A Fascination With Fireworks

hen night settles in, when the crowds settle down and when the sky lights up with bursts and trails and spirals and showers of color something special is in the air...literally. Children are entranced, dogs cower and adults are as nonpartisan as adults can be.

Almost everyone (except the dogs) votes yes for a celebration with fireworks whether it's for a sports team win, a summer fest, a community milestone, the arrival of a new season, a wedding or, especially, the birth of a nation.

Fireworks were the celebration of choice in 1776 when the United States declared its independence on July 4th and they have been a patriotic tradition ever since. They already were a popular way to celebrate patriotism in other countries.

Briefly, fireworks may have been discovered by the Chinese 2,000 years ago, where written records describe how to make gunpowder into a firecracker. The idea for shooting gunpowder as a

weapon is attributed to the Greeks and Romans. July 4 and December 31, when the hours of use Gunpowder made its way to the West in the 13th century and so did fireworks which became a form of entertainment and although they have continued as entertainment all over the world they are also used for providing light, warning about dangers and signaling for help via torpedoes, flares and rockets and many similar a civil offense that carries a fine and court costs. devices.

In Maine, fireworks are legal, with some exceptions, but they are also controlled by municipal ordinances under which times and restrictions may vary. Belgrade, for example, where a spectacular public fireworks display will be sponsored by the Belgrade Lakes Region Business Group on July 4, advises individual consumers to observe the following rules and requests:

-Consumer fireworks, by Maine law, may only be used between 9 am and 10 pm except July 4, December 31 and the weekends before and after

are extended until 12:30 am.

-Fireworks can only be used on your own property or the property of a person who has consented to their use.

-Those under 21 may not buy, use or possess consumer fireworks. Violation of fireworks law is

-Keep in mind that while you may be on vacation, neighbors may have to get up for work, have young children, have pets that may be traumatized by fireworks, or may have issues themselves that make fireworks difficult to tolerate. Be a good neighbor and respect those around you.

Municipalities aside, Maine's many lake communities are also affected by fireworks and although they cannot pass ordinances they can issue lake-friendly fireworks user guidelines like

the list issued by the Belgrade Lakes chain's Sake of the Lake in Mind!

"While fireworks seem to go hand and hand with the 4th of July, there are a number of Best Management Practices that you can follow to help keep our lake free from debris and prevent harmful chemicals that are contained in fireworks from affecting water and aquatic life.

- 1. Be respectful of your neighbors and their pets and consider the timing and frequency of fireworks displays.
 - 2. Become knowledgeable of surrounding from the water.

drinking water supplies.

- 3. Devise a plan that minimizes potential dance with manufacturer recommendations. North Pond: Celebrate the 4th of July with the runoff from launch areas, and don't launch from bare soil or sand.
 - 4. Launch fireworks at a steep angle that promotes maximum height allowing the complete ignition and combustion. Fireworks launched at a low trajectory may result in premature submersion in the water and incomplete burning of potentially hazardous compounds.
 - 5. Rake the launch area and clean up all debris immediately following a fireworks display. Retrieve any visible non-combusted materials home.

6. Collect and dispose of all "duds" in accor-

Hard Work of Youth Conservation Corps Improves Belgrades Water Quality

ot an erosion problem along a shoreline in **J**the Belgrade Lakes watershed? The 7 Lakes Alliance has a solution.

The mission of 7 Lakes' Youth Conservation Corps is to execute erosion control projects that keep dirt out of the lakes - phosphorous in dirt being a necessary nutrient for algae, the organism that can turn lakes an icky green.

The YCC is accepting applications for summer projects. Interested property owners can email Erosion Control Project Coordinator Stuart Cole at stuart.cole@7lakesalliance.org about their proposed project. Cole will schedule an inspection of the worksite and offer recommendations about what should be done, including providing a list of the needed supplies. He also pursues any



required state permitting.

Property owners provide the supplies; the YCC provides the labor at a minimal cost. (Labor is the costliest expense of most construction project.) Crews of high school and college students typically complete a project in a day or less.

Erosion control methods are referred to as best management practices, and the current BMP of choice is reinforcing shorelines and embankments with riprap. Optimally, the broken stone is complemented by other BMPs, such as:

- Planting vegetative buffers; blueberry bushes are tremendous at stemming erosion ... and at providing a delicious pie filling!
 - •Installing rubber razors that keeps driveway Continued on page 3...

and camp road dirt from washing into lakes during rainstorms.


- Building porous infiltration steps into which water can seep.
- •Laying driplines below eaves to allow roof runoff to more easily seep into the ground.
 - •Building rain gardens that collect runoff and sprout beautiful flowers.
 - •Spreading erosion-control mulch or gravel.
 - •Blazing zigzagged paths to the water, impeding the flow of runoff.

Cole also oversees 7 Lakes' LakeSmart program, which helps property owners determine whether their camp or lake home could benefit from adding BMPs. Email him to schedule a survey of your property. If it's deemed effective at mitigating runoff into the lake, you can earn a prized LakeSmart designation and a sign that, we hope, will encourage your neighbors to do the same.

Our lakes are gems. But our enjoyment of them carries a responsibility to be good stewards of them so they remain crystalline for generations to come. That means proactively keeping dirt out of the lakes.

