

'f it's Tuesday, a door opens in Belgrade; if it's Wednesday, Sidney; Thursday, Oakland. Almost every day of the week in some town in Central Maine, Food Pantry volunteers are helping give out food to residents who simply cannot afford enough food to keep away hunger or stave off the feelings of food insecurity.

Almost daily during summer vacation, at churches, rec programs children in schools, Central Maine as part of the USDA Summer Food Service Program receive breakfast, lunch, snacks served by food service workers and volunteers.

Almost weekly there is a food drive in progress, a small one at a place of work, a clever one at a library that will accept cans of food in lieu of late fees, an unexpected one when a young birthday boy or girl requests food donations instead of gifts and a large one like the recent collection of over 1,000 pounds of food and over \$1,050 of essential items by Elanco Animal Health in Winslow in just the month of June.

The statistics are saddening. According to the USDA's estimate more than one in five people or one in four children in Maine are food insecure. The Belgrade/Rome Food Pantry points out that 23% of seniors - a harder group to reach experience food insecurity.

Nationally, Maine ranks third among states for

the rate of hunger according to an industry study Maine reports that about 30% of the people who conducted in 2017, with more than 16% of its are food insecure, make too much money to households, more than 200,000 people unable to qualify for assistance programs but not enough afford enough food throughout the year.

Unfortunately, many of these people do not depend on charitable efforts such as food qualify for formal assistance. United Way of Mid- pantries and soup kitchens.

As the need for feeding the hungry in Maine increases and the availability of government aid decreases (for example Kennebec County will not be receiving any Emergency Food and Shelter money this year) Food Pantries will rely more and more on private contributions and donations.

For summer visitors, in particular - please remember food pantries when leaving Maine at the end of your stay. When you are emptying your cupboards remember there are collection boxes at Town Offices and Post Offices. There are bottle redemption boxes roadside and at transfer stations. Financial donations may be sent to The Good Shepherd Food Bank in Auburn, Maine, or checks may be given directly to local Food Pantries.

But actual contributions of food are best, from everyone. Be a hero against hunger.





pulled into Belgrade on the afternoon of July 10 after driving 2,100 miles Lover three days in a Subaru filled with my clothes, a few personal items and a cat. And I haven't stopped smiling since.

I am thrilled at the opportunity to serve as Belgrade's new town manager. This job offers everything my family and I were seeking: a small, rural community filled with citizens who harbor a deep love for where they live, a gorgeous New England setting, and a chance to deeply engage in our community and with the public I serve.

I understand questions of why a Texan pursued Belgrade's town manager job. My motivations were threefold. One, having worked in municipal government for 12 years, I wanted to serve as a town manager. That spurred me to return to school at age 50 to earn a master's degree. Two, my wife and I wanted a slower, simpler and more fulfilling pace of life. And three, we were eager for a new landscape ... and we love New England.

For 20 years, I was a print journalist. My time in government has been divided between managing municipal venues for a city of 100,000 people and serving as its communications director. In the latter job, I was exposed to and worked with every operation within the organization. That afforded me a broad and deep understanding of what local government does and, more importantly, how and why we do what we do.

However, I know I have a steep learning curve ahead of me as I gain understandings of how the Town of Belgrade operates, of our ordinances and of state law. Much of this coming year, I will dedicate to learning and evaluating. I look forward to that ... because I'm fascinated by local government, the most impactful level of governance.

Much of my learning will come from my new colleagues. But an equal amount will come from you - the residents of Belgrade. I invite you to pop by the town office, stop me in the village, or introduce yourself at one of our local gathering spots so you can share your stories, your ideas and your concerns with me.

I promise to listen and to do what I can to help Belgrade continue to be what everyone tells me it is - the greatest place anywhere. I am already convinced of that.

The Musical Comedy Murders of 1940 Play Comes To Vienna

On August 2nd and 3rd the Vienna Woods Players will transform the Vienna Union Hall stage into the mansion library of a wealthy patron of the arts who hopes to reveal the murderer of three chorus girls by inviting suspects to audition for still another show. The Musical Comedy Murders of 1940, written in 1986 by John Bishop and directed by Cheryl Herr-Rains, does include a few musical numbers and a few murders, but the emphasis is on comedy throughout. Hold onto your play program, as the who's who of whodunit shifts rapidly; while suspects emerge and reveal hidden identities, more deaths complicate the plot, investigators track leads, and romance progresses.


