Council ponders spending needs

BUCKSPORT – The Bucksport Town Council soon will decide how to allocate some major sums, including, perhaps, for a new animal shelter.

That project could approach the council's spending limit of \$300,000. Projects costing more than that amount require a voter ratification referendum.

The councilors also will be divvying up some \$350,000 to bolster a variety of reserves for major purchases or projects. These range from \$2,500 for the emergency dispatch center's gear to \$120,000 for major highway department vehicle purchases.

Before the capital budget account items are prioritized, the council's infrastructure will review the animal shelter and the possible installation of a small skateboard park off Elm Street. All three projects will be on the agenda on July 14. The apparent preferred location for the shelter is a site behind the Town Garage on Central Street.

The town officials in the months ahead also will be design-

nating the use of some \$491,000 in federal Covid cash the town received last year. So far, only about \$29,000 of the original \$520,000 has been used to provide stipends to most of the town's public safety personnel.

The council also has access to bond financing or the panel can tap the town's fund balance account to help finance any major programs or purchases.

The councilors already have approved buying a \$180,000 plow truck during the fiscal year that begins July 1.

Also in the requested items list is a \$45,000 police cruiser, \$19,500 for more repairs to the old firehouse on Central Street now used for storage, and \$15,000 for work at the town office.

The money will provide \$10,000 for a new chimney and \$5,000 in safety improvements for the town manager's office, which now lacks a second entrance. Another \$14,000 is being sought to replace the windows at the transfer station off Central Street.

An area's history written on stones

BUCKSPORT – Thomas A. Stevens has a neat specialty: he prowls ancient graveyards and puts things back the way they were decades - even generations - ago.

His Newcastle-based company has been working with old gravestones and historic family markers - some over 250 years old, and he's been succeeding in putting things back upright in cemeteries, large and small, all over Maine - one stone at a time.

Last week and this, he and a helper have been putting stones right at the Oak Hill and Moulton cemeteries here in Bucksport. A storm dropped a very old, very heavy tree on the edge of the Wilson Hall property right on a number of stones at the back of the Oak Hill graveyard at Franklin and MacDonald streets. Vandals did serious damage at the private Moulton graves deep in the wooded recesses of the old Upper Long Pond Road near the Dedham line.

IN THE WORKS . . . Tidbits from week's news

MOTEL SALE? – The closing of the sale of the Spring Fountain Motel on U.S. Route 1 reportedly has been set for July 20. However, the details may not be final, so the actual date could change. The name of the prospective owner, a person from southern Maine, has not been publicly disclosed. The new owner will be responsible for resolving a long list of building and fire safety code concerns that resulted in the Town Council ruling the now-empty structure to be a danger.

HEADED TO COURT? – A small lot adjacent to the boat landing at Toddy Pond in Orland has been deemed in violation of the town's regulations because four camp sites have been placed there, according to the code enforcement officer. Luke Chiavelli has issued a notice of violation to John Harris, the owner of the property.

One and, perhaps, two camp sites may be allowable but four constitute a campground, and that could take the issue before a judge, the code officer said.

CLOSED – The Bucksport Town Office will be closed to the public today (6/30) at 3 p.m. so the staff could close the books for fis-

cal year 2021-2022. As usual the office will be closed Friday. The office will re-open on Tuesday at 7:30 a.m. Both the Town Office and the rubbish transfer station will be closed on Monday in observance of the Fourth of July. The transfer station will re-open next Thursday (7/7) at 9 a.m.

SAFETY FIRST – Setting off any consumer fireworks or any other fireworks in the Town of Bucksport is prohibited, except for those included in a fireworks display permitted by the State of Maine. The only exceptions are: toy pistols, toy canes, toy guns or other devices in which paper caps or plastic caps containing 25/100 grams or less of explosive compound are used, toy pistol paper caps or plastic caps with less than 20/100 grams of explosive matter, sparklers that do not contain magnesium chlorate or perchlorates, or signal, antique or replica cannons if no projectile is fired.

Anyone violating any part of the no-fireworks policy is subject to a fine of not less than \$50 and not more than a \$500 fine, plus court costs for any one offense.

