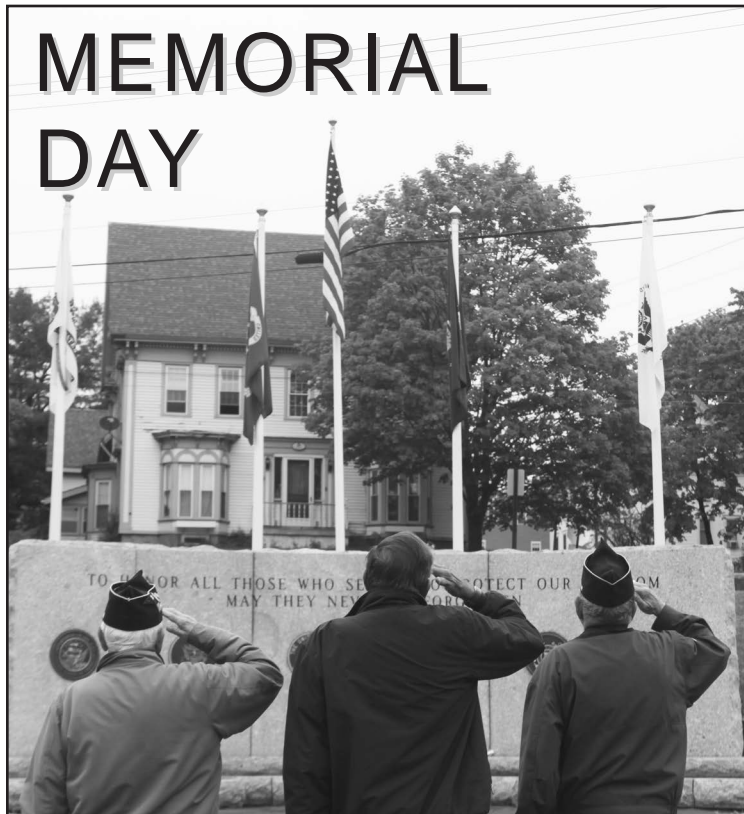

Claims town officials biased

Motel files new complaint

BUCKSPORT – The saga continues as town officials are poised to demolish the Spring Fountain Inn as a life and safety issue, and the owner has filed a last-ditch legal effort to squelch the council's April 8 order to shut down the motel down immediately.

While that order specified needed repairs to correct numerous fire, health, safety and building code violations, there have been no signs that any work has been done, the town manager reported at mid-week.

The owner, Asad U. Khaqan of Jersey City recently hired a

Portland lawyer, who on Friday filed a motion to further amend an earlier complaint in Hancock County Superior Court.

In the complaint against the town, the lawyer offered a list of allegations that claim the town failed to give the owner full legal due process.

Those allegations range from claims the code enforcement officer and the town "singled out" the motel for inspections not conducted at similar businesses, and that the code officer was biased against Khaqan.

The latest legal paperwork alleges that one or more of the councilors was biased against the owner and his business. The papers question the quality of the video used to document the required hearing.

Khaqan attended the hearing via an internet link, and chose not to have a lawyer that night.

The council ruled the motel at 196 U.S. Route 1 was without electricity, water and heat and the structure was a fire hazard and structurally unsafe.

All 44 units have since been vacated, and the building is secured.

Councilors split over solar farm request

BUCKSPORT – The Town Council, in a rare split, voted 3-to-3 on a request to build a solar farm on some 20-plus acres off the River Road, in effect killing the plan.

However, one or more representatives of the firm proposing the 5-kilowatt operation are expected to try to plead their case again at the council's next session.

Mayor Peter Stewart twice

has suggested publicly that he believes the best use of the property would be residential, as it abuts other homes and various sorts of housing that are needed in Bucksport.

Last week he was joined by Councilors Kathy Downes and Daniel Ormsby in voting against the idea, even though the solar farm had been cleared by the Planning Board. Voting to support the solar project were

Councilors Paul Bissonnette, Mark Eastman and Edward Rankin, Sr.

