Physical Education

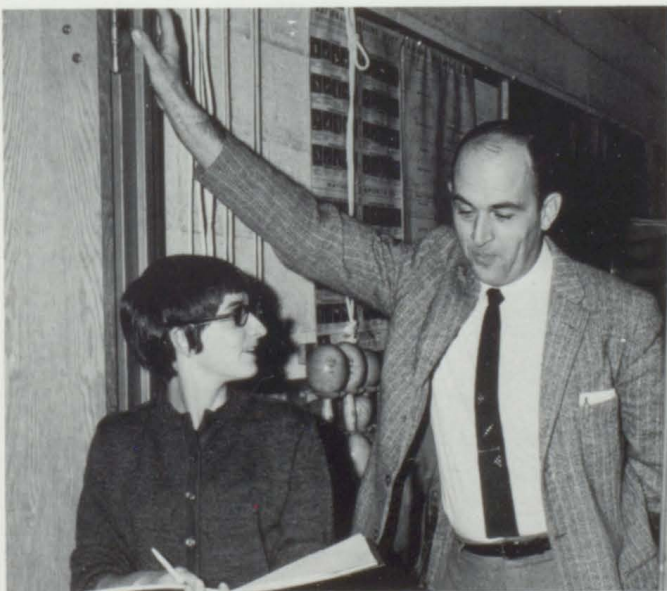
Mr. Richard Plummer, who is the boys' physical education and health instructor, is busy year-round as varsity basketball and soccer coach and assistant baseball coach.

