

I think we all know that an auction is an event where items are purchased by bidding against others. The highest bidder becomes the new owner.

As many of you know, the Luckiest Boy collects antique outboard motors. To date the number in the collection is just shy of 50, and we've named it the Antique Outboards of Belgrade. We had plans to quit at 25, but somehow that didn't happen and we are still at it. The old outboards have come from many sources including outright purchases, barn finds and land fill metal scrap heaps. In addition, many have come from good friends and neighbors at no cost, and yes, even auctions. The most recent acquisition is chronicled in the following story.

Our long-time Delray Beach friends Sandra Norton and Jan Hokenson, now living in Shelburne, Vermont, sent us an add/notification that items from a Lake Placid estate were being auctioned. The owner had been an avid hunting and fishing enthusiast and the items being sold reflected that. Things like antique fishing rods, bows and arrows and even an unfired Civil War rifle were included. What had caught their eyes were two small antique outboard motors that might be interesting for the Antique Outboards of Belgrade collection. They offered to send more information and if we wanted them for the collection they would go to the auction and bid on one or both, depending on price and competition. It turns out the motors were in the 2 to 3 horsepower range and were real antiques from the 1930s. The Muncie interested us the most and the collection did not have one. The Evinrudes are more plentiful as many more were produced and we have several of varying sizes. (for the record, we don't collect large outboards as they are too dammed heavy to handle)

Auction day arrived in January and the two spirited, white-haired women arrived early and got a good seat in the front row. This was a first for them both but neither suffers from shyness. They did not go unnoticed by the mostly male arrivals whose quimsical glances showed curiosity and

perhaps a little uneasiness. The auctioneer soon called the room to order and started the auction with several items, including a bamboo fly rod, a small kit of dry flies, and a nice wicker creole. The first outboard, touted as the owner's original fishing motor, was the Muncie 2 horsepower, model A11. Sandra and Jan comfortably and quickly joined the bidding by raising their paddle. After some minor competition the other bidders quickly were quieted when Sandra firmly set the paddle down marking the end of the bidding. The auctioneer hollered SOLD, as he pointed a finger to "our ladies."

Soon after, a lunch break was declared and the second outboard motor came up later in the afternoon session. The men seemed more determined about the Evinrude and the bidding was robust. San and Jan smartly let it go to others and with smiles on their faces, left the room to pick up their booty. After wrapping the new baby in a tarp, they loaded into their SUV and took it back to their home. This coming summer the Muncie will be available to see in the Antique Outboards of Belgrade collection. Thank you, Jan and Sandra, for alerting us and for your sporting sense of going to your first auction.

As I started writing this story earlier today, it occurred to me that I have obtained only one other outboard motor at an auction. Oddly enough, it was my first motor that started the collection back in 1988. Woodland Camps was having an auction to sell off ancillary camp items such as rocking chairs, old refrigerators, bed frames and so on. Nearing the end of the day, an auctioneer's helper lugged a dirty old outboard motor from the rear of the pump house. It was put up for bid and I put \$5.00 on it. There were no other bidders and I brought it home. It turned out to be a complete 1925 Johnson 2 horsepower, which still runs today. My friend Ralph cleaned it up and got it running. Doris and I ran it in the 1998 boat parade and this summer will mark it's 95th birthday.

Sooooo- what's the lesson here? Could it be, don't be afraid to raise your paddle at an auction—you never know what you might get!

Hats off to Sandra and Jan for their efforts to make it happen. The Muncie, as a newcomer, will join the Johnson as the oldster. They will reside together for the rest of their days for many folks to see.

