

## All's well as town clerk intervenes

VERONA ISLAND – Bucksport Town Clerk Jacob Gran was driving home to Winterport about an hour later than usual when he encountered a woman walking toward him across the Penobscot Narrows Bridge.

While other motorists drove by, Gran stopped, got out and asked the woman what she was doing. The woman, in her 40s and with her face somewhat concealed by a hoodie, was totally unresponsive.

Gran spoke reassuringly to her, and she began to cry.

He then urged the woman to walk with him toward the Verona Island end of the span.

At first unwilling, she relented as Gran quietly but firmly made it clear he wasn't going anywhere until she left the bridge.

Meanwhile, Bucksport Assessor Katlyn Howlett, who was driving home to Hampden, came upon the scene and telephoned the Bucksport police.

Officer Gerald Lowe responded and took the woman away in his cruiser.

Gran, who also serves as the pastor of the Starting Point Church, which meets in Bucksport each Sunday, said in an interview he was just glad to be able to be there at the right time to assist someone so clearly in distress.

The town manager and the Town Council last week commended Gran for stopping when others drove on by.

The woman was released to Hancock County Sheriff's deputies as they have jurisdiction over the eastern end of the bridge.

## Trash disappears . . . . . . but scofflaws persist

BUCKSPORT – Saturday was spring clean-up day in Bucksport, and volunteers scoured their neighborhoods for debris. Most didn't have to look far.

On the Silver Lake Road, Kathy Downes and Julie Herson Brooks reported finding - and removing many car parts, including two batteries, animal carcasses and every sort of debris imaginable. While they wore gloves, maggots and ticks were everywhere and both were bitten.

Half of the rubbish was lining the sides of the road from just from Harriman Hill to the Catholic Cemetery. All in all, they removed bags of the stuff in just two hours.

The worst of it, however, was when Downes drove down the road the next day and saw fresh debris along the sections the two women had cleaned the day before.

About 70- trash bags and sets of latex gloves were distributed by the town, and many volunteers used their own bags, gloves and other gear. All in all, Jay Lanpher, the highway boss, reported the crew picked up about two dump truck loads. That included the bagged stuff as well as tires and other junk and refuse people had left along the roadsides.

Town Manager Susan Lessard, who sparked the clean-up day, said, "I think that's pretty good, and the people who came to the office to get bags were very positive about it.

Those who participated got coupons for ice cream cones."

## Waterfront issues to be scrutinized

BUCKSPORT – Acting on a heads-up alert from the code enforcement officer, the Town Council quickly rallied to take an in-depth look at what's happening along the waterfront.

The councilors are concerned about maintaining the popular pedestrian attraction as officials continue to press for non-local money to underwrite a major portion of \$3.3 million in improvements to the Town Dock and the nearby area. The design phase of that project is substantially complete, but the financing source remains a work in progress.

The code officer, Luke Chiavelli succinctly noted signs of, "increased deterioration of the waterfront. This is just a result of time, weather and use. I have concern that if we do not put a plan in place to address it soon, it may become much more costly.

"Maintenance is more efficient than replacement. I would propose the waterfront committee be reinstated and we look at determining a project list that can then be prioritized. Then an engineering firm could make plans for the work to be done.

"This is one of our town's greatest assets and we need to take care of it."

Mayor Peter Stewart seized on that paragraph in Chiavelli's report last week, and encouraged his colleagues to act aggressively on the situation.

Specifically, the code officer is concerned by the slow disappearance of critical rip-rap, the small boulders that buffer the shore from the daily tides and ravages of storms. He also said the lawns along the shore also have become infested with grubs.

And the walkway pavers, in place for two decades, are beginning to pop, causing an uneven walking surface.

"If we let the waterfront fall into ruin, it would be a true travesty," Stewart concluded.

The councilors immediately agreed to put the topic on the agenda for next Thursday's (5/27) meeting.

"Talk is cheap, we need to take action," the mayor said after noting that most of what's been done along the pedestrian path has been routine maintenance. The first mile of the walk was built over 20 years ago.

