I cannot locate the analysis sheet made by a U. S. Government Agency, but you have a copy in your files. There is no change in the quality and it is uniform throughout the year. However, the moisture content may change or vary, dependent upon the humidity.

2. RENTAL ACCRUAL

Annual rental charges will be absorbed by the royalty payment enclosed.

3. ROYALTY PAYMENT

Based on the product value at the lime site, less the cost of extraction, my check is enclosed computed at 20 cents per ton, amounting to \$865.86.

4. NUMBER OF EMPLOYEES

There are only 3 regular employees, including myself. There may be 1 or 2 more temporary employees during the active months, not including the 2 or 3 men who deliver and spread the lime for a contract price of \$2.00 per ton, using their own trucks but using my lime spreading bodies. The delivery season (depending on the weather) usually runs from about April 20th to July 1st and from about August 15th to November 1st. During the other seven months a portion of my equipment is idle or used for loading and hauling pulp wood, hauling gravel, snow plowing, etc.

5. OTHER INFORMATION

Very little work was done at the mining site until the spring of 1971. The first extractions were done with a crane and clam. This method was expensive and left unsightly holes. Consequently it was decided to remove the muck and sod from the Lake bottom and expose the marl lime in 2 small rectangular areas and 1 larger one. This left a flat surface of lime which could be bull dozed with a weed hog to an approximate depth of 6 inches, left to dry and scraped into a pile at the end of the pit on the following day. This same method of extraction will be followed in 1972. Because of moisture content, the product is somewhat lumpy and this condition is not wholly eliminated by the high speed spreaders. As a result it has become necessary to purchase a spreader or sizer to cost about \$13,500.00 for use in 1972 and future years.

It is difficult to predict the volume of marl lime sales in 1972. Probably deliveries during the coming year will approximate the same figures as in 1971. However, if potato prices increase appreciably during Febru-

ary, March and April, potato growers will have more money to purchase sorely needed lime. As a result the sale of marl lime would increase substantially.

In November of 1971, I purchased from M. Philip Roberts a parcel of real estate consisting of about 47 acres. This land is rectangular in shape and extends from Route No. 165 to the Canadian Boundary Line. It includes over 80% of the area of my Claim No. 1. This gives me access to the marl lime site over my own land. I might add that almost 100% of the marl lime extracted by me in 1971 was from the Lake bottom on land owned by me.

In reply to your letter of August 3, 1970 that requested a detailed description of the methods to be employed with the machinery and explosives that have been listed I am providing the following information along with the map showing the area that will be drained and what will be cleared for mining in relationship to the adjacent private property.

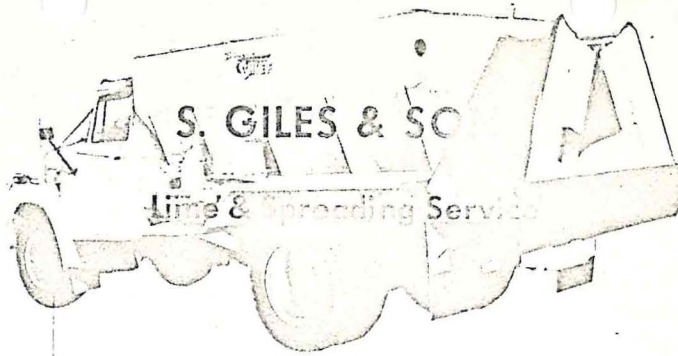
The new channel that will be dug by using most of the 800 sticks of dynamite, mentioned with the application, will change the course of the present stream and allow for more of the lake bed to be drained. New culverts are being installed at both the north end of the pond and also at the south end of the pond where an old farm road, originally made in 1920, is being made passable. A new access road has been constructed, with the permission of F. H. Vahlsing, Inc., from route 165 (the East road) parallel to the line between F. W. Vahlsing's property and Mr. Robert's property. This road goes from the main road to Nedeau Pond on Vahlsing's property. Another road has been made at the end of this road, running north on the property of Mr. Phillip Roberts. This has been constructed with his permission. F. H. Vahlsing, Inc. and Mr. Phillip Roberts have given allowance for the operation of mining equipment and the storage of lime on their property.

