FIVE HUNDRED U. S. TROOPS REPORTED KILLED BY THE INDIANS.—Chicago Nov. 10. Mr. Williamson, correspondent of the St. Pauls Times, writing from Payson on the 20th, says that a report had reached there that 500 U. S. troops, supposed to be a detachment of the Utah expedition, had been attacked and killed by a large party of Teosote Indians, near the Missouri river. Mr. Williamson believes this report.

YANKEE LABORERS AT FIFTY CENTS PER DAY. The Hartford Times of Nov. 7 prints the following:—"It has been found necessary for the officers at the railroad depot in Anytown street to reduce the pay of the workmen on the wood trains 20 per cent., and the laborers were offered yesterday 50 cents a day. A large force of them—Irishmen, all—were ready to go to work at the old rates, but they refused to submit to the 20 per cent. cut—and the result was that the 'wood train' yesterday was manned chiefly by Yankees, who were willing to earn half a dollar rather than be idle and earn nothing. To day the wood train was manned up entirely of Irishmen, most of them mechanics, and a few laborers, who have the good sense to take a job at half a dollar, rather than do nothing."

NEW YORK TROUBLES. New York, Nov. 10. There were large gatherings of idle laborers to-day in Tompkins Square and the City Hall Park, but no organized attempts at violence were made. The police, however, at the latter place, were promptly suppressed by the police, and one or two incendiary speakers arrested. A squad of 150 policemen were on guard at the City Hall—There was a detachment of U. S. troops to guard against any attempt upon the subterranean or banks. Gen. Scott and aid were present, and had an interview with the collector. The Mayor was generally pretty severely denounced by the mob in the Park, and the individual who attempted to defend him got handled roughly.

Damages by Freshets. ROCHESTER, Nov. 10. The heavy rains of the past two days have caused great damage in this vicinity and further up the Genesee valley. At and within two miles of Danville, 8 bridges were carried away last night. The Genesee river is now quite as high as it was during the flood last spring, and the water is still rising.

The Central Railroad track was last night, much damaged by the flood. Numerous culverts on both roads between this place and Syracuse were washed away, and the track is now inundated in many places. No trains passed this place and Syracuse to-day.

WILLIAMSBURG, Nov. 10. The Susquehanna river at this point has risen 10 feet, and is still rising. The water in the river here has overflowed the Erie Railroad bridge, and it is feared that it will be carried away.

The track at Corning is washed away, and the place abandoned. A number of buildings here were washed away.

ALBANY, Nov. 10. Two bad breaks have occurred in the canal near Palmyra and Newark; several feet of water have leaked out, and it will take five days to repair the damage.

Correspondence of the New York Journal of Commerce.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31. I learn that at a Cabinet meeting held on Thursday, the subject of Gov. Walker's proclamation, excluding the spurious votes of the Oxford district, and awarding the majority to the Free State candidate, and also giving certificates of election, and thus assuring to the Free State party a majority in the territorial legislature, was discussed, and that they came to the conclusion that, therein, he transcended his powers.—He had no specific instructions on this subject, but it is held that he was bound to leave to the Legislature the decision of the equality of the returns of their own members.

It was not determined, however, at this meeting to remove Governor Walker and Secretary Stanton but to ensure or reprimand him. Another Cabinet meeting is to be held on the subject. The Gov. was telegraphed to return for the purpose of attending it, and he is expected here to-night.

The question raised is a very nice one.—Some are of the opinion that the body is always constituted judges of the election and returns of their own members. He might, therefore, have legally given the certificate of election to the pre-qualified candidate, leaving it to the Legislature to oust them. But he was under a pledge to the people to see that they had a fair election, and had he countenanced the fraud, he would not have violated his own pledge, but that of President Buchanan also.

Gov. Walker will not be dismissed, but may be so reprimanded as to be forced to resign.

It is settled that Kansas will be a free State, but the Kansas question, as it involves political issues, is by no means settled. It will be found to be a very lively question in the coming Congress. The southern members will have positions upon it.