Although this is their first production as the

newly organized Vienna Woods Players, much of the cast has been performing together for nearly twenty years. The Musical Comedy Murders of 1940 will be presented Friday and Saturday, August 2nd and 3rd at 7:00 pm, with a Saturday matinee at 2:00. Tickets will be sold at the door - \$10 for adults and \$5 for children under 12. Tickets can be reserved until 6:40 pm (1:40 matinee) by emailing firemarks@fairpoint.net by July 31 with the number of tickets requested for which performance. The Vienna Union Hall is located at 5 Mountain Rd, off of SR 41 in Vienna.

Delaney Crocker is the housemaid, skillful with a meat cleaver. Elizabeth Bransky plays the attractive, wealthy, and tough owner of the mansion. Chris Crocker chauffeurs the guests and keeps an eye out for suspicious activity. Tim Davis auditions as an Irish tenor, but eventually sings a different tune. Stephen Linder portrays a stage and screen director with a series of successes, except for the musical cancelled due to the chorus girl murders. Allison Kuhns auditions as a dancer/singer for the play, whose purse seems heavy enough to conceal a handgun, in case she were targeted to be the fourth chorus girl to die. Andre Nile is a comedian, eager to land a role in a musical comedy, but is wary of the darker side of the whole situation. Jan Collins portrays the producer/business manager for the musical, helping to draw in the murder suspects, while enjoying being a mover and shaker on the theater scene. Rocio Carey plays a famed songwriter lending an air of legitimacy to the proposed comedy, whose topical lyrics transcend the 1940s. Don Petersen collaborates with Rocio's character as a musical team, but conflicts with the director's arrogance. Nate Kane provides voice-over radio announcements, foreshadowing twists in the plot. Karla Arceneaux, Dodi Thompson and Janet Roderick are assisting with production. June Cauldwell assembled stunning costumes and Greg Cauldwell constructed a set elaborate enough to contain the mysterious interplay of suspects, murders and victims.

Do not miss out on this evening (or afternoon) of silliness, laughter and local murders. The Vienna Woods Players are a group of talented actors from Vienna, Mount Vernon, Wilton, Farmington, Rome and Portland, who come together to create havoc, mayhem and true Maine entertainment.

Take It Outside

The past week has been hot and humid with **L** some rain. Early in the week we got a brief visit from our granddaughter, Maddy, when her parents dropped her off on the way to delivering her older brother to Jazz Camp at UMaine Farmington. While she was here, we spent a lot of time cooling off in the water, including swimming and jumping off the diving platform on my neighbor's swim float. After supper, we got in the boat to check out the new loon chicks in our cove and cruise down to Day's for a visit to Lakeside Scoops for some ice cream. Afterwards we headed out for bit of crepuscular (twilight) fishing. We took a few casts near the spillway area and then headed out for a "three-sunset trolling cruise." If you troll north along the western shore of Long Pond, you can get three sunsets if you time it right. The sun sets first behind Blueberry Hill, then briefly appears to rise again before setting behind Roundtop Mountain, and then rising and finally setting behind Vienna Mountain. Along the way we caught quite a few small to medium size smallmouth bass, none quite worthy of a photo. Finally, she hooked a nice one of about 3pounds or so and began to reel it in. As it got closer to the boat, I reached for the net to get ready to help land the fish. Suddenly there was a big splash and Maddy said her fish "jumped up and flopped off." The next day, Maddy went shopping and to a movie with Nana before getting dropped off at home in time to attend a theater event.

The warm rains have kick started the mush-







The Dams Keeper Report

Summer is most certainly here and, low and behold, our lake levels are still holding their own

Great Pond is actually 1" above full pond with both gates shut tight. In other words, Great Pond is just barely breaking over the spillway at the Village dam. Full pond is when the water has not quite crested over a spillway. Long Pond is now .72" below full pond with both gates still completely covered with cobwebs closed. Salmon/McGrath is now feeling the summer heat and is down 3" below full with its one gate still opened the mandated 1 turn or 1cfs. Overall for this point in the summer, all of our ponds are doing great.