None of the use of the dynamite, previously mentioned, will in any way affect the property rights of the adjacent land owners, none of the dynamite will be used on private property.

I contacted to game warden in Fort Fairfield, and in no way will it be destroying or damaging any wildlife.

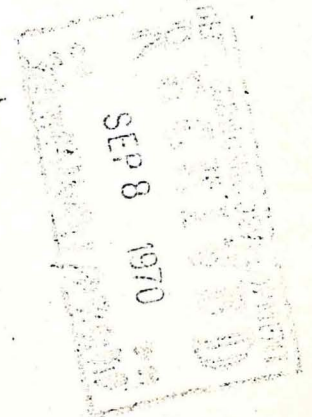

Your letter of August 10th has been received and I am glad to give you the following information regarding my application for a License to Mine at Nadeau Pond:

1. My survey map is enclosed and indicates the location of all claim posts, including the two northerly and southerly plus the two showing the line between Claim No. 1, and Claim No. 2.
2. Last Fall, when this operation was commenced, we extracted the marl by crane, loaded it on a truck and transported it to a sloping field with good drainage and put into piles of about 800 tons to dry. This proved ineffective because the product froze solid in the winter and was very late in drying. In fact, although we have moved the top of each pile to each side, the lime is still damp and we cannot market it for another month or more. So after further experimentation, we have finally at a simple but effective method of operation.

After removing the top sod (usually 6" to 10" deep) from a plot approximately 125' x 300', we use a weed hog to loosen the marl 6" to 8" in depth to fluff and dry it. After a few hours this is dry enough to move to a pile at one end of the strip, using a 450 JD tractor with a 10' blade. This can be repeated in the after-noon. Each operation provides about 800 tons of marl lime or 1600 tons per day, depending on the weather. We have two more slightly smaller plots ready for use, and will develop a fourth site. Since we can readily move from one site to another, it will give us a chain of operation when the demand is heavy. This method permits us to fluff and dry the product before being piled, and to market it the following day. We believe that this procedure will be continued not only for two or three years, but indefinitely. Mining will take place from about May 1st until freezing.

Frankly, we need little control to keep silting at a minimum. A large drain has been dug and ranges from 8' to 10' deep. The drop is about 11' from our present mining area to the Limestone Stream. Consequently the flow is constant, the water is clear and there is no pollution.

3. Mr. John Hoyt, Surveyor, will locate a steel pin in concrete at the northwesterly corner by the end of another month. This will be used as our master post.
4. There is no problem regarding disturbance of wild life or polluting the drainage system. Game or fish will not be affected in any way. There is no sedimentation or pollution going into the stream from the operation. Very few trees were cut or will be cut. There is only one pile of brush which will be burned and all other waste, small in quantity, will be levelled and covered with gravel. We are certain that your physical inspection will find no faults in this respect.
5. Since the property map which you suggest we have made, requires the services of a professional surveyor, it is not enclosed with this letter. However, when Mr. Hoyt installs the master claim post, we will request him to prepare a map consolidating the information in the two present maps. The approximate location of the presently located three sites is indicated on my map in pencil. This is not totally accurate as this map is a free hand drawn map.


This information should reach you in time for your next weeks meeting. If you need further information, please do not hesitate to contact me. My address is shown on the letter head, and also my home telephone number. There is a telephone in the scale house at the lime pit. The number is 472-4492, but the office is seldom occupied.

My visit to your office in Augusta on September 15th was an enjoyable one and I am pleased to know that all conditions required by the license have been fulfilled.

