

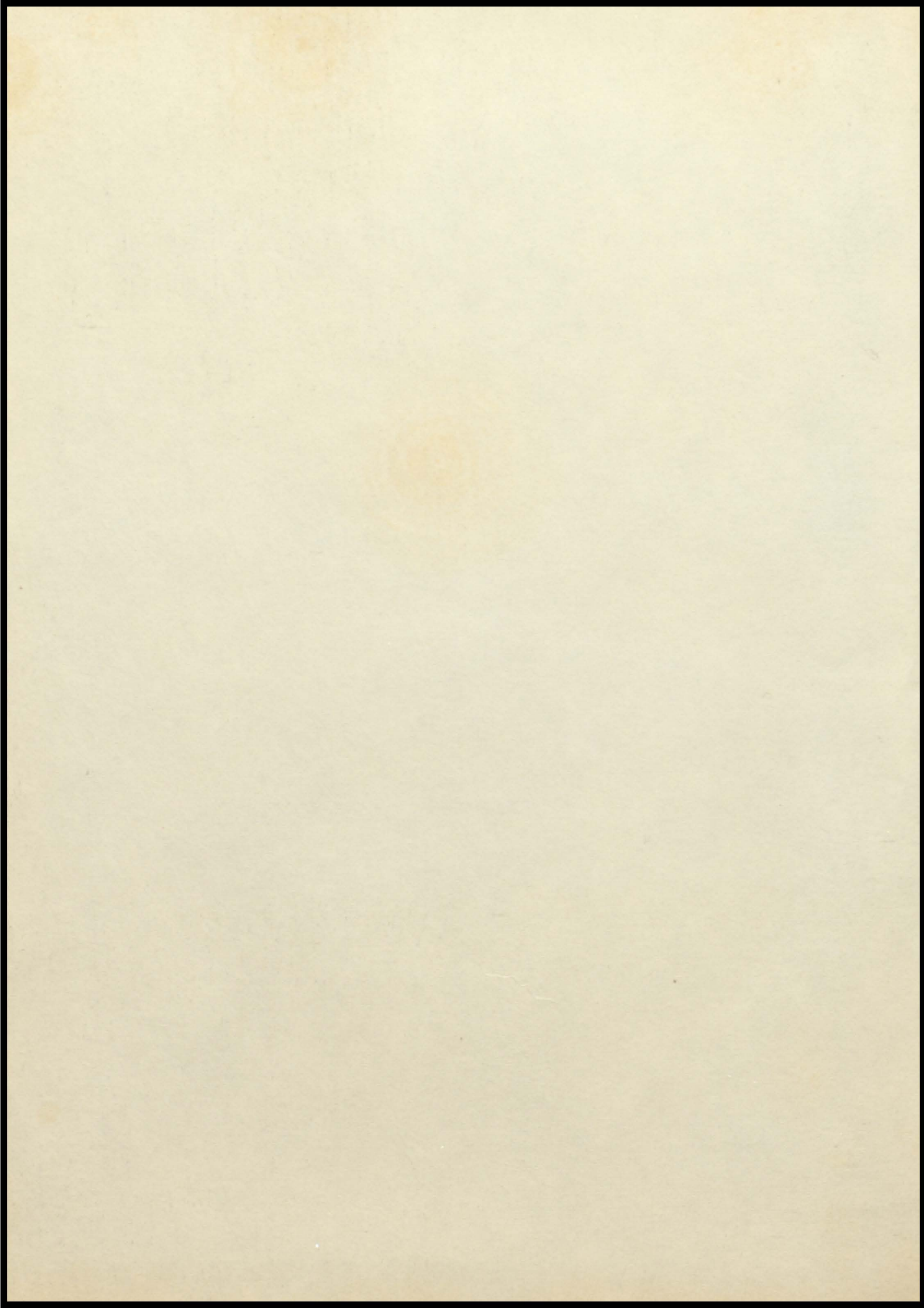

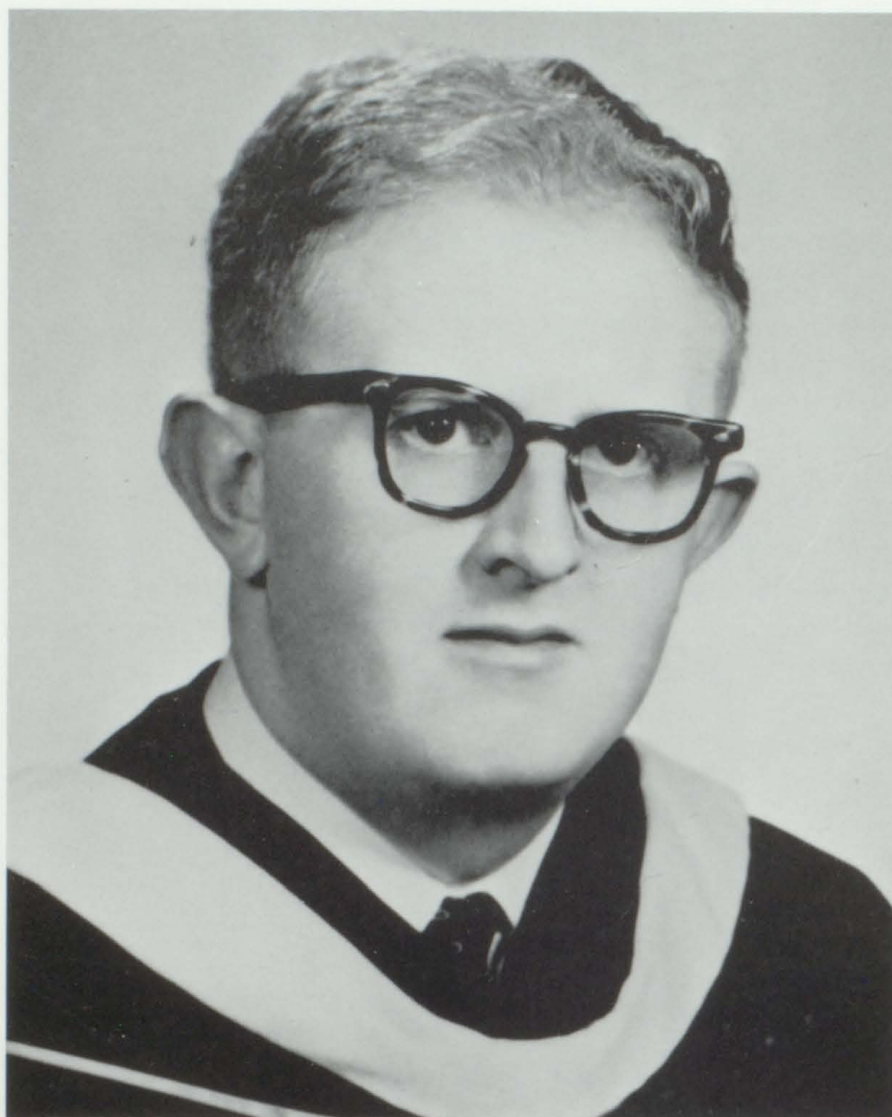

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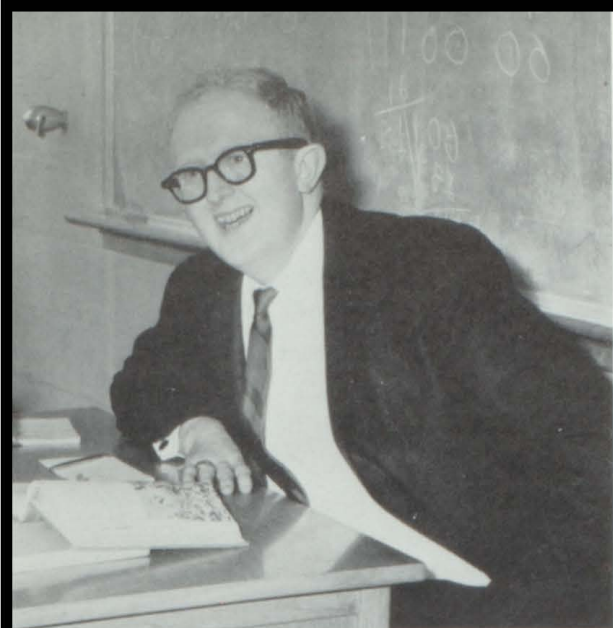

What makes a man is difficult to say—what made Almond S. Gushee a unique man among men is even more so. Perhaps it was a certain strength of will coupled with that keen mind and ready smile.

"A. Stephen Gushee," as he was wont to sign himself, left certain indelible memories with those whom his life touched. His was the same hearty laugh as he was presented with a season ticket to "Little Mary Sunshine" by the 1962 Washington Club, or as he was bravely asserting "We're gonna win tonight!," or plugging the Confetti Ball.

Others will remember those lips firmly compressed and the stern rebuke for a badly done translation or a "disgraceful" paper. Many will recall that he always gave a student "More than he deserved anyway."

Almond Gushee's dignity as a man and sincerity as a person did something almost miraculous for each person he knew. He was a fine teacher with a brilliant future. His was a depth of *understanding* often rare in his profession.

Of the prudent little maxims he frequently had to offer, none is more appropriate for this time than his typical injunction to "Just be yourself." This was a part of what he asked for and received. He is still offering us that advice.

This was a man who will remain in our hearts forever.

