Golden Bucks baseball earns first state title

BANGOR — Taking down Lisbon 1-0 on Saturday, the Bucks finally won their first Class C baseball state championship in the school's long baseball history, and everyone within shouting distance of Mansfield Stadium immediately knew it. The celebrating continued with the victory ride down Bucksport's Main Street, a journey taken many times in the past by Bucksport's softball teams; but never by the baseball squad.

Ty Giberson pitched the winning game, giving the team a 20-1 record for the season.

The Bucks' victory was especially sweet for Josh Jackson as it capped off his first year as the head coach.

Edging out Lisbon also put an end to Lisbon's undefeated status, the only team in the state to do so well right up until the final game Saturday. The defeat left Lisbon with a 20-1 season total also.

The Bucks' victory did not come easily. From the first inning when Giberson gave up three walks and two strikeouts, the team rallied and went into the second inning leaving three Lisbon runners stranded.

A Giberson hit in the fourth bringing Jake Gutty home, yielded the sole run of the game.

Giberson had to leave the mound in the seventh, having thrown the maximum of 110-pitches limit. He departed with Lisbon runners on first and second and one out, but with having six strikeouts, five walks and five hits.

Cam Rich took over and got the last two outs.

It was a tough day for Lisbon. The team left 11 runners on base, eight of them in scoring positions.

GPMCT relocates

Bucksport, Maine — After almost a decade in leased space in a former home on U.S. Route 1, the headquarters of the Great Pond Mountain Conservation Trust (GPMCT) has moved to the Heyward House at 77 Main Street.

GPMCT manages the 5,000-acre Wildlands conservation area in East Orland, and several smaller properties, has moved into the office once used by Eric Woodbury for his law practice.

Jack MacBrayne, the not-for-profit group's vice president, didn't even need to look at the office before approving the latest lease, noting "I spent many hours in that room over the years getting my hair cut by Phil Davis when his bar-

ber shop was there."

The Federal style Phineas Heywood House was built in about 1824 and was probably the first brick building in Bucksport. It is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Great Pond Trust expects to establish limited, but regular office hours to be available to give out maps and information about the trust's preserves and mission.

The GPMCT briefly used office space at Brown Hall on Elm Street. The original lease on the U.S. Route 1 space was with Larry Wahl of Bucksport, who also owns the Heyward House.

RSU 25 repairs will cost millions

BUCKSPORT —

Renovation projects are expected to cost several million dollars over the next few years.

A professional engineering assessment of the local schools found slightly more than \$10 million worth of work that ought to be done, but the need to keep the rejuvenation effort affordable to the four member towns will require prioritizing the work over the next decade-or-so.

At the top of the list are major heating and ventilation projects at the Miles Lane, Bucksport High school and G.H. Jewett schools.

That part of the work involves two new huge boilers to replace units at the Miles Lane School which are said to be, "on their last legs"; and two more at the high school where the current heating units are approaching that point, according to Supt. of Schools James

Boothby.

The one million BTU generating units need to be ordered soon if they are to be ready for delivery by next summer, Boothby said.

The RSU official briefed the School Board on Tuesday and the school system's infrastructure committee last week. Both groups apparently are ready to support the idea once the various projects are prioritized based on their urgency and the final cost estimates.

To move ahead will require a district wide public meeting and vote, perhaps in late-July or early August, but no local referendum in each of the towns are legally required, Boothby said.

Boothby plans to spend much of the next few weeks working out the cost estimates and financing options, including seeking additional state money for some of the work.

RSU monitoring school lead levels

BUCKSPORT — After receiving state test results that show higher than permitted lead levels in some of the water drawn from school taps and fountains, the RSU has issued an advisory to students, staff and parents about the lead levels that were detected.

The testing for the Bucksport Middle School was completed on April 15 and the samples were sent to the A & L Laboratory, where they were received April 23. The lab performed testing on the water samples on June 3, and forwarded the results back to the RSU.

The Federal EPA action level for evidence of lead in the water is 15 parts per billion or greater. However in Maine the guideline for reme-

diation has been set at 4 parts per billion. Two of the ten sources of water used at the middle school for drinking or cooking did come back with a positive result.

