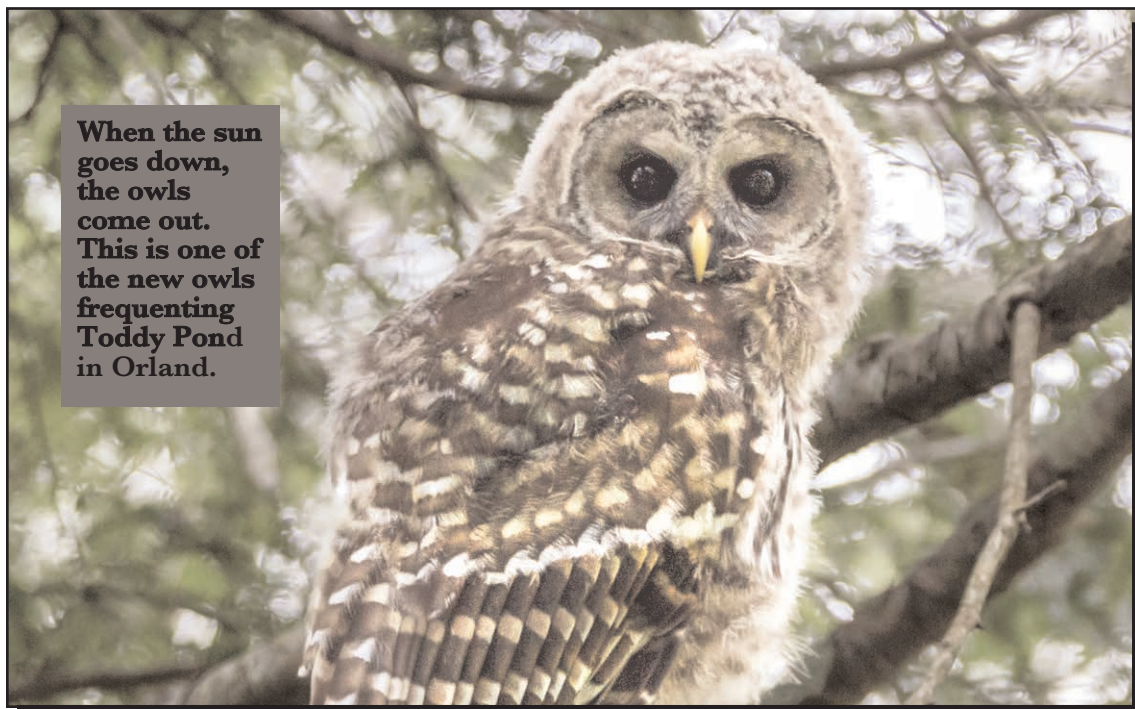

Walkway repairs being prioritized

BUCKSPORT – The reconstituted Bucksport Waterfront Committee is continuing its in-depth look at what can be done to return the Penobscot River Walkway to its original pristine condition.

While the walkway now is well-used, it has begun to show signs of neglected or deferred repairs.

The two largest issues are coping with several potentially severe areas in which the shoreline has eroded, and with the walking surface of the pedestrian way where some of the original pavers have “popped” or fallen away from the edges of the sidewalk.

The panel will gather at 6 p.m. at the Town Offices to hear an update on what should be done from Luke Chiavelli, the town’s code enforcement officer who also is serving as the chair of the committee.

The rip-rap - the stones used to hold back the shoreline - has eroded through the years, especially during severe storms.

The committee is considering some sort of paved surface to cover or replace the pavers to make the surface of the pedestrian route less costly to repair or plow.

While the walkway has been closed and left unplowed during winter storms, some members of the panel have asked what it would take to make the slightly more than a mile long path accessible year-round.

A quick experiment in one small section of the grass lining the walkway indicated the turf can be restored despite some sections being heavily damaged by animals, insects and the salt from the Penobscot River.

The committee members also are concerned about keeping the restrooms at the eastern end of the walkway and near the Town Dock clean, safe and accessible during as much of the year as possible.

Vandalism, while not as rampant here as in some parts of the country, also has taken a toll on the interiors of the restrooms.

Other concerns being discussed range from the lighting and surveillance cameras, to what to do with the eastern end of the walkway if and when the railroad releases a no-longer-used spur line running from the old depot to the former paper mill. The area, now overgrown, has recreational possibilities if it were repurposed.

