Children is a beautiful, moving, thought-provoking film that  $oldsymbol{\Pi}$  transports viewers to the other side of the world - Cambodia - yet has very strong Maine connections. Directed by Lauren Shaw, a long-time enthusiastic seasonal resident of Great Pond and a third-time MIFF veteran, the film follows three young Cambodian women as they create new cultural identities through traditional ("smot" singing), survival (circus) and contemporary (pop band) art disciplines.

In a country where 50% of the population is under the age of 21 and 90% of artists and intellectuals were eliminated by the Khmer Rouge, there is a tremendous void of cultural identity - and of hope, hope for the future and hope for women. "We needed to tell the world there is hope," Shaw states. "Art brings back souls, brings back hope."

Sponsored by the Mid-Maine Global Forum, "Angkor's Children will be shown on Saturday, July 18 at 12:15 pm at Railroad Square Cinema. Lauren Shaw will be at the screening along with Mu Sochua, a Cambodian politician and rights activist who appears in the film, to answer questions and discuss Cambodia today. 

# **MIFF Offers Unique Day-Long Series of Events** for Maine Filmmakers


n Saturday, July 18, MIFF will offer Maine filmmakers a chance to showcase their work and network with each other during Making It In Maine Day

"MIFF always seeks to include locally made films, both short films and feature length, and it is nice to host a day on which you can see a Maine-associated film in any time slot during the festival," said Shannon Haines, Festival Director.

The days starts off with a networking brunch where filmmakers can meet each other as well as representatives from the Maine Film Center, the Maine Film & Video Association, the Maine Film Office, and the Maine Public Broadcasting Network. 



# Monitoring Lakes by Satellite Groundtruthing Landsat Satellite Images with Secchi Readings



The efforts of volunteers to collect Secchi data matching flyover dates of the Landsat 8 satellite is paying off, according to DEP Biologist Linda Bacon. This technology has the potential to be able to identify algae blooms from space! Bacon says that "volunteer data will be more valuable than ever to help calibrate the satel-

lite."\_As the Landsat 8 satellite orbits the earth it takes photos of Maine lakes and ponds (as well as other features of the earth's surface). The satellite images could be used to help characterize the transparency for many Maine lakes (thousands!) for which we do not have current water quality data. Volunteer lake monitors can play an important role in helping to "ground truth", or calibrate the satellite images by taking Secchi disk transparency readings on the days when the satellite passes over Maine.

# A Cinematic Swan Song: The Final Days of This Year's MIFF

The Third Man


C even days down, three more to go. It's hard  $\mathcal{O}$  to believe that the eighteenth annual Maine International Film Festival is almost over, but there's still plenty to see during the festival's closing weekend, especially for aficionados of Maine-made and vintage films.

On Friday at 6:30 at the Opera House, Kathryn Altman will introduce a screening of the Maine Student Film and Video Festival at MASH (1970), the Korean War satire directed by Robert Altman (1925 – 2006) that spawned the long-running television series. The film stars Elliot Gould and Donald Sutherland and features this year's Mid-Life Achievement Award honoree Michael Murphy. The movie also has a local connection: it was adapted from a novel by H. Richard Hornberger (1924 – 1997), a thoracic surgeon who practiced at Mid-Maine Medical Center (now part of MaineGeneral Health) and who wrote under the pseudonym Richard Hooker. After the screening, Kathryn Altman will sign copies of Altman, an anthology of photographs of and essays about her late husband, along with archival documents from his files. Also at 6:30 on Friday, but at Railroad Square, will be the U.S. premiere of the final Maine feature, The Strange Eyes of Dr. Myes. Mixing live action and animation, this psychedelic romp chronicles the attempts of the fictional female scientist to, in the words of the MIFF website, "create medical/scientific treatments and body augmentations that elevate an individual's consciousness by enhancing their senses to go beyond the normal human range of vision, hearing, smell and touch.... It is a classic gothic horror, mad scientist movie, but with elements of musical, animation and experimental cinema."

The film features original music, and the director and lead actress, among others, will treat the audience to a concert after the showing. Those who decide to go to MASH instead can see Strange Eyes Saturday night at 6:00, but without the post-screening performance.

On Saturday, the Maine theme continues with 12:30 at the Opera House. Now in its 38th year, the festival accepts short films on any subject from Mainers 19 and younger. Submissions can be fiction or nonfiction, live-action or animated, but must not be longer than 10 minutes. At each year's MIFF, the top student films are screened; the winners are announced; and the prizes awarded. This years prizes include a \$500 cash award, a one-year subscription to an online suite of video editing software, and full-festival passes to next year's MIFF.

Following the screening and award presentation, one can see a collection of six shorts by grown-up Mainers at Railroad Square. Ranging from 6 to 24 minutes — 90 minutes total — these films tell the stories of two burnt-out Olympians trying to find a new purpose for their lives, an artist who channels her grief at the death of her epileptic son to build stained glass pyramids in his memory, American POWs in World War II Germany who escape with inspiration from Greta Garbo, an elderly man whose dreams may portend tragedy, a fiddle duo that plays Franco-American contradance music, and the 1971 U.S. Alpine Championships at Sugarloaf Mountain, the only downhill skiing World Cup event ever to be held in Maine.





