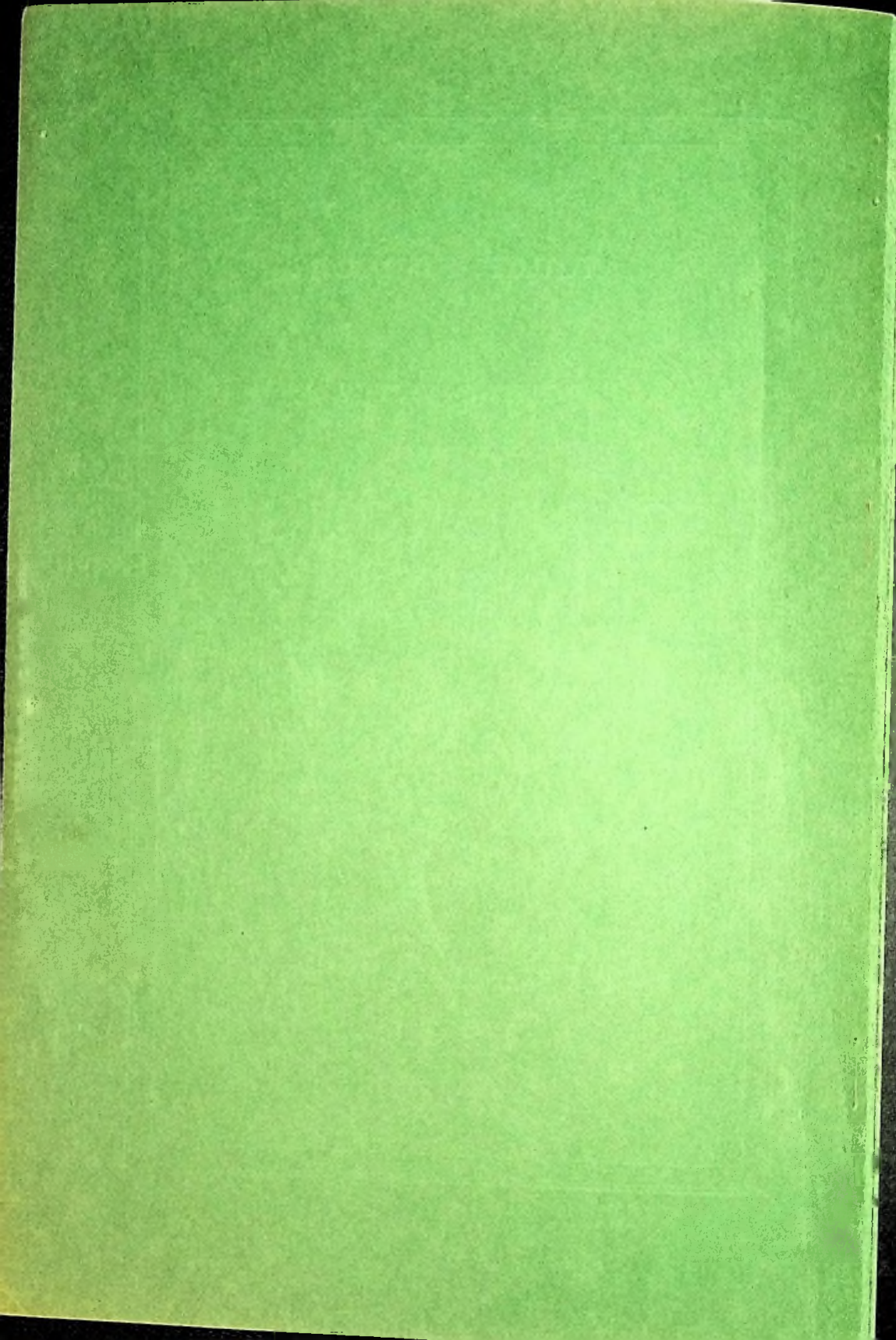

SCARBOROUGH FIREMEN'S ASSOCIATION

To the Board of Selectmen and Citizens of the Town of Scarborough, Maine:

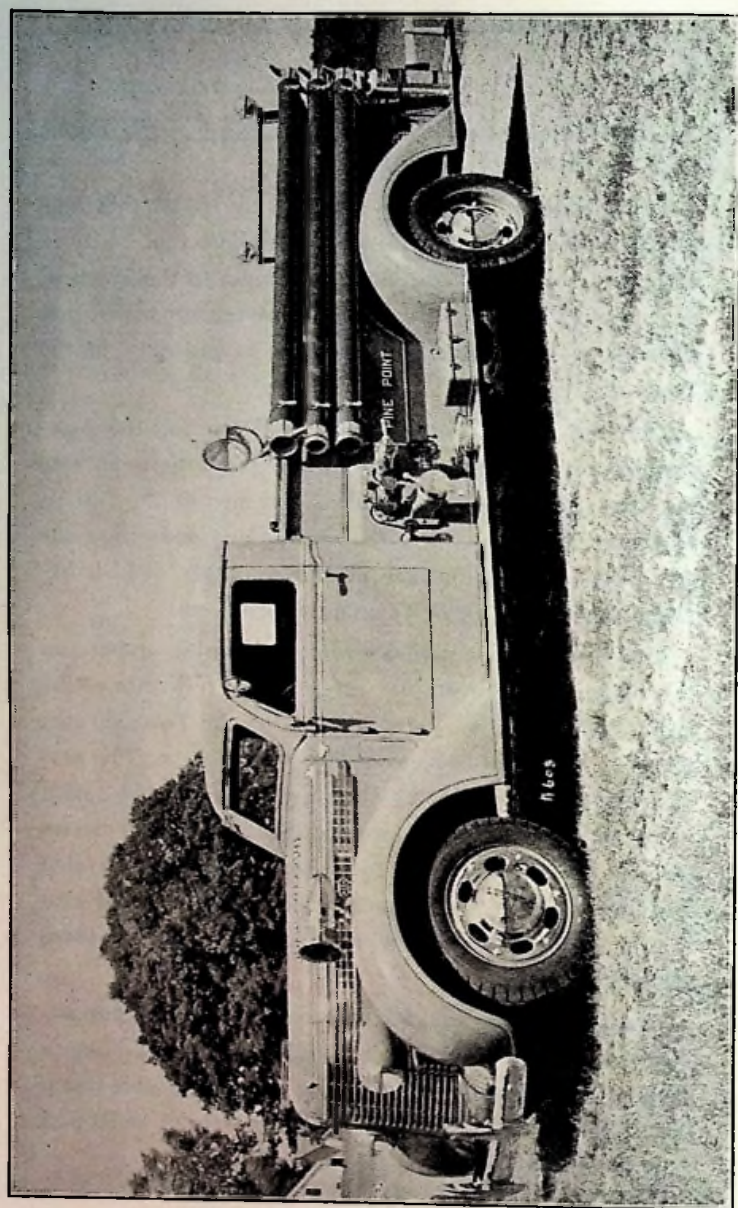
I am pleased to say, in submitting my report this year for the Scarborough Firemen's Association, that we have again progressed in fulfilling our purpose to the Town of Scarborough, that is, "To provide through organized and directed effort, protection from fire to property in the Town of Scarborough."

There has been much favorable comment on the Association's activity in having rules and regulations governing, first, the duties of the officers and men of the various companies, and secondly, the regulations governing the operation and maintenance of the equipment which has been purchased through Town appropriations.

This year the Association made considerable savings, on the change of the insurance rate, for the residents of the Pine Point and Blue Point sections of the Town; which has been estimated to be over \$800 00 per year. This saving was made possible by the purchase of a 500 gallon pumping engine, which passed the Insurance Underwriters tests successfully, and the fact that there was a suitable building to house the equipment the year round and also that there was an organized fire company covering those sections of the Town.

The North Scarborough Hose Company made a fine addition to their equipment by buying and assembling a small engine and pump, thus having a small portable pump which can be used to good advantage in brooks, wells and forestry work.

