that says time to clean out the refrigerator and Hello best secret in the world: the fall season shut it down or time to clean out the refrigerator and fill it up.


The clock of fall suggests tucking a wool hat in Fall is the time when the clock of change starts with the swim gear or packing a hot drink in the thermos instead of a cold one.

-The Luckiest Boy Boats of Belgrade- A Little History

The last Guide Ghost story involved an old guide ▲ boat that I remembered from my youth. Thanks to our local Franny Dill, we actually have a picture of the old craft—with her grandfather Charles Grant sitting in it. He was in fact the owner and guide that operated the boat for several decades in the 1900's. This brought me to thinking how many "named" boats there were here over the last 70 years or so. I tested by memory and wrote down as many as would come to mind and WOW, the number was near 20. I'm sure that I've missed many and that you readers could fill in the gaps. Considering that this is the last issue of the Summertime News for the year you'll have all winter to ponder. Here's the list that I came up with and most of their owners. Named boats seem more memorable for several reasons—names stick in your mind, named boats are often kept by owners for life and they are often remarkable in beauty or condition. You'll need patience as this list is rather long.




Boats of Belgrade: IDA, a guideboat that was operated on Great Pond by guide Charles Grant (circa 1920-1960); SNIPE, a guideboat berthed on the south end of Hoyt's Island and owned by the Mitchell family; ORALARK, a Higgins plywood speedboat that once claimed to be the fastest on the lake, owned by the Blaisdell family; *HAPPY, a Lyman that still plies the Great Pond waters with original engine, and always owned by Jack and Dianna Schultz; the WHY WORRY, a 20 plus foot Chris Craft also owned by the Mitchell family and berthed on the south end of Hoyt's Island; THE BIG BOAT, a semi-enclosed Chris Craft that replaced the WHY WORRY

during the Dowse family tenure; the WHY WORRY II, a replacement boat (Lyman) for the Chris Craft, owned and named by Bill and Joan Witkin, later owners of the Mitchell and Dowse property. The name WHY WORRY II given to the Lyman was later changed during a rebuild to *COCOA; the GREAT POND, one of the first pontoon boats on the lake, owned and operated by David Webster, long time water route mailman and character who was mimicked in On Golden Pond; the HUKELAU usually called the HUKE, a 21-foot Grady White used by Rod Johnson and family during the 60's and 70's, later sold to Lee Roberts for his cheering camp on the north end of Hoyt's Island. The fine craft subsequently was crushed in a storage building flattened by snow load in 1983; *MISS BELGRADE, another early entry to pontoon boating on Great Pond and still going today after 25 years, owned by Doris and Rod Johnson and berthed at Woodland Camps;

AUNT BETTY, a beautiful wooden fishing boat of probably 14 feet, berthed at Crystal Spring Camps and owned by the Fredericks family during the 50's and 60's. My father varnished it yearly; * MISS LAUREN, a beautifully restored HackerCraft of about 30 feet resides in Mill Stream and is owned by the Bolduc family. PHHFFT, a wooden PENN YAN of about 16 feet, originally powered by a 1957 18 h.p. Johnson was berthed on Long Pond at the Provandie family camp; **SHELLEY**, a Penn Yan runabout powered by a 1955 Johnson 25 horsepower, was owned and operated by Glenn and Bonnie Baxter until two years ago when Glenn passed away. They also owned a 1954 Lyman named SUNNY with original 4 cylinder Universal

Take It Outside -

When Will We Learn?

spent most of the week in Dayton, Ohio, at La family gathering celebrating my mother in-law's 90th birthday. I got most of my exercise pushing her around in a wheel chair on the wooded paths at the assisted living facility where she now lives. The trees brought joy to her and she talked about her youth when climbing trees brought her great joy. Every time we passed the small cottage where she used to live, she pointed out the relatively small red maple she had planted to replace the ash tree that was killed by the Emerald Ash Borer a few years ago. Unsaid, but clearly on her mind, was the thought that that particular tree would hopefully be around long after she wasn't. Our joyful family celebration was in stark contrast to the somber reflections of the local community after (another) horrific mass shooting in our country. There were community events that built solidarity and serious discussions about how to avoid future recurrences. It also reminded me there is much to be gained by listening to our elders and becoming immersed in the natural world. The rest of this column is basically a reprint of one that I wrote in 2011 when I was writing a column entitled, "Watershed Wisdom." I think it still has some good ideas