## Motel owner files appeal

BUCKSPORT –The owner of the Spring Fountain Inn has filed an appeal of the Town Council's decision to condemn the property as a health and safety hazard.

The action comes as the town was preparing to seek quotes for demolishing the 44-unit motel at 196 State Route 1.

The New Jersey owner has hired a Portland lawyer, who

apparently has filed the appeal in an Ellsworth court.

Meanwhile, the largest creditors holding liens on the property are weighing their options for the prime nine-acre site.

Town officials have backed off the effort to raze the buildings, while the town's lawyer and the owner's attorney sort out the legal options now available to each side.

## In the works . . . Tidbits gleaned from week's news

**BACK TO THE PAST** –The Bucksport Town Council has been meeting via a Zoom link on the internet for nearly a year, but next Thursday (5/27) that will change. Revisions of the Covid-19 pandemic rules will allow the councilors to return to their familiar spots in the Council Chamber at the Town Offices building.

*The session will begin with a meeting of the Cemetery Committee and the councilors at 6:30 and then move to the regular council meeting agenda at 7. The councilors were unanimous in their enthusiasm for returning*

*to the familiar format. rather than have to concentrate on a small screen to watch themselves as if they were participating in Hollywood Squares on TV.*

**SCHOOL BOARD, TOO** – The RSU School Board is awaiting the latest Covid-19 guidelines from the state sometime next week, but it, too, is likely to return to in-person meetings next month.

**SPEAK NOW OR . . .** A public hearing will be held next Thursday (5/27) at 7 p.m. at the town offices on the Ameresco solar farm project planned for three lots on River Road. The hearing is the final step before the Town Council votes on whether to grant a special contract zone for the property one of the energy company's affiliates plans to buy from Bucksport Mill, LLC, the film selling the assets of the former paper mill.

*While not opposing the plan, Mayor Peter Stewart last week suggested that, perhaps, the property should be kept residential to promote the*

*development of much-needed housing here.*

**DOCKIN'** – This summer one of the small American Cruise Lines ships will be tied at the Town Dock every ten days, beginning June 16. Each of the two ships the line will operate along the Maine Coast this summer initially will be at only 75 percent or less, based on the lingering impact of the pandemic. The 175-passenger *American Constitution* will arrive in Portland on June 14 after departing from Boston.

*The arrival of the first ship here resulted in the canceling of plans for Bucksport to participate in a tall ships event because the Town Dock no longer will be available while the cruise ship is here. That visit was to include a tall ship and the Maine Maritime Academy's historic Bowdoin.*

**ONE JOB, MANY APPLICANTS** – The retirement of Roxanne Clapper from the office staff at the Town Offices drew over 120 applica-

tions before the application period ended yesterday (5/19) afternoon. Many applicants failed to submit the required cover letter, explaining why they were interested in working for the town.

*Now, it's up to Town Manager Susan M. Lessard to winnow the list, schedule interviews and make a recommendation on who should get the job.*

**TRASH TALKS** – Bucksport Mayor Peter Stewart wants a detailed status report on the continued efforts to re-start the newly built trash-to-energy plant in Hampden under a new owner. Councilor James Morrison also has requested a reminder on how many more years its contract with the consortium of communities pooling their refuse has to run.

*In the interim, most of the material is going into a landfill.*

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# Moving along

Often problems are raised and then discussed and then a meeting wears on . . . and nothing is done. It was refreshing to see the Bucksport Town Council take up some issues, and promptly set a course toward action on each of them. Now, it's a matter of moving toward definitive actions.

At the core of the awakened call to doing things before they get worse was Mayor Peter Stewart, who marshaled his peers to take a true in-depth review of several matters that had been raised before but now need resolution. These include the state of the town's waterfront, the plight of those charged with the maintenance of both public and private cemeteries and the dilapidated housing that finally galvanized when the health and safety code issues at the Spring Fountain Inn took center stage.

The town now has acted, at least seeing to it that nobody will live in jeopardy within that motel until it is brought up to code, sold to a more pro-active owner or demolished. A new appeal of the council's condemnation order now is in process, but at least nobody is living at the prominent U.S. Route 1 site.

