## **FIRE DEPARTMENT Annual Report 1971**

*To the members of the Town Council and the Citizens of  
Old Orchard Beach, Maine:*

The following is a report of the Old Orchard Beach Fire Department for the year 1971.

A total of 275 calls were answered in 1971. This is an increase of 32 calls over 1970 and an increase of 102 over 1969.

During the year 1971, new equipment was purchased to increase the fire fighting effectiveness of the Fire Department. Items purchased are: 700 feet of five (5) in. hose. This hose will increase the supply of water from the hydrant to the pumper with the use of less amount of hose. The 5 in. hose will carry the same amount of water at less pressure required as four (4) lengths of 2½ in. hose. The new 5 in. hose is carried on the 1960 American LaFrance pumper, which has a capacity of pumping 1000 g.p.m. Three new 55 minute capacity Survivair self contained breathing apparatus units were purchased to enable our firefighters to have better protection and a longer length of time, if need be, to extinguish fires in buildings. Two (2) modern transistorized Plectron alert radios were also purchased for the men of the Fire Department.

A mutual agreement was reached between the Scarborough Fire Department and the Old Orchard Beach Fire Department by this agreement, an electronic signaling system was installed between the Old Orchard Beach Fire Station and the Pine Point Scarborough Engine No. 4 Fire house. If the need arises for additional help at the fire or to cover the Old Orchard Beach station, a push button is all that is needed to summon Engine No. 4 from Pine Point. On our part, we have agreed to cover Pine Point Engine No. 4 station on any of their second and third alarms.

We are also at all times in radio communications with Biddeford and Saco.

We have pre-planned fire fighting tactics to be used, if the need ever arises, at all local schools. Several other large buildings, hotels, etc. have also been pre-planned.

Fire fighting drills and rescue operations are held by the fire department twice a month during the complete year.

During these drills and in inspecting various places in town it becomes more and more apparent to us of the need for an Aerial Ladder truck for the two and three story hotels, motels and apartment houses, the need



is even more apparent for such a piece of apparatus. Needless to say, is the possibility of improving the Town's Fire Insurance Ratings, and the possible reduction in Fire Insurance premiums. An aerial ladder truck may not be all that is needed, but it is a step in the right direction.

At the beginning of the summer of 1971, we formed our Fire Prevention Bureau. The Bureau consists of the regular men, Deputy Chief Roy and myself. The Fire prevention inspections are done by the men on the off-duty days and at their own expense, that is to say, they do not receive any remuneration from the Town. The reason they do this, is to help reduce the hazards of fire in Town and to better acquaint themselves with the buildings in Town. Several motels, hotels, cabins, cottages, stores and other places of business have been inspected so far. Private homes are inspected only at the request of the owners. The men are more than willing to do these inspections at any time they are requested.

Hopefully all business establishments and homes in Old Orchard Beach will be inspected over the next few years, and on a continuous rotation thereafter. Fire Prevention Programs for teachers, baby-sitter, youth groups and other interested people are being formed and hopefully will be put into effect this fall.

Most rewarding to the members of the Fire Department and myself, is the support given to us by the citizens of Old Orchard Beach.

As Chief of the Fire Department, I am proud to have such dedicated men in my charge.

The immunization clinics continued to be held the 2nd Tuesday of the month other than July and August. Also the November and December clinics had to be cancelled because of the illness of the attending physician. In spite of that 287 children received immunization. In October we officially received word that small-pox might be discontinued. Under special circumstances it could be given at the discretion of the family physician.

It still is of concern that some families neglect children's immunization, especially measles and rubella which is far from eradicated.

The Medical Advisory Board continued to serve in an advisory capacity.

In years past the nursing office has attempted to serve as a clearing house for Thanksgiving and Christmas baskets and toys. This has been far from successful for many reasons. It is hoped that some united effort can be created more in the spirit of giving and receiving, not only for those days but throughout the year.

The Agency was re-certified for another year for Medicare making it available to those who qualify.

To Mrs. Lenkowski and other volunteers who have so kindly helped with the clinics, the members of the Advisory Board and the Doctors my appreciation and sincere thanks.