Watershed Wisdom – Ancient Wisdom I have been discussing Mother Nature's watershed design and the importance of maintaining upland forests and vegetated wetland buffers to protect water quality. I have talked about the importance of responsible development to avoid excess stormwater runoff that can cause erosion and deplete groundwater supplies. These are not new ideas. Consider this observation from over 2000 years ago:

"There are mountains in Attica, which can now keep nothing but bees, but which were clothed, not so very long ago, with fine trees producing timber suitable for roofing the largest buildings....while the country produced boundless pasture for cattle. The annual supply of rainfall was not lost, as it is at present, through being allowed to flow over a denuded surface to the sea, but was received by the earth, in all its abundance, into her bosom where she stored it." Plato: Dialogue of Critias 360 B.C.E

Plato could just as easily be talking about modern day America. Cutting down forests in the uplands and clearing the native vegetation results in too much impervious surface, which in turn results in excess stormwater runoff. Instead of recharging the groundwater aquifers and filtering slowly into streams and lakes, this runoff flows quickly down the hills, resulting in flooding in the lowlands and excessive erosion and phosphorus-laden sediments flowing into our lakes.

The LakeSmart program I discussed a few weeks ago emphasizes the importance of maintaining native vegetated buffers along the shorelines of our lakes, rivers, and streams. Over 500 years ago, Leonardo da Vinci gave the same advice:

"The roots of the willows do not suffer the banks of

the canals to be destroyed; and the branches of the willows, nourished during their passage through the thickness of the bank and then cut low, thicken every year and make shoots continually, and so you have a bank that has life and is of one substance."-Leonardo Da Vinci (1452-1519)

A few hundred years later, Henry David Thoreau built his home next to Walden Pond and observed:

"My house was on the side of a hill, immediately on the edge of the larger wood, in the midst of a young forest of pitch pines and hickories, and half a dozen rods from the pond, to which a narrow footpath led down the hill. In my front yard grew the strawberry, blackberry, and life-everlasting, johnswort and goldenrod, shrub oaks and sand cherry, blueberry and groundnut."- Henry David Thoreau (1817-1862)

Thoreau clearly understood the importance of diverse vegetation and a healthy vegetated buffer. Interestingly, even before the advent of shoreland zoning rules, he built his house a half dozen rods back from the water, almost exactly the 100 ft setback requirement of Maine's current law. With his narrow meandering footpath, I'm sure Thoreau would have qualified for a LakeSmart Award. He certainly understood the beauty of healthy lakes with forested shorefront areas:



The Dams Keeper Report

Well, this is our final Dams Keeper Report for the season. Whoever said that "Summer in Maine is nothing but two weeks of bad sledding" isn't too far off the mark! It seems like summer should be getting longer with all of that global warming but here we are regardless.

As of this writing, Great Pond is down 1" below full pond which is still very good considering last year at this time we were down 6". Long Pond is currently down 4" whereas last year we were down a whopping 12.36" and our friends over on Salmon/McGrath are now down 8" below full. For those of you navigating the channel between Salmon and McGrath you may want to lift your lower units a bit to clear you know what.

The occasional afternoon showers and thunderstorms have been of some relief for our farmers and gardens but have been of little benefit to our water levels. As of this writing we have received .82" of precipitation in the past 10 days with just a meager .38" forecasted for the next 10 days so we remain still very short of our normal 3.60" of precipitation for the month. The forecast for September is just 2.66", another 26% loss in the precipitation department. Hopefully we can do better but I am not holding my breath!

The Plan now is to try and keep what we have until the Fall Lake Drawdown which calls for Great and Long Ponds to be drawn down to 1.5′-2.0′ and Salmon down to 1.0′-1.5′ by November 1st. Weather permitting, the drawdowns usually begin after the Columbus Day weekend but at this rate it might just be a moot point.