Stewart and his colleagues next week will take up some serious - and, potentially expensive, issues on the waterfront. A lot of rip-rap has slowly drifted into the Penobscot River, depriving the coastline of the vital erosion protection it requires. Grubs have undermined the grassy areas, and cannot be treated with exterminators' chemicals because they are within 25 feet of the shore. And the pavers that make up the walkway, a persistent issue after each frost season, have begun to "pop," causing a potential safety hazard.

The code enforcement officer, Luke Chiavelli, also has drawn the council's attention to both the increase in dilapidated housing complaints and the problems that arise from slipshod building techniques sometimes attempted by those seeking "to live off the grid."

The councilors also are preparing to take a fresh and more comprehensive look at the physical and fiscal plights of the cemetery managers.

All in all, a great spring step forward. May the talk spark action, just as the mayor suggested.

## The good vs. bad guys

Volunteers in Blue Hill, Brooklin, Brooksville, Castine, Deer Isle and Sedgwick, Stonington and Surry in recent weeks have cleared entire truckloads of junk, debris and just plain thoughtless litter from the roadsides of their communities.

Last weekend, the roadside brigadeers here in Bucksport did battle with other people's refuse; they removed tons of the stuff.

Worse yet are those who did not pause for even 24 hours tossing things from their vehicles onto roadsides that were so recently cleared.

Maybe those of our ancestors who erected padlocked stocks to hold such miscreants up to public scorn were on to something



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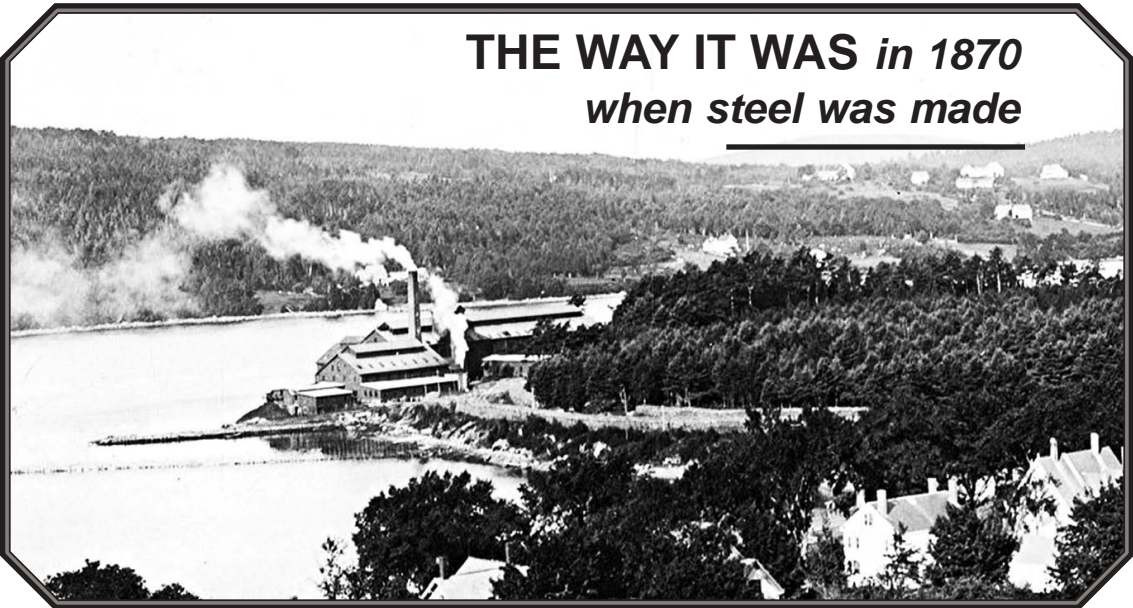

THE WAY IT WAS *in 1870*  
*when steel was made*

– HEAVY INDUSTRY began in Bucksport with a steel mill.

In 1870 the Sherman Steel Co. was incorporated in Bucksport. The steel mill was built on what then was known as Indian Point.