The seventh councilor, James Morrison, was out-of-state, and was unable to attend via an internet link.

Nobody from the Ameresco affiliate, the firm behind the solar project, attended last week's final hearing and vote.

Council approves pride event

Seven hour program on waterfront planned on June 12

BUCKSPORT – With little discussion, the Town Council last Thursday (5/27) unanimously approved an application from a local group seeking to rally those who support gay, lesbian, transgender, transsexual, queer and other lifestyles.

The event will begin at 2 p.m. on Saturday, June 12, on Bucksport's waterfront and run until 9 p.m.

The police, fire and code enforcement departments each gave the event a conditional recommendation of support.

However, Sean Geagan, the director of public safety, said after the vote that he wanted "to go on record" to let everyone know there would

only be one police officer on duty for the entire town during the seven hours of the pride event.

The organizers had have not requested any police, but noted they will have several participants available to summon police help should any incidents arise.

Luke Chiavelli, the code officer, said his only technical concern were the arrangements to temporarily supply electricity to the site. However, he also suggested a personal concern that granting use of public property for a social activism event could prove to be a precedent.

In the works . . . Tidbits gleaned from week's news

CLEAN SWEEP! –The Town of Bucksport is about to take delivery of a \$265,000 "demonstrator" street sweeper. The town manager expects to net \$15,000-or-so by selling the old one, although Mayor Peter Stewart suggested the current one might be retained to provide sweeping services in nearby communities.

The new sweeper is to be financed over seven years.. The manager said

the vehicle should last at least 25 years.

GRAVE ISSUES – Ground-penetrating radar was to be used this week to help find the bodies in the old Methodist burial ground at 917 River Road. After the stones were removed more than two decades ago at the request of an abuttor.

Some of the stones were buried on the site while others were laid on the ground at the nearby Riverview Cemetery.

Last week, the Town Council also voted unanimously to award \$500 to each of the associations that maintain cemeteries in Bucksport. They did so after a request from the group responsible for the Hillside Cemetery, which cited rising maintenance costs amid dwindling reserves.

DOWNTOWN EVENTS . Teri Doty, who operates a for-profit business providing chamber of commerce-like services is planning to hold several outdoor events in downtown Bucksport this summer. Her first one involves a partnership with the Warren Restaurant with the eatery selling a light bill of fare and alcoholic beverages, while live music is being staged nearby.

Although the details, including the dates, remain in flux, the Town Council last week indicated it liked the idea but will await more info before voting on the use of public property near the Town Dock

GET THEE TO THE POLLS! – Next Tuesday the

polls will be open in Bucksport, Orland, Prospect and Verona Island to conduct a ratification vote on the proposed 2021-2022 RSU 25 budget. The polls will be in the usual places, and open for the usual hours.

In Orland there is a municipal election was well but none of the candidates up for re-election have any announced opposition.

WATERFRONT – The Town Council next Thursday at 6:30 p.m. will take up a number of issues pertaining to overdue maintenance along the Penobscot River Walkway. Those issues range from repairing/replacing sections of rip-rap, the boulders that hold back the shore from being eroded by the tides, to, perhaps, resurfacing some of the paver sections which have become loose. Then, too,

there are those pesky grubs that have destroyed much of the grass, and can't be treated with pesticides because they are a few feet from the water's edge.