Enjoy what's left of The Summer of 2019 and your vacation! I hope it's been a memorable one. It has been for us. See you next Summer!







engine. The boats were used during the same time period of about 62 years on Great Pond; The MARY L, another lap strake inboard was owned by Edward and Mary Ladin and berthed on the northwest side of Hoyt's Island and later in Mill Stream; PETER RABBIT, a 15 foot Chris Craft owned by the Dunlap family was berthed in a Mill Stream boathouse; the INDIAN, another guideboat, was owned by the August family who summered on Indian island; the EDITH M. ROCKWELL a large open sea boat owned and used by the Swan family to ferry boys and goods to the Pine Island boys camp for many decades. The boat used now looks similar and I believe is the MARY SWAN. The JUBILEE was a 20 plus foot open boat owned by T.J. Myers and later the Weltmer family on Jamacia Shores near Crooked Island. The few boats on the previous list that still ply Belgrade waters today are marked with an asterisk*.

Whoops, a late entry just popped into mind: The **STORCREST**, a beautiful barrel back Chris Craft of about 17 feet was owned by a Doctor Potter. It was housed in his boathouse in Rome, Maine and was considered one of the prettiest boats on the lake for several decades. I always called her The Queen of the Waterways. I have just heard from the Summertime News editor Esther Perne. She recalls many stories of her grandfather Ernest P. Carr and his boat named NIXON, quite possibly an expression of the times, well before the President. The boat was a large Atlantic Dory and used on Great Pond starting around 1920. Esther's mother rode on the bow watching for rocks when her father entered Mill Stream before the stream was heavily dredged in the 1930's. There's much more to this and I'd like to reserve it for the first story of 2020!

Thank you all for following the Luckiest Boy stories in the Summertime News during this 2019 season. Hats off to Esther Perne editor and Michael Breault for getting Summertime News out every week. It seems hard to believe it's time to say good-bye for 2019, but may we all enjoy the coming fall and winter. For the Love of Loons: BLA's Loon Preservation Project

There are few memories of Maine as beloved as sharing a lake with loons. Loons set the tune for excited sightings, background trills and calls, human efforts to mimic, and baby infatuation

Annually, a loon count is conducted via Maine Audubon, but what do lake-dwellers really know about this iconic bird? About the impact of recent weather patterns? About the effect of climate change?

The Belgrade Lakes Association is about to find out. Over a 4-year period, to the cost of \$40,000 plus, a comprehensive survey of the Common Loon population on Great Pond and Long Pond will take place under the direction of Lee Attix of Loon Conservation Association. The goal is to develop a comprehensive plan to support and grow the loon population in a sustainable manner.

What can everyone do to help? Volunteer to monitor nests, donate to defray expenses, spread the information, keep watch and report unusual loon activity, harrassment or other actions. Donations may be made via belgradelakesassociation.org or call 512-5150 for more information.

LakeSmart Tip: Leave Your Leaves

Can you feel it? The weather is changing. Before we know it, fall will be upon us. There is still plenty of time to enjoy these last weeks of summer. But when fall comes along and you are closing up your camp, remember this LakeSmart moto: "Take a break, put down your rake and save the lake!" Leaves and pine needles provide a barrier between rain water and dense soil. When allowed to accumulate, the debris creates a sponge-like barrier that captures and infiltrates rainwater before it enters the lake. We call that barrier the duff -- it is one of the 5 tiers of vegetation in your buffer.