Several prominent Bucksport families were among the founders: Swazey, Wentworth, Bradley, Farnham, Pillsbury, Blodget, Parker, Woodman, Buck, Darling, Sanger, Hinks, Devereux and Sherman. The company manufactured steel in all of its forms.

The mill lasted but a decade or so, apparently succumbing to some financial machinations. It sat empty until the 1890's, when it became the Blodget family's tannery.

In the photo above, directly behind the mill, is a row of taller trees. This area became known as Carpet Green, an area of walking trails and picnicking spots for the steel workers and their families.

The photo also shows the once-pristine land, undeveloped and unused. Some believe the tall row of trees also is the location of the 5,000-year-old Red Paint burial spot of ancient native peoples.

The spot was discovered during the construction of a road into the tannery. It later was investigated by Charles Willoughby and later Warren K. Moorehead.

The burial ground became the site of what is considered the first professionally supervised archaeological dig ever conducted in the United States. .

Some of the artifacts that were uncovered were briefly displayed at Wilson Hall here in Bucksport, and others later were taken for additional study and display at Harvard College in Cambridge, MA.

### ‘Us’ and ‘Big Aqua’

To the editor

State Sen. Kimberley Rosen of Bucksport has introduced LD 1473, a bill to exempt land-based industrial aquaculture from state building and energy codes. There are many problems with this bill, not the least of which is Rosen's own admission - stated in an April 13 e-mail to Dr. Sidney Block of Northport that this bill could have been written by the aquafarms!!!."

Indeed, in a May 12 hearing on LD1473, Rosen read a statement that sounded like it was written word for word by Nordic Aquafarms, a Norwegian company that wants to build a massive \$500 million land-based industrial fish farm in Belfast. But when questioned about the bill, Rosen seemed to know little about it. Rosen seemed to think the bill was only about sprinkler systems, but it isn't - it's about the entire building code.

In the hearing, Rosen, other legislators and Kate Foye of the Maine Department of Economic and Community Development claimed to not know why there is so much opposition to Nordic Aquafarms' Belfast project. Taken altogether, Rosen's bill, her April 13 e-mail, her hearing statement, and this professed ignorance of major aquaculture issues are symptoms of an all-too-cozy relationship between Maine state government and "Big Aqua".

Perhaps Rosen and her legislator colleagues might bother to learn a bit about Big Aqua's dismal track record in Maine and elsewhere before greasing the skids for this highly polluting and environmentally dangerous industry. And who knows, maybe some day we, the people of Maine, could even write the bills that affect our state.

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

**No Memorial Day parade in Bucksport**

BUCKSPORT – There'll be no Memorial Day parade in Bucksport this year.

The truth be told, many of the stalwart veterans of Bucksport Post #93 of the American Legion, the folks who have been at the front of the annual parade here for decades, have concluded they can't muster enough people from their ranks to even ride in the tribute to all veterans.

Instead, a few members of the post will gather at the Veterans' monument on the waterfront at 11:30 a.m. on Monday, May 31. They will offer a prayer or two, and place a wreath at the memorial which honors the service of all in this area who have served in the military, in war and in peace, in current wars and in conflicts long-since forgotten by those who did not have someone engaged in them.

walk over to the memorial once again, this time to raise the flag from half-mast to the top of the pole.

Richard Bowden, the commander of the local American Legion post, estimated that more than 600 flags were placed throughout cemeteries in the town.

Bowden reported that a new Grand Army of the Republic marker was placed on the grave of a Civil War veteran interred in the Silver Lake Cemetery.

And a Korean War marker was added to the grave of the late Charles Clapper in the Catholic cemetery on the Silver Lake Road.

**Hospitals change visiting hours**

ELLSWORTH / BLUE HILL – The Northern Light Blue Hill and Maine Coast hospitals this week announced a change in their visitation policies.

The hospitals have waited for a time to safely allow visitors back in to visit with patients. However, the downward trend in area communities when it comes to Covid-19 positivity rates, as well as wanting to meet the needs of the community and the patients, new visitation policies went into effect, beginning yesterday (5/19).

