WOOD-FIRED - Jarvis Johnson says that the new 1500 gallon wood-fired boiler  
BOILER at Cobscook Bay Park is working very well and has heated water  
COBSCOOK BAY for nearly 5000 showers this summer. Johnson says that the  
boiler, designed by Professor Richard Hill of UMO, is "so  
efficient and so well insulated that it only used 3 cords of  
budworm killed wood to heat approximately 30,000 gallons of  
water. We only fired it every other day - for about 4 hours."

FALL - The Information and Education Section will begin fall foliage  
FOLIAGE reporting today. The reports, which are gathered by Forest  
REPORTING Service rangers and fire tower personnel, will be available to  
the media and travel information agencies by calling 289-2211.

TOGUE - Approximately 150 Forest Service rangers and several visitors  
POND from other DOC bureaus, the Legislature and the private sector  
EXERCISE returned to the scene of the 1977 Baxter fire during a field  
training exercise at Togue Pond last week. The exercise  
simulated a 1500 acre forest fire and provided an opportunity  
for personnel to become familiar with the operation of Fire  
Management Overhead Teams. These teams were formed after the  
Baxter Park Fire to provide supervisory staff at large fires.