## **REPORT OF HEALTH OFFICER 1971**

After several years of frustration, perserverence paid off and I was fortunate in successfully urging the owners of the large watery lot at the foot of Carll Ave. and Foote Street to fill and clean up this eye sore. It is to be noted here, that this was accomplished by your health officer and not the Town Manager as has erroneously been stated to me. This area in the past has caused great concern among the neighboring citizens and I am most pleased to note the great improvement. I must comment however, that the water which now flows over this filled land when frozen has caused considerable accumulation on the opposite side and the tiny cabins in the area are in danger of being undermined unless culverts or proper storm drains are constructed.

I would strongly urge the Town Council to review carefully the applications of those cabins, cottages and motels which in the past have been the cause of tourist complaints. Many improvements can be made if only we would enforce the existing laws.

I would recommend further, that no waste from the merchants of

Old Orchard Street be allowed to be placed out doors until after midnight. In the past this has been flagrantly violated and the debris has piled up in such unsightly accumulations that it made a mockery of the phrase "Cleanest Beach In the World".

Some merchants have encroached on our sidewalks when it is absolutely impossible to walk on them and many pedestrians, especially on East Grand Ave. are forced to step out on the street. Awnings overhang dangerously low and merchandise spills over the entire sidewalk. This must be stopped.

I would urge closer inspection of these markets that are making sandwiches to take out as I have found some in an intolerably filthy condition.

Once again I commend Mr. Armand St. Hillaire for his undying devotion to duty and I sincerely regret his resignation as Street Commissioner.

## **REPORT OF PLANNING BOARD**

To the Town Manager

The following is my annual report as Chairman of the Old Orchard Beach Planning Board.

The Old Orchard Beach Planning Board held twenty-four (24) meetings this year plus meetings with various Federal and State departments.

We met with the HUD office in reference to our Workable program — Urban Renewal and for the sanitary sewer project. The Workable program was completed and indications are that we the people of Old Orchard Beach, have to work together to enforce and abide by our codes and ordinances before we can benefit from Federal Programs — especially Urban Renewal and Public Housing.

We also met with the U.S. Corp. of Engineers for a study of our beach sand erosion problem. A report is forthcoming in the latter part of 1972. The U.S. Soil survey finished the soil description of the town of O. O. Beach and soil maps with explanation of various types of soil were acquired. The sanitary sewer program is well underway to realization. The survey is approximately 90% complete and negotiations are in process to finance and have the first phase started.



We met with the State Highway Commission in reference to the Saco Spur from the Maine Turnpike to the O. O. Beach Town line and also in reference to TOPIC (Traffic operation program to increase capacity and safety). The SHC is to follow through with traffic signs and painting arrows in streets etc. which will begin in the Spring except at the Heath St. Extension. Preliminary studies have been made on utilizing town-owned land on Milliken Street for both a parking and recreation area. Some conclusions are expected in early Spring.

Our codes and ordinances need to be updated and enforced. The Old Orchard Beach Planning Board met frequently with YCRPC to upgrade the subdivision code to comply with state statute H.S. 1380 - LD 1800 dated June 16, 1971. This new sub-division code should insure a firm upturn in bettering housing development in O. O. Beach.

A large project discussed and approved was the senior citizen 62 apartment development by the New England Baptist Council which is now in progress as well as the Hirst development of four apartment buildings of 24 units planned for an early construction date.

There is a substantial amount of work to be done to review and improve all our codes, along with many other projects but with the cooperation of the Council and the people of O. O. Beach, progress is assured.

I want to thank all the Planning Board members for their long hours of deliberation, excellent effort in participating in our meetings and the foresight in helping to improve our town.

**TO: SCHOOL COMMITTEE AND CITIZENS  
OF OLD ORCHARD BEACH, MAINE**

During the past year the educational programs in the Public schools of Old Orchard Beach, through the cooperation of the teachers and principals, has progressed with the changes. The Co-operative Education has proved very beneficial to both the students and community.

During the past decade the population of Old Orchard Beach has grown approximately 19.2%. This growth has had its effect on the population in the schools. The schools are very over-crowded and I recommend the Citizens of Old Orchard Beach seriously consider school construction in the very near future or the possibility of a year-round school for grades K-12.

Some needs which I consider necessary for a well rounded education would be art, physical education, and reading specialist in the elementary schools. I would further recommend serious consideration for an Educable Mentally Retarded Class for students between the ages of 7 and 15 with those above the age of 15 being tuitioned to the Biddeford Regional Vocational Center.

Your School Committee and I cordially invite all of you to visit the schools.

The Community should be proud of its School Committee members. They are interested in the welfare of all students, as well as the Community.

