Tidbits from week's news

ROAD RE-OPENED – The major culvert installation on the Jacob Buck Pond Road was virtually completed a week ahead of schedule, reducing a projected five-week closing of the road to four. The town manager praised Wardwell Trucking and Construction of Orland for their speedy work. Only a couple of minor tasks remain on the project.

IT'S BACK! The ghouls, goblins and all of the rest of the Ghostport celebration trappings will return on Oct. 29. There'll be the traditional costumed parade down Main Street, a "brunch with the witches" near the Town Dock, and more. The events will run from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

ANTE-ING UP! – Taxpayers in Bucksport paid 49.3 percent of the town's annual taxes as of last week - a week after the deadline for the first of the two installments.

COMING UP – Representatives of the Bucksport Historical Society will meet with the Town Council next Thursday (9/22) to discuss some issues with the old depot which houses the group's museum. The same night the council will receive some estimates on what it will cost to repair and install the skateboard track near Ian's Playground on Elm Street. The town has spent \$1,500 to get the track moved here from New Hampshire. SkateBucksport, the sponsor of the project, wants to hold an event at the site to raise money for the effort.

DOWNTOWN PROJECTS – The one-page applications for access to \$10,000 in matching town money to encourage the improvement of downtown building exteriors went out last week. They immediately drew a dozen responses, and some of those forms already have been returned.

The retired Bucksport paper mill worker had plenty of memories to share, and as many friends with whom to share them.

raft race down the mighty Narramissic and the genuine home-made strawberry shortcake booth in front of the Methodist Church. The church mobilized its members for a public supper instead.

The event was delayed until Saturday from the traditional mid-summer slot when a vote within the organizing committee opted for a test of the later date.

Freeman shares with community

ORLAND – The Orland Fire Department announced that local philanthropist, Debora Freeman, has been awarded the 2022 Orland Spirit of America Foundation award.

The award is given annually for commendable community service. The department nominated Freeman because, "she embodies the spirit of community service."

During spring, summer and fall, Freeman runs a donation barn on Acadia Highway (U.S. Route 1), near the Back Ridge Road and the Toddy Pond dam. There she receives donated items and then trades them for cash donations.

Her once-small endeavor has grown to provide huge rewards for all sorts of good causes. She keeps tons of stuff out of landfills, helps folks get affordable items, and then turns every dollar in "profits" to community groups.

The Orland department has been a frequent recipient of the donations, helping buy much-needed forest fire equipment and other gear.

Freeman staffs the barn full-time but takes no money for that.

In 2021, Freeman received a plaque and an honorary membership in the department. She flies a fire service flag and banner at the barn to raise awareness and foster respect for volunteers in the fire service. Freeman also donates a lot of her time and money to the Cub Scouts while quietly conducting other generous acts of volunteerism.

She invites adults with developmental or other disabilities in assisted living homes to come for a "shopping" trip and select anything they want for free. It's a delightful field trip, and puts smiles on faces.

She has helped those who needed medical equipment or modifications to their homes after surgery or illness. When a mem-

ber of the Penobscot Fire Department was diagnosed with Lou Gehrig's Disease—a young man with three children—she raised and donated a significant sum to help during the ordeal.

The not-for-profit Spirit of America Foundation based in Augusta encourages community volunteerism.

Town ballot updated

BUCKSPORT – Steven M. Bishop, a former police officer here and the current chair of the Bucksport Planning Board, became a last-minute entry in the race to fill two seats on the Town Council.

The Nov. 8 ballot will see Bishop compete with incumbent Councilor Edward A. Rankin and Tracey Hair. The top two vote-getters will gain the open seats. Councilor Kathy Downes is not seeking re-election. The signatures on Bishop's nomination papers have been certified, assuring his name will be on the ballot.

(Last week's Enterprise incorrectly reported that only one seat was available on the council this year.)

Bishop, of 100 U.S. Route 1, now works for his family's Bishop Auto Body business in Orland.

Rankin, of 150 State Route 46, operates Ed's Automotive here, while Hair, of 126 Franklin Street, is the executive director of the H.O.M.E. Co-op in Orland.

The three are being invited to a candidates' forum on Tuesday, Oct. 18, at 7 p.m. at Brown Hall on Elm Street. The two RSU 25 School Board candidates - incumbent Peter W. Clair of 16 Mast Hill Road and challenger Keith H. Kneeland of 1149 Bucks Mills Road - are being invited to discuss their candidacies, beginning at 8 p.m.


The forum, sponsored by The Bucksport Enterprise, will be streamed live on the internet and a videotape will be offered for use on the town's public access cable channel.

