The subject of a parcel post has been discussed and advocated for many years; yet it never could command a majority vote in Congress.

There is no question but what it would be a great advantage to the country, especially to persons living in country districts. This advantage has gained greatly in prominence since the rural free delivery system was inaugurated. A parcel post, with the delivery system, would give to every farmer an express service right to their very door, the same as their village cousins enjoy from the express companies.