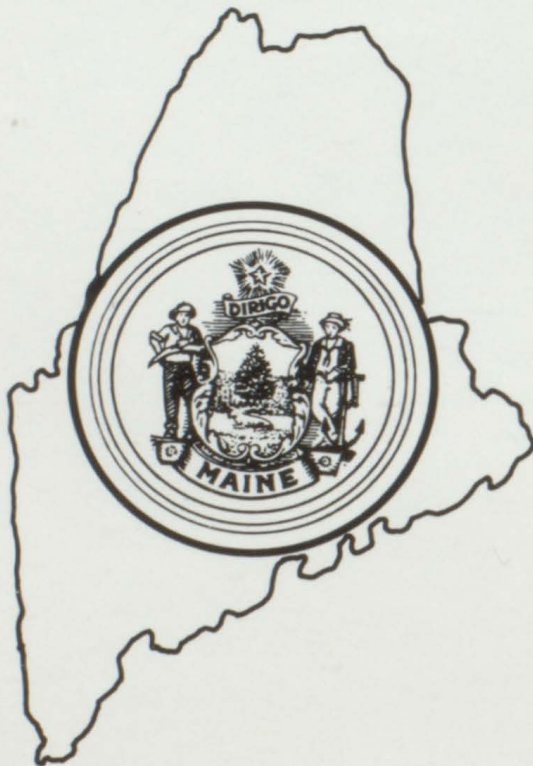

National Honor Society

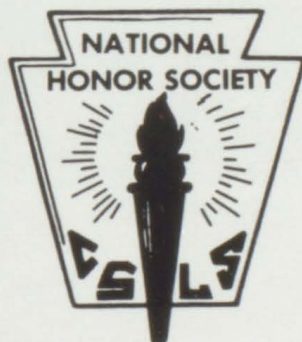

English: Foundation of Understanding

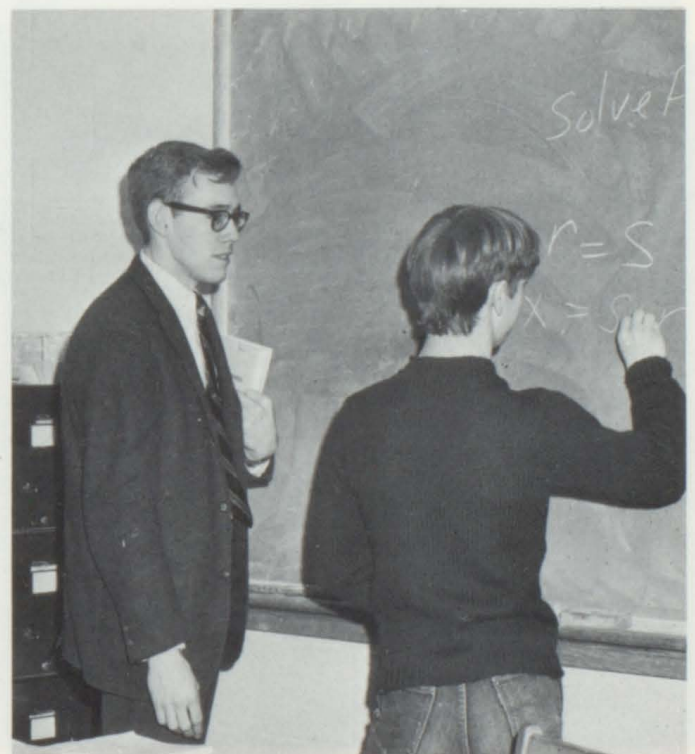
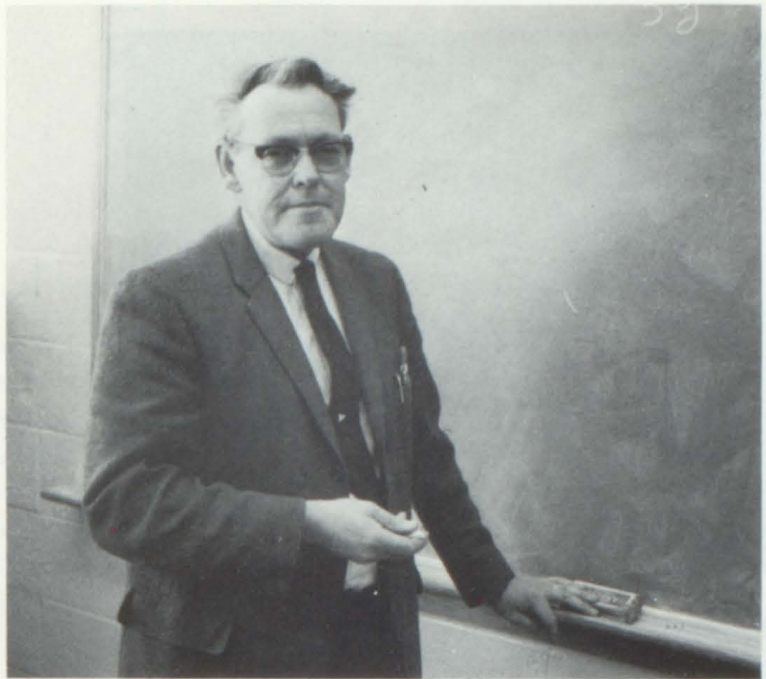