An application to Great Ponds Commission is in the mail together with the fee of \$10.00. A duplicate of the mining map in your possession was acceptable and I cannot foresee any difficulty in obtaining a permit from that office.

A revised application in duplicate is being sent to the Maine Mining Commission and Mr. Badet has approved the mining map subject to more details regarding locations of pits, stockpiles and surrounding terrain.

With regard to the royalty fee of 75 cents per ton as stated in your license to mine, dated September 7, 1971, it is my opinion that this charge is excessive. The marl lime is being mostly sold to Agway, Inc. for \$10.00 per ton, including the spreading on the land. The cost of preparing the lime pit, scrapeing and piling, loading on trucks, hauling and spreading on the land, amounts to approximately \$5.00 per ton. This leaves \$5.00 per ton on which I feel royalty should be paid, or 25 cents per ton. Please discuss this matter with the members of the Commission and advise me if this amount can replace the 75 cents per ton figure as stated in the mining license.

After a review of the application and supporting documents submitted on behalf of Stanley Giles & Son under Title 38, Sec. 422, the Board finds the following facts:

1. The applicant has erected a causeway and bridge which allows vehicle passage to his Marl mining operation on Nadeau Lake.
2. The applicant has an approved mining plan from the Maine Mining Commission as required under Title 10, Chapter 472, Sec. 2201-2216. The approved mining plan provides for the following reclamation of the area upon completion of mining:
 - (a) Restoration of water level of the lake to its original level.
 - (b) Grading and revegetation of shoreline affected.
 - (c) Construction of an outlet to the lake in accordance with Soil Conservation Service recommendations.
 - (d) Removal of any accumulated debris on the area.

A certified deposit in the amount of \$6,000.00, approved by the Attorney General's Office, has been assigned to the State of Maine to secure the obligations under the approved mining plan.

3. The reviewing agencies approved of the application. The Department of Inland Fisheries and Game requested that the causeway and bridge be removed at the termination of mining.
4. Three abutting owners object to the application as evidenced by three separate letters stating the following objections:
 - (a) The applicant has trespassed.
 - (b) The applicant has not taken care in using land.
 - (c) Has shown no regard.
 - (d) Has already gone beyond the high water mark.
 - (e) Has violated an agreement with the endorsers.
 - (f) The material beauty and ecology will be irreparably damaged.

The three letters are separately endorsed by: (1) Ambrose Day, (2) Harry Martin, and (3) Vahlsing Inc.

Based upon the above Findings of Fact the Board concludes that the applicant has sustained his burden of proof under Title 38, Sec. 422. except in the following instances:


1. The construction was done in violation of the statutes without a permit.

After review of the Letter of Intent and supporting documents submitted by S. Giles and Sons for the operation of a limestone pit at Nadeau Pond, Fort Fairfield, the Commission finds the following facts:

1. The applicant has the technical and financial capacity to comply with State standards.

1. The standard conditions of approval, a copy of which is attached to this order.

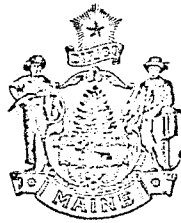

I purchased a sizer in 1972 at a cost of \$14,750.00 and increased the price to \$10.50 per ton to help pay for it. This removed the lumps and made the lime more uniform and much easier to spread. The method of extraction will be the same as in 1972. However, because there will be no adjustment in price because of the moisture content, the price per ton to Agway, Inc. will be reduced to \$9.75 per ton. Since I must pay \$2.50 per ton to contract truckers for hauling and spreading in 1973, the net return to me will be reduced by \$1.25 per ton. This factor should influence your Committee in making a reduction in the royalty payment per ton to the Maine Mining Bureau. As for 1973 volume, the present higher prices for potatoes should result in an increased demand for lime. On the other hand, many of the old time farmers still insist on buying Rockland-Rockport ground lime. While I spread this lime from Agway, Inc. stockpiles, it may result in a smaller demand for the marl lime. However, it is my prediction that my total marl lime sales will total around 5,000 tons in 1973.

