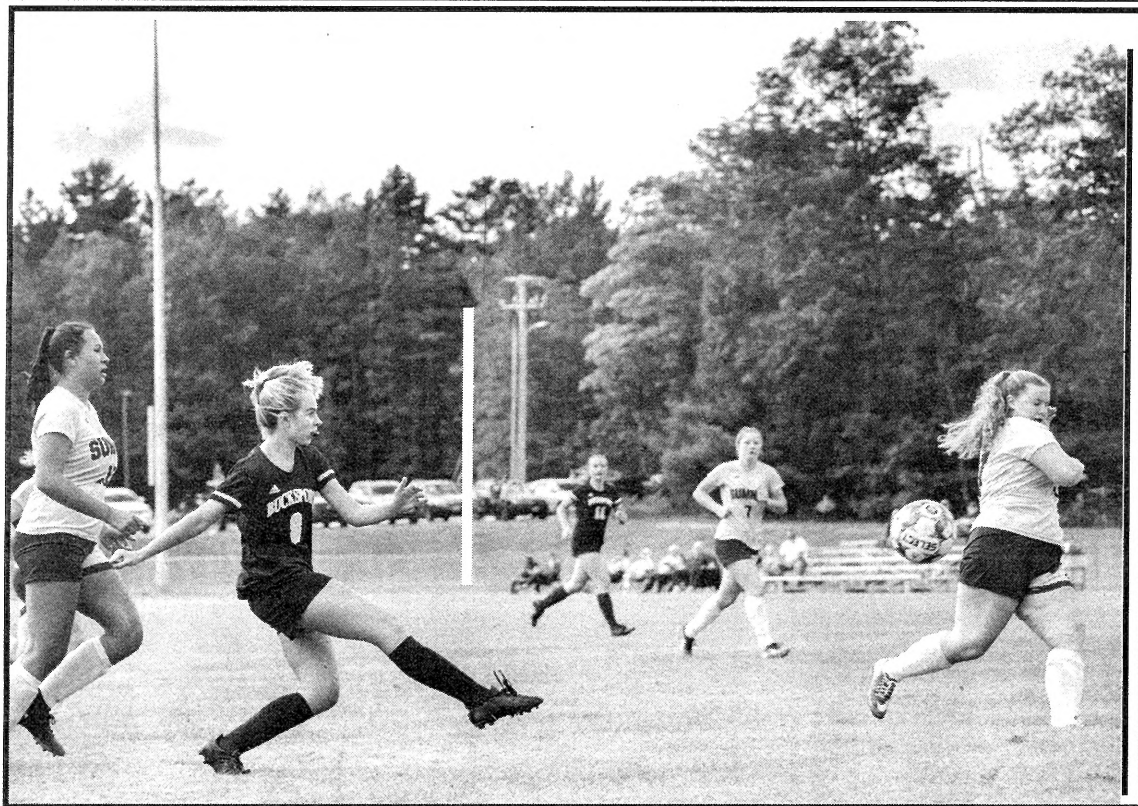

Hawes and Silvernail join for new ventures

BUCKSPORT – Andrew Silvernail, the Bucksport High School graduate, who built his success in large-scale manufacturing, and Michael Hawes of Bucksport, who developed the Silver Lake Estates mobile home park here, are combining ventures planned on two lots in the industrial park.

Blue Partners, LLC, their holding company, is proposing storage units and the headquarters for Hawes Trucking & Construction, LLC.

The Town Council tonight (9/9) is likely to approve the request for the two lots, which are valued at \$109,000 for taxation purposes. Lots in the municipal industrial park off State Route 46 generally are provided for \$1 each to encourage business growth

here.

The new business is expected to produce an investment of "up to \$400,000 and a first year assessment of \$500,000." The developers also are planning on a \$40,000 contingency for unforeseen costs.

The project also is to begin with two employees, and grow to four in the second year, and six two years from the opening.

The construction work will begin this fall.

Hawes trucking operation sells and delivers basic aggregate materials to other construction contractors.

Silvernail and his wife Shelby have been major benefactors for various causes in this area, as they met one another while at Bucksport High and have deep roots here.

Fire Department seeks . . .

Pump truck chassis, related gear: \$170,000

BUCKSPORT – The firefighters are seeking a nearly \$170,000 upgrade of Bucksport's 1988 Tanker 2.

They suggest the work will provide a better, more powerful, safer truck that could last another 25 years.

The unit is essential in fighting fires in areas where fire hydrants do not exist, and water often must be trucked long distances.