Long Pond Survey Areas

The third Saturday in July is the **▲** annual loon count in Maine, coordinated by Maine Audubon. See: (https://www.maineaudubon.org/projects/loons/annual-loon-count/). year's count took place on the 200th day of Maine's 200th year and was the 37th annual count in this important ongoing citizen-science project dedicated to better understanding one of Maine's most iconic birds. Every year over 1000 volunteers, of which I am one, attempt to count all the loons on a couple hundred Maine lakes at the same time. It's organized like a military operation and I am the coordinator for the dozen or so volunteers on Long Pond, which is divided into 9 Survey Areas, with a 10th in Ingham Pond. Early in the morning all counters head for their assigned section of the lake to be in posi-

tion to count all the adult loons and loon

chicks in their area between 7:00 AM and 7:30 AM. I left my dock around 6 AM, planning to fish for a bit on the way to my Survey Area. There was light fog over the lake, but it was burning off rapidly as the sun rose and the wind picked up a bit. I thought about Carl von Clausewitz's "Fog of War" and how it could even affect small operations like ours. Luckily, this year's fog turned out to not be a factor.

My assigned area was a cove that has been used for many years by a pair of loons that typically nests on a secluded beach on a small peninsula. Unfortunately, for the last few years this pair has been unsuccessful in raising very many chicks because land-based and avian predators have found the nest and eaten the loon eggs before they hatched. To assist this pair, the Belgrade Lakes Association (BLA), as part of their ongoing study of loons on Great and Long Pond, arranged to have a floating raft nest with an avian guard (to prevent predation by eagles, ravens, and blue herons) built and installed near the usual nesting site (to provide the loons some protection from terrestrial predators such as racoons, minks, et al.). While BLA members waited to see if the loons would use the new nest, a pair of mallard ducks discovered the nest and decided it was a fine place to raise a brood and climbed aboard and built a nest. When the loons showed up, they discovered the raft already occupied and headed for the beach. Eventually, Continued on page 10...

Belgrade Vote Protects Water Quality

• Water Quality Article 8 on the Town of Belgrade 2020 Town Meeting Warrant allowing funds to be used to protect and improve the water quality of the town's lakes passed with record numbers this year.

In 2019, the money approved went to:

- 1. Removing 28,835 gallons of invasive milfoil from Great Pond.
- 2. Removing 4,600 gallons of invasive milfoil from Belgrade Stream, 22,000 pounds from Messalonskee Lake and Belgrade Stream and placing 21,860 square feet of benthic barriers in Messalonskee Lake.
- Conducting 13,288 Courtesy Boat Inspections to prevent the spread of invasive plants.
- 4. Completing 119 erosion control projects at Youth lake shore properties with the Conservation Corps (YCC).

This summer, the YCC and milfoil removal teams follow new health and safety protocols while continuing to work hard to protect the lakes from invasive aquatic species and harmful erosion. For more information contact the 7 Lakes Alliance in Belgrade Lakes at 495-6039.

Report Analyzes Economic Contribution of Maine's Colleges and Universities

• Maine's 38 colleges and universities generate a total annual economic contribution - including spending of students and visitors, and multiplier

Violence Project. Conservation Too -

Some Common Questions about **Conservation Practices**

How can I plant a buffer and not lose my view? Buffers are not "one size fits all". Whenever designing a buffer for a landowner the first things to consider are the goals and objectives of the landowner. It does no good to install a planting that the homeowner dislikes. And it is depressing to install a buffer only to have the homeowner shear it down because it is in the way. The great thing about plants is that there are so many shapes and sizes to choose from. You can create a very effective buffer with plants that only reach a couple feet in height. If you have large trees, you can prune lower branches to create a window beneath the canopy.

What about pet wastes? Do they have an effect on water quality?

Pet wastes can have a serious impact on the water quality of lakes and streams. Pet waste washed into a lake uses up oxygen, releases ammonia, can cause algae blooms and disease. Children, adults and pets that spend time around or in the water are most at risk for the diseases and infections found in and caused by pet waste. If you have pets, the best strategy is to keep a supply of plastic grocery bags on hand and do a cleanup every few days. The bags can be thrown away with the trash or contents can be buried away from the water, gardens, kids etc.

How can I stop my shore from eroding?