– ‘Know Your Neighbor’ – Program offers chance to exchange ideas

BUCKSPORT – It’s called “Know Your Neighbor” and it’s a monthly opportunity to learn what is going on, as well as the possibility of sharing information with some of the area’s decision-makers.

While sponsored by the Elm Street Congregational Church, the series of hour-long chats with community leaders is entirely non-denominational and intended only to encourage people to talk informally to those in charge of local programs and, “to help people get to know others in their community.”

The first session will be with Mary Powell, executive director of Main Street Bucksport on Tuesday at 7:15 p.m. in Brown Hall, portion of the church on Elm Street.

The series will continue on the second Tuesday of each month at the same time and place.

Rev. Dr. Stephen York, the pastor of the church, initiated the program as part of an effort to encourage public participation in what is

going on in this area. In a recent session with several members of the town’s Community and Economic Development Committee, the pastor assured everyone that the goal is not to pressure anyone to do anything, but rather to offer helping hands when good things are being done on behalf of building on the community’s strengths.

York was quick to praise the potential that exists in the Bucksport area for a true renaissance and a new way of fostering good things that will further improve the lives of those who reside, visit or invest here.

Next Tuesday, July 13, at 7:30 p.m., the guest will be Mary Powell, the Executive Director of Main Street Bucksport. On Aug. 10, Town Manager Susan M. Lessard will be the guest. On Sept. 14, Lisa Ladd, Executive Director of the Buck Memorial Library will speak. Meg Keay, the owner of the Port O’ Call shop will be the guest on Oct. 12 and on Nov. 9, Jane Donnell, of The Alamo theater staff, will talk.

Bucksport tax rate unchanged

BUCKSPORT – The Town Council is expected to extend the current tax rate of \$16.25 per \$1,000 worth of property for another year.

The vote will come in about two weeks. The current tax is 85 cents per \$1,000 less than in 2015.

– Major projects and purchases –

Town ready to spend \$600,000

BUCKSPORT – The town will spend \$600,000 on major projects and purchases during the next 12 months. A quarter of a million dollars is earmarked for highway projects, and another \$185,000 has been budgeted for highway equipment. Work at the Town Garage is listed at \$12,000.

The fire department has been budgeted for almost \$48,000, while downtown improvements are listed at \$30,000. The downtown work is exclusive of the money being spent to replace fail-

ing retaining walls along Main Street and at the intersection of Main Street and U.S. Route 1. Half of the wall money is coming from the state. Police equipment is in the capital improvement budgets for \$45,000. And improvements to the Public Safety Building are targeted at \$7,000.

The Town Offices account will receive \$18,500 to underwrite various projects.

At the end of the fiscal year, June 30, 2022, the town is expected to have \$932,500 sitting in

various accounts, all of it earmarked for specific departments or projects at various buildings.

The largest single reserve, almost \$114,000 is set aside toward paying for the next new ambulance and related equipment.

The swimming pool repairs, some \$135,000 were charged against the reserves, so no borrowing was needed to pay that bill in the fiscal year that just ended.

In the works . . . Tidbits

muster the votes it needed. Instead, the councilors last month split 3-3, in effect denying the request.

The company has spent many thousands of dollars planning the project, and its representatives thought they had assurances the project would get approved.

POWERING UP – Bucksport has received an up to \$5,000 grant to install two electric vehicle charging stations in the parking lot adjacent to the Town Dock.

Town officials had been lukewarm to installing publicly owned charging stations, but apparently the offer of cash to pay for their installation changed some minds.

RE-BUILDING WALLS – The Town of Bucksport received but one bid to replace several failing retaining walls downtown. The quote of \$329,900 from Gardner Concrete of Bangor is expected to be accepted by the town councilors tonight (7/8).

A total of \$550,000 has been budgeted for the project, including the related engineering work. Half the money will come from the town and the rest from the state.

BUCKSPORT’S BUDGET – The town’s budget for 2021-2022 totals nearly \$7.3 million. That sum includes local municipal spending, the county assessment and money set aside for economic and community

development.

Meanwhile, the tax rate - unchanged from last year - is generating that sum from taxable property valued at nearly \$448.3 million.

