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**REPORT OF THE SCARBOROUGH  
FIRE DEPARTMENT**

To the Selectmen and Citizens  
of the Town of Scarborough:

The record from Fire Alarm Headquarters for 1954 shows that the number of calls were reduced 25% over the year 1953. The loss in dollars and cents was proportionately low, due largely to the abnormal rainy weather and the cooperation of the public on fire prevention and safety.

Total number of calls for fires	99
Total number of rescue calls	23
Second alarm fires	3

Alarms have been handled in an efficient manner and response has been prompt.

The report of the survey made by the New England Rating Association has been received. This should be used as a guide for future improvement of the water and fire service.

The new Engine 7 at Oak Hill has passed all Underwriters tests. The station is now qualified by the New England Rating Association as an approved station by the addition of this 500 gallon class A pumper.

We have stationed in the town at Engine 7, Oak Hill quarters, one of four Civil Defense rescue trucks allotted to the State of Maine. This unit is under the command of trooper Richard Kelley of the State Police. It is available in an emergency and is equipped for heavy rescue work. Together with our own rescue company

this makes a combination that is not excelled by any city or town in New England.

Fire Prevention Week was observed through a school program, also by fire posters throughout the town, and by newspaper announcements.

After a delay in receiving our material we participated in the drive of the Muscular Dystrophy Campaign. Under the chairmanship of Neal Leighton the sum of \$132.00 was raised for this worthy cause.

I wish at this time to express my thanks to assistant chief Eldred Harmon, the selectmen, commissioners and all personnel of the Department for this cooperation during the past year.

## Report of Chief of Police

To the Citizens of the Town of Scarborough:

I hereby submit this, the first annual report of the Chief of Police of the Town of Scarborough, in the feeling that perhaps the residents are not fully aware of the problems confronting the Police Department during the summer months when our tourist population is at its peak.

Our present known population approaches 5,000 and it is estimated that during the summer vacation period our population exceeds 10,000. As you are well aware, this creates a police problem for a short period of time in the summer months. The fact that we have a State Police barracks located within our own town leads many people to feel that there is no great need for police protection on the part of the town. This, however is in no way true, because the present State Police force in Maine is greatly undermanned, which is evidenced by the recent request from the State Legislature. They do, however, relieve us from the entire responsibility of the traffic problem on Route 1. Under these conditions it is impossible for them to answer the numerous complaints received during the summer months.

Below is a listing of the various complaints and violations answered by the Scarborough Police during the past summer season.

Our department made 75 arrests for traffic violations ranging from speeding, drunken driving and reckless driving, to parking violations on roads other than Route 1. They also answered 118 complaints ranging from

breaking, entering and larceny, drunken disturbances, family quarrels, attempted suicides; gambling, night disturbances on the beaches, assault and battery to neglect of children. The department also investigated 2 accidents and 19 miscellaneous calls covering other normal police duties such as transportation of mentally ill to the Augusta State Hospital and calls involving neighboring police departments.

In view of these facts, I earnestly feel there is an urgent need for an appropriation for the rental of a police car which is radio equipped for use during the summer months.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE

of the Town of Scarborough:

This is the seventh annual report of your present Superintendent of Schools dealing with the condition and progress of the Scarborough school system. The nature of such a report is necessarily broad in scope, and for that reason it is not possible to give detailed treatment to many of the items which would be of interest to individual citizens. Any interested person is invited to talk with the principals or with the superintendent of schools about specific items not handled in detail here.

### Enrollments

The number of pupils attending Scarborough schools continues to increase. This year's net increase was 54 pupils, less than half the increase last year, but somewhat more than that of the year previous. This continuous increase poses the most acute education problems which Scarborough has been meeting, and must meet. The following tabulation shows January 1 enrollments in both high and elementary schools over the period of January 1, 1947 to the present:

With the occupancy of the new Scarborough High School, which has a present capacity of 350 pupils, the old high school became available for the upper elementary grades. This old building now houses 380 elementary pupils, 330 of whom are in grades five through eight. The use of this building made it possible to employ six additional elementary teachers as of September, 1954, thus reducing the pupil-teacher ratio, which had averaged over 35-1 the preceding year, to 30-1 at the present time. This represents a great improvement of the conditions under which instruction is given, but is still not ideal. With the increasing number of pupils coming up through the school system, further additional teacher and rooms must be provided each year to maintain or to better this ratio.