Hospital patients will be

allowed one visitor per day between noon and 6 p.m. A visitor now is allowed to stay for a maximum of two hours.

Visitors must wear a hospital grade mask, regardless of vaccination status, during their entire stay.

In the rare instance in which a visit impacts the safe delivery or care for the patient and/or the visitor, guests may be asked to leave.

The hospital chain reassured the public that its medical providers and staff are continuing to work hard to keep everyone safe.

• Steven Bishop, who completed his final shift here last night (5/19), began as a part-time patrolman in 2003 full-time patrolman in 2006 and joined the department full-time three years later. Bishop now will work full-time at his family's auto body business in Orland.

The Bucksport Police Department now is at full-strength, with 10 full-time officers and four part-time reserve officers. Included in the ten are the public safety director, the deputy police chief and a sergeant.

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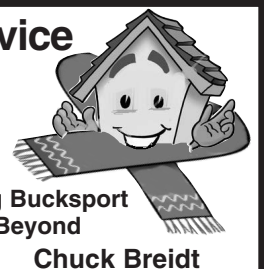
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## Aquaculture bill draws criticism

AUGUSTA – A piece of legislation ostensibly aimed at making it easier and cheaper to open on-shore aquaculture plants in Maine has drawn sharp criticism from those opposed to the planned proliferation of such operations in Maine.

State Sen. Kimberley Rosen, (R-Bucksport) this week said she helped sponsor the bill at the request of Gov. Janet Mills. Mills. Rosen noted, Mills sought her help because of the Whole Oceans aquaculture plant proposed but not yet built in Bucksport.

Environmentalists and others opposed to such plant and especially some residents of the Belfast area have stepped up their concerns about the proposed legislation. Belfast is the planned site of a Danish-owned salmon raising farm similar to that proposed in Bucksport several years ago.

Rosen said she initially backed the idea because she thought it would be helpful to Whole Oceans. The legislation

would remove the central sprinkler systems and some air-handling equipment in such plants.

Now, however, Rosen said in an interview Tuesday that she's not yet committed to voting for the bill.

She said her "number one concern right now is the health and safety" of those who would work in aquaculture plants.

Obviously the fish being raised in tanks would not benefit from from overhead sprinklers, she observed.

When she presented, "LD 1473, 'An Act To Exempt Land-based Aquaculture Facilities from the Maine Uniform Building and Energy Code Requirements,'" Rosen said she wanted "to update Maine law for the purpose of providing regulatory clarity and parity to an emerging, exciting industry for Maine, particularly for Bucksport.

She recounted the loss of the Bucksport paper mill in Bucksport and the devastating economic impact of that.

However, she said, "we were thrilled when we were approached approximately four years ago by Whole Oceans {which} expressed a desire to locate a land-based, recirculating aquaculture system on the site where the paper mill had once operated. This was music to our ears."

She summarized the efforts by Whole Oceans to get its Atlantic salmon farm operating at the on-shore site, adding, "we are excited and anxious for them to move the project forward".

In the interview she said she acted earlier to aid the Whole Oceans project by sparing it the estimated \$2 million to \$3 million it will cost to meet the current building and safety codes.

Rosen, like most Bucksport officials, said she does not know when the backers of the long-delayed salmon farm will turn the first soil to start the first farm. A blasting permit to start the process has not been requested.

## Police give warning . . .

## It’s ‘Click-it or Ticket’ time!

AUGUSTA – Together with the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration’s two-week “Click It or” Ticket” Campaign, the Maine Buckle Up. No Excuses! campaign kicks-off on Monday.

State police, municipal police and sheriff departments across the State of Maine will be stepping up their patrols to target those not wearing their seat-belts. The campaign will run through June 6.

These campaigns are intended to raise awareness about the importance of seat belt safety.

“Our sole purpose is to save lives and raise awareness about the importance of always wearing your seat belt”, said Lauren Stewart, director of the Maine Bureau of Highway Safety. “It takes just one second to make it click and it could save your life”.