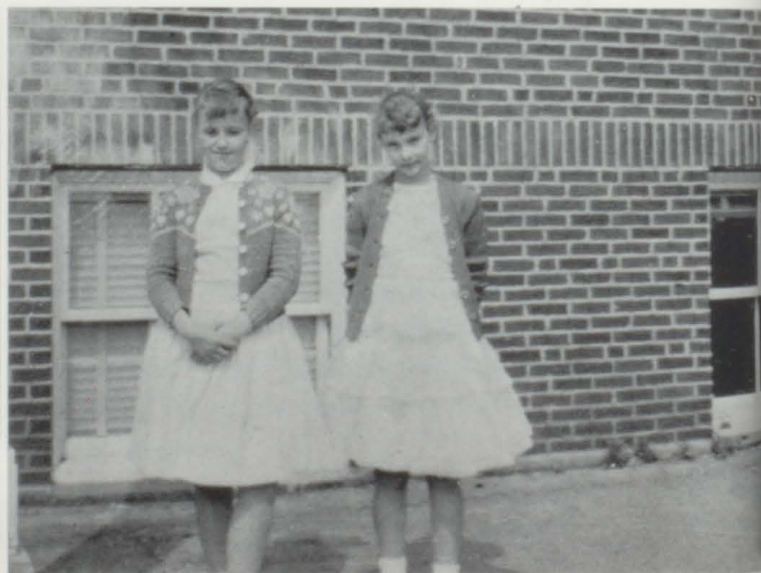
The Class of '66

Off the Glass Boards

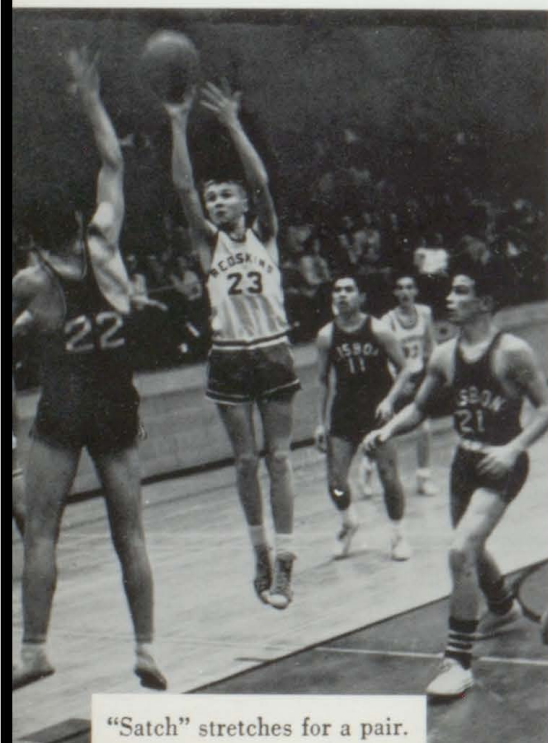

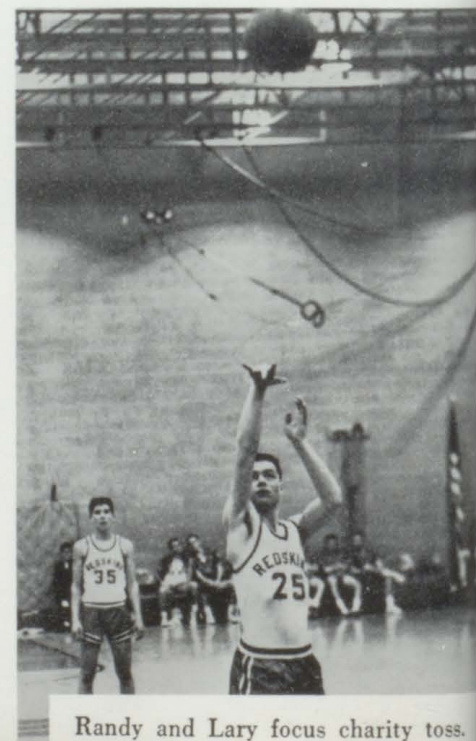

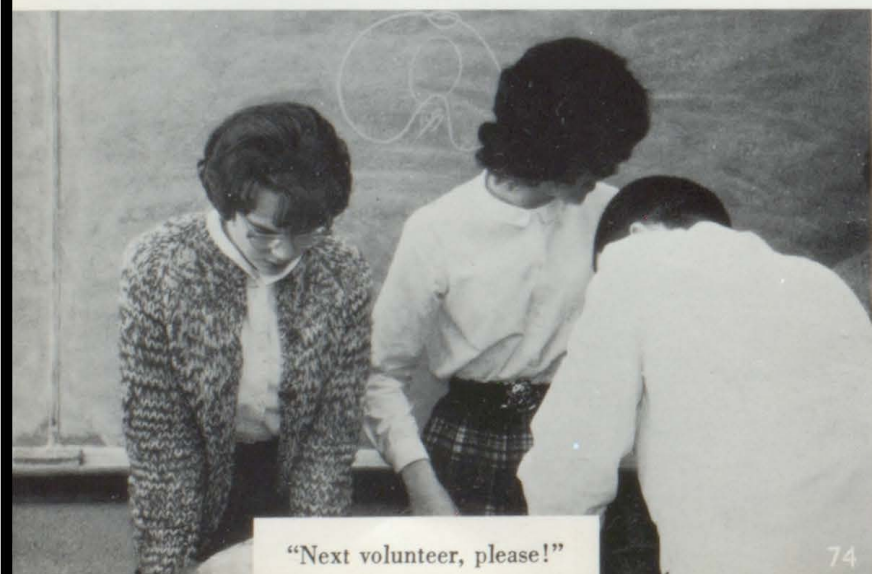