Oak Hill Hose Company added 300 feet of 2½ inch



hose and two pump cans to their equipment also enlarging their hose body and installing a booster tank.

Dunstan purchased two foam extinguishers for oil fires.

Black Point added a new 28 foot extension ladder, two foam extinguishers, and six sets of raincoats, hats, and rubber boots to their equipment.

Pleasant Hill replaced 100 feet of $\frac{3}{4}$ inch booster hose.

The department answered 94 alarms this year divided as follows: Dunstan, 35; Oak Hill, 15; Black Point, 15; North Scarborough, 13; Pine Point, 8; Pleasant Hill, 8; and laid 7,050 feet of $2\frac{1}{2}$ inch hose; 2,500 feet of $1\frac{1}{2}$ inch hose and raised 486 feet of ladders.

The first year in observance of the National Fire Prevention Week, the pumping engines of the department assembled at the Nonesuch River on the Beach Ridge Road in North Scarborough and gave a demonstration of fire streams, after which they assembled at the Town Hall and were viewed by a large number of people; and I want to take this opportunity, in behalf of the Scarborough Firemen's Association, to thank all of the people and organizations who have made it possible for us to accomplish our aims and purposes.

REPORT OF HEALTH OFFICER

To the Citizens of the Town of Scarborough:

The activities of this office the past year began with free Small Pox vaccination clinic at the High School building early in March. While there were fewer vaccinated at this time it was probably due to the large number attending this and other clinics in previous years. The State Health Department urges everyone possible avail themselves of this service as conditions are favorable for a quick spread of this disease if it once gets a start.

This town has been very free from communicable diseases considering the present condition of modern and economic life at this time. There are several factors that are cause for concern that exist at this time, that menace the health and comfort of the people in case of outbreak of disease. The crowded conditions of some of the schools which I am in hopes will be remedied in the near future as it has been considered in the past year and it is probable that the town will find some means of providing more room shortly for school purposes. The danger of spread of disease as far as the schools are concerned, minimized by constant observation of scholars by teachers and the exclusion of doubtful cases of illness also the careful consideration of the health and welfare of the School Department and school doctor are worthy of note.

This year as in the past economic conditions in cities have driven families into small towns in search of cheaper living conditions has caused a number of rudely constructed homes to be built each year until the number has grown until there are several large settlements of this type of homes of which very few are fit for the number they are required to house and a number are not hardly fit for habitation at all. It has been, in the course of my duties, necessary for me to visit these homes a number of times this year as in the past. Most of these houses are constructed of used material and no amount of work in house-keeping could keep these buildings clean as homes should

be for the sake of health and also comfort. So objectionable is the situation to the public that many have looked forward to remedying the situation and it is believed generally that some sort of a zoning ordinance should be enacted by the town in the near future.

Consideration is to be given at the annual town meeting as to a town nurse and it is hoped that this will be carefully considered by the townspeople and that means will be made to provide a nurse as the need of one is shown to be more each year.

We had the usual amount of complaints about nuisances that existed in different parts of the town. A large part of them the Health Department could not correct, however I was able to induce property owners to wholly or partly correct in many cases nuisances that existed on their land. In some cases where persons refused to correct these conditions I could not act as it would have to be a civil action by those who were discomforted. Many of these cases were in connection with the keeping of farm animals and the statutes give owners of stock many privileges where there are no town ordinances regulating the keeping of stock in certain areas.

The collection of garbage at beaches in the summer has been the means of eliminating a large number of complaints that came from people disposing of their garbage themselves in years past.

As last year there were the usual troubles connected with sewerage disposal but in most cases the owners corrected conditions as soon as they were notified of the complaints and usually the replacements were more substantial than the original.