A study of the enrollment report for January 1, 1955 will show the whole picture of present enrollment. It should be noted that as the larger classes in the lower grades work their way up through the system, additional rooms will be needed at each grade level to house them.

### Academic Progress

The improvement of the pupil-teacher ratio mentioned in the preceding section has already resulted in a noticeable improvement in the efficiency of the instructional process, and in its results. Academic achievement, which was satisfactory in previous years, has improved and will continue to improve if the present relatively favorable pupil-teacher ratio can be maintained.

The teaching staff has worked diligently to keep abreast of the best in educational practice through professional reading, summer schools and extension courses, and professional meetings at the local level. At an all-day institute held by members of the State Department of Education in January, 1955, members of the department expressed great satisfaction with the attitude and proficiency of the Scarborough teachers at all levels. It is felt that this is very important, because it cannot help but be reflected in the conduct of the classroom and in the achievement of the pupils.

### Personnel

During the past summer, the Scarborough School Department lost the services of eight teachers, half of whom went on to other teaching positions which for one reason or another they considered better. These eight teachers were replaced with the best qualified personnel available to your school department, and their number augmented by the addition of six added elementary teachers. **School Plant**

While the changes in school plant have been mentioned in other sections of this report, it seems advisable to summarize them here. The new Scarborough High School, dedicated to the memory of the late former Superintendent, Franklin H. B. Heald, was put in use at the beginning of the present school year. This building has a rated capacity of 350 pupils, and as of January 1, 1955, accommodated 241. This is a strictly



modern building, in the construction of which the Town of Scarborough received a great deal for its money. While the cost per square foot was lower than the average for that for other recent construction in this area, the building is sound, well designed and constructed, and capable of economical expansion in the future when required.

The occupancy of the new high school made available the old high school building, which was named the Elwood G. Bessey School, in honor of Mr. Elwood G. Bessey, high school principal for many years prior to his retirement in 1948. This building now houses all the grades six, seven and eight in the town, and in addition to that one Jr. Primary and one Grade five. Reference to the enrollment table, shown earlier in this report, will show that it houses 380 pupils.

The physical condition of the buildings and grounds has been maintained at as high a point as permitted by the budget. Your school department is attempting to maintain a regular program of inside and outside painting and repair to offset deterioration to the greatest extent possible. While there have been enumerable small items in this program, the major items include outside painting of all wood work and trim, and relining of the gutters at the Dunstan School, and the replacement of the condemned steam boiler at the Oak Hill Primary School. At the latter, the fire escapes were added to and improved in keeping the present-day standards.

### Finance

This statement will supplement the detailed financial statement printed in another section of this report. It may be pointed out, however, that the school department was able to meet increased costs in the replacement of an unusual number of teachers, as well as other emergencies, and still stay within the bounds of

its over-all budget. It was able to close the year with a balance in the maintenance account, made possible by the special session of the legislature which increased the amount of the state school fund by approximately 9%.

In conclusion, your superintendent of schools wishes to express his appreciation of the cooperation extended him by the school committee, town officers, school staff, and citizens of the Town of Scarborough.

This enrollment shown an appreciable increase over 1953-1954. Figures at hand indicate that we may expect an even greater increase yearly for several years. We



are, however, in a position to handle this increase effectively for some time in the new school plant.

The new building is proving to be a very functional one. Those individuals entrusted with its planning and construction are to be commended for a job well done. Both faculty members and pupils feel highly privileged and proud to be the first to enjoy the up-to-date facilities offered. In behalf of the school I would like to thank those organizations which have so generously contributed furnishings and equipment to further add to the convenience and charm.

The boys in the Industrial Arts department under the very able supervision of Mr. Hallett have done an outstanding job in building much of the equipment necessary to that department. They may well feel that they have had a real part in the transition from the old to the new.

A number of our recent graduates are enrolled in post-secondary institutions and are doing very creditable jobs in their various pursuits. Approximately 25% of our present senior class plan to go on to schools of higher learning. The percentage would be higher if our young men felt free to make the plans they would like to make. Many of them will meet their military obligations and get further education through the many excellent courses offered in the service.

The Iowa Tests of Educational Development were given in October. The results have been analyzed and are being used as a basis for strengthening certain weaknesses which appear prevalent. Continued progress from grade to grade is evident in most areas tested.