A lot of folks wonder, or more accurately question our numbers particularly when their favorite measuring rock is now exposed and we are reporting such and such. There is a lot that goes into it but the bottom line is that our daily measurements are calculated every 15 minutes 24/7 by computerized data logger systems at both the Long and Great Pond dams and of course are calibrated periodically when we see something amiss.

Of course if your shore has been experiencing southerly winds for a few days, your water level will be higher and conversely if the winds change direction. Rain events also rain havoc on stability of our measurements especially with Long Pond where it takes new rain water up to 3 days to reach the dam at Wings Mill.





Women Caring for the Land Report

As a further report about Agriculture in central Maine the recent one-day workshop sponsored by Women, Food and Agricultural Network Organization and Natural Resources Conservation Services was focused on soil health. It was called Women Caring for the Land. A

management, frost seeing legumes in the pastures, among others.

The afternoon section was at Winterberry farm, a diversified organic farm in Belgrade owned and managed by Mary Perry. During the farm visit, we showed the women producers different soil assessments they could do at their own farm, such as a rain simulator in good and poor soils showing soil erosion and water absorption, as well as digging some soil and observing the structure and living organisms. Finally, we showed different management activities mentioned earlier on the day that Mary does in her operation to increase soil health.

Soil health is important to sustain plants, animals, and future generations. To do this, we need to remem-

group of women farmers from all throughout Central Maine got together in Augusta to talk about ways to improve the soil in their farming operation. Women producers ranged from different backgrounds and diversified farming interests, such as forestry, small scale farming, beekeepers, gardeners, livestock, mortality compost, and orchards, among others. But they all had the same interest: improve soil quality.

The day started by women participants introducing themselves in a circle learning style. All the women participants comfortably shared their farming background, concerns, and goals for their farming operation. The instructors then started explaining the different compo-

nents that lead to soil quality, such as soil structure and biota.

Soil is an ecosystem that can be managed to provide nutrients for plant growth, absorb and hold rainwater for use during dryer periods, filter and buffer potential pollutants from leaving our fields, serve as a firm foundation for agricultural activities, and provide habitat for soil microbes to flourish and diversify to keep the ecosystem running smoothly.

Afterward, we talked about different management choices that could be implemented in their operation to improve soil health, like cover crop, crop rotation, mulching and residue

groundwater runoff. Plants catch rainwater, slow it down, and filter out the unwanted chemicals. But plants can only grow if they don't get trampled, and a pathway tells humans how to walk around them. Paths are ideally 3-4' wide and can be defined with undyed mulch, crushed stone or even pine needles. You can border them with rocks, logs, branches, or nothing at all. They should


A nother way to save your lake is to define your foot pathways. Trees, shrubs, and plants act as a shield between the lake and bend in way to deter water from travelling straight down them into the lake.

tate in the other areas. You can landscape the garden with
native and native friendly plants like blueberries, juniper,
hostas and daylilies. If you put mulch down, make sure it
is undyed so those chemicals can't leach into the lake. If
you are not interested in a "highly civilized" landscape,
you can let it vegetate naturally with whatever is natural-
ly growing. You will be surprised at how much stuff
grows when you stop walking on it!





A Secret Gift by Ted Gup

Summertime in the Belgrades

ake a beautiful coastal drive from the author's small cabin in the woods near Bucksport to visit his mother near Kennebunk for Virginia's surprise 80th...what would mother give him this trip? Something from the attic, of course! Even the author's son Matt could not imagine what would come from this surprise birthday party at Grandma's.

As in most families, we know each other's needs and interests. Virginia knew her author son loved family history, so she insisted he take the old, dusty suitcase on the floor. It contained some "old papers". More junk to help Grandma in her downsizing to smaller and smaller living spaces. Continued clean-up from her own mother's death

one requires too much sorting and too much "junk".

Not even opening the suitcase, Ted Gup and his son Matt packed it the next day in their car before returning to Bucksport. "It was too big to be a briefcase, too small to be of much use as luggage." On the outside his mother had written a label "Memoires: Minna's Baby Book, Wedding Book, Family Misc." Can you imagine having your great grandmother's treasures still in tact? Matt was a lucky great grandchild and his dad the author had the beginnings of family history worth writing in a book.

