

EMPEROR WILLIAM MEETS THE CZAR

An Impressive Array of War Ships and Soldiers.

CHONSTADT, July 19.—At 4.30 p. m., German yacht Hohenzollern, with Empress Wanda on board, entered the roads and the valley of the river, where the German war forts.
