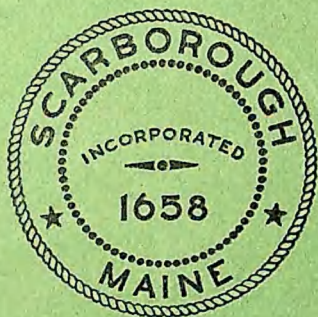

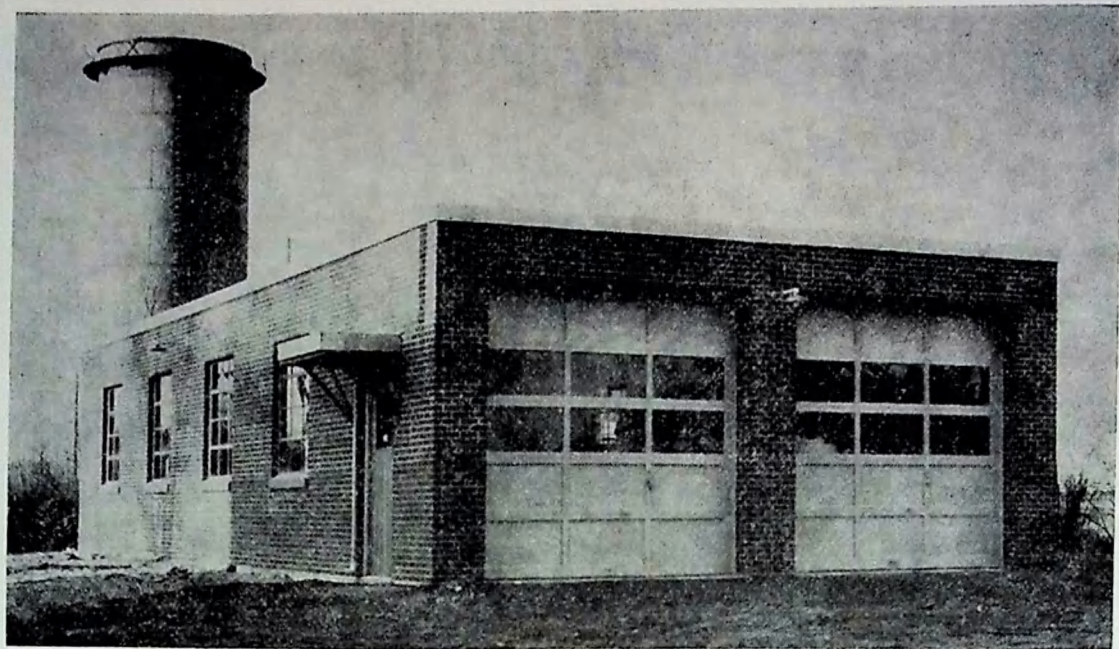

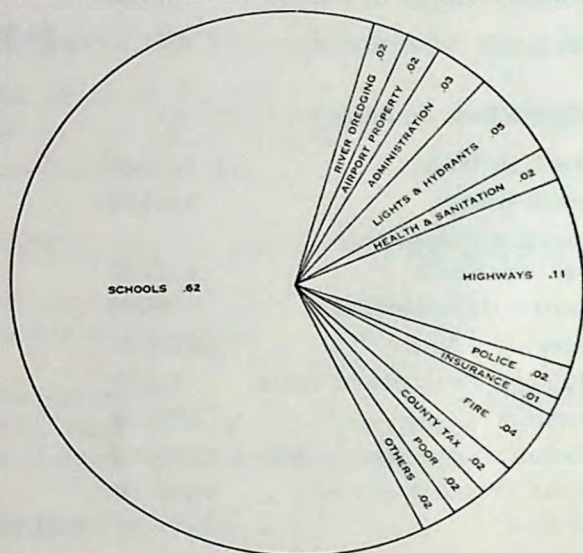

Report of the Scarborough Fire Department

To the Selectmen and Citizens of the
Town of Scarborough:

The new fire station at Dunstan, with its ideal location is indeed a step toward future expansion of the Department. This building, with the proposed purchase of a new fire truck to replace twenty-one year old Engine 6, may be considered the start of a program as recommended by the New England Rating Association to improve the efficiency of the Fire Department.

Many improvements including water, man power, a new Central Station, etc. should be contained in the above mentioned program to acquire better classification for the town.

The current three-year program as recommended by the fire commissioners for new apparatus will replace the old at regular periods.