In closing I wish to thank the municipal officers, Board of Education and others who assisted me in conducting this office the past year.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

*To the Board of Education and Citizens of the Town
of Scarborough:*

I am happy to know that more of our citizens are interested in the best possible development of our school organization than at any previous time. Of course this is due to the study of school matters which the community has made during the past year. A very earnest group of citizens, including the Board of Education and the Selectmen, has concentrated on these problems. The discussion in informal gatherings and town meetings has been very helpful. While failure to meet a quick agreement as to the best solution was disappointing, we may be sure that when a solution is reached from further and longer study it will be the more satisfactory to the citizens as a whole.

Repeating somewhat from the report of last year, our most difficult problems are these:

1. Because of badly overcrowded conditions, which are getting worse because of continuous increase in enrollments, additional facilities must be provided as soon as possible.

2. These additional facilities must be so located as to continue our progress in obtaining more effective pupil grouping. This applies both to the assembling of elementary pupils in buildings where they may have the benefit of grade grouping, and the grouping of pupils in grades seven and above where they may have the benefit of a broader program and we, in turn, may make wider use of our equipment in the high school plant.

Both of these will be discussed in more detail later under three headings—"At Oak Hill," "At Dunstan," and "At the High School."

A New Proposal

When it became clear that none of the previous proposals met with sufficient community approval to go forward, our study was started anew. With the cooperation of the Board of Education, we requested the State Department of Education to assist us. Mr. Richard J. Libby, the State Agent for Rural Education, came to Scarborough and carefully studied our situation. Mr. Libby brings a wide experience in dealing with rural schools and recognizes the difficulties, including financial handicaps, of the smaller towns. After this study, Mr. Libby submitted to the Board of Education a report. You will find a copy of his report on later pages and **I hope that every citizen will read it.**

Let's consider his recommendations:

"We would recommend a building program designed eventually to consolidate the schools of the town at three points, viz: Oak Hill, Dunstan, and the High School.

"As the first step we would suggest the erection of a four-room unit at Oak Hill to relieve the over-crowded conditions at North Scarborough, Beech Hill, and the Libby Schools. This should be undertaken at once.

"As the second step the erection of a four-room unit at Dunstan, or as an alternative, a new building.

"The third step would be an addition of two or four rooms to the High School building.

"When the three building units are completed, the set-up should be as follows:

1. Sub-primary and grades one to six at Oak Hill caring for the pupils now enrolled at North Scarborough, Libby, Black Point, and Beech Hill;
2. The school at Dunstan, sub-primary and grades one to six caring for the pupils now enrolled at Beech Ridge, Broad Turn, Pine Point, and Blue Point;
3. A six-year high school caring for grades seven and eight and a four year high school."

A study of the possibilities since this report was re-

ceived indicates that these recommendations would solve our problems.

Enrollments Still Increasing

Before taking up Mr. Libby's recommendations in detail, we should note that our enrollments are still increasing and thereby our problem is becoming more and more acute.

The situation will be seen in the following table. For similar figures showing enrollments prior to 1936 see our report for February, 1937. The figures used are the average daily attendance for the term starting in September of each year. The actual number belonging, the number for which school facilities must actually be provided, is slightly higher as the attendance is cut down by some daily absence.

At Oak Hill

Returning to Mr. Libby's recommendations let's consider each. In our reference to the number of pupils, we

will base on the total enrollment at the opening of schools last September. While the number in a grade changes from year to year, our findings are sufficiently close to help in determining what would happen if Mr. Libby's recommendations were adopted.

At present at Oak Hill we have four rooms housing sub-primary through grade seven. The smallest room is 34 pupils; the largest, 47 pupils. The eighth grade with 46 pupils in one room is in the high school. In the Libby school we have 59 pupils in one room with two teachers, a most impossible situation. Black Point is a small school of 23 pupils in six grades. Beech Hill has only 31 pupils but they are in nine grades. North Scarborough has 39 pupils in nine grades. Obviously at Libby, in the eighth grade in the high school, and at North Scarborough, there are too many in one room; at Beech Hill, while the number is not large, they are spread among too many grades.

