A Stubborn Fight Made to Secure a Declaration for License.

AGUSTA, May 22.—This has proved one of the most interesting and important conventions ever held in the State under the auspices of the Democracy, and it was very evident that since the Federal patronage fell into the hands of the Republicans, there has been a marked increase in the enthusiasm of the average Democrat through out the State. He makes it a point now to present at the party gatherings. The convention today was accordingly a very full one, and the party bosses were all in attendance. The hotel capacity was fully taxed to accommodate the visitors and at the Augusta House, many who applied were turned away. A large delegation which arrived on the 2.20 a. m. Pullman train were almost at a loss to find quarters, and in one instance, two men were known to have been sheltered during the night. The morning train had been heavily loaded with delegates, and the hall was filled long before the hour for convening.

At 11.15 a. m., Chairman Brown, who had been down in the committee room, wrestling with contesting delegations, mounted the platform and read the call. After rapping out the names of the delegates, he declared that it had been the practice long ago to meet the Democrats of Maine to go up to the conventions, make up faces at the Republicans, and go down and vote for them. He then declared that it had been long the custom for the Democrats of this State to enter campaigns, but now they were to be elected by the people. His reference to the temperance and of the Republican party, was received with great applause.

ADDRESS BY MR. POWERS.

LOOKING AFTER SOUTHERN INTERESTS.

WASHINGTON, May 22.—The Democratic members of the House committee on rivers and harbors are dismayed by the chances made in the bill by the Senate committee and express an intention to vigorously oppose most of those of importance. It is asserted that New England appropriators, in many cases, are increased even beyond the estimates of the engineer officers and those submitted by the department while Southern interests are ruthlessly cut.

To illuminate Maine Waters.
