It was a summer of parades and parties and crowds everywhere. It all seemed ageless and

timeless and just plain wholesome fun and yet the activities were interspersed with very formal and forward-looking meetings, projects and plans that benefit the region today - rec programs, lake week, fairs and other community gatherings.

First the birthday - the big bicentennial bash. Many people made it possible, helped in the events, participated in the festivities but it took a town manager who wasn't from Belgrade to select the perfect person, a retired military man and native Belgrader who knew his town well.

Bicentennial Committee Chairman Carl Yeaton not only set up the year-long schedule - from a fashion show in February to a United States Army Field Band finale in October - covering many facets of Belgrade's heritage but divided the summer's festivities into three major successful celebrations that, he stated, "should attract people from all walks of life": Lakes Appreciation Day in Belgrade Lakes Village, Sports Day in Belgrade Depot and Farm Days in North Belgrade.

Lakes Appreciation Day in Belgrade Lakes Village was devoted to wonderful, water-related activities from early morning pontoon rides to exhibits and events throughout the village to two very unique water parades - followed by the Belgrade Fire Department's famous Bean Hole Bean supper and the annual Loon Calling Contest.

Capping the many projects in preparation for Lakes Appreciation Day was project Peninsula Park, a 3-day work extravaganza by the Belgrade Camp celebrated a one-year "Victory Over people mingling, celebrations and concerts and Lakes Conservation Corps who transformed a

Representing the combined interests of all who lived, worked and relaxed in the watershed, the Belgrade Lakes Conservation Corps, composed of two dedicated work teams of the area's best-qualified high school and college age youth, was the brainstorming outcome of the newly formed Lake Associations of the Belgrades group - the first formal organizational link of the chain's seven lakes.

Celebration number two was "Sports Day" in Belgrade Depot a gathering place known for its sports fields, elementary school, a loop of road good for foot races and - today - the Belgrade Library. 

Summertime in the Belgrades

Take It Outside

• o far this has been a cool and windy transition to Usummer, with some occasional very hot days. The fishing has continued to be productive, especially early in the morning and late in the evening. I love fishing these crepuscular periods when the lake is typically dead calm, and it is easy to spot fish feeding on or near the surface. Surface feeding fish often indicate an insect hatch taking place with some fish (often trout or small bass) sucking the fish off the surface. Often larger fish will be just below the smaller fish at the surface, eating the smaller fish or the nymphs (insect larvae) just below the surface waiting to emerge. I often keep my 6-wt flyrod rigged with a big brown, bead-headed, woolly bugger that I can cast into the middle of the action (for my non flyfishing readers, the woolly bugger is a big ugly fly that doesn't really look like anything in particular but looks enough like almost everything fish eat that they can't resist it). I recently caught and released several nice 16-inch rainbows with the woolly bugger that were feeding on the nymphs below the surface. If fished near the bottom with a slightly jerky retrieve, the woolly bugger looks enough like a crayfish to generate strikes from large bass, pike, and trout, as well as other game fish such as white perch. In our lakes, we also get schools of landlocked alewives disturbing the surface while spawning in relatively shallow (less than about 25 feet) coves. Often these schools are being chased by larger fish and you will see occasional large splashes as a bass or brown trout picks one off. For this situation I like to use one of my flyrods rigged with a White Zonker, a streamer that nicely mimics the landlocked alewives in the lake.

It's usually easy to catch several nice bass or white perch under these conditions. A spinning rod (I prefer an ultralight) rigged with almost anything silver, such as a small jerk bait (such as a Rapala), Mepps spinner, or Weeping Willow spoon is also quite effective. I recently had my ultralight rod and 4-pound test line severely tested by a big pike (32", over 8 pounds) that hit a small Weeping Willow spoon while chasing alewives. Luckily it was hooked at the tip of the jaw and I managed to land the fish after about a 15 or 20-minute battle despite not having wire leader. а

