Washington, Jan. 6.

SENATE. Messrs. Hunter and Toombs asked, but the Senate refused, to excuse them from serving on the French spoliation bill Committee.

The Senate then proceeded to the consideration of Mr. Crittenden's resolution in favor of increasing the duties on imports and substituting foreign valuation.

Mr. Crittenden spoke as to the necessity for the adoption of such a measure. He did not believe that the present law would produce an adequate amount for the support of the government. An increase of 5 per cent on woolen and cotton, would be sufficient to afford all necessary protection.

Mr. Pugh presented a petition from the citizens of Portsmouth, Ohio, praying for a charter for a National Bank for thirty years, with a capital of \$600,000, and an increase of the tariff.

After the transaction of some further business, of no special importance, the Senate adjourned.

HOUSE. Mr. J. Glancy Jones, from the Committee on Ways and Means, reported the appropriation for the support of the military Academy at West Point.

Mr. Wadsworth, of Ill., from the committee on Commerce, reported a bill to further amend the act providing for the better security of the lives of passengers on board steam vessels. Its consideration was postponed till the first Tuesday in February.

The House then passed into Committee on the President's message.

Mr. Sickles spoke at considerable length on the Central American question.

Mr. Bliss, of Ohio, spoke against the Central American question.

Mr. Haskins, of New York, followed in remarks on the Central American question. Messrs. Cockran, Stephens and Boock joined in the debate, at the conclusion of which the Committee rose and the House adjourned.

Washington, Jan. 7.

SENATE. Mr. Hammond, of S. C., in place of Mr. Butler, deceased, took his seat.

Mr. Seward presented a petition from the citizens of Canada, N. Y., praying for the adoption of some measures by which the people of the north may co-operate with the people of the south, for the extinguishing of slavery by making fair and honorable compensations to slave owners for the full value of their slaves. The petition was ordered to lie on the table.

On motion of Mr. King, a resolution was adopted, requesting the President to furnish, if compatible with the public interest, copies of the correspondence and despatches from our Ministers at the courts of England and France, and other powers, on the subject of the danger to emigrants, arising from contracting with irresponsible parties for their inland passage.

The President sent in his message in response to the call for information relative to Central America. While he says that Com. Paulding committed a great error in arresting Gen. Walker, he thinks it is quite evident that he (Paulding) was actuated by patriotic motives, and a desire to promote the interests and vindicate the honor of our country. Nicaragua sustained no injury by the act, but was benefited. She alone would have the right to complain; but he, (the President) was quite certain that she would never exercise that right.

A warm and long debate followed, in which Messrs. Seward, Douglas and Pugh sustained the President's views.

Messrs. Davis, Crittenden, Brown, Pugh, Toombs and Douglas, took the opposite side.

The message was referred to the Committee on Foreign Relations.

The Senate then went into executive session, and on opening the doors, adjourned.

HOUSE. A Select Committee was appointed to inquire into the circumstances attending the sale of the Fort Snelling reservation. It consisted of Messrs. Morrill, of Ill.; Morrill, of Maine; and Pettit.

To-morrow being the anniversary of the battle of New Orleans, it was agreed that when the House adjourned, it be till Monday.

The House then went into a Committee of the Whole on the President's message.

Mr. Washburn, of Maine, made a speech to show the Messrs. Douglas and Cass, and other prominent statesmen who were instrumental in the passage of the Kansas Nebraska bill, claimed that the doctrine of popular sovereignty gave the people of the Territories the right to legislate on all their domestic institutions, while the President maintained that the slavery question only was to be submitted for their judgment.

Mr. Washburn argued that the President had the right to legislate on slavery in the territories, and that the administration never intended the people of Kansas should decide that question for themselves. In the course of his remarks, he reviewed and condemned the Lecompton process, which he said was founded on fraud and injustice.

The committee then rose, and the House adjourned till Monday.

FROM WASHINGTON.

Washington, Jan. 9.

From advice received today, it appears that the Mormons will not retreat from Utah as was expected by the government; but will fight it out where they are. This insures us bloody war in the spring, the following orders will be issued from the headquarters of the army.

Head Quarters of the Army, New York, Jan. 8, 1858.

The General in Chief, with the approbation of the War Department, directs the following movements.

First. The army of Utah will be reinforced as soon as practicable by the 1st regiment of Cavalry 6th and 7th companies, and 7th regiment of Infantry, and light companies A and M of the 2d Artillery.

Second. Fort Smith, Washita, Arbuckle and Belknap, by the Red and Mississippi rivers, or transportation on the former river can be obtained without too great delay, otherwise Fort Smith is the first named river.

Third. The 4th regiment of Artillery men in Kansas will take post as follows: Head quarters with 2 companies at Fort Riley, the least Col with 4 companies at Fort Laramie, the Junior Major with 2 companies at Fort Leavenworth; the companies in each care to be distributed by the female, and the 4th regiment will be put on march for its several stations by the Commanding General of the Department of the West as soon as practicable.

Fourth. An officer of rank being necessary for Fort Kearney, the Junior Major of the 4th Artillery will at once proceed thither and assume command of the post.

Fifth. In due time further orders will be given for the march of reinforcements across plains, and preliminary measures will be commenced at once by several staff officers and departments concerned for preparing the troops and supplies for the movement.

Sixth. Measures will also be taken for filling up the regiments and companies to the maximum standard, and also to furnishing the arms of the other troops composing the army of Utah.

Seventh. The several Departments of the Staff will take prompt measures to secure the public property at the posts to be abandoned.