Take It Outside –

Moose in the Morning; Trout in the Afternoon

ast week was the first official week of summer and I got to enjoy a Ibroad variety of the outside activities this area offers. One day last week I went foraging for early season mushrooms and met up with a couple of moose in the woods on one of the 7-Lakes Alliance hiking trails. Later that day, I took a neighbor's grandson out fishing and to check on a newly hatched loon chick. We caught a couple of bass and a nice rainbow trout along the way. This has made the trout in Long Pond much happier, and they are staying up in the layer again. I've caught several this



Gaslight Theater to Present I Hate Shakespeare!

o you hate Shakespeare? Or do you love him? If you are in the "hate" camp, Gaslight Theater's presentation of I Hate Shakespeare! may change your mind. If you already love the Bard, the play



may deepen your appreciation of his works. Gaslight, which bills itself as Maine's "oldest continuously operating theater," will hold six performances on the second and third weekends of July. The performances will be in Augusta and Hallowell.

Written by Steph DeFerie and directed by Meg Mattheson, this play about plays spoofs both Shakespeare and popular culture. Through a series of sketches, Hamlet (Cody Curtis) and the ensemble (listed below) try to convince an "Unhappy Person" (Lisa Copenhaver) that Shakespeare's plays are still interesting, meaningful, and funny four hundred years after they were written. The sketches include Othello, Iago, and Desdemona's sorting out their differences on the Jerry Springer Show; a mild-mannered milquetoast's finding courage in a can and learning to

use Shakespearean insults against a sand-kicking bully at the beach; the ensemble's attempts to relate the plot of "the Scottish play" without saying the name of the play or its lead character, lest some calamity occur; and Juliet's going on *The Dating Game* to choose a suitor. (Will she pick Romeo?) There are also zombies and cheerleaders, and at some point, somebody gets a pie in the face.

The cast and crew also includes Ben Keene, Kathleen Leopold, Donna Loveland, Eleanor Maranda, Joe Maranda, Desi-Rae Severson, Quinn Murray, Matthew Perry, Gregor Smith, Tony Vazquez, and Richard Bostwick. There are 44 distinct roles, so each actor plays multiple parts.

Performances will take place Friday – Sunday, July 8-10 & 15-17. The Friday and Saturday shows will all start at 6:00 p.m., the Sunday shows at 2:00. Not including intermission, the play runs 60 – 70 minutes. The play is definitely suitable for children, although they may not get all the jokes and references. Indeed, the first-ever production of I Hate Shakespeare! used child actors. Rather than taking place on Broadway with adult professionals, it was by the students at a middle school on Cape Cod in 2008.

The first weekend's performances will be held in Augusta's Waterfront Park, behind the stone-turreted Olde Federal Building on Water Street. The second weekend will be at the Vaughan Homestead Pavilion at 2 Litchfield Road in Hallowell.

All performances will be outdoors. Although a few seats may be available, audience members should bring their own chairs or blankets to sit on. Admission is free, but donations will be gratefully accepted.

The Dams Keeper Report

A visitor wrote in this week to compliment us on the water levels so far this season, but (there's always a "but") asked if "there is something we can do about the water temperature?" I don't know where they are from, but, right now as I pen this week's discourse, upper Long Pond is a refreshing 67.8F! Not quite wet-suit weather but not quite enjoyable either, in my book!! And that's on the surface. Forget going below that at least for another month!!

Another question by way of J.A. was, "For every inch of rain, how far does the Great Pond's water level come up?" Well, if you remember from last year's columns, for every inch of rain that lands in your water bucket on the dock, both Great Pond and Salmon/McGrath come up just about 1.5", but (I know, another "but") Long Pond with its steep watershed, comes up a whopping 3"!

Back to why I guess you're reading this column, Great Pond's Village dam is currently 1.44" above full pond with the main gate still opened

just 6". Long Pond's Wings Mill dam is at 1.32" with both gates completely closed collecting cobwebs. Salmon/McGrath is now right at full pond with its single gate still opened the mandated 1 cfs. flow. Our neighbors to the east on Messalonskee are down 5.40" below full which is what they need to do for their electricity generation needs.

Our precipitation for the past 10 days was a meager .54" of rain with only .64" forecasted for the next 10 days so it looks like our honeymoon with the occasional afternoon shower is coming to an end. Remember, that they were calling for an average 20% less precipitation. Who wants to bet against the weatherman?

Update On Great Pond Herbicide Application

The success of a low-risk herbicide treatment to choke invasive milfoil in Great Meadow Stream will not be fully known until early August. The Maine Department of Environmental Protection applied the herbicide, ProcellaCOR, on June 16, using an airboat. The herbicide is an intentionally slow-moving solution that is gradually absorbed by the entire plant, including its roots. The success of the effort cannot be fully measured for five weeks.

Sharon Mann, Invasive Aquatics Director for the 7 Lakes Alliance, stressed the treatment is not a "silver bullet" cure-all. The one-time treatment is meant to stymie invasive milfoil so 7 Lakes divers can continue to sustainably remove the milfoil infestation while preventing its spread. The 7 Lakes Alliance and the Belgrade Lakes Association supports the DEP's decision to treat Great Meadow Stream after studying the herbicide's effectiveness and safety. ProcellaCOR is not toxic to humans and aquatic life at recommended dosages, and only temporarily impacts native plants. 7 Lakes is monitoring the treatment's impact on plants. 