By the time this article is published, the water temperatures will be over 70°F in the lakes and the bass will be in the shallows either sitting on their own beds or chasing the sunfish on theirs. It is a fun time for fly fishermen to catch a lot of fish on streamer flies or surface poppers, especially at dawn or dusk. Spinning gear also works well with surface lures, especially at dusk. It can be a great time to teach a youngster how to fish because the action is fast. Recently, Scott Finlay was teaching his two-year old grandson Kade the joys of fishing from the end of his dock in Great Pond. On his second cast (EVER), Kade hooked a nice smallmouth bass that he reeled in with a bit of help from his grandfather. Kade is now thoroughly "hooked on fishing" and is constantly talking about going fishing again.

Every spring I act as a "Fish Friends" mentor for the Atlantic Salmon Federation (ASF). I work with several schools (and the 7-Lakes Alliance) to help students raise Atlantic Salmon fry in refrigerated tanks in the classroom from eggs we receive from





Call of the Loon

Did some duck just spear our loon with an extra leg? Did our loon suffer a collision with a boat or just an angry mate? Is he/she merely waving to us as we float by? Or is this just another example of strange but normal loon behavior? Yes, it is very normal and is called the "Foot Waggle"!

According to the loon experts at New Hampshire's Loon Preservation Committee, "the Foot Waggle is a behavior in which loons raise one foot above the water and shake it vigorously. There are many theories as to its function—it could be a comfort movement used when loons need to stretch, it could be used to help loons reduce their body temperatures, or it could have another purpose that we are not yet aware of."



the National Hatchery at Green Lake in Ellsworth. The students study salmon life cycles and migrations and the fish are eventually stocked into the Bond Brook in Augusta to help restore this Federally-listed endangered species. This year was a difficult year with some of the schools teaching virtually, some hybrid, and some in person. 7-Lakes Alliance CEO, Laura Rose Day, Amy Soper (7-Lakes Staff), and I worked with Dr. Chris Maloney's science classes from the Maine Arts Academy to stock the fry after carefully equilibrating the temperatures and pH between the cooler and the brook. This is a great program and gets young people (and their parents) excited about these critically important fish. Maine is the only U.S. State with reproducing native Atlantic salmon and is trying to restore these once thriving fisheries.

As COVID-19 travel restrictions are being

– Conservation Too –

Those "Ditches" We Call Driveways!

– How to Manage Them

By Dale Finseth It's now the beginning of the summer season, i.e. it is mid-June. As part of our focus on Nonpoint Source or NPS pollution I'll discuss gravel roads. Here in Maine, and particularly in and around our lakes and ponds, we frequently need to travel on and frequently are responsible for a gravel camp road or our own gravel driveway. Those road surfaces often collect and direct runoff into our lakes,

ponds, streams and wetlands. Much of our conservation work and the work of various Youth Conservation Corps, Road Associations and watershed groups will focus on gravel road work. Gravel road erosion is a major source of sediment into our lakes and that sediment carries phosphorus in addition to other toxins like road salt, oil and the like. Gravel roads and improving the way those gravel roads function is an excellent way to help protect water quality. Given all the use those roads get during the summer an improved road both costs less money over time and makes for a much better "mud season". Even at the beginning of the summer season, many roads that did NOT receive a 'spring upgrade' are showing problems. Potholes have appeared, ruts have developed in the tire lanes, ditches may NOT be directing runoff into the woods and other vegetated areas. Instead, the roadway, culverts, and ditches are all working together in order to direct stormwater and the sediment into the lake. The Kennebec SWCD focusses on Gravel Road Management/Maintenance Plans as a means to provide landowners a better understanding of how their road impacts water quality and how to manage its maintenance to minimize that impact. A good Road Plan also provides the landowners with information to better budget the resources they devote to their shared roadway. Those resources not only include the dues paid by landowners, but the volunteer work to maintain it. A better maintained road can save a property from damage caused by stormwater leaving the roadway and damaging the

individual's property. It is important for people to better understand how the road "works". Given the Road Plans written in the past few years. feedback is good. People appreciate the advantage of having a long range plan to protect the investment they have already made in their gravel road access.