The Town Council will consider the proposal tonight (9/9).

A sale of the current chassis and pump could bring \$7,500 they suggest.

The new unit would have a new chassis, a pump capable of moving 1,000 gallons of water,

double the current limit, and afford other improvements, including a new radio for emergency calls.

The 2,200-gallon tank would be transferred to the new chassis.

According to the Fire Department data submitted to the councilors, a new pumper would cost the town from \$375,000 to \$425,000, depending on the equipment that is specified.

The Fire Department already has sought bids from several suppliers, and is prepared to act as soon as the councilors endorse the plan.

The chassis has been quoted at \$86,000, the pump at \$75,000 and the rest of the sum would be for the equipment and

Ballot set! . . . TOWN COUNCIL RACE IS OFFICIALLY ON - AS SIX SEEK THREE SEATS

BUCKSPORT – The deadline came and went last Thursday (9/2) so the town clerk confirmed six candidates successfully filed nomination papers- but the seventh - Derek R. Cole of 36 Elm Street - had opted not to make the race.

In a statement issued Tuesday, Cole said, "I considered a run for Bucksport Town Council, and after much consideration have decided not to run. After speaking with many members of our town, I realized that I can better serve the community through grassroots efforts aimed at bringing people together."

Here, listed alphabetically are the candidates who qualified to have their names on the Nov. 2 municipal ballot:

The top three vote-getters that day will earning three-year seats on the seven-member Town Council.

• **Bruce M. Ashmore**, of 4 Hinks Street, is an auto upholstery business owner in the industrial park and an activist in various gun and sporting groups.

• **Paul A. Bissonnette** of 53 Bridge Street, an incumbent councilor who formerly served on the school committee.

• **Joseph A. Davanzo** of 7

Spring Street, a retired postal worker who remains active in his union and in a number of not-for-profit groups in the area

The Enterprise last week inadvertently omitted Davanzo from a list who had qualified for a place on the ballot. In fact, he was the third of the council candidates to submit all of the required paperwork.

• **Tracey J. Hair**, of 126 Franklin Street, executive director of the H.O.M.E. Co-op in Orland and a political newcomer here.

• **Daniel M. Ormsby** of 17 Middle Street, an incumbent councilor and a public school administrator.

• **James R. Morrison** of 4 Morrison Road, an incumbent councilor and a farmer here.

All of those seeking the council seats will be invited to a Bucksport Enterprise forum on Tuesday, Oct. 29 at 5:15 p.m. at Brown Hall on Elm Street.

The 90-minute session will be moderated by Dr. Stephen York, the pastor of the Elm Street Congregational Church.

The candidates' night event will be streamed on the internet and videotaped for later use on the town's public access cable channel.

The public may submit possible questions to be asked, and

these will be reviewed by York, just as the Verona Island resident has done at previous candidate forums.