All apparatus, hose, pumps, etc. were tested the past fall and found to be in good condition.

National Fire Prevention Week, Oct. 7 to 13 was observed throughout the schools with drills and poster programs.

The Department answered 175 alarms during 1956 as follows: 137 for fires, 4 second alarms, 1 false, and 38 for rescue.

I wish to express thanks to Ass'n Chief Eldred Harmon, selectmen, commissioners, alarm headquarters personnel, and all members of the Department for their cooperation and assistance during the year.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE
of the Town of Scarborough

In this ninth annual report of your Superintendent of Schools will be found the legally required report as to the condition and progress of your school system, as well as certain other facts which, because of their nature, merit inclusion in the one public record which will be most certain of preservation and availability in the years to come.

This report deals with the fiscal year ending January 31, 1956, and with status as of the end of that year. The financial record is to be found in another section of the Town Report. Specific plans for the year to come are to be found in the separate budget message distributed by the school department just prior to the annual meeting.

Enrollments

As the fastest growing town in southern Maine, if not in the whole state, Scarborough continues to present a most challenging problem to those who must keep abreast of her growing demands. A ten-year summary of growth in school enrollments follows:

School Plant

The school buildings which house the pupils shown in the table above, together with accompanying facilities, are adequate or inadequate as they meet the needs of the pupil population. The State of Maine, through its laws, defines approved school facilities. Scarborough is using all approved facilities, plus a number of classrooms which bear state approval only because of emergency conditions. A listing of schools, and their facilities is as follows:

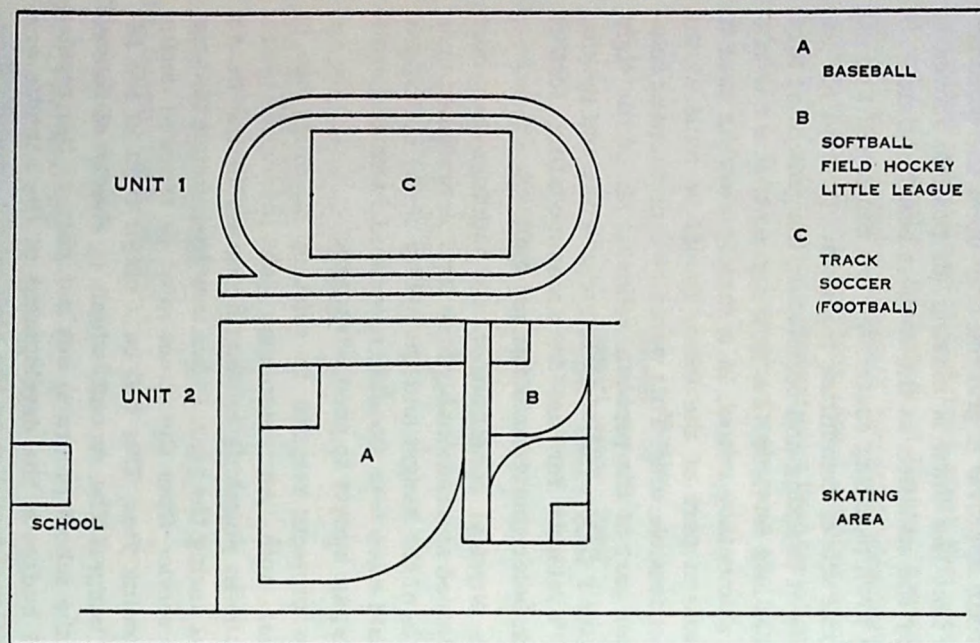

The preceding table will show that 14% of Scarborough pupils are attending school in quarters only permitted by the state because of emergency conditions. This state approval is granted only upon the consideration that the town is making all possible moves to remedy the situation at the earliest possible time.

The town planning committee has continued to meet with the school committee from time to time for the purpose of charting and correlating the growth of town agencies and services. It is now agreed that a new six-room elementary school, in a rapidly growing area in the eastern part of the town, should be built at the earliest feasible time. This would be a permanent solution for part of the problem, relieving six of the eight emergency classrooms of their present use, and making them available for use in accommodating further growth before more buildings are built.

The physical condition of all buildings has been maintained at a reasonably high level, conditioned upon the size of the budget and the ability of the custodians. It would have been possible to expend twice the available repair budget to good advantage.