A course in Driver Education has been added since my last report and is proving to be a very popular and effective offering. 99% of those students starting the course have carried it to a successful conclusion and have received their licenses on the first test.

Triple C principals are again formulating plans for another Career Day to be held at North Yarmouth Academy. The one held last year I feel proved valuable to those attending. This important guidance experience will be offered to the juniors as it was last year.

In conclusion, I wish to express my sincere thanks to all school officials, fellow teachers, and parents for the splendid spirit of co-operation extended to me during the year. It has indeed been gratifying.

#### SCARBOROUGH COMMUNITY NURSING SERVICE

To the Board of the Scarborough Community Nursing Service and the Citizens of the Town of Scarborough

As Public Health Nurse I hereby submit my annual report for the year of 1954.

There were 930 visits made to the homes which included 775 bedside calls plus infant and pre-school health supervision, communicable disease control and health education.



Monthly child health conferences were held in the Nurse's office with a physician in attendance. Immunization for diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough and small pox were offered.

There are also many patients who attend regularly the various clinics offered by the state and the hospitals for treatment and diagnosis. I feel that we are very fortunate to be so near these facilities for the cardiac, crippled childrens, tumor and eye clinics.

Chest x-rays are given regularly to all school personnel and are available to any citizens desiring them.

Monthly meetings were held with the Board of Directors of the Nursing Service and the Nurse to discuss problems relating to the service.

### Schools

Two hundred and seventy one visits were made to the schools to check the children and for teacher-nurse discussions.

Dr. Haigis, school physician, examined seven hundred seventy nine pupils. Serious defects were reported to the parents and home visits made when possible.

Tuberculosis patch tests were given to three hundred and forty four children and all positive reactors were examined and x-rayed. Forty five children were vaccinated for small pox in the schools. This number may seem small but many of the children are done during the summer at a special vaccination clinic or at the regular monthly child health conferences. Audiometer hearing tests were given to six hundred sixty six pupils from the fourth grade through high school. Parents were notified of defects.

All high school seniors were given chest x-rays in the Spring. This service is offered yearly by the Cumberland County Tuberculosis Association.

The dental clinic, under the guidance of the Scarborough Community Nursing Service, was held twenty-

five half days. Dr. Norman Blanchard was the attending dentist, assisted by the dental hygienist, Mrs. Doris Homer. The total number of pupils treated was sixty-four; there being two hundred seventy three fillings, sixty-six extractions, and fifty-seven cleanings. The number of children treated constitutes a small percentage of the pupils eligible. During these visits to the clinic they are instructed how to care correctly for their mouths.

The number of extractions exceeds the number of children attending clinic. This is one of the reasons the Nursing Association feels that all elementary school children should have the benefit of dental health education, which includes class room instruction of correct brushing of the teeth, of well-balanced diets and of the importance of visiting a dentist twice a year.

Another means of lessening tooth decay is the topical application of sodium fluoride to grades one or two, five and eight. The reason these grades are chosen is that the new second teeth are erupting at these grade levels. The lack of funds deprives the Scarborough children of these opportunities.

I wish again to thank the Lions Club for their generosity in helping with financial assistance to provide for tonsillectomys, and in securing glasses, clothing and any other help asked for.

The Pythian Sisters gave a rubber mat to go around the dental chair. Their gift is most gratefully appreciated.

My thanks and appreciation to all those with whom my work brings me in contact for their friendliness and cooperation.

**REPORT OF HEALTH OFFICER**

To the Citizens of Scarborough

In submitting my report as Health Officer I wish to report while there were quite a number of cases of measles, mumps and chicken pox there were not as many cases of communicable diseases reported as the previous year. There were six cases of scarlet fever — one more than the year before. However the number of visits, about 80, is an increase over the last few years. Also there was an increase in the number of dog bite cases reported. In all cases the dogs were ordered quarantined as required by law.

As in past years there have been a large number of old sewerage systems repaired or replaced to conform with plumbing code, also several overflows from septic tanks have been removed from highway ditches.

There have been several cases where persons have installed sanitary systems before applying for permit. This has resulted in an installation that would not pass inspection nor function properly thus much time and money has been wasted when proper advice is always available from state and local plumbing inspectors.

There has been some trouble as in the past with persons attempting to install plumbing without permits, also with unlicensed persons doing plumbing for gain. Both are forbidden by law.