The town's website advises residents to, "be a good neighbor."

BROWNTAIL MOTHS – Bucksport again has been notified by the State of Maine that there is some browntail moth infestation in the community. This link provides information on how to recognize the signs, and ways to try to manage them if a person's property is effected.

The town already has taken action on some infestations of municipally owned trees in the downtown area.


FIREHOUSE – The Orland Fire Station Committee this month narrowed its review of possible contractors for the new fire station. The group concluded, "clearly" the top two contractors under consideration would be Nickerson & O'Day and Sheridan Construction. Four other firms which showed an interest in the project will, "not receive further consideration at this time." Interviews were to be arranged with the two companies still in the running.

Then, the committee will make a recommendation to the selectmen.

The republic lives

The outpouring of emotion and angst after the recent Supreme Court decision is understandable, but unfortunate. Clearly abortion is passionately emotional to those on both sides of the issue. Still, screaming epithets into bullhorns and failing to condemn acts of violence on either side is not part of a recipe for moving on or advancing one's cause.

Just as the original Supreme Court decision was rendered by nine well-seasoned legal scholars, the reversal of that decision also was done by another group of nine whose legal credentials have been well-tested before and during their appointments to the nation's highest court.

The issue now will go back into the hands of the electorate after no-doubt exhaustive public debates in each of the 50 states. That is as it should be.

To suggest the Supreme Court be open to lobbying or political coercion is wrong. Each justice has lifetime tenure to guard against such an outrage.

Similarly, to suggest "packing the court" with nine justices - those more favorable to one side or the other on a particular issue - is similarly outrageous. With inevitable changes in administrations and the nine-member court becomes 11, 13, maybe 19. Where do we stop? 99?

Be careful what you wish for - the purpose of the Supreme Court is not to serve the bidding of those in power at the moment. The court is meant to endure, to protect that precious Constitution, and not to serve the interests of those who temporarily hold sway in Congress or the White House.

This week's decision did not end abortion. It said the people of this nation must decide. It returned this most vital issue to an open and sincere debate, one in which all Americans should participate but do so with open minds and hearts. We each in our own way have a stake in the outcome.

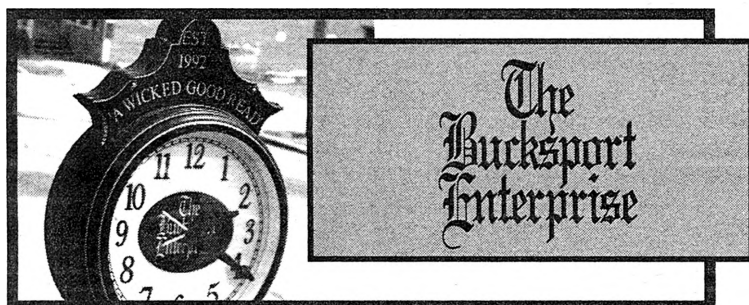
The decision was a victory for the founding principles of this nation. The Supreme Court cannot be subject to the political winds and whims. The court, like the republic, must endure and stay faithful to those founders' goals set so long ago.

Masonic Hall sold

BUCKSPORT – The Masonic Hall at 83 Franklin Street was sold yesterday (6/29), and the brick landmark will be transformed into residential uses on the first and second floor and probably some form of commercial use of the basement.

A wine bar has been suggested, but any business use of the building at Franklin and Elm streets will require Planning Board and, quite likely, Town Council approval.

While the other side of Franklin Street is part of the village business district, the Masonic Hall is in a residential area.

The empty building has been on the market for some

months, and initially carried a listing price of about \$200,000. The final sale price was not immediately available.

The new owners are Alexander Pelling and Lisa Grant, both of Belfast.

The local Masonic lodge had to close the building several years ago because of the high cost of maintaining the structure, and a decline in membership in the lodge.

Kathy Coogan, the broker who listed the property, said it was a pleasure to work with the lodge and find a new use for the local landmark. The building originally was crafted by a school principal who personally placed every brick, and then presided over the classrooms for a number of years.

Seafood dealer gets aid

TRENTON – Over \$15 million is being shared by 107 seafood dealers and processors to help increase the supply of Maine-harvested seafood, strengthen the ability to deliver to markets, and add and sustain jobs throughout the industry.