Duff is nature's way of keeping sediment in the ground. To get an idea of how deep your duff layer is, stick a pen into the ground. It will easily push through the duff layer until it hits the hard packed soil underneath. To build your duff layer, and save the lake, stop your raking! In addition to uncovering bare soil, raking can disturb the plants that are trying to grow. Putting down your rake can be your first step in letting your lawn naturalize --remember, lakes like less lawn! If you let nature take its course, your lawn will become a hearty buffer in no time. "For me the golden time of year was summertime, when we all went for one month to a rented camp on the shore of Great Pond, one of the Belgrade Lakes in Maine. This Belgrade era began, I think, in 1904, when I was five years old. It was sheer enchantment. We Whites were city people—everything about Belgrade was a new experience: the big freshwater lake, the pines and spruces and birches, the pasture with its sweetfern and juniper, the farmhouse where we took our meals, the rough camp with its sparsely furnished bedrooms... the boating, the swimming, and the company of other campers along the shore. The month of August was four solid weeks of heaven....

The delicious smells and sounds of Belgrade are still with me after these many years of separation. I spent much of my time in a canoe, exploring bogs and streams, netting turtles.... At Bean's store [in the Village] Father would treat us to a round of Moxie or birch beer, and we could feed the big bass that hung around the wharf and then head back [in the launch] across the lake... (There was a new drink out called Coca-Cola, but Father assured us it was a cheap imitation of Moxie and without virtue.)"

This is my last "Take it Outside Column" of the season. I hope readers will find it of value and be inspired to "Take it Outside" and reflect on some of the life lessons Mother Nature can bring. And don't forget to take a kid along on your next adventure. Or someone older, who will once again, feel like a kid again.

"A lake is the landscape's most beautiful and expressive feature. It is earth's eye; looking into which the beholder measures the depth of his own nature. The fluviatile trees next the shore are the slender eyelashes which fringe it, and the wooded hills and cliffs around are its overhanging brows."

We have discussed the importance of watersheds and managing our lakes on a watershed basis instead of arbitrary municipal boundaries. There are two places in Maine where this takes place- the Cobbossee Watershed District and the Penobscot Nation in the Penobscot River Watershed. It is no coincidence that Cobbossee Lake is the only major lake that has been taken off of the official DEP list of impaired waterbodies. Native Americans have long recognized the importance of taking care of our lakes and rivers. Chief Seattle (1786-1866) was not a Penobscot but I think they would agree with him:

"The rivers are our brothers. They quench our thirst. The rivers carry our canoes, and feed our children. If we sell you land, you must remember, and teach your children, that the rivers are our brothers and yours, and you must henceforth give the rivers the kindness you would give any

brother."

More recently Luna Leopold (1915-2006), the son of the great 20th Century conservationist Aldo Leopold, who was the Chief Hydrologist of U.S. Geological Services (USGS) and a Professor at the University of California summed it all up when he said:

"Water is the most critical resource issue of our lifetime and our children's lifetimes. The health of our waters is the principal measure of how we live on the land."

Our new Maine Lakes Resource Center (MLRC) will shortly be working to make conservation a tradition in our watershed. We plan to implement some of the wisdom of past generations to preserve this special place for future generations. We need to take advantage of Mother Nature's built-in systems and figure out ways to modify man-made systems to mimic natural systems. We have implemented many state-of-theart best management practices into the design of our new center. Come visit and learn how to live lightly on the land for the sake of the lakes. We want our children and grandchildren to have memories like E.B. White:

E.B. White on Democracy, Edited by Martha White, Granddaughter

During these turbulent times, it is helpful to read our "Once more to the lake..." bard and lover of all things here in the summer E. B. White. He canoed our Great Pond shores from age six onwards into his eighties around Snug Harbor, Bear Springs, and, of course, to the village store run by Bean, L.L. Bean's brother. Buying Moxie and little birch bark canoes were all the thing before crossing the lake once again.

I have E. B. White's marvelous words framed in my dining room camp by Great Pond:


"I returned to Belgrade. Things haven't changed much...The clothesline behind Walter Gleason's house is flapping with white wash...and below you the lake hangs blue and clear, and you see the islands plain". (1936 version, revised essay over 40 years many times)

So now we have a new collection of his words to read in 2019, edited by his granddaughter Martha White who resides on the coast of Maine. Jon Meacham, historian of Power and Destiny about our President Bush who enjoyed his last summer in 2018 at Kennebunkport's Walker Point and the wedding of

his twin granddaughter, writes an introduction in full for E. B. White.