Two projects relative to existing buildings are of especial note. An emergency job involving nearly \$1,400.00 in plumbing became necessary in the Bessey School during the year. It has now been found that the water service from the street must be renewed during the coming year. This will be a major item in the repairs budget. The second, which is closely connected with the school program, but not part of the regular school budget is the development of the athletic and recreational facilities on the high school grounds. Since this will be the subject of a report by a large citizens committee, it will not be detailed here.

Academic Progress

The academic progress of Scarborough pupils continues to be acceptable, but is increasingly threatened by a recurring growth of the pupil teacher ratio. Before the last building program made more classrooms available, many pupils progress suffered greatly from enforced attendance in classrooms holding 45 to 50 pupils. With the completion of the new high school, freeing the old high school for use by the elementary grades, class size was reduced to a satisfactory level and accomplishment improved. Now, however, the old evil of overcrowded classrooms is again growing, with a number of classrooms in the high thirties. Teaching and learning will suffer until this is remedied by providing added classrooms.

In the meantime, reasonably enlightened salary policies have succeeded in retaining a majority of the excellent teaching staff. Continued progress in this respect can somewhat mitigate the effects of inadequate numbers of classrooms for a time.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF SCARBOROUGH HIGH SCHOOL

To the Superintending School Committee and Superintendent of Schools of the Town of Scarborough.

Gentlemen:

I herewith submit my fourth annual report as principal of Scarborough High School.

The enrollment as of January 1, 1957 was as follows:

This enrollment is an increase of only one over 1955-1956. We expect a sharp increase in the coming year, however, as we are graduating 52 and the class which will enter in September at the present time has 109 members. A study of figures at hand seem to indicate we will reach 350, which is the capacity of our new building, in about three years.

Our building facilities are very adequate for our present enrollment and indoor program, but I feel serious consideration should be given at this time to the development of playing fields in order to improve our outdoor program. Such development would not be for the benefit of only the few boys on the baseball, soccer, and track teams. The entire student body, boys and girls alike, would use the areas in physical education in the spring and fall.

I want to commend the Boosters Club on their interest in such a development. They have given much time and consideration to the problem and are ready to present a plan which, I feel, is one that will not only meet our needs for a number of years but will also meet the needs of the entire community in providing a safe place for skating in the winter and an opportunity for little league and pony league ball in the summer.

On behalf of the school, I wish to thank None Such Lodge, K. of P., for the library tables presented in Memory of Dr. B. F. Wentworth and Mr. Frank H. B. Herald, the Parent-Teachers Association for their generous donation to our Public Address System fund, and the Civic League for their generous contribution to our television account.

Twenty-five percent of the class of 1956 are continuing their education in the following post-secondary institutions.

Twenty percent are meeting their military obligation.

Some of these plan to continue their education upon separation from the service.

The Iowa Tests of Educational Development were given in November. The results have been studied, and teachers are attempting to overcome existing weaknesses which came to light as a result of the testing.

All grades equalled or excelled last years results in most areas. Both teachers and students take these tests very seriously and make a sincere effort to improve results from year to year thus improving our entire program.

We have participated in several scholarship programs during the year. Two of these were National, the Merit Scholarship Program and the National Honor Society Program. A total of fourteen seniors had the opportunity to take part in this valuable educational experience.

Our high school annual, "Four Corners," has won distinction since my last report by being the only lithographed yearbook in Maine in schools under 300 to place in the second division in the Columbia Scholastic Press Association Contest, a contest sponsored by Columbia University.

Much credit for this honor goes to Miss Ferguson, Mr. Hallett, and Mr. Libby who gave unselfishly of their time and talents to help the students produce such an outstanding piece of work.

In conclusion, I wish to express my sincere thanks to all school officials, teachers, and parents for the fine spirit of cooperation extended to me during the year.

SCARBOROUGH COMMUNITY NURSING SERVICE

The program of the nursing service has been carried on as in previous years. Because of the increased population in the town and also the increased school census, it is impossible for the nurse to do all that needs to be done. Schools and bedside nursing take up most of the time. 856 home visits were made this year with 732 of these being sick bedside calls. The rest were infant and pre-school health supervision, adult welfare, tuberculosis, crippled children and communicable diseases.

Interviews were held from time to time with town officials, social service workers and others connected with the service. Ten monthly meetings were held with the Board of Directors of the Nursing Service and the nurse. One Civil Defence meeting was attended.