RESCUE SUCCESSFUL – As reported last week, four police personnel talked a despondent man out of jumping from the Dr. W. Edward Thegan Memorial Bridge on June 25. As a result, Deputy Police Chief David L. Winchester has recommended Officers Matthew Schmidt and Kayla Brooks, Public Safety Director Sean Geagan and Hancock County Sgt. Daniel Harlan be nominated for a “life-saving award.”

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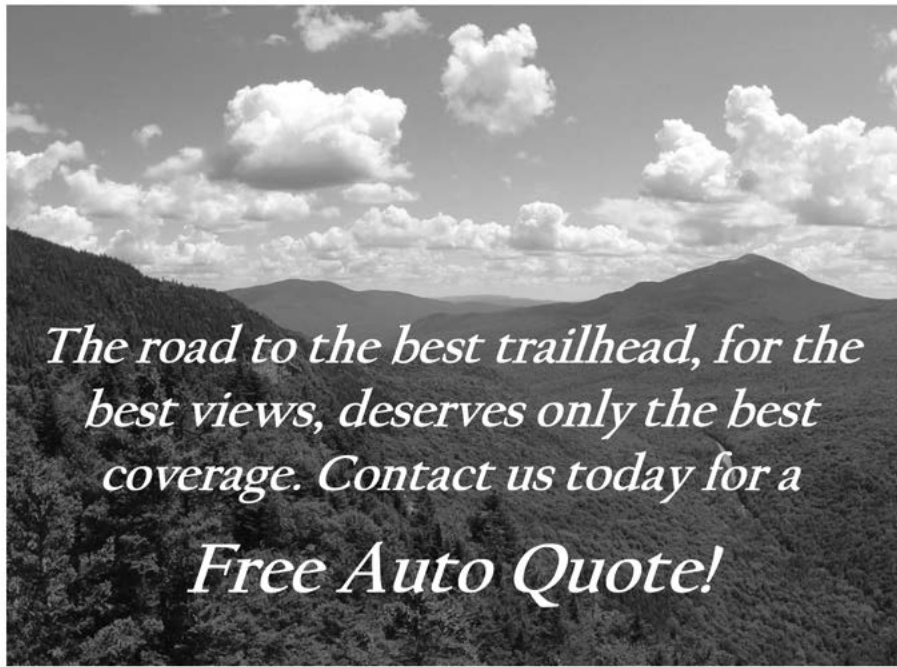

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It’s ‘Old Home Week’ in Orrington

ORRINGTON— The Town of Orrington will celebrate their annual Old Home Week from tomorrow (7/8) through Sunday, July 24, with events highlighting Maine’s 200th birthday.

In addition to the tall ships moving up and down the Penobscot (see article below),the Orrington Conservation Commission will have a display at The Picnic Park on Route 15 when the *Santa Maria* sails by and at the Sedgeunkedunk Stream during the duckie race.

The conservation group also is encouraging people to enjoy all of the other beautiful places preserved in the town. Hike the Richardson Tract atop King’s Mountain; Relax at Clark Falls; Launch a kayak at the Sedgeunkedunk Fishway and paddle to Fields Pond or launch a boat on Brewer Lake and tour, fish, swim or ski.

Old Home Week events will kick-off with the Endless Yard Sale on Friday, July 9 through Sunday, July 11. It has grown into one of the most anticipated events in the region. Thousands of treasure seekers have made Orrington the best place in the State of Maine to find the best bargains from yard sales covering over 7 miles of roads. Pick up the treasure maps on the days of the sale at Bob’s Kozy Korner, R.H Foster’s, PizzaLand, Dunkin’ Donuts, A Straight Stitch, Fusion, Lav’s Auto, the Town Hall and the Public Library. Maps will also be available online on July 8 at www.orringtonoldhomeweek.com and at facebook.com/OrringtonOldHomeWeek. Look for the yellow signs when shopping all around town.

