Whole Oceans to start work – but slowly

BUCKSPORT – The Whole Oceans on-shore salmon fish farm site off River Road will see limited signs of activity beginning next week, according to the contractors who toured the property late last week.

However, passers-by on Route 15 probably will hardly notice, as most of the initial site work will be done at the rear of the property, near the Penobscot River. That work will include dismantling and removing a large old fuel tank left behind after the closing of the paper mill. It also will include tearing a number of old concrete foundations that an American Iron & Steel (AIM) affiliate that served as the salvage purchaser of the mill was allowed to bury rather than remove.

There will be some clearing of underbrush and staking out the areas being used to curb erosion during the construction process. It's not clear when actual construction work will begin.

Already several years behind schedule, the multimillion dollar project has had a rocky road, ranging from Covid to soaring construc-

tion and interest rates, and more than a few changes in management. The project also is moving ahead in a sharply different market for Atlantic salmon.

When first proposed, the developers claimed the company had pre-sold its entire first five years of the on-shore reared salmon. Now, the price for that salmon has fallen, and more companies have entered the salmon-rearing field and native salmon have rebounded in previously overfished waters.

Nordic Aquafarms, a Norwegian-based company seeking to build a similar salmon operation in Belfast, also has slowed its efforts there after spending millions on the pre-development and permitting efforts. That operation is more than three-and-a-half years behind schedule.

As yet, the actual construction preparations have not required any permits from the town. Luke Chiavelli, the code enforcement officer, said it now appears the extensive blasting called for in the original plans, will not be needed.

Opening... Several businesses being launched

• **CAFE** – The permitting path has been cleared for the Nutrition Cafe offering “healthy alternative snacks” and fruit smoothies at 119 Main Street. The Nutrition Cafe will be opened by the owners of a similar business they began in Ellsworth a year-and-a-half ago. They are leasing the former Lewis + Malm Architects office space from William Nichols, who is in the process of selling the structure. That sale should be completed within a week or two, according to Jacob Grandmaison, the co-owner of the new eatery. Grandmaison and Jayme Gibson of Moosehorn Drive in Bucksport, operate the Ellsworth site. The cafe here will open later this month.

• **FRANKLIN STREET** – The Planning Board not only is recommending the former Masonic Hall at Franklin and Elm streets be included in the village district allowing it to be occupied by a business, the panel this week voted 3-2 to extend the village district along the north side of Franklin Street from Elm

to Central streets. This would add five lots to the village district, including the former Elm Street Methodist Church. That would allow a number of new business uses now banned on that side of the street. The Masonic Hall was sold last week to Alex and Lisa Pelling of Belfast. The Pellings may seek a permit for a wine bar to be in the basement.

Those who voted against the idea apparently did so because they thought the village district should be extended further on both sides of Franklin Street, not just accommodate one new business. One member, Richard Peterson, strongly argued for a much larger expansion of the village district. The Town Council will decide the issue later.

• **U.S. ROUTE 1** – The Planning Board this week also unanimously ratified its recommendation that both sides of U.S. Route 1 be treated equally when it comes to siting or operating businesses. Currently, lots on the Penobscot River side of the highway have much tougher restrictions. Again, the council

will have the final say. A restaurateur had considered using the former Grindle insurance building, but restaurants and taverns are not allowed in the shoreland zoned side of the street. She apparently has opted to look elsewhere.

• **DAY SPA** – Bruce Ashmore, the owner-operator of a vehicle detailing shop in the industrial park, has edged closer to getting the approvals he needs to lease roughly 500 square feet in the front of his building to a Bucksport woman who wants to relocate her day spa from Ellsworth. Personal care service businesses are banned from the park, but the board believes a non-transferable approval should be given to accommodate this situation because it only involves a small portion of the building and will have a minimal impact in the appearance of the building.

• **MARIJUANA** – The Town Council is being advised by the Planning Board to

designate that any “adult marijuana” retailers - those selling cannabis products for recreational use - be confined to the U.S. Route 1 corridor. Other more remote sites will be designated for the growing and packaging of the products. Jordan Godino, the co-owner with his wife Erica of the Green Island Herb medical marijuana shop on U.S. Route 1 on Verona Island attended to show his interest in locating a second one which would sell cannabis for adult recreational use - along U.S. Route 1. He offered to assist the board in its review of the rules governing all marijuana sales in Maine.

Others have attended the panel's sessions previously because they, too, are considering opening cannabis enterprises in Bucksport.

While the U.S. Route designated area is being suggested to the council, there still are a number of hurdles to be cleared before cannabis sales are allowed in Bucksport, and one or more public hearings will be required.



IN THE WORKS . . . Tidbits from week's news

FITNESS FOLKS – Beginning Monday, Aug. 29, public access to the fitness room in the G.H. Jewett elementary school will move to new hours. The hours will be published by the YMCA and will limit the access to the periods when students are not present.

The move is being made as part of the continuing effort to safeguard the children and the RSU 25 staff.

MONDAYS, TOO? – The town manager is working out the final details of adding a second day of shuttle bus service here. The most likely day will be Mondays, according to Susan M. Lessard. The town now offers subsidized bus service on Wednesdays.

TRASH – The proposed sale of the closed rubbish-to-energy plant in Hampden to the Municipal Review Committee is on hold after a creditor convinced a judge to provide more time to, perhaps, negotiate a better deal for the

debt-holders. Bucksport Town Manager Susan M. Lessard said the town remains a very unlikely financial investor in the MERC takeover plan. In the meantime the town's rubbish is being trucked to the Penobscot Energy Recovery Corp. (PERC) plant in Orrington. When that site is not available the rubbish is buried in the Juniper Hills landfill. The Hampden plant was built to serve over 100 Maine communities, but failed to operate on a sustained basis before the creditors decided to shut off the cash.