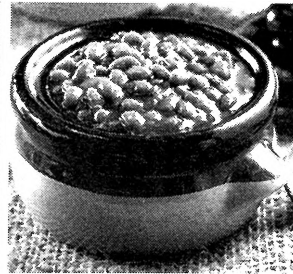

Royal legacy

The British Parliament, ordinarily a raucous collection of cantankerous curmudgeons schooled in the deft art of wielding verbal brickbats using the best words the English language has to offer, suddenly went solemn last week. Each member patiently waited her or his turn, then searched for the words to express their grief and the grief of most of the 2.2 billion others in the Commonwealth. No shouting, no foot-stomping, just pure affection for Queen Elizabeth II, the only sovereign most of her subjects ever had known.

In a nation known for producing strong leaders like Winston Churchill and Margaret ("Iron Maggie") Thatcher, the Brits know the importance of the right person in the right place at the right time. They also know prime ministers, like presidents, come and go. The queen, however, seemingly was forever.

In good times and bad, she stood resilient, offering words of understanding and encouragement. In her radio broadcasts as

a child she rallied all children to persevere, overcome their fear during Word War II. As a teen, she donned the uniform and became a mechanic and truck driver. Her annual Christmas broadcasts became legendary. Even recently she rallied her people to confront Covid. While the disease could kill, it could not prevail over a nation united to cope with it.

If the Queen said it, it must be true. After all, for seven decades she eased her nation's slow but steady evolution from centuries as an imperial power into a cooperative amalgam of 54 independent constitutional governing bodies.

From the outset Queen Elizabeth recognized she had few real powers in a constitutional monarchy. As a result, she scrupulously was apolitical throughout her 70-year reign. Indeed, she lived and died a most enigmatic figure, for she knew her place as a symbol. The queen reveled in tradition and most things British, and as a result she rallied support for progress directly from those everyday folks she devoted her life to serving.

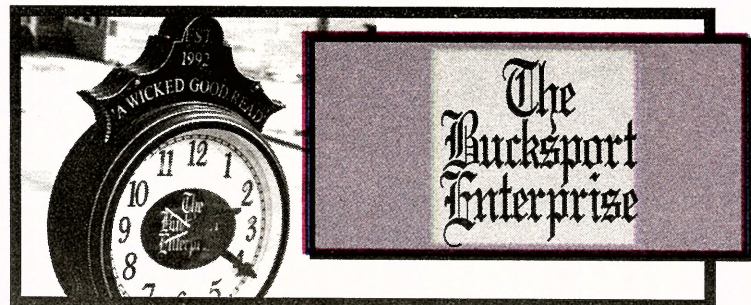
The queen said she gained great comfort and strength from, "common people who regularly do uncommon things." And most of the people put their faith in her, for they knew she truly understood them

Change remains inevitable, and King Charles III has some major challenges immediately ahead. Not the least of these is the role the royal family will play now. Whether the king has enough of his mother's innate intelligence, wit, understanding and diplomatic skills to capture the hearts of the British public only history can judge.

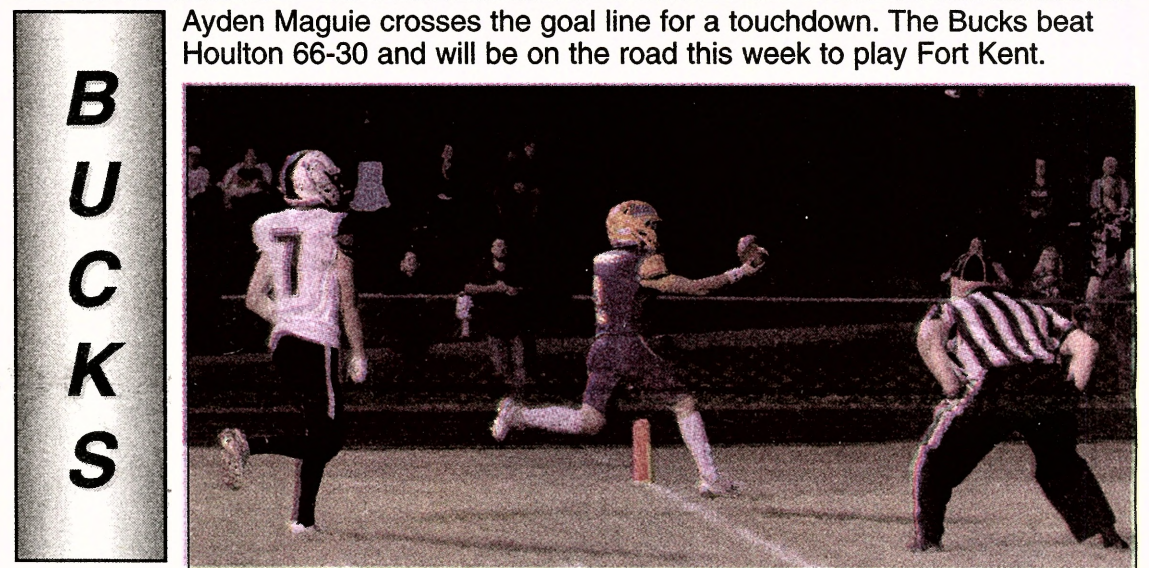
Letter to Editor:

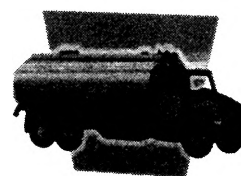

Community Health Outreach Consultant

Bucksport Bay Healthy Communities Coalition (BBHCC) seeks a compassionate, organized, and collaborative individual to support our organization as a Community Health Outreach Consultant. We are looking for someone who is passionate about healthy aging and public health. The successful candidate will demonstrate understanding of the Social Determinants of Health and apply this knowledge through the oversight of the Bucksport Thriving in Place Program (TiPP). This is a contract position.

Who We Are

Bucksport Bay Healthy Communities Coalition is a Comprehensive Community Health Coalition operating within Maine's public health system. We are a volunteer-based non-profit built and maintained by local citizens to improve the health of Bucksport, Prospect, Orland, and Verona Island. The Coalition monitors health status; performs community assessments; mobilizes community partnerships; provides community health programs and develops policies and strategies to improve community health.

The Role of the Community Health Outreach Consultant

The Outreach Consultant will facilitate communication between BBHCC Board Members and volunteers and local and state organizations. Additionally, this position will work closely with local, regional and state partner organizations to coordinate and implement the newly developed Thriving in Place Program. Primary responsibilities will include TiPP participant intake and orientation, data collection and storage, and community outreach and education. Additionally, they will facilitate communication between community partner organizations, conduct outreach for volunteer recruitment, research, program planning and evaluation, and maintain strong relationships with partner organizations.

The monthly time commitment is approximately 90 hours and the monthly fee is \$2200.

- At least 2 years of experience in social services and/or public health
- Strong in written and verbal communication

CROSS COUNTRY HIGHLIGHTS

Medal Haul at Bucks Invitational Coach Chris Jones

BUCKSPORT - The Golden Bucks hosted their annual Class C invitational meet, drawing over 100 runners from all over Eastern and Down East Maine.

There were three races, starting with a coed junior varsity race, boys' varsity run and a girls' varsity event.

Four Bucks runners toed the initial line, three girls and a boy in a field of 43.

The Bucks' Dylan Courtney was the first finisher in his first-ever cross country competition. After a great start he was able to maintain the pace for the entire race. He finished fifth in the junior varsity race. All three of the Bucks' girls finished in the top ten and took home one of the coveted wood medals.

The medals were crafted by the Bucksport High School shop teacher Mike Gross on the CAD machine along with the wooden plaques for the winning team.

The girls placed second, third and fourth. Abby Farricker who put up a personal best by timing 1:50, running the course in 25:48. Christina Degiso was third, and like the previous week had the biggest improvement from last year, her time of 27:23 was 3:38 seconds ahead of her previous pace. The fourth-place finisher was Roza Parker who completed her first race of the season, running the course in 29:09.

In the varsity boys' race the team had only four runners, not enough for a team score. Still, they posted some fine performances.

Gage Bruns who was unable to race last week because of injury, finished seventh overall, three seconds faster than last year. He did the course in 18:09. Michael Johnson, the Bucks' second runner this week, finished just outside the top ten in 13th place running the course in 19:00. Rounding out the team were two freshmen. Marlin Orcutt took 31st place running 22:43 significantly faster than the previous week on the Bucks' slightly longer course. Not far behind was Cameron Orcutt in 35th place. His time 24:08 also was significantly faster than he did in Ellsworth.

The boys likely have a full team at the Blue Hill Fairgrounds for their only PV-required regular season meet with every team in Hancock County.

With no opportunity to score with just four girls on the Bucks' team only one Lady Buck could participate in the varsity race. Abbi Hunt, running in her one and only home meet as a senior, ran a tough race and placed 12th. Although she missed the top ten, she met her other goals set before the meet. The girls would like to field a full team tomorrow (9/16) Friday. This week's race will start at 4 p.m., beginning with the boys, then the girls will head out.