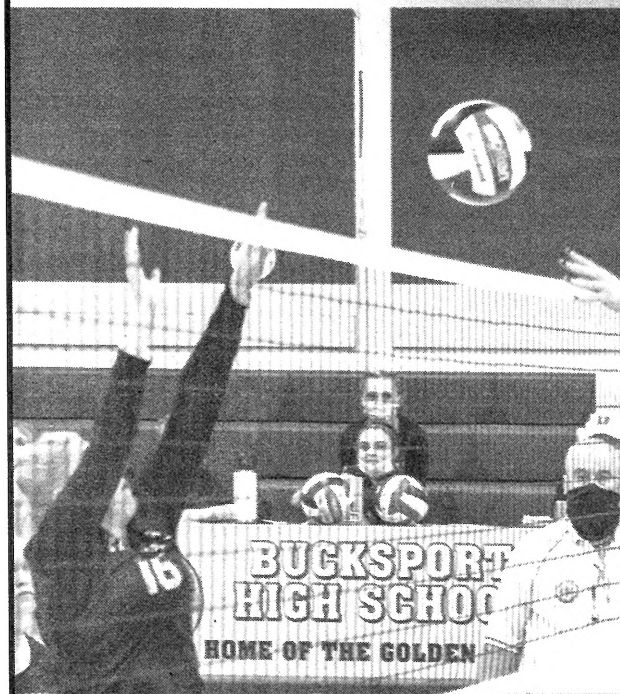
To the Editor

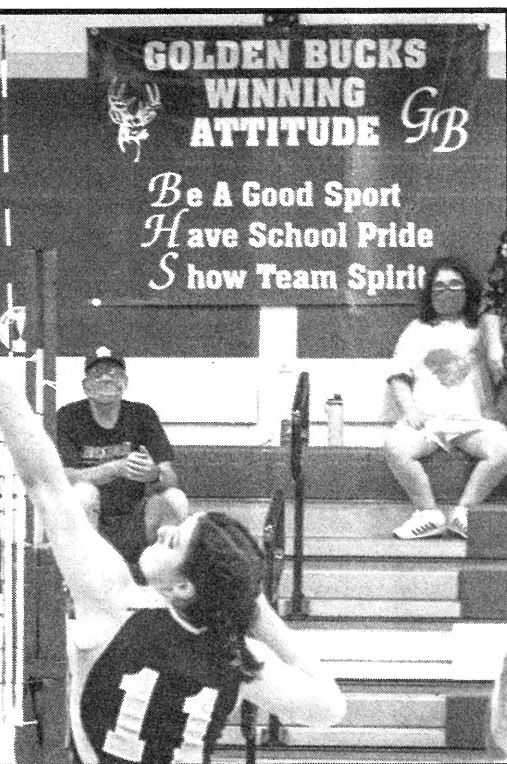


Working WITH net!

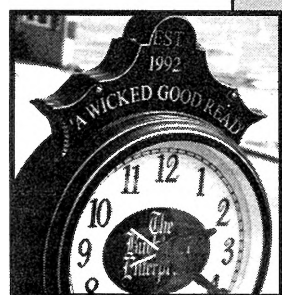

In 2020 President Donald Trump made a deal with the Taliban to withdraw the US troops and contractors by May 1, 2021 and 5,000 Taliban prisoners were released from jail.

Hileman cruises to big Ellsworth win

ELLSWORTH – Running in the Ellsworth Invitational at the start of the high school cross-country season in September has been a rite of passage for many cross country teams now for decades. Throughout that time only two runners from the Bucks squad have earned the crown as the sole winner at that race: Maine Running Hall of Famer Gerry Clapper and Bucksport High School Sports Hall of Famer Maggie Kropp.

On Saturday, the Golden Bucks added a third name to that illustrious list, Will Hileman. Hileman won the meet, going away, nearly 50 seconds ahead of his closest competitor.

His incredible time: 16:06.99 would have won every Ellsworth Invitational way back to 2013 and nearly tied Ellsworth's Dan Curtis' time in 2012 by a tenth of a second.

Hileman took a commanding lead before the end of the first of the two-loop course and never looked back. He nearly ran into the John Deere Gator that had picked up injured runners, as he was closing in on the finish.

The Bucks team would have their best finish at the Invitational in years with a seventh place finish out of a dozen teams.

Gage Bruns took the second spot for the Bucks with a strong finish, moving up multiple spots as the race progressed and finishing 20th at 18:57. The Bucks next two runners – Micheal Johnson and Collin McDougal – finished nearly next to each other in 48th and 49th place. Johnson's time - 20:36 - was nearly as fast as last years' time on a shorter course.

For freshman McDougal it was his first race on a sometimes intimidating course that has two very tough hills within the first half mile. However, his time of 20:59 was very respectable for his first varsity race and put him ahead of 34 other varsity runners.

The lone senior boy on the team, Liam Swift, was the only runner to best his time from the previous full course race. Back in 2018 as a freshman Swift ran 26:12 at the Hancock County run. Ironically it would be the last time the Bucks would run the full course in Ellsworth. Swift would cut almost 3 minutes from that time, running 23:23 and finishing in 66th place.

The first race of the day was the combined boys and girls junior varsity and all three of the Buck runners, a boy and two girls, never had run the course before. The two freshman girls were making their high school debut on Saturday. Two of the runners Cameron Evans and Abby Farricker started conservatively and moved their way to the middle of the pack as the race progressed with Cameron completed the course in 27:14, in 22nd place and Farricker who was 14th, covering the 2.9 mile course in 29:02. The other freshman Christina Degiso who ran a solid race finishing in a time of 32:40 in 22nd place. The girls varsity would

run the second race of the day and veteran Bekah Ireland would be the first Buck girl to cross the line, earning 22nd place in 24:17.


And close behind Bekah was Evie Hileman, finished one spot behind in a time of 24:20 and in 23rd place.

Although the girls did not have a full girls' team this past weekend coach Jones believes he will have at least five girls competing in the varsity girls' race.

This bodes well for the future.

This Saturday, the Bucks will host the annual Golden Bucks Invitational at Carmichael Field. The junior varsity race will start at 11a.m. and then it's on to the girls' varsity, and finally, the boys' varsity will be run.