Businesses in every coastal county received awards, with more than half each receiving \$1145,000 or more each year.

Greenhead Lobster, a Stonington-based lobster processor and dealer with a processing plant in the site in the Buckstown industrial park in Bucksport, is among the beneficiaries.

The money came through the Seafood Dealer and Processor COVID-19 Response and Resilience Program (SDPP), a plan backed by Gov. Janet Mills. The program draws \$10

million from the Governor's Jobs Plan, \$5 million from the federal Consolidated Appropriations Act, and \$850,000 from the USDA Seafood Processors Pandemic Response and Safety Block Grant Program. The Maine Technology Institute administered the program on behalf of the Maine Department of Marine Resources.

According to the owner of the Stonington firm, Hugh Reynolds, "Greenhead Lobster appreciates the opportunity to partake in the SDPP program to supplement our investments in innovation and technology," "Greenhead Lobster will use this grant to complete investments in innovation that will significantly increase the efficiency of our lobster processing."

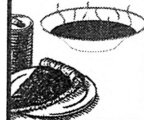

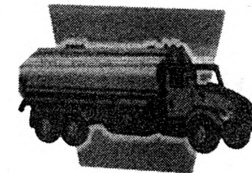

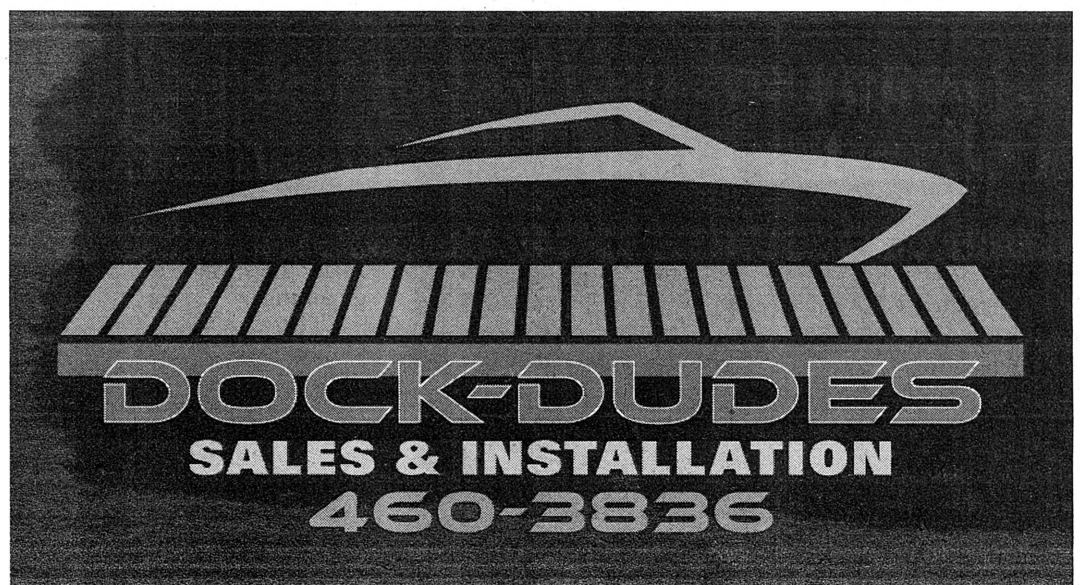

The company also will be replacing the historic stones that were wrongly removed by a former town manager from the Old Methodist Burial Ground in North Bucksport. The stones were laid flat on the ground in the nearby Riverview Cemetery, but the bodies of those the stones honored were left in their original burial places across River Road.

The stones not only got moved and placed in new solid foundations; some are repaired and cemented back together, their cracks and voids filled with white cement giving them a great facelift. And a power wash capable of pushing water at 2,500 psi is used as lightly as necessary to make the surface clean and gleaming.

The local Cemetery Committee has some extra cash in its latest budget to make things right again in North Bucksport. The plan is to prioritize the repair of the town's other cemeteries while providing \$5,000 or more per year to keep the progress going, again at a pace of one stone at a time.