Now, if Mr. Libby's recommendation were adopted, these desirable changes could be made. Grades five through eight from the Libby School could be taken to the Oak Hill school. This would leave sub-primary through grade four at Libby, a school of 34 pupils with one teacher. Of course the second teacher now at Libby would be transferred to the new building at Oak Hill. All of the pupils at Black Point could be accepted at Oak Hill. If this were done, the teacher could also be transferred to the new building. From Beech Hill and North Scarborough, the seventh and eighth grades could be accepted at Oak Hill. This would leave each with sub-primary through grade six, Beech Hill having 26 pupils and North Scarborough 32 pupils. In any other case where parents wished their children from any of these schools to go to Oak Hill in sixth grade or below, they could be accepted.

With these changes, using the four rooms in the Oak Hill present building and the four rooms in the new building, the eighth grade could be taken back from the high school and made into two classes of reasonable size. With all these pupil changes we would have eight rooms, the largest being about 39 pupils and the smallest, 22

pupils. If Black Point were closed, the second teacher transferred from Libby, and the eighth grade teacher transferred from the high school, we would have to employ one more teacher to cover the eight rooms. However, we would save the upkeep of the Black Point School. Above all, every pupil would then be having a real opportunity for education—which we cannot claim in the present situation.

At Dunstan

While it is not recommended for this year, let's look at the recommendation regarding Dunstan—the erection of a four room elementary building. This is an important step in the ultimate program.

This would provide six rooms at Dunstan—two in the present building and four in the new one. Using five of these for the present, we could gather all the pupils now at Dunstan, Beech Ridge, Broad Turn, Pine Point and Blue Point. On the expense side this would require some additional transportation; we now have one bus in that area serving the Scottow's Hill families. On the saving side, it would remove the cost of upkeep for the four one-room schools and eliminate one teaching position. We would also receive from the state yearly \$100.00 for each one room school closed or \$400. And above all, the pupils would receive much more effective education in the graded school. The advantages are so great that this recommendation should be carefully studied with the thought of going forward with it soon after the Oak Hill adjustment.

At The High School

As the third adjustment, Mr. Libby proposes additional rooms at the high school and the formation of a six-year high school (grades seven through twelve) for the entire town at that place. It seems likely that four rooms would be desirable. When these had been added, three of them would be used for the transfer of the seventh and eighth

grades to the high school building. This would release three rooms at Oak Hill which in turn could be used for the final consolidation, transferring pupils in sub-primary through grade six from Libby, Beech Hill, and North Scarborough schools to Oak Hill.

Then the full consolidation would be complete with sub-primary through grade six in Dunstan and Oak Hill elementary units and grades seven through twelve in the high school plant.

The Junior—Senior High School

At no stage of solving our elementary housing problem should we let any step be taken which will hamper the ultimate development of the junior-senior high school or six year high school at the high school plant. This has been recommended in the past in report after report. Many of the towns around us have also seen the desirability and adopted this plan. For a town of our size it is the best educational unit for the higher or secondary grades.

Even before the completion of the high school addition it will be possible—if the seventh and eighth grades are concentrated at Oak Hill, to approach this ideal plan. We can departmentalize the academic instruction, use some high school teacher hours, and assign seventh and eighth grade classes to industrial arts, economics and science laboratories. This will allow an approach to the broader program which we should be able to teach seventh and eighth grade pupils.

Art, Music, Physical Education

Also offering broader opportunity for effective specialized instruction in art, music, physical education, the concentration of all pupils in three centers will avoid the waste of time of pupils and special teachers. Now, with our children in eleven centers, much time would be lost in travel.

However, the absence of this specialized instruction is a serious lack in Scarborough's educational program. Even

if only on a part time basis, special teachers in these subjects should be available to assist the regular teachers in their efforts along these lines. The Board of Education has recognized this need by a vote directing the superintendent to take steps to provide instruction in music and including funds for such instruction in its budget request. Through the courtesy of the Rev. Mr. Pleasant, a music survey of Scarborough Schools is now being made.

The Health Program

We again emphasize the need, outlined in detail last year, for a full time school and public health nurse. At least, a start in such service can be made by the necessary appropriation to participate in the services of the county health association.