Because potato prices were low in the Spring of 1972, my sales of marl lime were slightly less than the previous year. And because I discovered that stockpiled lime froze so solid, and did not thaw early enough to spread in early Spring, I did not stockpile as much lime for the 1973 season. I purchased a sizer in 1972 at a cost of \$14,750.00 and increased the price to \$10.50 per ton to help pay for it. This removed the lumps and made the lime more uniform and much easier to spread. The method of extraction will be the same as in 1972. However, because there will be no adjustment in price because of the moisture content, the price per ton to Agway, Inc. will be reduced to \$9.75 per ton. Since I must pay \$2.50 per ton for hauling and spreading in 1973, the net return to me will be reduced by \$1.25 per ton. This factor should influence your Committee in making a reduction in the royalty payment per ton to the Maine Mining Bureau. As for 1973 volume, the present higher prices for potatoes should result in an increased demand for lime. On the other hand, many of the old time farmers still insist on buying Rockland-Rockport ground lime. While I spread this lime from Agway, Inc. stockpiles, it may result in a smaller demand for the marl lime. However, it is my prediction that my total marl lime sales will total around 5,000 tons in 1973.



My sincere apologies for not answering you sooner. It takes a long time to get word back from members of the Bureau on their decisions regarding some of our activities.

I am finally able to advise you that at a recent meeting of the Maine Mining Bureau, the decision was reached to set a 35 cents per ton royalty on all marl extracted from the State-owned areas beneath Nadeau Pond on which you have been issued a License to Mine. This decision was reached after considerable discussion and after comparison of prices, royalties, and schedules for other marl operations in the northeastern United States.

The Bureau feels that this is a fair price for a nonrenewable resource and we believe that it is within the economic framework of your business. This figure may, in succeeding years, change upward or downward depending on new information and your operation experience.

I would also like to acknowledge receipt of your check #720, dated January 27, 1972, in the amount of \$865.86, which will be processed in the very near future. The total royalty payment, based on your figures and the 35 cents per ton figure, should be \$1,514.96. Your remittance of \$865.86 has been credited to this total figure, therefore, an amount of \$649.10 still remains due. A copy of the License to Mine #8, First Renewal, is enclosed for your files.

As soon as it is convenient, I would like to get together with you to discuss the possibility of a Lease.

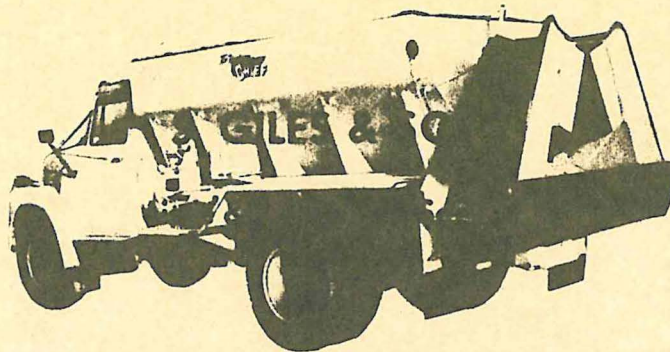
Subject Stanley Giles

During the Geological Society meeting in Buffalo last week there was a paper given on marl deposits in north-western New York State by a recent doctoral candidate from New York City. I was able to discuss marl operations with him at some length after his paper had been presented and from this discussion, gained insight into the value of marl as an agricultural product.

Based on what this gentlemen told me, it would appear that the availability of the marl and ease of extraction are the two critical factors in establishing prices and in a difficult, marshy situation where equipment is frequently bogged down, 10 or 15 cents a ton to the land owner is not out of line. However, in areas where accessibility is easy and the area of marl is either small or well drained, the price varies from 15 to 60 cents per ton to the land owner.