Child Health Conferences were held monthly with 248 children in attendance. Besides the regular diphtheria, tetanus and whooping cough inoculations and vaccinations for smallpox, 133 children received the Salk vaccine for polio. Several children are under the care of the cardiac and crippled childrens clinics and receive careful supervision.

The Y. M. C. A. again sent two children to their camp in Winthrop for two weeks; all expenses being paid for by this organization.

Schools

Regular visits were made to the schools throughout the year; problems were discussed and teachers interviewed. 284 such visits were made.

The nurse assisted Dr. Haigis, school physician, with the physical examinations of 890 pupils. Parents were contacted regarding defects and effort made to get each defect corrected or under medical supervision. 80 children were vaccinated for smallpox in the schools at the beginning of the school year. 352 tuberculosis patch tests were given to sub-primary, 8th grade and high school pupils and reactors were X-rayed.

All the seniors received free chest X-rays, 35 in all. This was paid for by the Cumberland County Tuberculosis Association. 26 school personnel also were X-rayed, as everyone connected with the school department must have this done every two years.

Several large polio clinics were held during the year and a total of 2886 shots were given. Of this number, 897 were third shots, and the remainder first and second. This is a large program and very time consuming; but I feel that it is most important. It is also very gratifying to know that most of the children in the school system have now been inoculated.

We are fortunate to have the services of a speech therapist for one half day each week. She gave speech correction classes to eleven pupils with some very good results.

During the year, a dental survey was conducted in all of the elementary schools by registered dental hygienists. This survey included a complete examination and charting of each pupil's mouth and written reports sent to all parents informing them of their child's mouth hygiene and what corrective care was necessary for the health of their child. Class room talks covered

teeth, diet and demonstration of toothbrushing techniques.

889 pupils were examined; of this number only 40 had never had any decay and needed no dental care, 160 recently had dental work completed and needed no care at this time, and 689 needed corrective dental care.

The dental clinic functions one half day a week with Dr. M. G. Mazzacane in attendance. It cannot possibly meet the dental needs in the town.

The Lions Club has been most generous in giving financial assistance for glasses and tonsillectomies. We appreciate this much needed aid.

The Nursing Board members gave me valuable assistance in helping at clinics and in transporting patients and children to clinics and the hospitals. I appreciate this help and cooperation. Also may I thank those people who are not on the board but who assisted at the polio clinics. The teachers and town officials also have my sincere appreciation for their cooperation.

HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT

To the Citizens of Scarborough

In submitting my report as Health Officer, I wish to report that the number of cases of communicable diseases remained about the same as last year with the exception of scarlet fever. Eleven cases being reported, three more than the year before. There were sixteen dog bites reported four more than last year. In all cases the dogs were quarantined as required by law.

I made 76 visits during the year in connection with this office. In addition I attended the polio (Salk) vaccine clinics which were held as the vaccine became available to the various ages. These clinics will continue and probably be available to adults sometime during the year.

There were nearly a hundred plumbing permits issued during the year. A large percentage for new homes. There were also a large number of replacements and additions to plumbing in older buildings.

Much has been done during the year in replacing defective sewerage disposal systems with those specified by state plumbing code.

In closing I wish to thank Town Officials, Doctors, Nurse and all others who have aided me in conducting this office during the year.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

To the municipal Officers and Citizens of the Town of Scarborough; we are pleased to submit the following report:

During the past year the Scarborough Planning Board has met nineteen times in carrying out its task of planning for the future development of the Town.

We have revised the zoning ordinance, trying to simplify the wording and removing some parts which seemed objectionable. We trust that the new form will be acceptable and that the Town will adopt it in its present form. We found that there has been a serious lack of both administration and enforcement of the present zoning ordinance and building code. This has been due to the lack of funds to hire a person to devote his full time to this work. The salary of such a person would undoubtedly be paid by the increased valuation he would pick up in the year, thus helping to stabilize the tax rate.

Separate meetings have been held with the School Board, Fire Commissioners, Industrial Development Commission, Police Department, Highway Department, Board of Selectmen and the Portland Water District. All of these departments have programs partially formulated for expansion to meet future requirements. The overall cost of these necessary expansions to meet the Town's growing needs is so large that it seems desirable that a planned program of capital expenditures be instituted as promptly as possible. Such an approach to capital outlays will help to stabilize the tax rate. This

seems to be a proper function of your Planning Board which will be carried forward during the coming year. Following is a detailed report relating to schools and water, both matters being particularly pressing at this time.