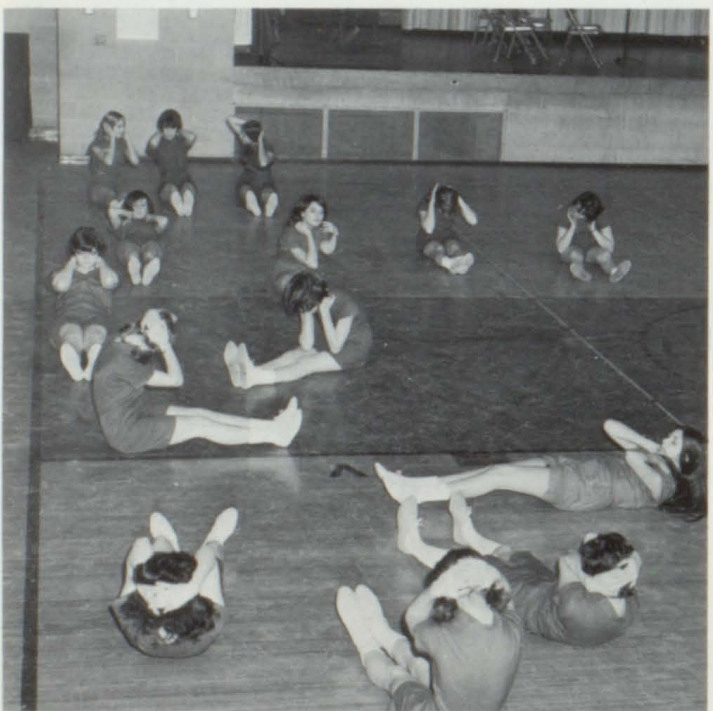




Physical Education

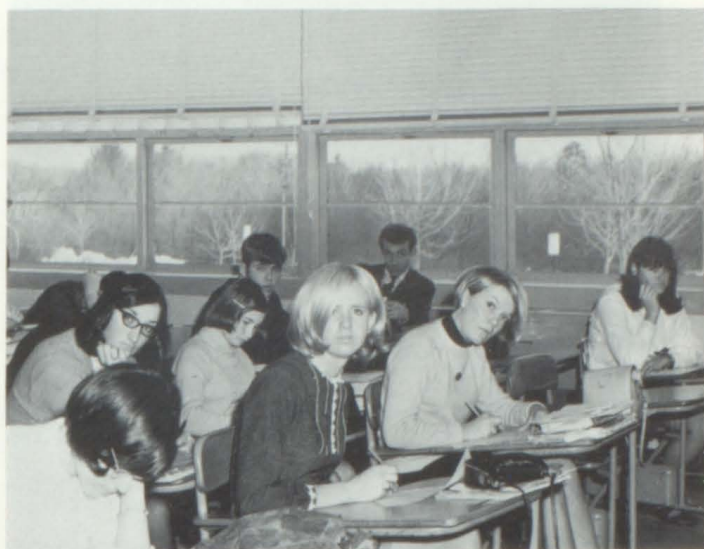
Physical Education classes are designed to teach students the fundamentals of sports and exercises. Students have an opportunity to further develop these skills as members of athletic teams.