This is a tough one to answer without looking at the site but the first thing to decide is what type of erosion your shore is experiencing. Is it wave action or runoff from land that is causing the problem? If it is runoff from a driveway, buildings or the lawn, buffers of various types may remedy the problem. Planting shore stabilizing vegetation with deep roots or allowing parts of a lawn to remain un-mowed will provide two types of protection. If you are planting or maintaining a vegetative buffer, combine the vegetation with a raised berm to help slow the flow and redirect stormwater into the sideyard, a raingar-

den or other area where it can seep into the ground more slowly. If wave action or ice damage is the culprit, fixes may require some kind of armoring such as rock combined with stabilizing vegetation. Any armoring effort probably requires a permit. Contact your local town, Maine DEP or even the local YCC group for assis-

My camp road or driveway washes out each spring. What can I do to fix it?

There are two approaches to "fixing" these types of roads. There is the popular band-aid approach where money is spent each season on gravel to fix washouts disregarding why the road washes out. A better "Option B" is to find the reason for the washouts, fix them and then do some annual maintenance. The initial cost of "Option B" which could include a Gravel Road Management Plan, can be larger than the band-aid method but will save lots of money and aggravation in the long run. It also helps protect water quality over the long run.

Do all of those outboard motors pollute the lake?

The short answer is that they pollute much less than they used to. New, tougher restrictions on outboard emissions have caused the industry to create much more environmentally friendly products. Old motors that have not been retired yet still pollute much more than their newer cousins. Lakes have an amazing ability to clean themselves but an out of date, old, polluting outboard can have very detrimental effects on an average sized Maine lake. The good news is that newer outboards meet more and more strict standards and as old motors are replaced, lakes will have less and less pollution from outboard motors.

The Dams Keeper Report

nough with the rain already! Turn off the faucets! We have enough water! Our ponds are full as are our wells! Even our gardens and farms are doing great! Heck, even the lawns through the Village are green and exquisite!

As I write this week's column, we have received over 2" of rain in the past ten days but, we may be going back to our original forecast of a drought as we are now forecasted for just .41" of precipitation for the next 10 days.

I am pleased to report that both Great and Long Ponds are now about 3" ABOVE FULL POND. I cannot believe I am actually typing this! I never thought I would see Full Pond until sometime late Fall – never mind three inches above full. This has not happened at this point in the summer for the past five years. Great Pond is as of this fine morning, 2.76" above full pond with Long Pond actually 3.24" also, above full pond. Meaning, that the water going over their respective spillways is 3" deep. Over the past couple of days, the Dams Committee's quandary has been "do we open the gates to stem the tide as the levels will still be going up for a couple of more days due to drainage from the steep watershed or do we hold tight and pray that the water levels stabilize sooner than later and no one loses their dock."

Normally, we would also be concerned with

the higher water levels washing out native loon nests but believe it or not, there are no active loon nests on Great Pond and only two on Long Pond as I write this update. There are also no loon chicks on Great Pond and just four on Long Pond with a potential for just two more. This has been a dismal season for our Loons but this discussion will have to be for another day. You may want to reach out to the Belgrade Lakes Association's website for updates on their allimportant Loon Project (https://belgradelakesassociation.org/).

As a reminder, Great Pond and Long Pond dams have been completely shut down for well over a month now so your Dams Committee will remain in the "preserve the water levels at all cost" mode while anticipating a return to another drought.

The 'permanent' repair on Wings Mill starts this week with installation of a new floating cofferdam to deter the water flow while they do the reconstruction. This is an incredible new technology that yours truly cannot wait to see. You too may want to visit the Wings Mill Dam on Wings Mill Road in Belgrade over the next few weeks for a look yourself. This is our tax dollars at work!

Kennebec Cradle of Americans by Robert P. Tristram Coffin

Robert P. Tristram Coffin was a descendant of the original English settlers of Maine and an acclaimed historian of his time. He was also a poet and essayist and was awarded the Pulitzer Prize for poetry in 1935. He attended Bowdoin College in Maine and later taught there while writing many of his thirty-seven books," from back cover.


I purchased this 1937 history with updated 2002 front and back large cover painting by Trevor Paul Robertson at my favorite Brunswick Bookshop on the corner of Main Street. DownEast Books are usually great republished reads and this one overwhelmed me, every single page.

I dare you reader to open anywhere in this local history, only 218 pages, and read any page and discover Robert Coffin's pure poetry in prose about our beautiful lakes and mountains surrounding the Kennebec.