I have a letter here from Giles which I am enclosing with this memorandum, indicating that he felt his 20 cents per ton was sufficient. He did not supply further information and based on my conversations in Buffalo, I suggest that we present Giles with a 35 cents per ton figure as actual royalty for extraction of the marl. Between 30 and 35 cents seems to be a good figure here in the Northeast. If I have your agreement on this figure, it will be submitted to Giles as the final decision of the Bureau.

As a preliminary report, requested by Mr. Anderson in his letter of December 27, 1972, I am glad to give you the following information.

During the year 1971, slightly over 4,000 tons of marl lime was delivered and sold from the Nadeau Lake location. Approximately 200 tons was sold for \$12.00 per ton; about 400 tons was sold for \$9.00 per ton; and the balance was sold to Agway, Inc. for \$10.00 per ton. Payment has been made on about 15% of the first two mentioned sales, and the balance remains unpaid as accounts receivable.

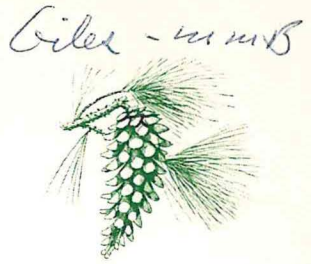



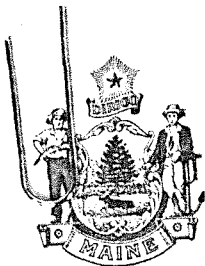

Subject Royalty schedule for Stanley Giles License

The royalty for the Giles license to mine is, as you can see from the attached renewal, based on a 35 cents per ton. This figure was calculated as 5% of the market value of the marl, less the costs of site maintenance, extraction, drying, and loading. A haulage cost for a 30 mile average distance was also included. During 1970/71, in Aroostook County, the price of lime delivered, not spread, varied from \$12.00 to \$18.00/ton.

The price in 1978 was approximately \$25.00/ton, not spread, and \$28.00/ton spread. I calculate that his costs are approximately \$12.00-\$15.00/ton, showing "an adjusted fair market value" of the lime, at about \$13.00/ton. Five (5%) percent of this value is 65 cents.

Since we haven't changed his royalty rate since 1970/71, I think that a 65 or 70 cents per ton is not unreasonable. As the technical advisor to the system, I recommend that level of per ton royalty for the Giles license renewal in 1979.

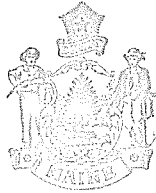



We have a Mining Bureau meeting sometime next week and we will go over your application for a License to Mine at Nadeau Pond. In the meantime, I have been looking over your material and find a few things which I think should be improved. I will list them as follows:

1. Enclosed is a copy of your survey of the Pond area. Would you please locate exactly where your claim posts lie on this map and return it to us. Please locate all of the posts on the map.
2. We must have an expanded description of exactly what you plan in the way of mining operations this year. Although we know pretty much what you plan to do, there should be something in the record that we can refer to from time to time. You should include approximate times you will take out, the method of extraction, the controls to keep silting at a minimum down stream, your methods of drying and preparation, and some idea of your plans over the next two or three years.
3. I suggest that you locate one claim post with a steel pin set in a small pile of concrete. This is your master post which would serve to locate your License area at all times. This is merely a suggestion but it is a good idea for you to follow it.

4. Would you also expand your ideas on maintaining the area free from any disturbance either to wild life or drainage system going into Limestone Stream. This is very important because the E.I.C. will be looking for good control on drainage. For this purpose, I am returning to you the application for a Land Use Ruling form. You can write directly on this using additional pages as necessary.
5. I am sending back to you copies of both your Pond map and your claim map. I believe that it would be well, relating to suggestion number 1, if you would combine these two sheets locating the posts and giving us the directions as you have on sheet number 2. You should then make a survey point at some critical and easily observed physical location; for instance, the outlet of the stream, a large rock, or some man-made building or structure. We are today in receipt of your application for a permit to use machinery and explosives on Maine Mining Bureau claims 4301 and 4302. Before issuing such a permit I would appreciate hearing from you in detail the type of work which is planned for the claim area, especially where, how and for what purpose 800 sticks of dynamite will be used.