While the Road Plan is usually for the "shared" road which is the responsibility of the property owners, many of the recommendations and Best Management Practices can easily be modified to help the individual camp owners better manage their own driveway. We do NOT want to see these gravel roads simply become a means to transfer silt and phosphorus filled conduits to our waterways. Intercepting that stormwater is an excellent way to help protect water quality.

...And with the improved attention to long term maintenance they can expect better long term water quality. Definitely a "win, win" situation.

Remember, there is a lot to do in order to protect water quality.



The Dams Keeper Report

As of this writing, we are happy to report that, with the exception of Messalonskee and Salmon Ponds, our ponds are still in great shape. Great Pond's Village dam is currently 0.84" above full pond with both gates still completely closed. Again, at basically 1" above full, the water is now flowing over the top of the spillway. Long Pond's Wings Mill dam is 1.56", also above full pond with both gates also completely shut down. Salmon/McGrath is now 1.8" below full pond with its single gate opened just the mandated 1 cfs. flow. Our neighbors on Messalonskee are down 4.08" below full which is representative of both this dry period and the fact that Essex Hydro uses the Oakland Dam to provide us with electricity. Although we are in another drought, the forecast has just been revised from a dismal 26% lack of precipitation up to now 16% which is good news for our farmers, wells, gardens and of course, our lakes. We'll take what we can get!

We are tentatively going to begin our second and final year of the Wings Mill Dam remedia-

The Overstory by Richard Powers

Summertime in the Belgrades


This novel about trees was the winner of the ▲ National Book Award in 2018. What could be better for a Belgrade Community Read than a gripping story of scientists, some fictitious and others for real, working to preserve ancient forests and their necessary health to our daily lives? Doesn't everyone feel better after a walk in the woods?

When I first saw this 502 page tome, I thought what a crazy story this has to be to hold my attention. At our monthly ZOOM group I mentioned that I may skip some chapters. The chapter about the computer game designer was one that did not seem to be my preference, but I was encouraged by friends at the monthly book discussion to read on and do not skip.


Good advice. By the time I reached the last chapter on Seeds, I was hooked for sure by Richard Powers' power with words. I slowed down and read and reread pages because I did not want this in-depth tale about trees to end. It was like sitting by the lake surrounded by hemlocks and birches. The daily diet of trees is necessary in my life. I was consumed by the author's

tale of scientists dedicated to preserve the few ancient growths left.

was profound for me to read. Birch trees surround us in Belgrade. Richard Powers shares early on in this convoluted tale that the name "birch" has its root in book. Makes sense to me.

Chapters about jail time were ones I was tempted to skip, but no, I read on and on. "Through the armored arch behind the checkpoint, a cell-subtended hallway disappears lengthwise down an optical illusion of forever". Now, that is a description of perspective if I ever read one: and I read on.

One tree expert was a failed actuarial scientist. Multiple exams failed when several attempts are allowed to achieve the profession. That really caught my interest because my dad was an actuary and few people can define the profession. This author did it for me. "It's the science of replacing an entire human life with its cash value". The actuary formulates pension plans based on mortality tables, the probability of future life. I am a retired teacher and enjoy a monthly pension after working in the classroom for thirty years.

Another scientist travels from "Las Vegas, capital of clueless sinners, toward Salt Lake, capital of cunning saints". How funny is that description of two US cities? Back roads taken and demonstrations to prevent tree removal are related.

Crimes committed and jail time with many secrets kept to protect others. Just the fact that the word tree comes from the same root word as truth Family treasures, wood art work and a flip book of tree photos covering decades of sprawling growth buried and retrieved years later.

> Childhood memories of climbing our backyard mimosa tree with my younger brother returned when I read "Adam climbs up into his maple as high as he can and doesn't come down until dinner...It gives him bitter comfort to gaze over the neighborhood's roofs and know how much better life is above ground level". 