The fur trade established here along the river is our local success story in American history. The Abanakis, handsome and tall, called themselves The Dawn People and lived forever in the Kennebec River area. "The Abenakis built bark cabins, long

houses with ridge pokes, and small ones around a central paved fireplace. They had towns...as at Norridgewock and at Koussinok, where Hallowell now stands. And they built boats. Birch-bark canoes, some of them large enough to hold a small army of men."

Curious now? A few more quotes? Dear reader, you do not need my opinion, just read this author. My copy over winter reading has almost



every other page dog eared (I own the book).

"So fortified with bayberry and nicotine, the Abenakis held the Kennebec many thousand strong, a tough and bright people. But another race of men was coming to fit their bodies into the winds and to be made tough and bright and smart by the splendors and the rigors of Maine weather."

"Maybe it was a Viking. Leif Ericsson got down lower than Maine, likely...Maybe it was an even older European than a Nordic. On Ma_ana, the island next to Monhegan, near the Kennebec's mouth, there is a rock that bears what seems to be an inscription. Perhaps it is an old Indian pictograph, though some people believe it to be a runic message of the Vikings; other people say it was put there by the Phoenicians, the men who founded Cadiz in Spain and colonies in Britain...Anyway, fishermen were here early and stayed late. They found the water alive with cod and could dip them up by the bucketful. The cod, not Columbus, opened the door to the new world."

"Cartier saw Indians as white as men in France. Probably European fishermen had already been

active in domestic affairs. The French brought settlers over to the Gulf of St. Lawrence. Trappers, traders, fishermen, and missionaries were soon living as neighbors to the red men. Henry Hudson may have thrust his nose into the Kennebec."

"Surely one of the first Englishmen to swim the Kennebec, and half a hundred other rivers from Mexico to Maine, was David Ingram, the most famous walker of American history". Ever hear about him, dear reader? I had not until reading this most revealing history. Go to page 39.

"Navigators could smell Maine far out at sea. No wonder, with so much bayberry and sweet fern around. The poet Drayton knew his Maine:

When as the luscious smell
Of that delicious land,
Above the seas that flows,
The clear wind throws,
Your hearts to swell
Approaching the dear strand...

"But the first sailors to the Kennebec were thinking about breeding a new race of heroes, too. They foresaw that this wealthy world would be a fine cradle for men of a future empire".

It may have been just the measles or some offspring of the family of common colds. But it was fatal to the sons of the forest who ran naked in the summers and had never had colds before. Probably three-quarters of all the Abenakis were dead by spring."

The Maine Film Center just concluded a successful, although unconventional, 23rd annual Maine International Film Festival. The festival was unconventional in several respects: Instead of the usual 60+ feature films, there were only eleven this year, the best of the best. (There were also two collections of shorts, Maine Shorts and Shorts From Away.) 2020 is the first year that MIFF has not used either of its traditional venues, Railroad Square Cinema or the Waterville Opera House. (In order to maintain social distancing, all the in-person screenings took place at the Skowhegan Drive-In.) This year is also the first time that the festival has presented any of its content online. (Two documentaries and the Shorts from Away were presented only online, and Maine Shorts was the only festival offering presented both online and at the drive-in.)

Despite these changes and challenges, those who attended screenings at the drive-in were happy to be there, enjoying being able to see fine foreign and independent films once again. This is an opportunity that was lost when Railroad Square Cinema in Waterville had to close in late March, during the early days of COVID-19 in Maine.

Over 200 people attended the final screening, the Northeast premiere of *The Last Shift*, a film made more timely by recent Black Lives Matter protests. In this drama, white everyman Stanley (Oscar-nominee Richard Jenkins) is retiring as the night manager at an all-night fast food restaurant in an economically depressed Midwestern town. In training his replacement, African American probationer and aspiring writer Jevon (Shane Paul McGhie), Stanley is forced to confront some uncomfortable realities about himself and the society in which he lives.

Now that the festival is over, what will happen next? When will Railroad Square reopen? The answers remain to be determined. The Maine Film Center, which organizes the Maine International Film Festival and which owns Railroad Square, plans to email a survey to festival goers soon to help it decide its next steps.