I wish to make it very clear that any permit issued by the Maine Mining Bureau covers activities only on State land and land held in trust by the State. This law does not cover any activities on private land nor do any permits issued by the Mining Bureau give you rights for any exploration work on private land. Additionally, the Bureau has no responsibility for any damage or effects resulting from activities on State land which may harm private individuals or lands.

I wish to quote to you the last paragraph of Subchapter I, Section 2102 of the Mining Law.

"If machinery or explosives are to be used for prospecting in areas under state jurisdiction, the methods to be employed and the amount of explosives to be allowed must first be approved by the Mining Bureau."

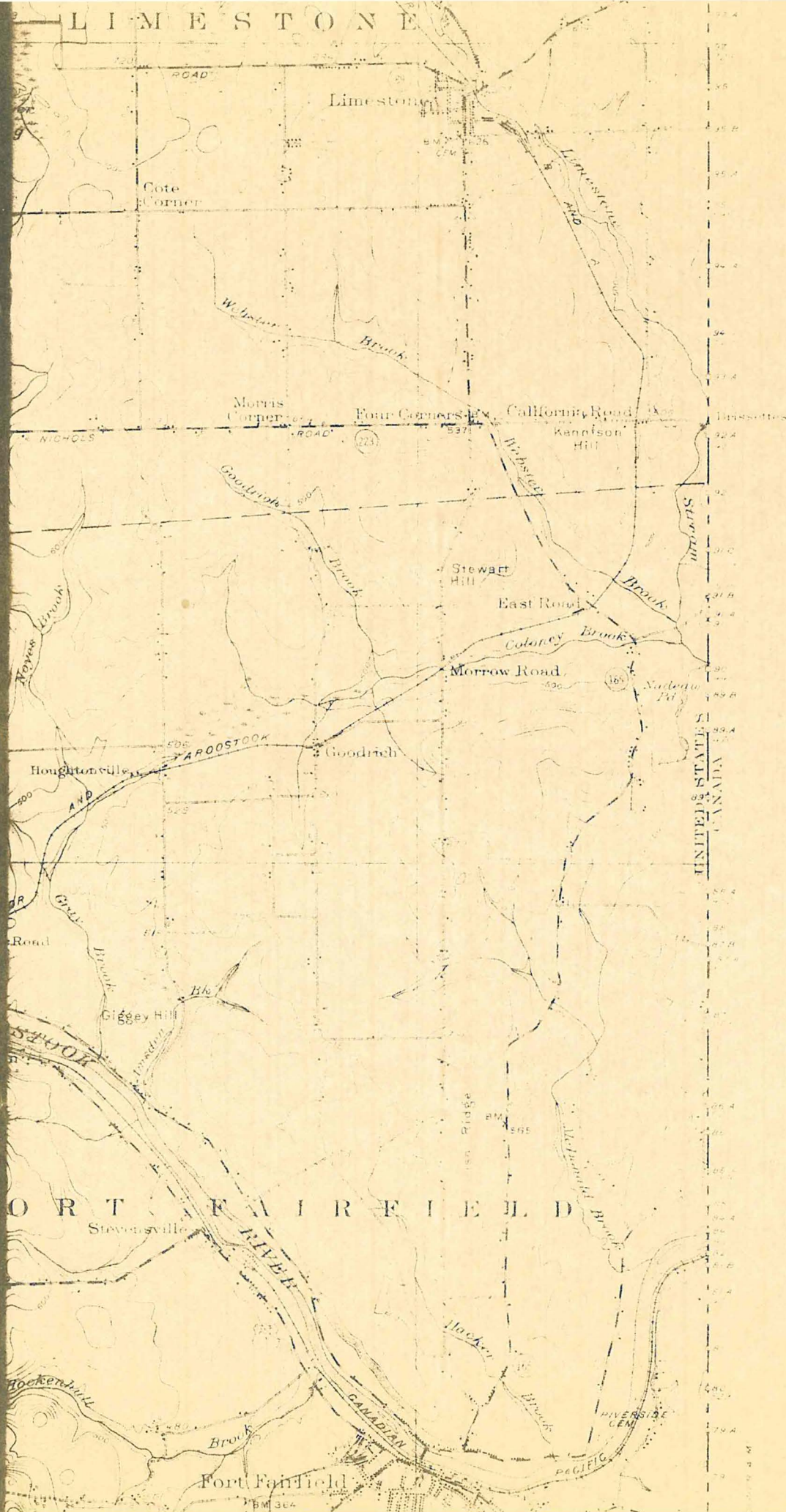

Practically 100% of the marl lime sold by me in 1972 will be sold to Agway, Inc. for \$10.50 per ton. The increase of 50¢ resulted from the purchase of a new shredder for \$13,000.00 to remove the lumps and make the product more easily spread. This product has not been accepted by the A. S. C. S. under the government program, which is the reason I must sell it under the usual price for ground lime.

I cannot understand the decision which you have made to place a value of \$7.00 per ton at the lime site. Apparently you have given me credit for the cost of contractors hauling and spreading, and for the cost of extraction. There are other numerous expenses. I am entitled to compensation, plus cost of labor other than hauling and spreading, plus telephone bills, taxes, interest, depreciation, gasoline, oil, tires, repairs and maintenance, insurance and many other incidentals including the annual cost of license and a \$400.00 surveying bill. Please ask the members of the Committee to reconsider their decision. I will come to Augusta for a meeting if necessary.