Medical Club

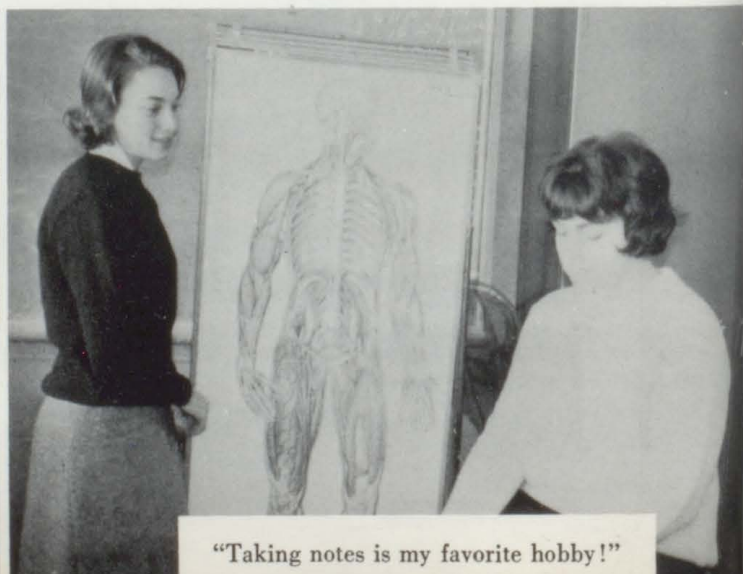

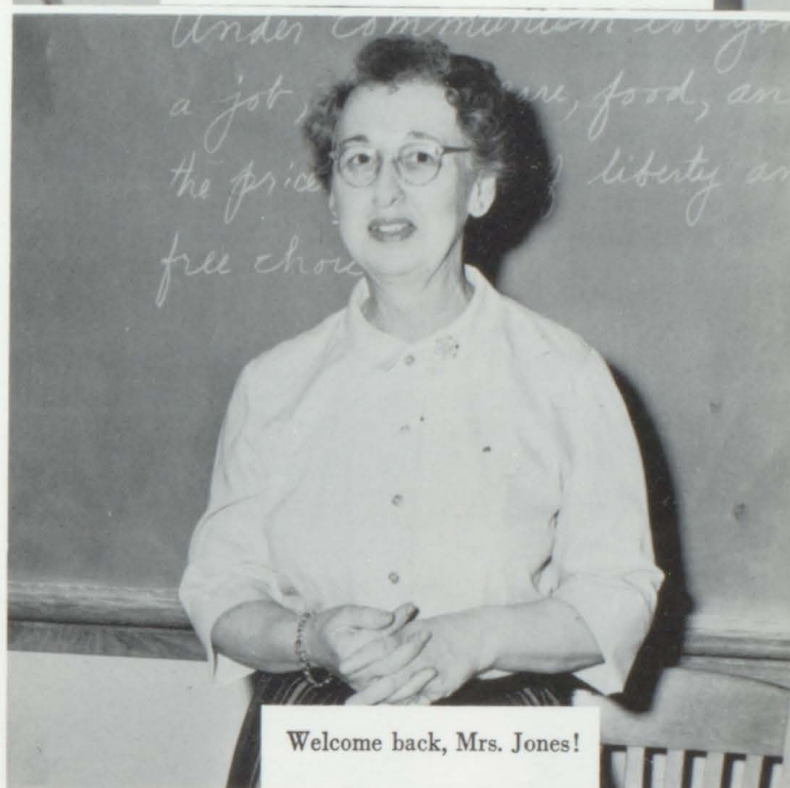
MAY—May seems to be a very lazy month—not very many activities going on. We did have a May Dance, though.