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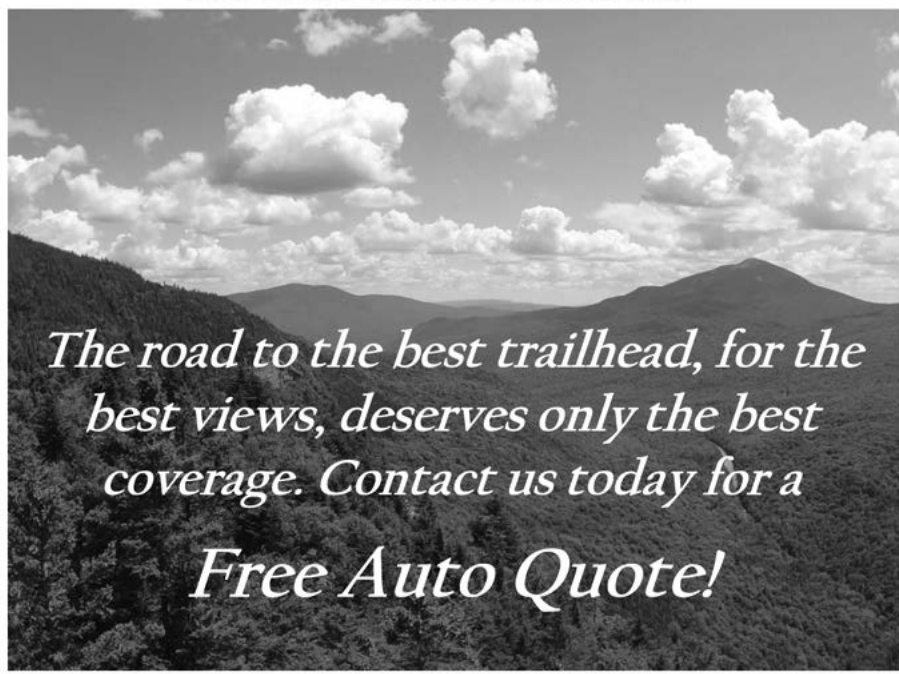

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Where’s the judge?

The dismal saga of the Spring Fountain Inn continues, seemingly an endless back-and-forth that nobody appears destined to win without spending a lot more monies on lawyers and all of the related costs.

Certainly the owner of the now closed-and-sealed motel at 196 U.S. Route 1 is entitled to all legal due process in protecting his investment. But this sorry tale of shutting down an obviously unfit for human habitation lodging spot has dragged on for years. And,

60 days after being told to clean up the fire, building and health safety code violations the New Jersey owner apparently has done nothing at all to the property.

Worse yet, through his new-found Portland attorney he has filed paperwork with the Ellsworth Superior Court, claiming that town employees and unspecified town councilors have targeted him. They are all biased, the owner said through his lawyer. We say, tell it to the judge, but first we need a judge.

What’s needed now is prompt judicial action. The court system can’t continue to hold the world’s legal issues hostage, citing Covid-19 concerns. Put up some plastic shields, reopen the salad bars of justice, gather the facts and render a decision. (*Had the councilors taken the same laissez-faire pace, motel tenants might have died.*)



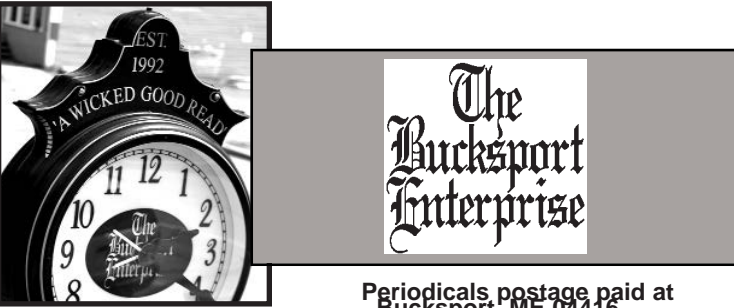
Bucksport Christian School kindergarten graduation on Tuesday.

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

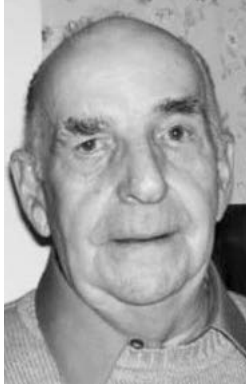

Emergency lighting is from Truck Works and More in Bangor; the graphics and lettering were from Banner City Graphics, Bucksport, and the radio came from Brown's Communication in Ellsworth, Maine.