Schools:

The number of school children has increased to such a point that Scarborough is now at least nine classrooms behind its normal requirements. Nine classes are held in 'temporary' quarters that should be given up as soon as possible for permanent facilities.

The accompanying map, prepared for the Planning Board from information supplied by the School Board, shows in graphic form the school problem caused by the growing population. The map itself shows the location and number of preschool children. The table of figures shows the number of children now attending school from each survey district.

Map referred to in above paragraph located in back of book.

In view of both the needs for new classrooms and the heavy expenses incurred by the town for other services, the Planning Board, with the approval of the School Board, recommends the immediate construction of a six room schoolhouse. The school should be located, in the opinion of both boards, in the vicinity of Pleasant Hill. The number of children adjacent to the area is sufficient to support such a school, the area is a rapidly growing residential area, and it is an area removed from

the danger of heavy traffic. A school in this location would substantially relieve the load imposed upon the school bus system. Provision should be made in both land and building for expansion. This area appears to be destined for considerable residential expansion.

Water:

The Planning Board recommends that the proposals of the New England Fire Insurance Rating Association be followed out. These proposals are designed to improve the reliability of the present water supply by developing circuits. The completion of this program should result in more favorable insurance rates. By agreement with the Portland Water District this work can be done on either a two, eight or thirteen year program. The map and table to follow show the extent and cost of this work. The Planning Board presents the problem and the various proposals without specifically recommending any particular one.

Map referred to in above paragraph located in back of book.

The proposal as recommended by the Planning Board does not include the extension of water mains into North Scarborough at this time. The cost of crossing the Maine Turnpike is prohibitive. The Planning Board recommends that an agreement be worked out with Westbrook and South Portland (through the Regional Planning Commission) for an extension into North Scarborough from the main on Spring Street along the Buxton Road. Such an extension would give better ser-

vice, and be less costly than any main across the Turnpike in Scarborough.

Fire Department:

In meeting with the Board of Fire Commissioners we found that the Board had started a replacement program, three years ago, of replacing one fire truck every three years which is in accordance with the Underwriter's request that each truck should be replaced every twenty years. The Planning Board had a plan made of the extensions of the present mains in accordance with the Underwriters survey requested by the Fire Department 12/29/54.

The Fire Department built a new fire station in the Dunstan District last year. The department proposes that a new station should be built in the Oak Hill area, to replace the present inadequate structure, when the payments of the Dunstan building are completed. This would be incorporated in the capitol improvement program. The Planning Board feels that consideration should be given to the advisability of incorporating Police head-quarters in the same building, and also that thought be given to the future consolidation of Eng. 1 and Eng. 2 in a new fire station located somewhere near the junction of Spurwink Ave. and the Black Point Road. In following a program of expansion of this type we feel that the tax rate will not be affected too much each year, and that the tax payers will more than save their investment by the reduction of insurance rates when the classification is changed from D to C.

Time has not permitted the Planning Board to give the necessary consideration to the important problems faced by the Highway and Police Departments.

Highway Department:

The provision of a suitable central quarters to house, repair, maintain and service all Town equipment, including school buses, should be considered.

Police Department:

The work load of this Department is increasing tremendously. Early attention must be given to providing its personnel with additional money and equipment. Funds available today are in our opinion being used efficiently but fall short of the necessary amount to meet present demands for suitable protection.

NOTICE
COLLECTION OF DOG TAXES

Chap. 100, Sec. 14, R.S., 1954.

The municipal officers of each city, town or plantation shall annually within 10 days from the 1st day of June issue a warrant, returnable on the 1st day of July following, to one or more police officers or constables, directing him or them to proceed forthwith to enter complaint and summons to court the owner or keeper of any unlicensed dog.

On the 1st day of July the municipal officers of cities, towns and plantations shall issue to one or more police officers or constables a warrant returnable on the 1st Monday of the following February, directing him or them to seek out, catch, and confine all dogs within such city, town, or plantation, which are not licensed, collared and tagged, or enclosed as required by sections 9 to 28, inclusive, and to enter complaint and summons to court the owner or keeper of any such dog. Such court may order such police officers or constables to sell, give away, kill, or cause to be killed each such dog which after being detained by him or them for a period of 6 days shall not have been licensed, collared and tagged.

And when estates of persons deceased have been distributed during the past year, or have changed hands from any cause, the Executor, Administrator, or other

persons interested, are hereby warned to give notice of such changed, and in default of such notice will be held under the law to pay the tax assessed although such estate has been wholly distributed and paid over.