There were about sixty plumbing permits issued during the year — about the same as previous years but more of it in new buildings.

As in the past, help from District Office and Division of Sanitary Engineering has been valuable in cases.

In closing I wish to thank Town Officials, Doctors, Nurse and all others who have aided me in conducting this office during the year.







**Sec. 2 Certificate of public convenience and necessity required.** No license to operate a taxicab shall be issued unless and until the Municipal Officers of said town have issued a certificate that public convenience and necessity require the operation thereof.

Applications for certificates of public convenience and necessity shall be made on forms provided by the town and approved by the Municipal Officers and shall, among other things, set forth: —

- (1) The name and address of the applicant;

(2) The number of taxicabs actually owned and the number of taxicabs actually operated in the Town of Scarborough by such owner on the date of application, if any;

(3) The number of taxicabs for which a certificate of public convenience and necessity is desired;

(4) The intended make, type, year of manufacture and passenger seating capacity of each taxicab for which application for a certificate of public convenience and necessity is made;

(5) A description of the proposed color scheme, insignia, trade, style or any other distinguishing characteristic or proposed taxicab design;

(6) Such other information as the Municipal Officers may in their discretion cause to be inserted in said application.

**Sec. 3 Public hearing.** No such certificate of public convenience and necessity shall be issued until the Municipal Officers have held a public hearing thereon, and given notice in the same manner and form as required for notice of a town meeting. At the time of such public hearing, the following factors shall be taken into consideration in determining whether or not a certificate of public convenience and necessity shall be issued:

(a) The demand of the public for the additional taxicab service.

(b) Financial responsibility and experience of the applicant.



(c) The adequacy of existing mass transportation and taxicab service.

(d) The effect which such additional taxicab service may have on traffic congestion.

(e) Whether such additional taxicab service will result in a growing hazard to the public.

(f) Such other relevant facts as the Municipal Officers may deem useful in arriving at a determination.

**Sec. 4. Owners, with licenses prior to this ordinance prima facie presumed to have established evidence of public convenience and necessity.** Every owner, operating a licensed taxicab or taxicabs as of the effective date of this ordinance, shall be presumed, in the absence of any contrary finding by the Municipal Officers to have established prima facie evidence of public convenience and necessity for the licensing of the taxicab or taxicabs actually in operation, and the Municipal Officers, upon written application, shall grant such certificate or certificates to said owner for each such taxicab or taxicabs without holding of a public hearing as hereinbefore provided.

**Sec. 5. Cancellation of certificate.** After the service for which a certificate is granted hereunder is discontinued the certificate shall be automatically cancelled, and a certificate in place thereof shall be issued only in accordance with the provision of this ordinance.

**Sec. 6. New certificate after sale of taxicab.** Whenever an owner sells or otherwise disposes of a taxicab or taxicabs for which a certificate or certificates have been granted and, within thirty days thereafter, replaces the same, the Municipal Officers shall upon written application made within thirty days of such

replacement, issue a new certificate or certificates for the operation of no greater number of taxicabs than those so disposed of and replaced, provided said owner has complied with all the provisions of this ordinance.

**Sec. 7. Town Clerk to issue license.** Upon the issuance of a certificate as hereinbefore provided, the Town Clerk shall issue to the owner of said taxicab, provided he shall comply with the further conditions of this ordinance, a license for the operation of such taxicab upon payment of a license fee of \$15.00 yearly for each taxicab.

**Sec. 8. Taxicab to be conspicuously marked.** Every taxicab shall be conspicuously marked, in letters not less than one and one-half ( $1\frac{1}{2}$ ) inches in height, with the word "Taxicab" and the owner's name or trade name or, in lieu thereof, with a design or monogram containing the owner's name or trade name. Such design or monogram shall be not less than eight (8) inches in diameter.

**Sec. 9. Inspection of taxicabs.** Before a license is issued to the owner of any taxicab or taxicabs, said owner shall deliver such taxicab or taxicabs to the Chief of Police for inspection, and the Chief of Police, or some person designated by him, shall inspect such taxicab or taxicabs and determine whether or not they are safe and suitable for taxicab service.

**Sec. 10. License not to be issued until Chief of Police certifies taxicab safe.** No license shall be issued by the Town Clerk for any taxicab or taxicabs unless and until the Chief of Police shall certify that such taxicab or taxicabs are safe and suitable to be used for that purpose.