According to the federal safety agency, in 2019, there were 9,466 unbuckled passenger vehicle occupants killed in crashes across the United States.

That year, 55 percent of passenger vehicle occupants killed at night (6 p.m.–5:59 a.m.) were not wearing their seat belts. That’s why one focus of the Click It or Ticket campaign is night-time enforcement. Participating law enforcement agencies will be taking a no-excuses, both day and night, approach to seat belt enforcement and education.

In Maine, the maximum penalty for a seat belt violation is \$85 for first-time offense violators.

According to the Maine Public Crash Query Tool at: <https://mdotapps.maine.gov/MaineCrashPublic/>, between

January 1, 2018 and May 10 last year the state recorded:

- 187 fatal crashes with unbelted drivers
  - The roads were dry 129 times
  - The weather was clear 130 times
  - It was dark (including dawn to dusk) during 100 of the crashes.
  - The most common ages of those involved in the fatal crashes were from 25 to 34
- “The Bureau of Highway Safety is reminding people to buckle up and survive your drive. We care about your safety. Please encourage everyone, in all seating positions, to use correct occupant protection, including child safety seats and seat belts when traveling. Let’s make this summer a safe one,” Stewart said.

## School Board votes to buy new mathematics program

BUCKSPORT – The RSU 25 School Board this week agreed with a recommendation to totally revamp the teaching of mathematics in the first eight grades, a decision that will cost roughly \$200,000. The new textbooks, lesson plans and guidance in their use is part of a six-year commitment to the new teaching style. The teaching of mathematics has been a lingering concern for some years, for test scores have been lagging,, especial-

ly in the lower grades. The Illustrative Mathematics program was selected from among five programs that were reviewed by administrators and teachers, according to Supt. of Schools James Boothby. He said a portion of the purchase will be financed by some of the new federal money the district has received, and the rest will come from the curriculum reserves account.

## GETTING READY TO ROLL . . new buses

ORLAND – The four school districts, including RSU 25, that comprise the Hancock Transportation Collaborative, will operate their shared busing program from the former First Student garage here. They also have hired Susan

Flewelling, the transportation director at First Student, to oversee the new transportation system. The RSU 25 board this week adopted five policies setting the rules for riding and driving the newly purchased buses.

## RSU #25 budget detailed

BUCKSPORT – Every household in the four communities that make up the RSU 25 district this week is receiving a newsletter detailing the proposed 2021-2022 budget. That budget will be aired at a public, in-person hearing at the Bucksport Center for the Performing Arts next Tuesday at 7 p.m. Forty one people are needed for a quorum. While the proposed budget is 1.8 percent higher than this year, much of the hike is off-

set by much-higher state and federal subsidies. As a result, the participating towns generally will receive a lower assessment. Most of the increase resulted from higher special education. Bucksport, will receive significant rebate checks from the RSU. Bucksport’s assessment will fall by \$5,800. The town also is expected to reap a \$126,000 rebate to offset school costs, cash school officials suggest be set aside when educational costs rise after the special grants

## Board says ‘no’ to George Stevens’ fiscal request

BUCKSPORT –On a 6-1 vote, the RSU 25 School Board this week denied the request for an extra \$1,000 for each Orland student attending the George Stevens Academy (GSA) in Blue Hill. Only the board’s representative from Prospect, supported the idea. Bucksport pays \$11,051.60 per year for

each of the seven students now attending GSA. When the RSU was started, Orland was the only community given the option of sending publicly financed students to any high school other than the one here. Now, Orland students attend five secondary schools, including GSA.

