

Hendon Five stars 4th Maine Reg.

Oct 23 1861

My Dear Gen.

The deserters Joshua & Bretall arrived to camp yesterday afternoon, amidst a most pitiful rain storm, and in the most abahitated condition - their pitiful appearance together with your kind note in their behalf has ex-empted them from present punishment - I never saw more humble men, glad indeed were they to get back to their old quarters, and the rest of the Regiment have learned a deeper lesson from their pitiful & rugged condition than they would learn from the bickering of the sever-er punished inflicted on men otherwise clad & better provided.

We have just finished another fort and long one of Rife Pitt's & have filled for during the past two weeks hundreds of acres of his mostly white oak. Each is said to be Old Vir-ginia is being furnished in a manner not to be forgotten for one century at least.

I have little or no news to commun-icate. We are now now ready to fight at any

time the Rebels claim it or whenever our
leader the Secession orders it. The whole army
is in fine condition. Marine troops so far
as I have seen them 3^{rd} , 4^{th} , 5^{th} are equal to
the best here. God Grant that we may
sustain the reputation of our gallant soldiers
that when the day of trial comes -
as far thence as a few days distant

Cd Nickerison will have
seen you on this reaches now. The Col
has given him for the number of Manning
recruits. Any assistance you will
bestow will be gratefully received by
myself & the entire Regt. & it will be re-
membered & noticed wherever an op-
portunity offers. I desire to have the best
Regt in force & possible, & know the 4th is
as good as the best now. He says our Sappers
officers - Our drill & discipline is excellent
