

The group will recreate scenes similar to the 1860's when troops were mustered to the Fort, according to Mike Leighton, Park Manager. The group, known as the 20th Maine Company B, was formed approximately one year ago, according to one of its founders, Brian Higgins. They will attempt to authentically recreate the Maine Civil War soldier from his uniform to his time-piece. The group will demonstrate marches and musket firing drills as well as songs and other military music of the period.

VIDEOTAPED

RISK - Arrangements have been made for a videotape to be made on public contact for State Park Managers. Professor Paul Risk's 4-hour presentation on hospitality and public contact was videotaped at the University of Maine at Orono's audio/visual center. The videotape will be used for Department of Conservation training programs. Ed Beach of Park's Operations & Maintenance Division made the arrangements.

CONFERENCE

NEWS - Representatives of the Department's of Conservation and Labor will visit the third session of the Maine Conservation Corps' "Brushsaw Training Program" and hold a news conference at the MFS Western Region Office in Greenville on Monday, July 15. Commissioner Anderson and Corps Director, Dennis Doiron, will participate. The programs which have been operating in the Jackman area since May provide brushsaw training to unemployed Somerset County residents. Other MCC projects taking place this summer include: Corps members will renovate a heavily used campsite at Seboies Stream, Aroostook County. They will tear down several picnic table canopies and build new ones. Corps members will also work on various small contruction projects at the Island Falls Forest Service Headquarters to include building a wharf and pouring a concrete foundation. Work at Roosevelt Campobello International Park, Campobello Island will include development and maintenance of walking trails, drives, picnic sites and vistas in the Park's natural areas; conducting small mammal and herptile surveys; and work in the Park's greenhouse and gardens. Six Corps members will reconstruct the fire tower cab for the tower on Squaw Mountain in Greenville, the first fire control tower in the country. Corps members will also repair and refurbish campsites along shores and on islands of Moosehead Lake and maintain hiking trails on Little Squaw and Squaw Mountains. These are just a few of the many projects taking place. This is going to be a busy summer for MCC.