We earnestly urge that every effort be made to correct the physical handicaps of our young people as noted in the report of our School Physician.

May I close with gratitude for the conscientious attention being given to school problems by many citizens, the Board of Education and town officials and the hope that through this attention a splendid solution will be found for our difficulties. And I would be remiss if I did not remind you that your splendid staff of teachers are through their devotion to the needs of our children and their cooperation with each other and the school administration, giving our children the best education possible under present difficulties.

To the Superintendent of Schools and Superintending School Committee of the Town of Scarborough

Gentlemen:

After visiting all your schools on Tuesday, January 24, I am pleased to make the following report:

First, I want to congratulate you upon the fact that while your one-room rural schools are old-type buildings with the exception of the Blue Point School, I find the physical conditions in excellent condition in so far as possible in buildings of this type. The equipment as far as teaching is concerned is good, and the teaching staff seems to me to be much above the average for schools of this type.

Second, I find that the school buildings of the town are filled to capacity. Several of the one-room schools are over-crowded at the present time, and the continuing increase of pupils enrolled over a period of years would indicate that something must be done to relieve congestion in the immediate future. With the exception of the Broad Turn and Black Point Schools the enrollment in each of the one-room schools is greater than can be efficiently taught by a single teacher, the enrollments ranging from 29 to 37, while the Libby School with an enrollment of 59 pupils is housed in a single room having an air capacity for 35 and taught by two teachers. It is impossible for two teachers to work efficiently in a single room, and particularly so in a room so over-crowded as the Libby School.

You are maintaining a nine-year elementary system. In four of these one-room schools 9 classes are reported. In the Blue Point, Black Point and Pine Point Schools 7 classes are reported so that the number of daily recitations makes it impossible for the teacher to do efficient work and to give the individual attention to the pupils which is absolutely necessary to assure reasonable progress on the part of the pupils.

It is unfortunately impossible in a town like Scar-

borough to make a survey which will indicate with any degree of certainty whether or not the increase in school population will continue, and if so the section of the town in which that increase will be most marked.

Many of the children in the one-room schools come from the homes of parents who have been attracted to the town because of cheap housing conditions and it is difficult to predict whether they will permanently remain in the town. However, the location is such that even if these parents find employment in Portland, Westbrook or Biddeford that they can continue to live at their present locations and commute to their employment by car more cheaply than they can secure housing in either of the industrial centers, so it would seem reasonable to suppose that either these people or others like them will make Scarborough their residence in increasing numbers. It would seem reasonable to expect also that the increase in population along Number 1 Highway will continue for some years to come.

In considering the future of the school system of the town it is necessary to take into consideration the conditions at the high school where the four years of high school and a part of the eighth grade are now housed. It is reasonable to suppose from the enrollment from the several grades that within three years the high school proper will need a whole building and the eighth grade will have to be housed elsewhere.

With these facts in mind we would make the following recommendations:

We would recommend a building program designed eventually to consolidate the schools of the town at three points, viz., Oak Hill, Dunstan and the High School. As the first step we would suggest the erection of a four-room unit at Oak Hill to relieve the over-crowded conditions at North Scarborough, Beech Hill and the Libby Schools. This should be undertaken at once. As the second step the erection of a four-room unit at Dunstan. The third step will be an addition of two or four rooms to the High School building.

When the three building units are completed, the set-up

should be as follows: Sub-primary and grades one to six at Oak Hill caring for the pupils now enrolled at North Scarborough, Libby, Black Point and Beech Hill; the school at Dunstan sub-primary and grades one to six caring for the pupils now enrolled at Beech Ridge, Broad Turn, Pine Point and Blue Point; a six-year high school caring for grades seven and eight and the four years of high school.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF THE HIGH SCHOOL

To Superintendent F. H. B. Heald:

I herewith submit my eighteenth annual report as principal of Scarborough High School.

Our Senior class is the largest in the history of the school and thirty-five will probably graduate in June. Scholastic honors have been won by Ida Nelson with an average of 92.6 per cent for the three and one-half years and by Margaret Richardson and Margaret Courtenay who tied for second honors with averages of 89.7 per cent.