When Mr. McLaughlin, Acting Director of the Maine Mining Commission was here last week, I asked Mr. Winslow to take him out to the A. S. C. S. Office to check the aerial map showing Nadeau Lake. He discovered that the land lying north of the road across the drainage ditch was never under Nadeau Lake. The Lake came to the dam, or about 12 feet south of the access road. Consequently I paid royalty to you for 1971 tonnage on slightly over 2,000 tons. This land is owned by me, and while subject to Maine Mining Commission regulations pertaining to reclamation, is not subject to royalty payments. Please advise how I may obtain a rebate.

My visit to your office in Augusta on September 15th was an enjoyable one and I am pleased to know that all conditions required by the license have been fulfilled.

An application to Great Ponds Commission is in the mail together with the fee of \$10.00. A duplicate of the mining map in your possession was acceptable and I cannot foresee any difficulty in obtaining a permit from that office.

A revised application in duplicate is being sent to the Maine Mining Commission and Mr. Bader has approved the mining map subject to more details regarding locations of pits, stockpiles and surrounding terrain.

With regard to the royalty fee of 75 cents per ton as stated in your license to mine, dated September 7, 1971, it is my opinion that this charge is excessive. The marl lime is being mostly sold to Agway, Inc. for \$10.00 per ton, including the spreading on the land. The cost of preparing the lime pit, scraping and piling, loading on trucks, hauling and spreading on the land, amounts to approximately \$5.00 per ton. This leaves \$5.00 per ton on which I feel royalty should be paid, or 25 cents per ton. Please discuss this matter with the members of the Commission and advise me if this amount can replace the 75 cents per ton figure as stated in the mining license.