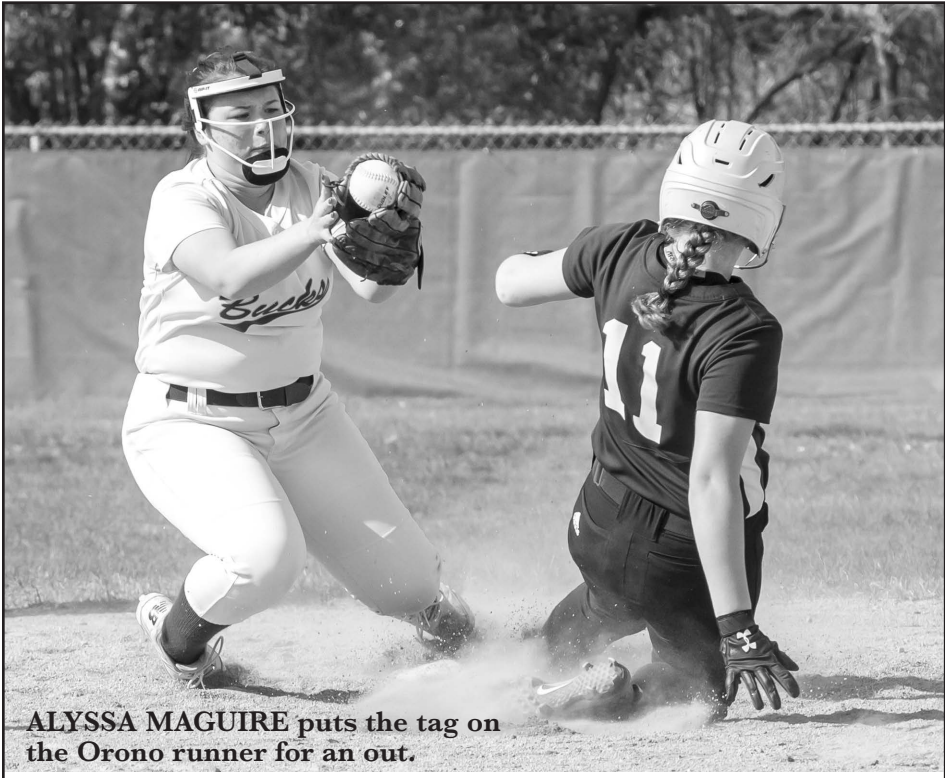

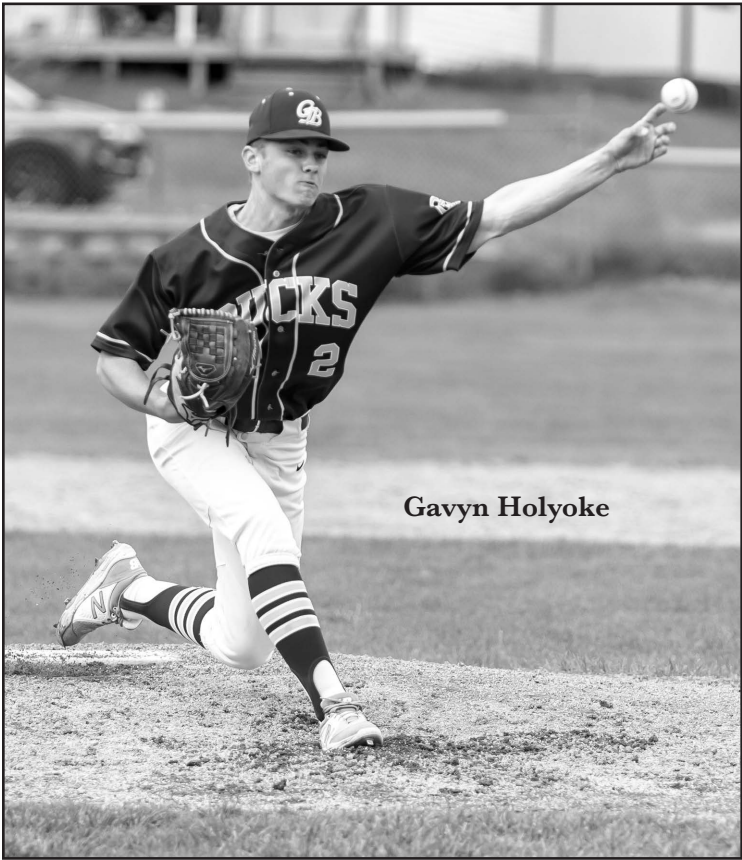