I wish to express my sincere appreciation to the members of the School Committee, Town Officials and Citizens for their help during the past year.

## REPORT OF VISUAL CONSULTANT

The Controlled School Vision Testing Program has assured the personnel involved of real value and benefits derived by the school children of Old Orchard Beach.

All previous records are reviewed and studied, number of follow-ups and family contacts and those needing other assistance are recorded. This provides for the most complete program of its type.

All Sub-Primary children are screened for ocular abnormalities and visual defects.

The School Vision Tester is used in the rest of the school system.

The controlled program is carried out as follows:

1. Driver Training class at Old Orchard High School screened.
2. All Freshmen plus questionable cases from previous year are tested.
3. Sub-Primary children are checked using the Clinical 6 point method.
4. Grades 1, 4 and 7 checked with School Vision Testing unit.
5. All intermediate grades — questionable cases and teacher referrals are sent to the eye clinic for vision testing.

In my opinion this is a well planned and administered program in which reliable tests and procedures are used.

Good Vision programs are rewarding in benefits to so many children who otherwise would remain handicapped in their seeing abilities because of unrecognized difficulties.

This control program will provide us with valuable information on students from Sub-Primary through Senior year in High School.

Cooperation of the School Board, Superintendent, Teachers and faithful assistance of Mrs. Agnes Murphy, R.N., makes this undertaking a valuable supplement in a complete school health program.

## **HIGH SCHOOL**

**January 1, 1971 — December 31, 1971**

Co-operative Education program has been added to the High School curriculum this year. Co-op permits the student to take his academic courses at the high school for part of the day and work in a local business or trade to secure his remaining credits. The employers pay the students a regular salary and grade them on the quality of their work. The student earns a total of 3 units toward graduation for each year of his program. Co-op is under the direction of Mr. Ralph Jones, and has proved very successful during this pilot year.

Both the Biddeford Vocational and Naval Science Programs have had a good year. We had about 45 juniors and seniors attending Biddeford Vocational High School for half the day, and about 60 boys signed into the Naval Science program. By government regulation, Naval Science will probably be officially open to girls next year.

The Class of 1971 had 70 graduates. Follow-up surveys by the Guidance Department indicate the following post-high school record of the class:

Working force	29
Four year college	23
Two year college	7
Military	7
Married (females)	3
Nursing	1

With the arrival of voting and the rights of full citizenship for 18 year olds, we should recognize the fact that students must become more involved than ever in the decision-making process in school responsibility and organization. Over 50% of the average high school senior class will now be legally adults and responsible for their own standards and conduct. It is part of the task of the school to take immature freshmen of thirteen or fourteen years and teach them self-reliance and responsibility in the short space of four years. How successful any school can be at this undertaking remains to be seen, but it is fairly obvious that the older approach of "do-it-because-I-said-to-do-it" will not develop the type of citizenship now demanded of one 18 years old.

I wish to thank the Superintendent of School Committee and the faculty for their hard-working cooperation in instituting these many programs and changes.

## ANNUAL REPORT LORANGER JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL

It was necessary to house two fifth grades at the Loranger School this year. These self contained classrooms operated independently from the departmental program of grades six, seven, and eight. This arrangement worked out well.

There are 368 pupils enrolled in our school this year. Approximately 203 pupils are transported by bus.

We plan to use the present library area for an additional eighth grade next school year. It should be noted at this time that there will be no additional classroom space available at our school when classes open next September. It is evident that serious planning should begin for additional classrooms.



## SCOPE OF AUDIT

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The system of internal control was reviewed as it pertained to the handling of cash and other matters of financial concern. Cash accounts were verified by reconciliation of bank statements and count of cash.

An analysis was made of receipts and deposits as well as disbursements and bank charges. Vouchers, payrolls and canceled checks were examined on a selective basis. Letters of confirmation were used on a test basis to verify the correctness of recorded assets and liabilities.

Revenue accruing to the municipality from various sources was reviewed and checked to pertinent records. Records of council meetings, as they pertained to financial matters, were reviewed. Surety bond coverage was examined.

The cash records of the Edith Belle Libby Memorial Library were examined, the cash balance was reconciled and the investments were verified.