During the past decade forty-seven of the two hundred and five graduates of Scarborough High have attended advanced schools of learning. At present we have students

at Bates, Colby, University of Maine, Simmons, Northeastern University, Portland School of Business Administration, Portland Tech, Aroostook Normal, and Gray's Shaw's and Northeastern Business Colleges. Nearly all of these students have entered these institutions on the principal's certification and many have done outstanding work. I have recently been notified that Margaret Gantnier of Aroostook Normal School and George Woodward of Boston University have been placed on the Dean's lists for their excellent work during the first semester of the current school year.

The best track team in the school's history was developed last spring. This team, after winning several dual meets, won the Triple C championship, scoring more points than the combined total of the other competing schools. Following this, it won the Class C state championship at the Portland Stadium, this being the first state championship in competitive athletics ever to be won by Scarborough High.

A change has been made in the girls' athletic program in line with the policy of several of our neighboring schools. Basketball was dropped as an interscholastic sport and placed upon an intra-mural competitive basis. The continuation of this program in our school depends upon whether definite accomplishments for the better have resulted from the change.

Early in the year, funds were raised by the school for an electric scoreboard. It was planned and built by the coach and boys of the basketball team assisted by Mr. A. Ralph Libbey and has attracted much favorable comment. Protective mats have been placed at each end of the gymnasium providing a much needed protection against injuries.

The recent purchase of seventy-five books of fiction, travel, biography and reference will do much to raise our library to a standard fitted to our needs.

Another long-felt need has been filled by the building of a cupboard enabling our Home Economics department

to properly store its canned foods. In the early weeks of the school year nearly eight hundred jars of foods for noon lunches were canned by this department.

The public was given an opportunity to observe the school at its daily work when a four-period session of school was held on the evening of November 18. One hundred and two visitors were present.

In consideration of the modern demands of education, I am hoping to revise our course of study somewhat next year to meet these growing demands. A study which is being made compulsory in many schools and which I hope to be able to add to our curriculum is a course in Economics. The purpose of this course is to tell how man gets a living and to suggest how he may obtain a better living. Since many people are unaware of the extent to which the problems that confront them are economic in character, a recognition of the existence of economics problems and an understanding of them is desirable particularly in these days of business stress and strain.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the Superintendent and the members of the Board of Education for their support in the administration of my duties.

REPORT OF SCHOOL PHYSICIAN

The school examinations this year, in several of the schools in particular, were not at all satisfactory. Many of the defects requiring attention were conditions of long standing and were noted at the examination last year. Nothing has been done to correct these conditions.

To allow infected tonsils and bad teeth to remain year after year in children is criminal. Acting as constant foci infection there is always the possibility that a child may be crippled for life in one way or another. Many children are kept back in school due to the effect of bad tonsils and adnoids. Severe anemia, Rheumatic Fever, Heart Trouble, Sinusitis, Mastoiditis, Arthritis and many other serious disorders can be traced to bad teeth, tonsils, and adnoids.

The cards sent to parents of children with defects mean that at the time of the examination a condition existed which should have received immediate attention.

I feel that every effort should be made by parents to insure healthy and happy futures for their children. I can assure the people of Scarborough that I will cooperate in every way possible to see that these children receive adequate care.

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Scarborough, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall on March 6, 1939, at 9 o'clock A. Article I. To see if the Town will vote to accept and adopt the reports of the several Town Officers.

Article 2. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Support of Poor for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To see if the Town will grant and raise money necessary for the following: Free High School, Common School and all other necessary school expenses for the ensuing year.

Article 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to be expended for Memorial Purposes.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money necessary for the following: Electric Street Lights, Rental of Hydrants, Collecting Garbage and Rubbish, Officers' Salaries, Interest Charges, Contingency and to Defray Other Town Charges.

Article 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the regular Repair of Roads and Bridges.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) to repair and apply hard surface to the Airport Road. On Petition.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Winter Roads for the ensuing year.