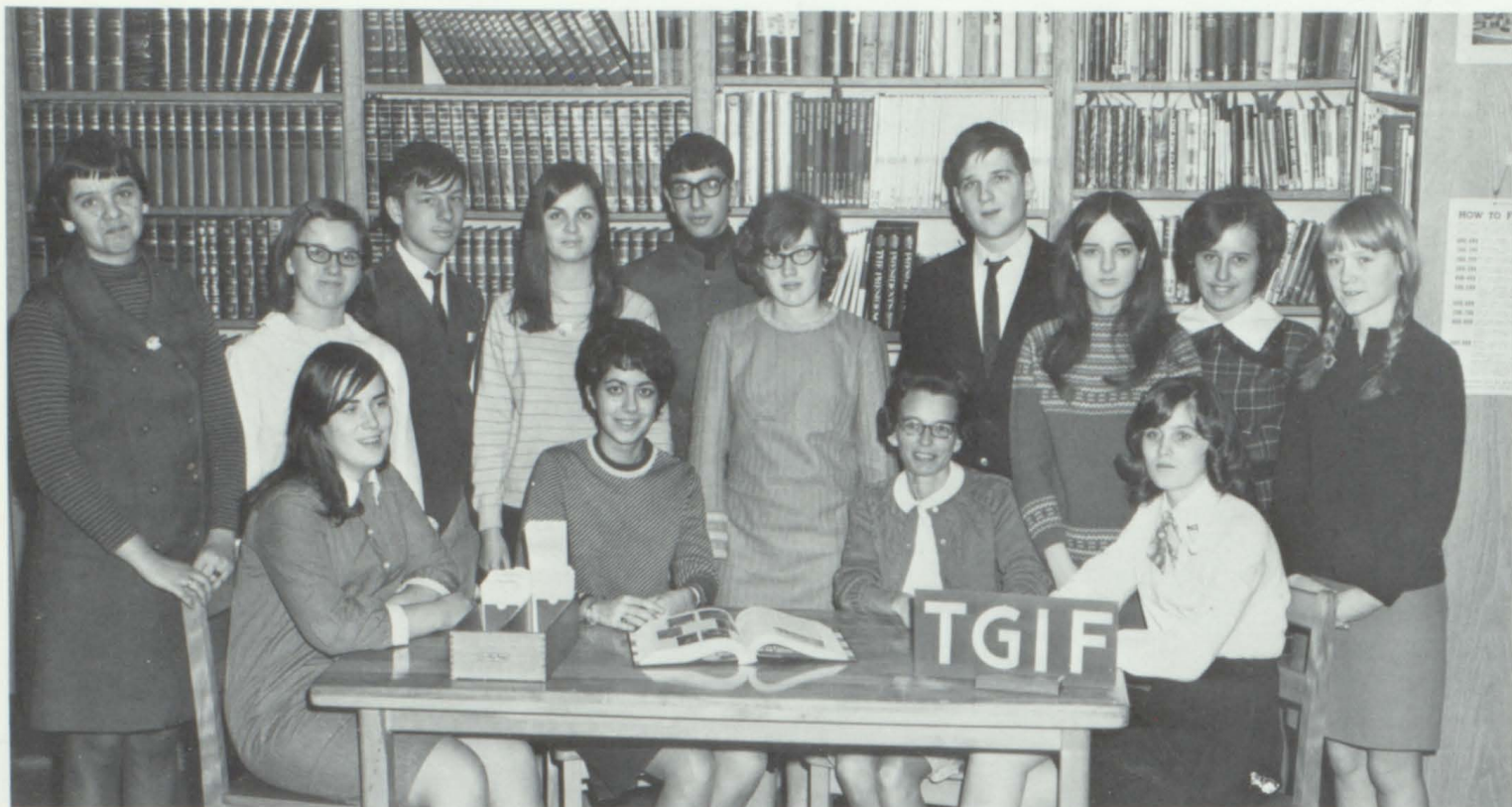

Library Builds New Goals

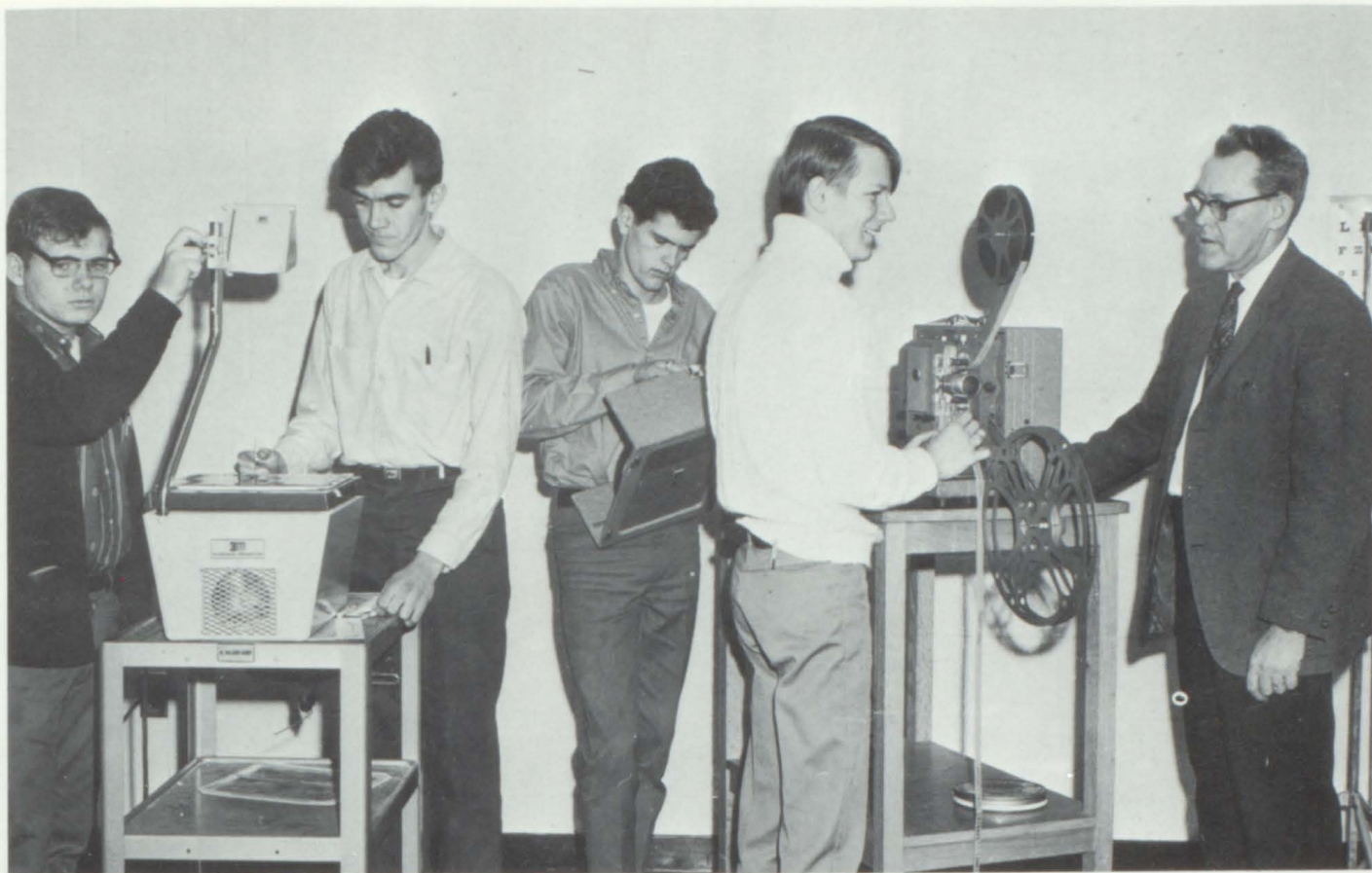