# C O M M E N T S

## OPERATIONAL RESULTS

The current year operations showed a net gain of \$58,944.96 which was accounted for as follows:

The overlay, supplemental taxes and unexpended balances in contingent and public works department, less tax abatements and overdrafts in insurance, town poor and interest accounts were the major factors contributing to the net unexpended departmental balance lapsed. The records did not indicate that authority had been granted by the legislative body allowing overdrafts in appropriation accounts.

\* \* \*

The following comments pertain to the accompanying financial statements:

ASSETS . . . . The general fund cash balance, which included general, capital improvement and petty cash, totaled \$104,773.46 at December 31, 1971. The bank balances used in reconciling this amount were confirmed by the depository. Petty cash was counted.

Accounts receivable amounting to \$4,101.64 at the close of the year consisted principally of welfare funds due from the state and other municipalities.

Taxes receivable totaling \$220,199.58 consisted principally of current year accounts of \$206,465.03. The remaining balance of \$13,734.55 was for prior years dating from 1965. Tax liens and tax acquired property amounted to \$63,125.09 and \$492.13 respectively.

It was noted that uncollected taxes and tax liens totaled approximately \$283,000.00 at the close of the current year. It is again recommended that the delinquent accounts be reviewed to determine their collectibility and administrative action be taken accordingly.

Expenditures totaling \$24,881.20, which were in excess of amounts appropriated are being shown on the balance sheet as deferred charges pending further financial activity.

LIABILITIES, RESERVES AND SURPLUS . . . . Accounts payable totaled \$118,163.22 at the year end. Included in this amount were unpaid school department bills of \$24,277.90 for December of 1970 and November and December of 1971, various other departmental bills totaling \$93,689.48, a balance of \$50.00 due on county tax assessment and tax overpayments of \$145.84 to be refunded. A tax anticipation note of \$100,000.00 and withholding, social security, state income tax and other deductions totaling \$24,996.72 were unpaid at December 31, 1971.

Unexpended departmental balances of \$30,501.81 are carried forward to the ensuing year in accordance with legal requirements and/or customary practices. Excise taxes totaling \$5,396.63 are reserved for future allocation.

The capital improvement fund (garage and pumping station) balance amounted to \$54,314.95 at the close of the year. This fund was represented by deposits in local area banks.

The unappropriated surplus amounted to \$55,946.37, a decrease of \$43,168.63 for the year. This change resulted principally from the transfer to reduce the current year tax levy less the net unexpended departmental balance lapsed and actual revenue over estimated.

Appropriated surplus, established for tax losses amounted to \$13,467.41.

DEBT FUND . . . . The debt fund, incorporated in the balance sheet as a separate fund, shows various purpose outstanding bonds of \$585,000.00, due to mature during the ensuing fourteen years, and an equipment note of \$136,625.00, to be fully paid by July 15, 1978.

GENERAL . . . . New equipment purchases made during the year were authorized by the town council and were financed by the issuance of notes.

RECOMMENDATIONS . . . . In order that audit costs be kept at a minimum, the following recommendations are worthy of consideration:

A complete general ledger containing all asset, liability and operating accounts should be maintained on a current basis and trial balances of same should be taken monthly.

The treasurer should reconcile the checking account at least monthly with the cash book balance.

Periodic reconciliations should be made of uncollected taxes with the control accounts.

## ELEMENTARY SCHOOL Principal's Report — 1971

The following is a report of the Elementary School for the year beginning January 1, 1971 and ending December 31, 1971.

Our total enrollment increased by 8 compared to last year's figures.

There were 282 pupils transported to the Elementary School. The children came from the following areas:

Mrs. Helen Allen and Mrs. Elizabeth Regan were in charge of serving hot lunch. Approximately 200 children were served daily. Forty-eight applications were approved for free hot lunch and 25 at a reduced rate. These were issued according to family income. Some children bring a cold lunch. Over 90% of the first and second grade enrollment stay for lunch during the noon hour. These children are supervised by an assistant teacher and

three aides. Our custodian, Mr. Podchalski, also remains in the building during the noon hour to assist.

Approximately 250 children were served milk during recess in the classroom.

Several tests are administered throughout the year and are recorded on the child's permanent school records. Kuhlmann-Anderson Intelligence Tests were given in all first grades and new pupils in grade two were given the Otis Intelligence Test. Basic reading and math tests are used in all first and second grades, which assist the teachers in adapting instruction to individual and class needs.

Parent-teacher conferences were held in the fall for all classes and again in the spring for Kindergarten. First and second grades received report cards four times during the year. Kindergarten teachers used a check sheet which was discussed with the parents at conferences.

