My Dear Governor

Please find accom-
panying duplicate receipts for articles
purchased for our Hospital, amounting
to fifty nine (59) dollars. which amount
I have paid and you ^{will} please trans-
mit the same amount, at your
earliest convenience, to R. S. Morris
Bangs, on whom I draw for the sum
appended as above. You will per-
ceive, that I have not purchased
all the articles specified in the last
sent you, as I have been enabled by
great effort, to get a part of them of
U.S.-Navy's made, & think I have
made great improvement in the
accommodation for the sick since
I came here, but have incurred an
unnecessary expense, and here ^{is}
passing I will add what with-

standing of Dr. McRae's plan. That I should
not succeed with the Regt. I have
no doubt a very large majority of both
officers and soldiers would quite easily
have me remain or that he should
return or Doctor Allen either or that, &
am however ready & perfectly willing
to return home if Dr. A. ^{has} returned.

I am a little anxious to know whether
there is a probability that Dr. A. will return,
as if I am to remain but a few weeks
at present, I do not wish to incur the
expense of purchasing a horse, uniform
form and various other articles
which would be of very little value
to me if I should leave here. The
Regt. has just had a new uniform. Have
been paid off and are in the main in
very good condition. Though a few are
yet here who ought to be discharged.

All Dr. McRae's efforts in this direction
availed very little, as he did not
seem how to accomplish what he
desired for the good of the Regt. Giving

knowledge from his friends. I think I shall
soon be enabled to get all those discharged
who ought to go - I have worked very hard
usually rising at 5 and retiring, that is lying
down in a bed of straw with my clothes, and at
ten or eleven, but my health is good and I
dont value the labor if I can be useful -
Col. Roberts in fact all the officers treat me
very cordially, & sincerely to appreciate all
my efforts for the good of the Regt. There are
a large number of General officers quartered
near Fort. As soon as I can learn the
Regt. will suspend here in the course of
two or three weeks, unless we should before
that time have a general battle. Most of
the troops in this vicinity are in good spirits
and good condition, and not only ready
but eager for a fight, willing to settle up
that account commenced at Battle of Bull
Run. Please let me know if you have any
information as to the probability of S. C. re-
turning.