**Sec. 11. Insurance policy required.** No license shall be issued for any taxicab until the owner of said taxicab has filed with the Town Clerk an insurance policy, covering the period of the license, issued and executed by an insurance company having a permit to issue such policy in the State of Maine, in the usual form of automobile liability insurance policies in this state for injuries to persons and property from the use and operation of such taxicabs. Such policy of insurance shall be issued for a principal sum, sufficient to provide indemnity for personal injury in an amount of not less than \$20,000. for injury to one person, \$50,000. for injuries to more than one person arising out of one accident, and for property damaged to the amount of \$5,000. Said insurance policy shall bear an endorsement thereon by the issuing agent that the same is to be deposited with the Town Clerk of the Town of Scarborough under the provisions of this ordinance.

**Sec. 12. Taxicab drivers, applications and license fee.** Applications for licenses to drive taxicabs shall be made on forms furnished by the town and shall set forth under oath such information as the Municipal Officers may require. Such licenses, when approved by the Municipal Officers, shall be issued by the Town Clerk, shall be numbered in the order granted and, unless sooner suspended or revoked, shall continue in force until the end of the calendar year. The fee for such license shall be \$5.00 for the original license and \$2.50 for each renewal thereof. No such license shall be granted to any person unless he is of sound physique, nor unless he can read, write and speak the English language intelligently, nor unless he shall present a valid driver's license issued to him by the State of Maine.

**Sec. 13. Revocation of license.** Licenses issued hereunder may be revoked at any time for a violation of any

of the provisions of this ordinance or for any other cause deemed sufficient by the Municipal Officers.

**Sec. 14. Taxicabs licensed in other cities or towns.** Nothing contained herein shall be construed to prevent a taxicab duly licensed in another city or town from delivering passengers from said city or town to a point within the Town of Scarborough, nor to prevent a taxicab so licensed from calling for a passenger within the Town of Scarborough at the specific request of such passenger. However, said taxicab shall not park, stand, or cruise in the Town of Scarborough for the purpose of taking, obtaining or soliciting passengers.

**Sec. 15. Penalties.** Any person, firm or corporation who violates any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$20.00 for each offense, to the use of the Town.

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**NOTICE****COLLECTION OF DOG TAXES**

Chap. 100, Sec. 14, R.S., 1954.

The municipal officers of each city, town or plantation shall annually within 10 days from the 1st day of June issue a warrant, returnable on the 1st day of July following, to one or more police officers or constables, directing him or them to proceed forthwith to enter complaint and summons to court the owner or keeper of any unlicensed dog.

On the 1st day of July the municipal officers of cities, towns and plantations shall issue to one or more police officers or constables a warrant returnable on the 1st Monday of the following February, directing him or them to seek out, catch, and confine all dogs within such city, town, or plantation, which are not licensed, collared and tagged, or enclosed as required by sections 9 to 28, inclusive, and to enter complaint and summons to court the owner or keeper of any such dog. Such court may order such police officers or constables to sell, give away, kill, or cause to be killed each such dog which after being detained by him or them for a period of 6 days shall not have been licensed, collared and tagged.

All inhabitants of the Town of Scarborough, Maine, and all Administrators, Executors, Trustees, etc., of all estates taxable in said town of such persons are hereby notified to MAKE AND BRING INTO THE ASSESSORS TRUE AND PERFECT LISTS OF THEIR POLLS AND ALL THEIR ESTATES, REAL AND PERSONAL, not by law exempt from taxation, of which they were possessed on the first day of April, 1955, and be prepared to make oath to the truth of the same and to answer all proper inquiries in writing as to the nature, situation and value of their property liable to be taxed.

#### **Estates Distributed**

And when estates of persons deceased have been distributed during the past year, or have changed hands from any cause, the Executor, Administrator, or other

persons interested, are hereby warned to give notice of such change, and in default of such notice will be held under the law to pay the tax assessed although such estate has been wholly distributed and paid over.

### **Persons Doomed**

And any resident owner who neglects to comply with this notice is thereby barred of his right to make application to the ASSESSORS or the COUNTY COMMISSIONERS, for any abatement of his taxes, unless he offers such list with his application and satisfies them that he was unable to offer it at the time appointed.