Our circulating library has increased to 52 sets which are being used by all teachers in the classrooms. These sets are kept in a convenient location where they are available to all grades. The children enjoy the variety they have in library material. All classroom libraries received books under Title II funds. Also additional audio-visual material was purchased to be used in all grades.

Teachers again obtained guides for each program viewed on Maine's Educational Television Network. These guides are available to the school free of charge from the Education Department in Augusta. They recommend the programs to be viewed on each grade level, suggest material to be presented before the television lesson, and give suggested follow-up material.

The Elementary School has three teacher aides, Mrs. Esther Taylor, Mrs. Lois Benway, and Mrs. Irene Cooper. Their duties consist of supervision of the playground, cafeteria, halls and bus loading. They do clerical work, hot lunch and milk orders, correct papers, conduct small group drill, assist individual children with lessons and many other tasks which help the teacher.

In addition to our staff this year, we have five teacher assistants which are used full time in the five first grades. Giving the teachers this needed support in the classroom has provided educational opportunities for all pupils in existing overcrowded conditions.

The services of a social worker, Mrs. Edna York and a speech therapist, Mr. John Maloney, were available to us this year. Mrs. York worked



with several children and their parents here at school and at home. Mr. Maloney worked in the building with eight children each week.

We all wish to thank the fathers of the PTA who volunteered their time to make bookcases for every classroom in the Elementary School. All of the teachers appreciated their efforts.

In closing, I wish to express my sincere appreciation to Mr. Howard Cushman, the School Committee and the parents for their full cooperation. I would also like to take this opportunity to thank the teachers, aides and assistants, of the Elementary School for their cooperation and untiring efforts in behalf of the children of Old Orchard Beach.

The teachers were on duty daily from 8:00 A.M. to receive and care for the first bus load of pupils. In the afternoon at the close of school the teachers were again on duty for loading the buses.

#### **FIRE DRILLS**

Fire Drills are set up the first week of school and are carried out periodically. We are able to clear the building in 30 seconds during a fire drill.

#### **HOT LUNCH PROGRAM**

The Hot Lunch Program runs very smoothly. Mrs. Armstrong, Mrs. Pettengill, Mrs. Zafirson, and Mrs. Hackett were in charge of serving. They

## SCHOOL NURSING SUMMARY — 1971

During the FALL Term Dr. Skilling did medical check ups on the Kindergarten, grades four and eight — plus the Junior High and High School students, (boys and girls), who participated in the various sports programs. During the late summer the football players had their medical checks completed.

The Vision Program was supervised and carried out for the children in the Kindergarten, and Grades 1-4-7 and the Freshmen class by Dr. Polackwich. (Along with these groups children who are having reading problems or signs of any visual difficulties are also tested each year).

The parents were notified of any apparent medical or visual difficulties and assisted when needed or advised preclinic help on medical care for the children. Local service clubs, the Maine Medical Center Eye Clinic and the State Department of Eye Care and Special Services have helped with the vision program.

Audiometer hearing tests were given by the School Nurse, to Grades 1 and 4 and to other children in other grades who showed a need for a check up on their hearing.

Tine Tests for signs of TB were given to the Kindergarten classes Grades 7 and all the adult staff due for TB check ups. All tests were negative.

During 1971 the hot lunch program was expanded under new regulations and was able to provide a goodly increased number of meals for the students. This was certainly beneficial to many families.

In the Fall Term a breakfast program was introduced which hopefully aided in improved "teen age nutrition status."

The usual virus and cold infections troubled students and adults during the winter term, and sick children were cared for until they could be safely taken home. Our Police Department helped us many times on illness and other student needs.

The York County Counselling Service, which has developed from the previous Child & Family Service having shown a greater need in our area. (The Hub Learning Services, a Pilot Federally funded program also emphasized the need for an expanded mental health program. Recently the Y.C.C.S. has received a \$400,000 grant of funds so we can hope for a



continued and expanded program for mental health needs in our area which is needed.)

Daily First Aid calls average 12-15 or more for physical health. Emotional stress calls, students or adults, from minor to serious conditions also run a daily course.

Dr. Skilling exams 498 plus football group. Dr. Polackwich vision tests totaled 677.

Individual Health Records (1300 plus) and State Departments of Health, Ed., and Clinic Services were kept by the School Nurse.