Persons Doomed

And any resident owner who neglects to comply with this notice is hereby barred of his right to make application to the ASSESSORS or the COUNTY COMMISSIONERS, for any abatement of his taxes, unless he offers such list with his application and satisfies them that he was unable to offer it at the time appointed.

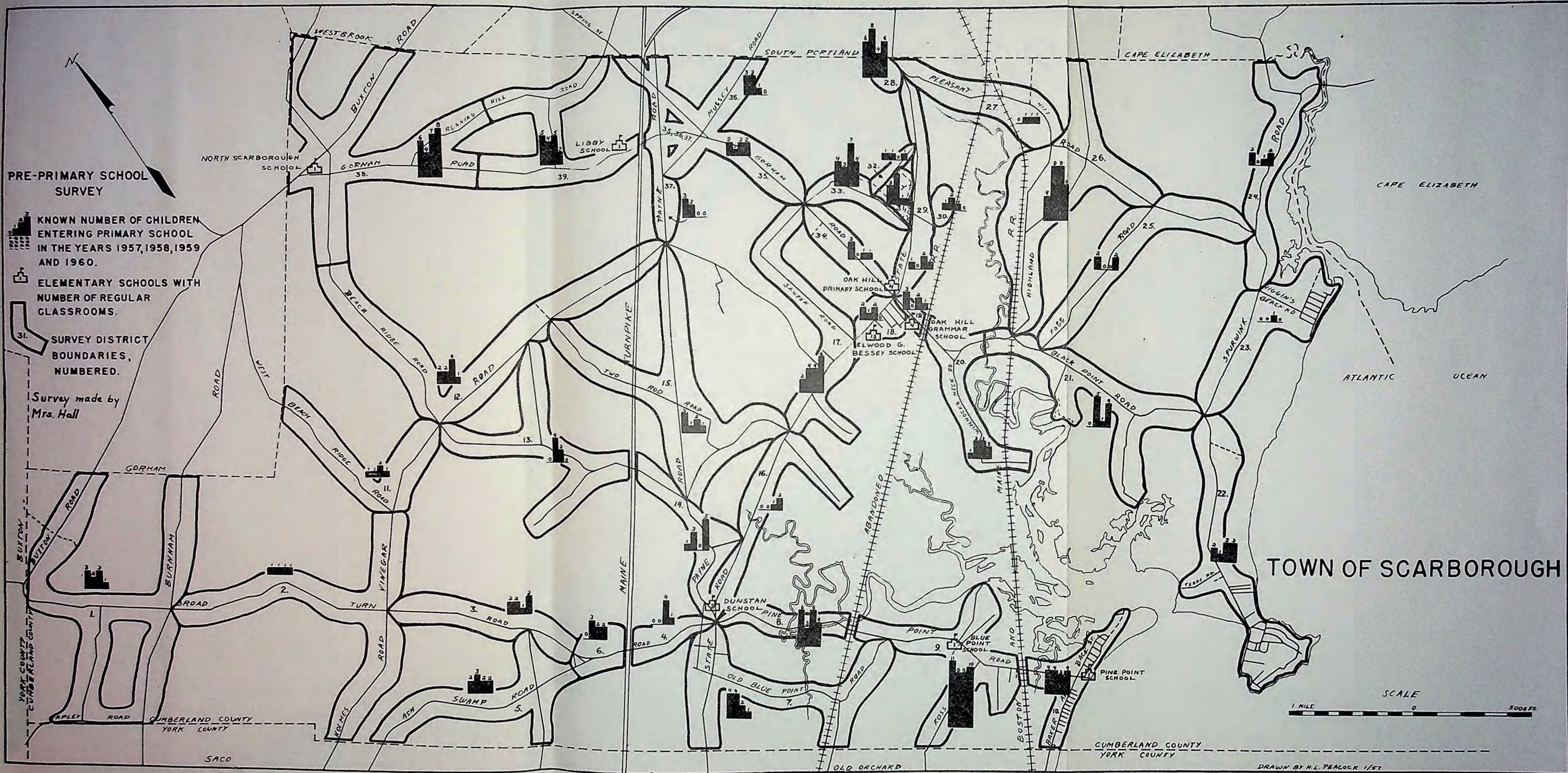
PRE-PRIMARY SCHOOL SURVEY

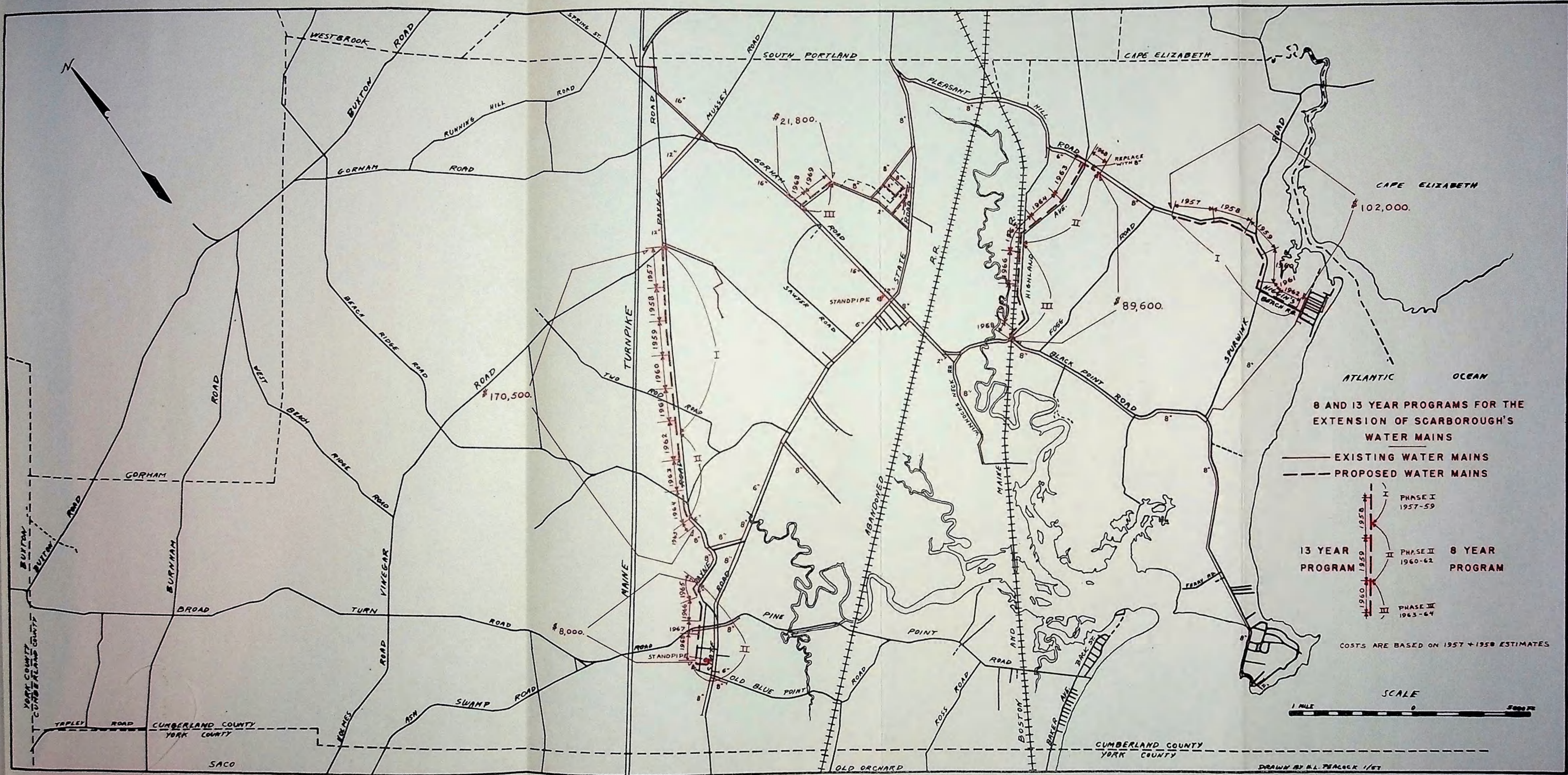

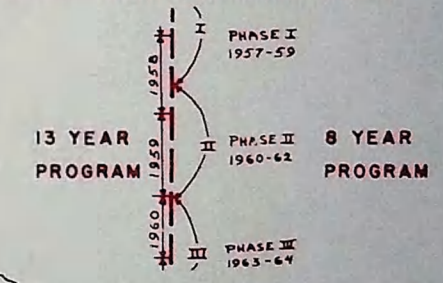
