Dear Sir.

Your letter of the 4<sup>th</sup> inst came due to  
house. In reply allow me to say, that until your  
late Telegram, I was not aware of an obstacle  
in the way of my permanent commission. Newspaper  
intelligence had deceived me, noticing in several  
papers, an item stating that Dr. Huntington had  
resigned, I never supposed it to be the fact —

Furthermore it has been my misfortune not to receive  
the pertinent item of information which your letter  
answers me, you have repeatedly sent — My first  
knowledge of the Special & financial intent you have taken  
in my behalf, in soliciting authority from the War Dept.  
was also for the first time conveyed to me in  
the same letter. Had I known these facts, my request  
for a commission, or a release from further duty, would  
have been either withheld, or eventually modified.

Ignorance of these facts must be my apology, which  
I trust you will deem sufficient for the request I now  
wish to make — money — of the relations of Dr. Huntington  
to the U. S. A. If I should permit it, at some future  
day, I may then be put in the Commission & position,  
in expectation of which I have left my service —

In the exception of this I presume you wife  
have received a note stating, that I signed  
my confession with the 4 others, &c. on a about  
the 5<sup>th</sup> inst -