Canton, Ohio was where the family tale began in 1933, during the Great Depression. This caught my eye, because my grandmother and cousins lived in Canton and we visited them often with such wonderful family get togethers. Not in 1933, but in 1948...still, the railroad town of Canton, where hoboes knocked on my grandmother's door looking for work, years after this 1933 story. My grandmother often fed these transients her deli-





cious cooking and I fondly remember her generosity.

So, too, the amazing front page story in the Sunday, December 17, 1933 Canton Repository headlined, "Man Who Felt Depression's Sting to Help 75 Unfortunate Families...Anonymous Giver, Known Only as 'B. Virdot,' Posts \$750 to Spread Christmas Cheer."

The ad within the paper was very brief and simple. Thank goodness journalists noticed and expanded the news on the front page. How often do we see good news written up? "In writing, please familiarize me with your true circumstances and financial aid will be promptly sent."

True to the ad's claim, families all over Canton began

just three years ago. Moving is always monumental and death of a loved receiving \$5 or \$10 before Christmas. The town reveled with happiness in knowing that someone in their community was so very generous to the needy. The individual stories of how the money was spent is documented in this fine family history.

> The distant relative of author Ted Gup is really not so distant. "They had learned during the Great Depression that they were all in this together--rich and poor, black and white, Jew and Gentile--and that only by acting in concert could they prevail. B. Virdot had sent them five dollars. They repaid his faith in them ten thousand fold."


> "But even today, B. Virdot's gift enjoys a half-life in Canton. At Christmas 2008, following my discovery of the suitcase, the Repository ran an editorial citing Sam Stone (a.k.a. Mr. B. Virdot) and his generosity."

> "...There is no better role model than Samuel J. Stone." Receivers of the Christmas money wrote letters of gratitude to their anonymous benefactor. That is how author Ted Gup could tell the rest of the story in A Secret Gift.

> Small beginnings with only five dollars shows how families could turn around their poverty, thanks to these many Christmas gifts by Ted Gupt's relative. Not until this book was published in 2010 did Canton, Ohio residents find out about our Maine-related hero incognito, the best kind, after all!

> Both Meyers Lake Amusement Park and the Palace Theater are mentioned several times in this history of Great Depression in Canton, Ohio. Young folks were determined to have fun on weekends even though money was short. A world's record was hailed in 1933 for dancers in the Moonlight Ballroom: 3,450 hours--some 144 days.

> It was so very straining on the dancers and the watchers (who paid to observe, even in the middle of the night!), that it was discontinued for health reasons. The desperation for fun and winning money was blatant with 77 couples entering June 7th and the three couples hanging on desperately to the torturous end. Mayor James Seccombe of Canton handed out the much sought for prize moneys to Bob "Popeye" Everhard and partner,

This Year's Program:

Maine Lake Ice-Out Dates: 1807-2018

Lloyd Irland, PhD; Forester and Economist; The Irland Group

Maine's exceptional lakes are clear and clean, due in no small part to the fact that historically they have been covered with ice and snow for nearly 6 months of the year. A shortening of the duration of ice cover on lakes as a result of a warming climate will likely have a profound effect on the interacting biogeochemical factors that influence lake ecosystems. Lloyd Irland will discuss his recent research, which suggests that a shortening of the period of ice cover on Maine's lakes has been taking place since the mid 19th century.

The Influences of Climate Change on Lake Water Quality, Including Recent Case Histories

Linda Bacon, Limnologist and Unit Leader; Maine Department of Environmental Protection, Lakes Program

During the past 10-15 years, a number of Maine lakes have experienced significant, unanticipated changes in water quality. A warming climate appears to have been a common factor in the complex interaction of conditions and circumstances that contributed to these changes. Linda Bacon will discuss the case histories of several lakes that have been pushed "over the edge" in recent years, as well as efforts underway to slow or reverse their decline.

The Effects of a Changing Climate on Invasive Aquatic Species: Threats to Maine's Lakes

Roberta Hill, Aquatic Ecologist and Invasive Aquatic Species Program Director; Lake Stewards of Maine (VLMP)

One of the major historical factors that has protected Maine's lakes from aquatic invaders has been our relatively cool climate. Many species of invasive flora and fauna that have successfully infested lakes throughout much of the Country have failed to gain a foothold in Maine, in part due to our long, cold winters, and cool water temperatures. A warming climate could open the door to many such invaders. Roberta Hill will discuss what could take place in such a scenario, and what can be done to address the problem and reduce this threat.


