FIRE SET

FOREST - The Sunken Stream fire in Edmunds Township that scorched more than 1,000 acres of forestland was one of "well over 50" fires set in Washington County this spring, according to Roger Milligan, Regional Ranger. The fire, the largest in eight years, began April 30 and burned 1,086 acres of woods on Champion International Paper Co. and Moosehorn National Wildlife Refuge land. Hot spots within the fire zone flared up as recently as two weeks ago; the blaze was completely extinguished early last week. Forest rangers have joined the Washington County sheriff's department and state police in investigating the fire, which was set in a clearcut area that had been replanted by the paper company at substantial investment. Seedlings have been ordered from the Maine Forest Nursery to replant Moosehorn National Wildlife Refuge and Champion International lands.

SPRAYING BEGINS

BUDWORM - This year's spruce budworm spray program officially began on Thursday, May 23, when the first plane took off from Old Town to begin treating the first 1,970 acres of the nearly 400,000 acres to be treated in northern and eastern Maine. Because of a decline in the infestation, the size of the project has decreased from 3.5 million acres in 1976, the largest ever, to this year's acreage figure of 400,000.

SURPRISE - A surprise 70th birthday party was held last week for Irene Foster of the Maine State Forest Nursery with a luncheon and cake. The party was attended by about 65 of Irene's co-workers. Several Forestry people attended from Augusta.

WHISLE STATE BY ME

BPL - The Bureau of Public Lands hosted the annual meeting of the Maine Forest Products Council last week, arranging facilities at Sugarloaf USA and providing a tour for some 60 MFPC members of management activities on the Bigelow and Dead River units of the Public Reserved Lands System. In a formal presentation following the day's field activities, Rob Gardiner submitted the Bureau's proposed planning policy to the group for comment and discussion. The policy should be ready for adoption within the next couple of weeks.

BEAVER - The town of Lisbon voted 150-3 to accept Beaver Park, a 397-acre parcel purchased by Parks and Recreation in 1972. Lisbon will use the park primarily for recreation and forest management. Parks and Recreation will deed the property over to the town.

DEMO FOREST

- A timber harvest taking place at the James C. Durham

Demonstration Forest in East Northport will provide
scholarships to forestry students at the University of
Maine at Orono, according to Bob Umberger, Management
& Utilization Division. The 100-acre woodlot is managed
by the Bureau of Public Lands in cooperation with the
Maine Forest Service. This harvest is expected to generate
\$8,000.00 from about 76,000 board feet of pine saw logs and
a combined total of 118 cords of softwood and hardwood.
The money will be added to the trust allowing more interest
to be generated and more forestry students to be helped.

BIG A - Thursday, May 23 at 2:00 a.m., the state's longest environmental hearing ever to be conducted came to a close. Because of the large amount of material gathered during the 7 weeks of testimony and the number of exhibits, photographs, charts, prepared statements and other supplementary documents entered by GNP and its opponents (over 1,800 so far) the Land Use Regulation Commission expects to make a decision by the end of September.