I am herewith issuing to you a Maine Mining Bureau License to Mine No. 8 covering the overwater area included in your claims numbered 4301 and 4302 on Nadeau Pond, Fort Fairfield Township, Aroostook County, Maine. This License is dated as of today but its implementation is subject to receipt of a check from you in the amount of \$50.00, which is the annual fee of \$25.00 per claim for a License, and an accurate survey map of the area to be submitted to me within seven days of receipt of this letter. It is understood from your letter of September 5, 1970, and from our visit to Presque Isle on September 4, 1970, that you will use explosives in a limited fashion to open up channels in Nadeau Pond between two or three deep holes in the so-called lower pond. Further, it is understood that an amount of 75 to 100 sticks of dynamite will be used in this work. The Bureau accepts the fact that you own land on both sides of the pond where the work will be done so that private property of others will not be harmed. As part of the record, your letter of September 5 is enclosed with this permit. It is finally understood that any additional work or work different than work described here will need additional review and approval from the Bureau.

STANLEY O. GILES - Statement of Operation at Marl Lime Pit

at NADEAU LAKE, FORT FAIRFIELD, MAINE. YEAR ENDING DEC. 31, 1973

1. QUANTITY AND GRADE OF PRODUCT

Someone plugged the culvert leading to the Lake and the land under my main mining claim was so wet that I could extract practically no lime during the first part of my fiscal year. I had to take it from my own land, which was not under water. There is no change in the quality of this product and it is uniform throughout the year except for moisture. More and more farmers are demanding delivery of this type of lime instead of the Rockland-Rockport.

2. RENTAL ACCRUAL

Annual rental charges will be absorbed by the royalty payment enclosed.

3. ROYALTY PAYMENT

I sold and delivered 11,638.27 tons of marl lime during the year. However, a total of 6,334.46 tons less stockpile on site in 1972 came from my own land, on which no royalty need be paid. If my figures are correct, I owe you \$1,943.83 for 5,553.81 tons delivered at 35¢ per ton. I have not stock piled any lime this year.

4. NUMBER OF EMPLOYEES

There are only three (3) regular employees, including myself. There usually is 1 or 2 more temporary employees during the active months. This year I had nine (9) men delivering and spreading lime, at a contract price of \$3.00 per ton, using their own trucks but using mt lime spreading bodies. The delivery season usually runs from April 20th to July 1st and from about August 15th to November 1st. Other than a few separate orders in between, my equipment is idle and this year only used to plow a little snow.

5. OTHER INFORMATION

Very little work was done at the mining site until the spring of 1971. The first extractions were done with a crane and clam. This method was expensive and left unsightly holes. Consequently it was decided to remove the muck and sod from the Lake bottom and expose the marl lime in two small rectangular areas and one larger one. This left a flat surface of lime which could be bull-dozed with a weed hog to an approximate depth of six inches, left to dry and scraped into a pile at the end of the pit on the following day. This same method of extraction will be followed in 1973. Because of moisture content, the product is somewhat lumpy and this condition is not wholly eliminated by the high speed spreaders. As a result it has become necessary to purchase a apreader or sizer to cost about \$13,500.00 for use in 1973 and future years.

It is difficult to predict the volume of marl lime sales in 1974. Probably deliveries during the coming year will approximate the same figures as in 1973. However, if potato prices increase appreciably during February, March and April, potato growers will have more money to purchase sorely needed lime. As a result the sale of Marl lime would increase substantially.

In November of 1971, I purchased from M. Philip Rbberts, a parcel of real estate consisting of about 47 acres. This land is rectangular in shape and extends from Route No. 165 to the Canadian Boundary Line. It includes over 90% of the area of my Claim No. 1. This gives me access to the marl lime site over my own land. I might add that almost 100% of the marl lime extracted by me in 1973 was from the Lake bottom on land owned by me. This applies to lime extracted previous to June 30, 1973.

This amount shall be paid on all tonnage removed from the property since July 1, 1970, except for that tonnage used for research and testing and not prepared for market during the period from July 1, 1970, to September 1, 1971. Payment of the minimum royalty payment, covering the period July 1, 1970 through December 31, 1971, shall be due on December 31, 1971. Each succeeding payment for annual renewal shall be on December 31 of each calendar year.