The 32 page introduction encapsulates many helpful quotes about democracy. Jon Meacham's summary is helpful for our immediate decisions we have as citizens in our next local, state and national elections.

"[H]e wrote plainly and honestly about the things that matter the most, from life on his farm in Maine to the lives of nations and of peoples...White is the rarest of figures, a writer whose ordinary run of work is so extraordinary that it



repays our attention decades after his death."

During the invasion of Poland by the Nazis, "White described a day on the waters of Maine. 'It struck me as we worked our way homeward up the rough bay with our catch of lobsters and a fresh breeze in our teeth that this was what the fight was all about,' he wrote". Almost six years of WWII in Europe.

" If there is any principle of the Constitution that more imperatively calls for attachment than any other it is the principle of free thought--not free thought for those who agree with us but freedom for the thought we hate."

"We don't mind changing to a different economy, as to a different shirt, but we will not submit, even for a split second, to controlled opinion. If it is controlled, it isn't opinion."

Turning off the radio was another helpful hint from White. The all encompassing media at that time was radio. Isn't that good advice today for our mass media of 24 hour onslaught, much of it entertainment, not news?

"[Democracy] is the line that forms on the right. It is the don't in don't shove. It is the hole in the stuffed shirt...". So much advice from a favorite writer...

Charlotte's Web, "An hour of freedom is worth a barrel of slops."

Stuart Little, "A law has to be fair to everybody."

The Trumpet of the Swan, "Safety is all well and good: I prefer freedom."






Steeple Restoration Underway at Norlands

When people travel North on Norlands Road, they are oftentimes surprised to see a lovely steeple rise above the landscape on this rural road in Livermore. It is the first clue that something special is about to happen. That "something special" is witnessing a place where the past lives on in a setting virtually unchanged since the 1800s and a time when the remarkable Washburn family called the place home.

These days, those passing by now see the oldest building at Washburn Norlands Living History Center (Norlands) encased in modernday steel scaffolding – a sure sign that a remarkable transformation is about to take place.

Norlands, now a museum offering an authentic view of 19th-century life in rural Maine, is pleased to announce that a full restoration of the meeting house steeple and bell tower has begun. The restoration includes strengthening the framing with new posts, building and installing a new bell wheel, and repairing or replacing the upper and lower railings, decorative lattice work, clapboards and other deteriorating woodwork. The weather has not been kind to the structure over the past decade. The flashing will be repaired where it meets the roofline. The entire steeple, from the roofline up, will be scraped, sanded, primed, caulked and painted. When finished, it will be more structurally sound and weather tight. It will shine bright once again – harkening back to 1828 when Israel Washburn Sr. and his neighbor, Otis Pray, raised money to build the church. The work is expected to be completed in



October.

Norlands has been able to start the restoration, thanks to recent grant funding awarded to the Center. The Maine Steeples Fund, a component fund of the Maine Community Foundation, awarded a \$60,000 matching grant. Norlands is halfway to meeting the match. Earlier this year, the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) donated \$10,000 to the preservation project. This grant funding was made possible through the sponsorship of Mary Dillingham Burnt Meadow Chapter, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution,

based in Lewiston, Maine. To date, three individual donors have given a total of \$25,000. This project, like most major restoration projects, is not inexpensive and will cost upwards of \$136,000. Norlands is seeking cash donations and gifts in kind to finish meeting the match and the expense of the project.

"The steeple is a beacon that contributes to the quality of place at Norlands and in the greater Livermore community. To think that more than a thousand people attended the dedication of the meeting house in 1829 and we are seeing the same view as the Washburns enjoyed is just incredible. We are doing everything we can to preserve the structure", commented Harry Simon, president of the Board of Trustees.

Sheri Leahan, Norlands' director, remarked "We are thrilled to have the support of the DAR, an organization that supports historic preservation and education, as well as the Maine Steeples Fund, a fund that supports historically and culturally significant buildings. Both funding opportunities fit within our mission. We're so grateful that they have included us among the many organizations they champion."


