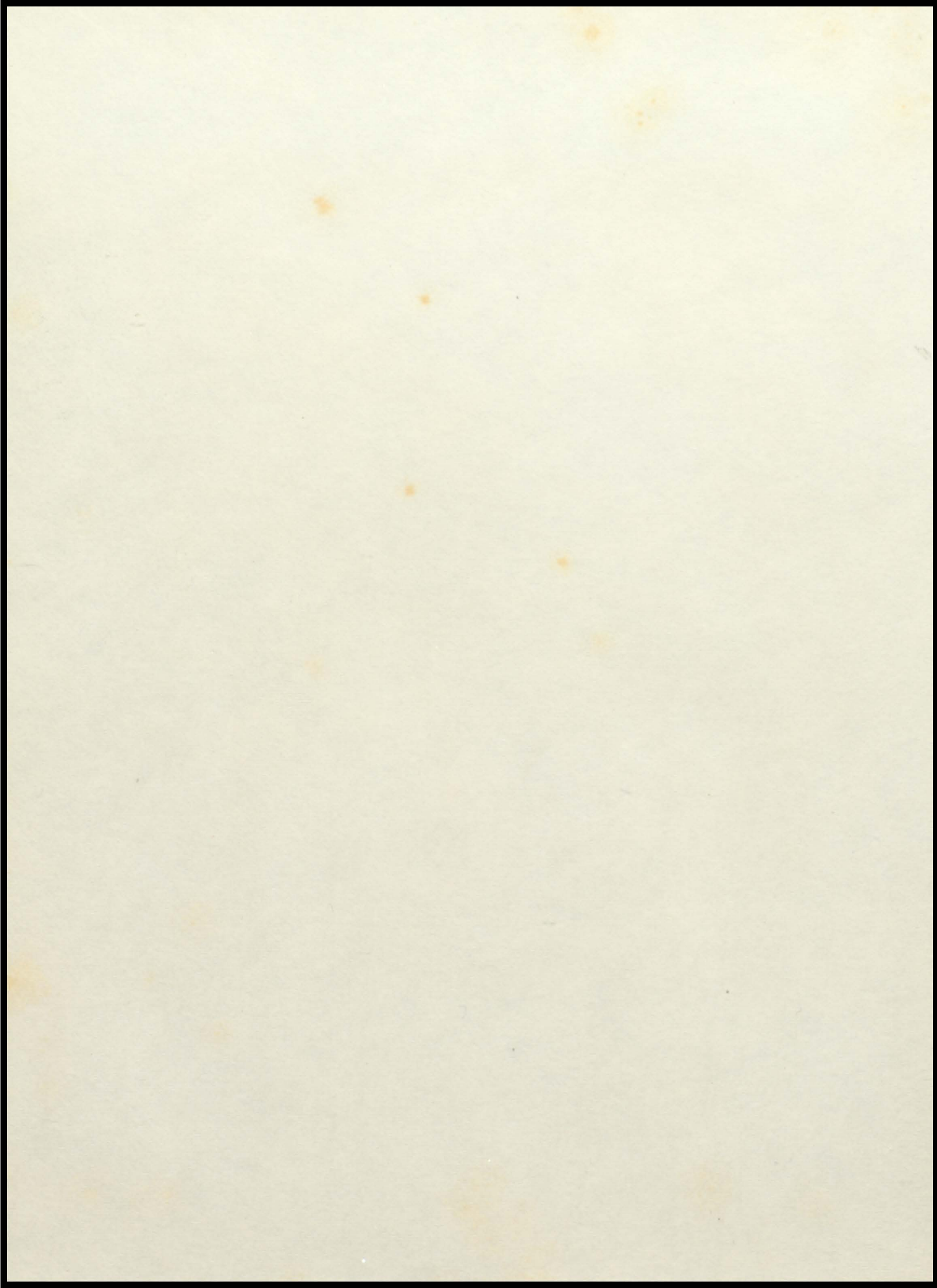

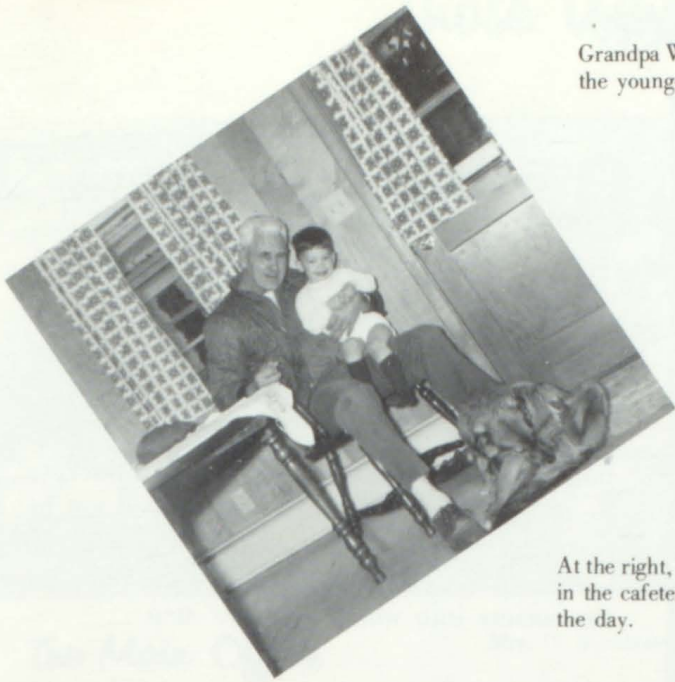

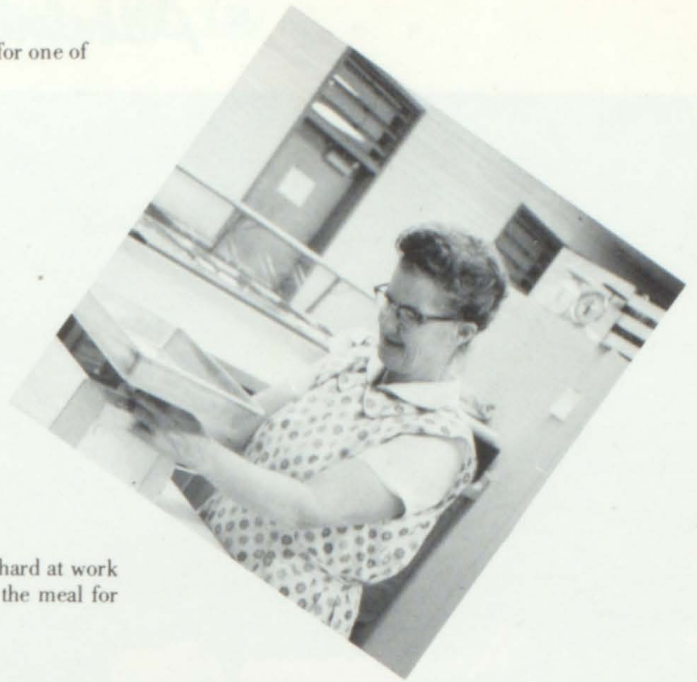
Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Wood

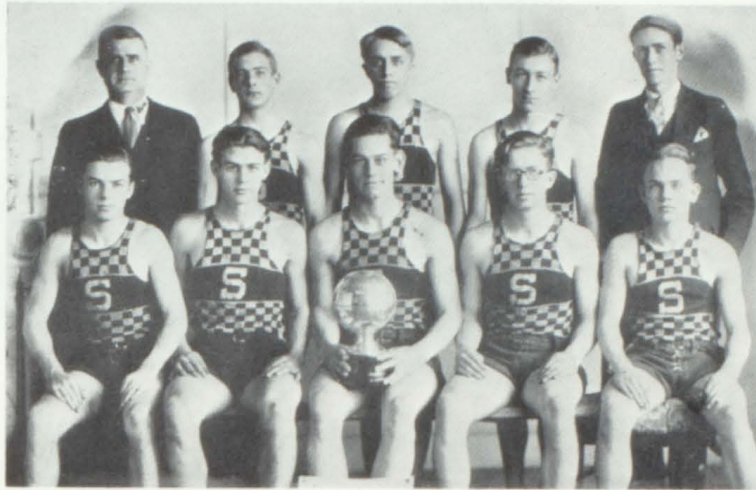

Looking Back to Yesteryear at SHS

We know little about our school's development into the modern institution which stands atop Oak Hill today. Let us look back at the original Scarborough High School.

In 1896, Scarborough School System served fewer children than attend the high school today. Attendance that year was nineteen for the fall term and twenty-two for the spring term. The high school operated on a \$500 budget, and the principal was paid \$20 a week! Eight years later, in 1904, Scarborough High's graduating class consisted of one young lady, who was hired as an elementary teacher the fall of that same year for \$7 a week. Students at the high school that year were offered courses in government, geology, chemistry, literature, Cicero, and algebra; evidently the curriculum has not changed very much! High school students attended classes at the old Town Office at Black Point, and not until the Elwood G. Bessey School was built in 1926 were the high school grades housed in a separate building from the lower grades.