Besides the Strange Eyes reprise, Saturday evening and Sunday afternoon offer a second chance to see one of the other Maine features and two newly restored classic films shown earlier in the festival. They are The Hungry Years (Sat., 9:15), a documentary about a struggling, young Portland rock musician; The Epic of Everest (Sun., 12:15), a video diary of a failed 1924 British attempt to conquer the world's highest peak; and Imitation of Life (Sun., 3:00), a 1959 melodrama about mothers and daughters and race relations. All three screenings are at Railroad Square Cinema.

The festival closes Sunday evening with a 7:00 screening at Opera House of a digitally restored 1949 noir classic, The Third Man, in which a pulp fiction writer (Joseph Cotten) arrives in post-War Vienna to take a job offered by an old school chum (Orson Welles) only to learn that his host has just been killed in a mysterious traffic accident. The novelist now turns sleuth to try to uncover what was behind this "accident."

Admission to any of the above-mentioned screenings is \$9, except for The Third Man, which costs \$3 more, and the Maine Student Film and Video Festival, which is free. # Take It Outside

his week I finally got my sailboat into the **L** water. As I towed it slowly up the lake from the Castle Island boat launch, I was scanning the shoreline and noticed a camp where I don't usually see one this time of year. I looked through my binoculars and spotted a family busily clearing vegetation and spreading mulch in the shoreland zone. I quickly attached my boat to a mooring and headed back down the lake to make sure the family understood the rules. They were very surprised that what they were doing was wrong. They had asked a few neighbors and even gone on line to find the rules without success. Someone told them to use erosion control mulch (a good idea) and someone told them they couldn't cut anything larger than 3 inches in diameter (not quite true) but no one told them that they couldn't cut anything less than three feet tall near the water except for a six foot wide meandering path. They were replacing woody shrubs with deep roots that hold the soil with flowers that have almost no root structure. They were filling in depressions that slow and infiltrate water flowing toward the lake. I offered to bring them an official copy of the rules and headed down the lake to the Belgrade Regional Conservation Alliance (BRCA) office in the Maine Lakes Resource Center (MLRC) to pick up a copy of the "DEP Issue Profile: Clearing vegetation in the shoreland zone" (4 pages) and a copy of the "Citizens Guide to Maine Shoreland Zoning-A Handbook for shoreland owners" (42 pages).

As I was motoring up the lake to deliver these documents, my fishfinder detected a large fish all by itself 27 feet down in 45 feet of water. I knew this was just below the thermocline where large trout, salmon, and pike like to hang out. I happened to have a flyrod with me with a sinking line, already rigged with a white zonker streamer fly. I cut the motor, cast my fly out and let it sink to the right depth. I then motored a slow circle around where I had spotted the fish, twitching the fly like a wounded minnow. I soon had a jolting strike and about ten minutes later landed Walter's younger brother, a 23-inch, 5-pound Brown trout. I spotted a friend of mine on the end of her dock and motored over so she could snap a picture of me with the fish. I then continued up the lake to deliver the vegetation rules. The vegetation clearing rules are complex and to ensure compliance shorefront property owners should check with their local code enforcement officer before starting any landscaping projects. Stop into the BRCA office at the MLRC to pick up copies of the relevant rules. They are also available on line at:

I admired the fish and offered to show him how to filet it cleanly around the y-bones the way my uncle had taught me over 50 years ago. Ben said, "Thanks but I just watched a couple of u-tube videos on how to do it. I think I'm good." Just goes to show that kids are still learning outdoor skills but sometimes in slightly different ways than their elders.

One afternoon I decided to stretch my legs for a

bit and headed to French Mountain for a quick hike. As I was headed up the hill I met Sue Greenan coming down, celebrating her birthday (she didn't say which one) by taking a hike with her daughter, Heather Hartley, and grandkids, Kate and Garrison. Big smiles all around.

The BRCA "Geology of the Kennebec Highlands" hike with Mel Croft that was rained out last month has been rescheduled. It will take place on Thursday the 16th of July at 10 AM at The Mountain. 



Then I hear the word conservation the first V thought that comes to mind is protect and maintain a particular thing. In this case: soil. Why should people be aware of soils? Growing up people are educated on what percentage of the Earth is covered by water. Now, when we think about the remaining percentage available as dry land... is all of it fertile and productive land? Even if that was the case, the reality is that this available land might present conditions where using it for agricultural purposes is not an option, or where special attention and management is required to achieve a desired outcome.

According to (USDA) Natural Resources Conservation Service "Soil quality is how well soil does what we want it to do". In order to do this, taking the time to know your soil is critical. Online soil data and information is available through the USDA Web Soil Survey web page (included in the reference section of this article). This information can be used for general farm, local and wider area planning. In addition, taking a sample of your soil and having it tested is always recommended. Soil sample form and box can be obtained at any NRCS local service center. A healthy soil provides substantial crops, wide-ranging wildlife, clean water and

air as well as productive lands.

Some conservation practices that can help increase the overall conditions of the soil are no till, crop rotation and cover cropping which help reduce soil erosion, increase soil organic matter, promote weed suppression and increase plant available moisture among other healthy soil characteristics. More information about these practices will be discussed in upcoming articles.
