PERCY L. KNIGHT, CLASS OF '38



Nerve center of our school—our library. Over two thousand volumes, a real working collection especially selected for student use. Important acquisitions of the present year include fifty volumes of the National Geographic, a gift of the Gotham family of Gorham, and a fine assortment of biography, manners, occupations, historical novels, and science books from the one hundred dollar gift of Miss Margaret Jewell, a four-drawer metal picture file, two card index files, two large book cases, and a magazine rack. A second work table provides accommodations for a daily average of forty students. We have assembled a very fine file of occupational material which is unusual for a school of our size. The money which made these improvements possible was more than half earned by the students.

The team played remarkably well all season and lost three heart-breaking extra inning games by one run. One of these games was with Falmouth, the league champion, on our field. Scarborough played a sparkling ball game, going the entire distance without an error. Going into the ninth inning it looked as if "Bob" Lilley had a no hitter, then Falmouth exploded for two hits and two runs. In the last half of the inning Scarborough's rally was cut short with only one run. The final score was in Falmouth's favor, 2-1.

Our last game of the season was a double header with Windham at Scarborough. Coach Hallett's boys again turned in a sterling performance as they played both games with only one error.


STATE MEET