In his annual report in 1895, Supervisor of Schools, J. A. Snow made the statment, "Today we have a high school in the Town of Scarborough, of which all wise and conscientious citizens may well be proud." Seventy-five years later, Mr. Snow's evaluation of Scarborough High School still holds true for the modern school we attend in 1970.

New Projects for Library Staff

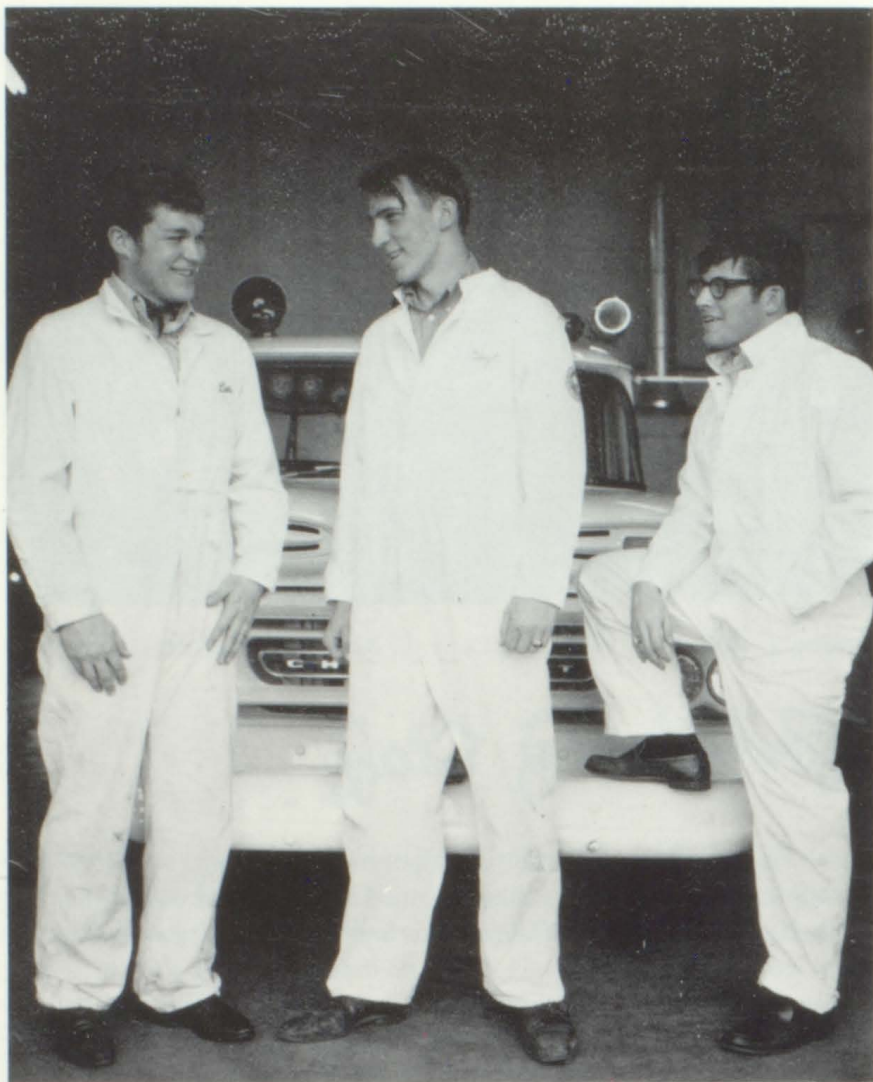

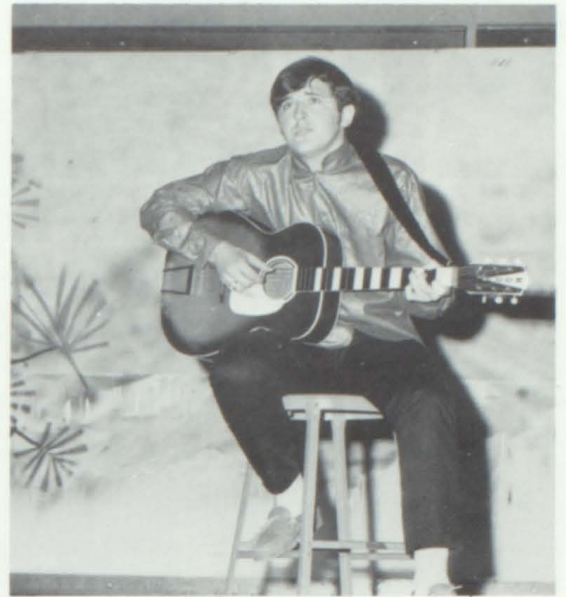

Science Club

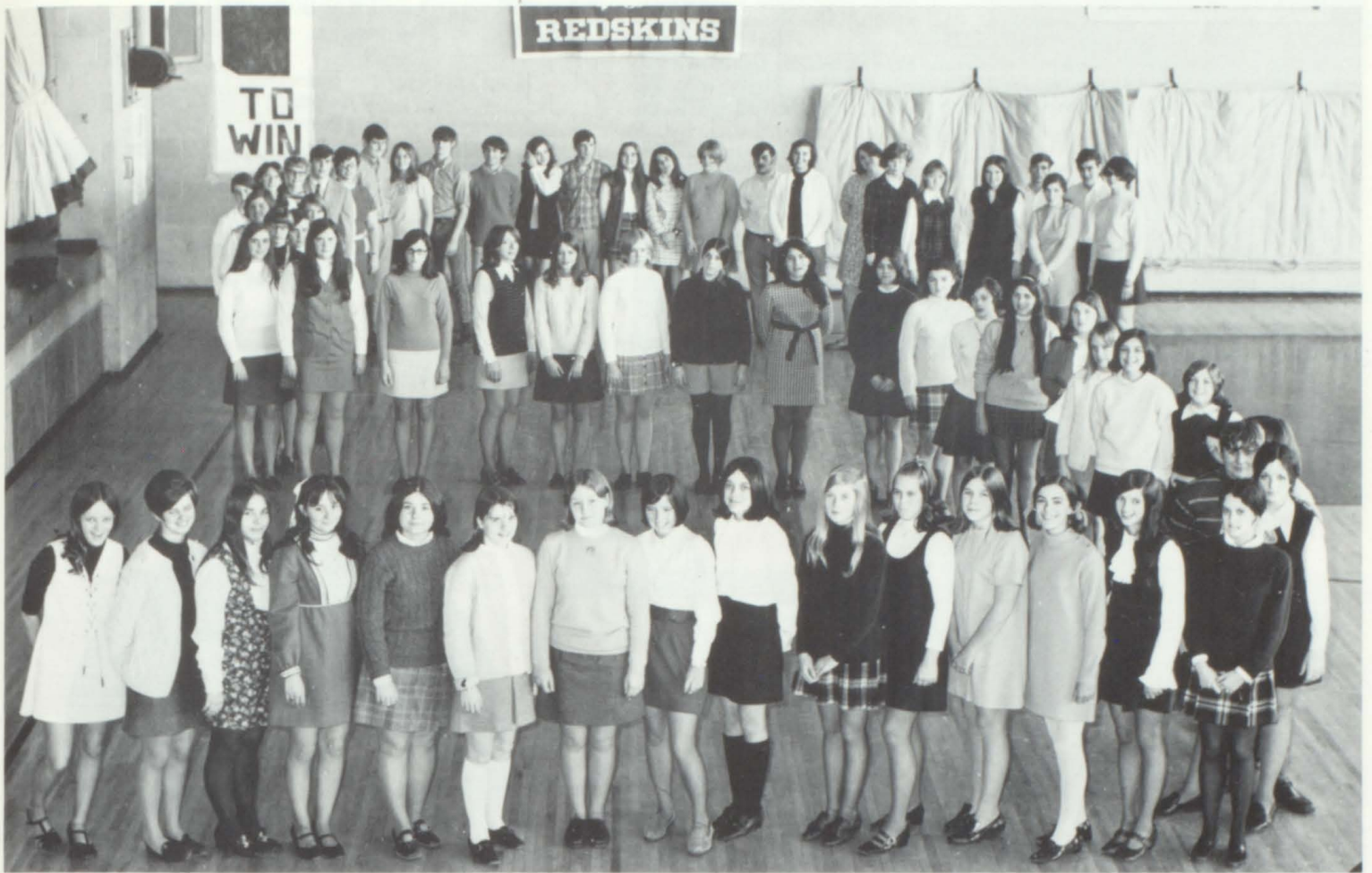