The two locations identified above the 4 ppb threshold have been removed from service and will no longer be used as a potable water source until repairs can be made and subsequent tests are at or below 4 ppb.

PIPE PROBLEM — The drainage work at the athletic fields at the Bucksport Middle School have begun, but add plastic pipe to the supply chain dilemmas being experienced across the country. The project calls for lots of four-inch piping and initially some five-inch pipes. The only four-inch pipes that could be found are in Kennebunk, but the seller won't deliver them; perhaps because of the price of fuel. As a result, a truck is being sent to Kennebunk. As for the five-inch piping, forget about it. The engineers have ruled that more four-inch will do just fine.

MAJOR PROJECTS — The town's infrastructure committee will be focusing on three major projects when it meets at the Town Offices at 6 p.m. on July 14: Repair, or more

likely, replace the animal shelter off Central Street; make significant repairs to the old town-owned depot which houses the historical society's museum and deciding whether to install a small skateboard park on town-owned land next to the baseball field off Elm Street.

MAKING A SPLASH — As the municipal pool opens for another season, recreation officials reported the pool drew between 4,000 and 5,000 visitors last summer. Obviously that number includes a number of folks who returned multiple times throughout the 2021 season. This year the pool manager was able to recruit a full staff, allowing a full schedule. 





Redefining downtown

Earlier this month the town's code enforcement officer told the Planning Board he has fielded literally dozens of inquiries from people who wanted to open a business here, only to find the site they had in mind comes with zoning entanglements that at the least would long delay their plans and, in a number of cases, make them impossible.

We understand the need for good, orderly zoning, but in some cases the rules here border on the ludicrous.

For example, you can open types of businesses on one side of U.S. Route 1, but you can't put those same types on the other side of the highway. Also, the facades of businesses on the shoreland side have to appear to be residential even though the fully permitted use inside has to be commercial.

To permit a small restaurant to open on the shoreland side would require extensive reviews by the Planning Board and the Town Council, even though a McDonald's is but a few doors down the highway on the same side of the road. Does that make sense?

Meanwhile one side of Franklin Street is part of the village business district, while the other side is solely restricted to residential uses.

EDITORIALS The business use of buildings along Main Street is clear, at least until you drive or walk to the former mill property. You can use properties along Main Street for commercial and even residential uses, but once you cross MacDonald Street you'll have to go before the Planning Board to get its okay first.

Several members of the Planning Board this month were right in expressing opposition to spot zoning a single lot to accommodate a would-be business buyer or developer. They also were right to suggest town officials get out in front of the issue and suggest some zoning adjustments of districts that provide more space for businesses. Looking at the land along the river side of U.S. Route 1, the Masonic lodge side of Franklin and the odd mix of uses along Main Street between MacDonald Street and the credit union would be a great place to begin.

Let's get growing!

A few months ago a lot of folks were very enthused about putting in a community garden here. The town manager even found a possible spot for one; a seemingly ideal space next to the Gardner Commons apartments. Then, nothing.

It's now June and about to be July. If farmers were that mellow about the planting we'd all be eating stone soup in New England.

Supposedly using that site off Elm Street takes the sign-off from some faceless, nameless bureaucrat somewhere hidden away in some dank, windowless basement where such folks not only dwell but, like mushrooms, they thrive.

While we're hunting for this person with such awesome authority let's also find their colleague, the one that's holding up the demolition of a long-since condemned house on Mt. Olive Heights that the town has been vowing to demolish for years. (The town needs a bureaucrat's signature to get a clear title to the property so the lot can be cleared and sold to someone who will pay taxes on it.

If our town officials can't shake loose the required paperwork, let's give U.S. Senators Susan Collins or Angus King or U.S. Rep. Jared Golden a chance to root out two people with enough authority to get these tiny tasks done.

You did it!


Yes, the RSU 25 varsity baseball team now are the Class C state champions!

The Bucks scored their lone run in the 4th. With 1



Persons found to be in violation of any provision of the policy shall be subject to a fine of not less than fifty (\$50) and not more than five hundred dollars (\$500), plus court costs for any one offense.


