Within a year past the sales have doubled, and now amount to \$100,000 a year. 2000 dozen a month are turned out. The market is chiefly in the large cities of the country, and the jobbing trade here. About one hundred numbers are manufactured. The grades all stand very high, and the wares are the best in the domestic market. The monthly payroll is \$800.

CANNED HADDIES.

Fresh haddies so prepared are very palatable, and a great variety of sizes, from the common small fish, being of a much more delicate flavor. Full three-quarters of the goods are made in the State, and the annual production amounts to about 120,000 pairs. In the making of these goods from 100 to 125 hands are employed on an average, and the amount paid for labor exceeds a thousand dollars a week. The goods find a ready market all over the State, and an increasing sale throughout New England. For several seasons past may have been sold to Western jobbers, and there is growing trade in that direction. To fine goods in French and American kid, fox and serge, such as in process of making by the skilled workmen at the hall the firm give place to the leather of the finest quality, and into every day's production—forty pairs to five men.