The 19th Century Curran Village will hold an open house on July 9, 10 and 11, from 10 to 3 daily. Visitors will see the impressive growth and


development of this living history museum and it’s all free. The village emphasizes hands-on experiences with a working collection of 19th and early 20th century artifacts of rural life. There will be a slide show and video presentations, including a time-lapse video of the disassembly and reassembly of the carousel building, for viewing in the newly renovated interior of the red schoolhouse at noon and 2 p.m. each day. Walk through the Village and see building construction in progress. There have been more than 10,000 items involved in the relocation process. Entire buildings have been relocated, rebuilt, and/or repurposed. There will be costumed interpreters to answer questions. Home-made pork and beans, as well as grilled sausages and cold drinks will be sold, and there will be some ginger ice cream.

The annual Wicked Muddy Mainer will take place at Thornton Family Campground on Saturday, starting at 8 a.m. Contestants test their endurance in a muddy obstacle course on 120 acres of sweat, mud and tears. Spectators are welcome to watch.

Snag some artifacts and bargains at the Orrington Historical Society indoor yard sale from Friday and Saturday from 8 to 4 at the former Grange Hall.

There will be a craft fair at Gott’s Farm at 45 Center Drive, jewelry and other crafts will be available.

Port of Call: Bucksport

The *Nao Santa Maria*, a reproduction of one of the three ships that brought Christopher Columbus and his crew to the New World is scheduled to dock in Bucksport this morning (7/8) as a prelude to the arrival of other ships coming to the area as part of the “4-Port Loop” event.

A big event to float your boat!

BUCKSPORT – The Penobscot Maritime Heritage Association’s celebration of Maine’s 200th birthday will bring Tall ships and schooners to the Penobscot River for the first time *in 40 years!*

Historic seafaring vessels will visit various ports in the lower Penobscot River basin beginning today (7/8) through July 18.

The project, dubbed the “4-Port Loop” sets anchors in Bucksport, Bangor, Orrington and Searsport.

The square-sailed *Nao Santa Maria*, a Spanish reproduction of one of the three ships that brought Christopher Columbus to the Americas, is scheduled to arrive this morning (7/8) in Bucksport, and remain here until July 13.

The ship will be in Bangor from next Thursday through July 15-17. There is a fee for daily tours of the ship.

The Maine Maritime Academy’s historic schooner, *Bowdoin*, will be in Bucksport next Thursday (7/15) and then go on to Bangor.

The 170-foot U.S. Coast Guard cutter, *Abbie Burgess*, will be docked on the Bangor Waterfront on July 16 and 17 and will offer tours and information about her special missions.

The University of Maine’s *3Dirigo*, the largest 3-D printed object in the world, will travel by land and be on exhibit in Bangor, Bucksport and Searsport.

American Cruise Lines’ 288’ ship will be docked in Bucksport on July 17.

All of the tall ships and private boats are invited to a Schooner Gam, where they will gather off the coast of Searsport, which will be the finale to Searsport’s 175th anniversary celebration.

Both the Maine’s Bicentennial and Searsport’s anniversaries actually occurred last year, but they are being celebrated this year because of the pandemic.

Several towns within the 4-Port Loop will be participating in the summer celebration with fun, family-oriented events. They may include Brewer, Castine, Frankfort, Orland, Orrington, Penobscot, Prospect, Stockton Springs, Verona Island and Winterport. Fort Knox will feature Civil War encampments July 16-18.

Bucksport welcomes Tall Ship enthusiasts to town on July 17 with family activities including live music on the waterfront, Main Street merchant specials. The Alamo theater and Northeast Historical Film will have an open house, movies on the sail, and there are fireworks.

Searsport will host the Schooner Gam and a picnic in Mosman Park with live music, movie on the sails and fireworks on July 18. Penobscot Maritime Museum will also curate seafaring exhibits.

Orrington will offer waterfront viewing locations and many activities, including the Endless Yard Sale, from July 9-24. Castine will offer the Wilson Museum Open House on July 24. From music to museums, food to fireworks, exhibits to educational activities, the 4-Port Loop will be filled with maritime adventures.

A cell phone app (4portloop.oncell.com for Android phones and 4portloop.STORY.com for iPhones) will guide travelers through the key historical sites, public access and viewing sites along the 4-Port Loop.

The mission of the Penobscot Maritime Heritage Association is to provide an historical perspective of the Penobscot River Basin. The group encourages educational programs which expand awareness of tourism opportunities in coastal Maine and draws attention to the businesses and groups that drive the economies of area communities.