CLOSED FOR GOOD! – It probably did not come as much a surprise when the directors of the Island Nursing Home on Deer Isle recently announced the place will not reopen as a skilled nursing center. Closed since October, the 70-bed building would require a minimum of 110 employees to meet federal requirements. Nursing homes are among the most-regulated

businesses in this country.

ONE-MILLION DOLLARS – The Northern Light Blue Hill Hospital has received a \$1 million pledge from Neil and Trudie Prior in support of the Next Century of Care: Keeping Our Promise campaign. The gift will be acknowledged in the naming of the in-patient unit of the new hospital. The Priors reside in St. Thomas, Virgin Islands and have a summer home in Blue Hill.


The groundbreaking for the new hospital took place on May 26.

IN THE BUDGET – The latest Bucksport Budget included these allocations for local groups: Wednesdays on Maine program of cultural and entertainment events, \$4,000; Main Street Bucksport, a downtown development group, \$20,000 to help balance its budget; and Health Equity Alliance, \$1,500 toward the annual Bucksport Pride event.

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

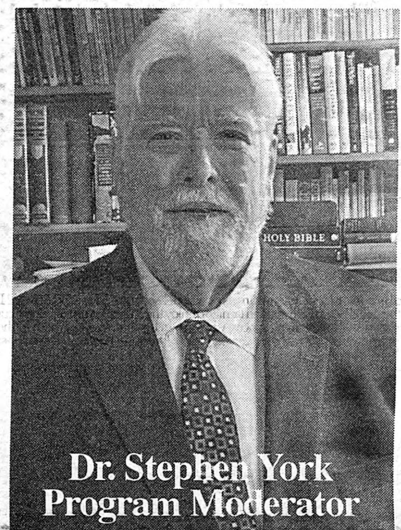

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All of the options

This is not about climate change; it's about the realities of getting to a policy of sound ecological changes most people would support because they do not destroy the economy we all depend on.

Beginning with the premise that alternative renewable sources of energy are good and should be encouraged on all fronts, it's also true our economy remains dependent on fossil fuels and will remain so for the immediate future. It's fine to drive electric cars but 200 or 300 miles down the road a source of electricity must be found. At the moment that source is not likely to be a solar array or wind turbine farm. That source is probably going to be a generating station powered by fossil fuel.

While some European countries are rediscovering nuclear power plants and China is building dozens of coal-fired turbines, the United States is facing rolling blackouts because of an inadequate supply of power – for electric vehicles and everything else from lighting to air conditioning. While the developing countries, producing tons of pollution amid minimal regulation, the United States is hobbling energy development within our own borders if it involves even a whiff of fossil fuels.

We can understand how the electric vehicle fans revel in whistling by the gas pumps, but we have yet to see large fleets of 18-wheelers running on energy from solar panels on their roofs. Our industrial, agricultural and retail industries are based on diesel fuel, and changing that is going to take years. Speeding up the process by causing higher prices only means higher costs and more inflation, burdens borne by all consumers.

Changing the energy underpinnings of our world is a noble cause, one worth all of our support. But it must be based on a longer term, comprehensive strategy, not a series of panic attacks whipped on by folks who know not what they're doing. The idea that, "everything is on the table" according to the politicians who claim to see few options is bogus blustering – unless you're talking about a very tiny table.

Collective angst

Inflation . . . recession . . . depression . . . some things are like viruses: you don't know what they truly are until you're caught in their clutches. For the record, we are not now in a recession, for the economic numbers generated over the next three months will determine that. (A recession is defined as three consecutive quarters declining key financial figures.)

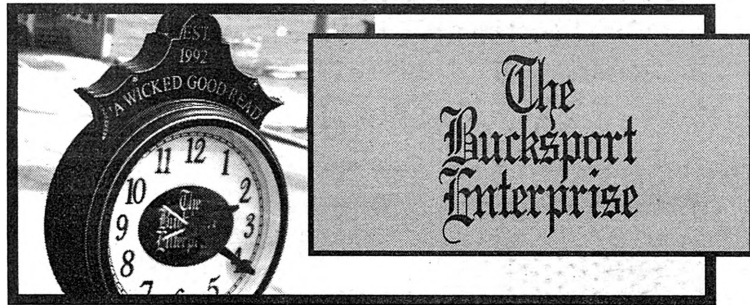
Still, there is a creeping malaise hanging above us, and it began with soaring inflation. Nobody needs proof of that: a trip to the gas station or supermarket will suffice. However, the myriad ways inflation, accompanied by the worst imbalance of supply-and-demand for so many goods and services are clobbering our economy.

Here are just a couple of examples here in Bucksport:

- The money and the plans are in place but for want of some huge culvert pipes a major local road project is stymied.
- The same would have been true for some major drainage work at the athletic field at the middle school, but the last minute substitution of four-inch plastic pipe for five-inch is allowing the project to move ahead.
- New boilers have to be ordered almost immediately if they are to be ready for installation at the Miles Lane School next summer, and the price is rising.
- Next winter's road salt here will cost \$24-a-ton more than it did last winter, and a ton is not a lot of salt.

Meanwhile, across the country thousands of projects called for in the government's multi-billion dollar infrastructure upgrade are growing more costly by the day. Higher energy, materials and labor costs are taking their toll. In fact, some projects are being delayed or even called off for lack of materials or labor. As a result, taxpayers will pay much more to get much less.

No wonder there's so much angst.

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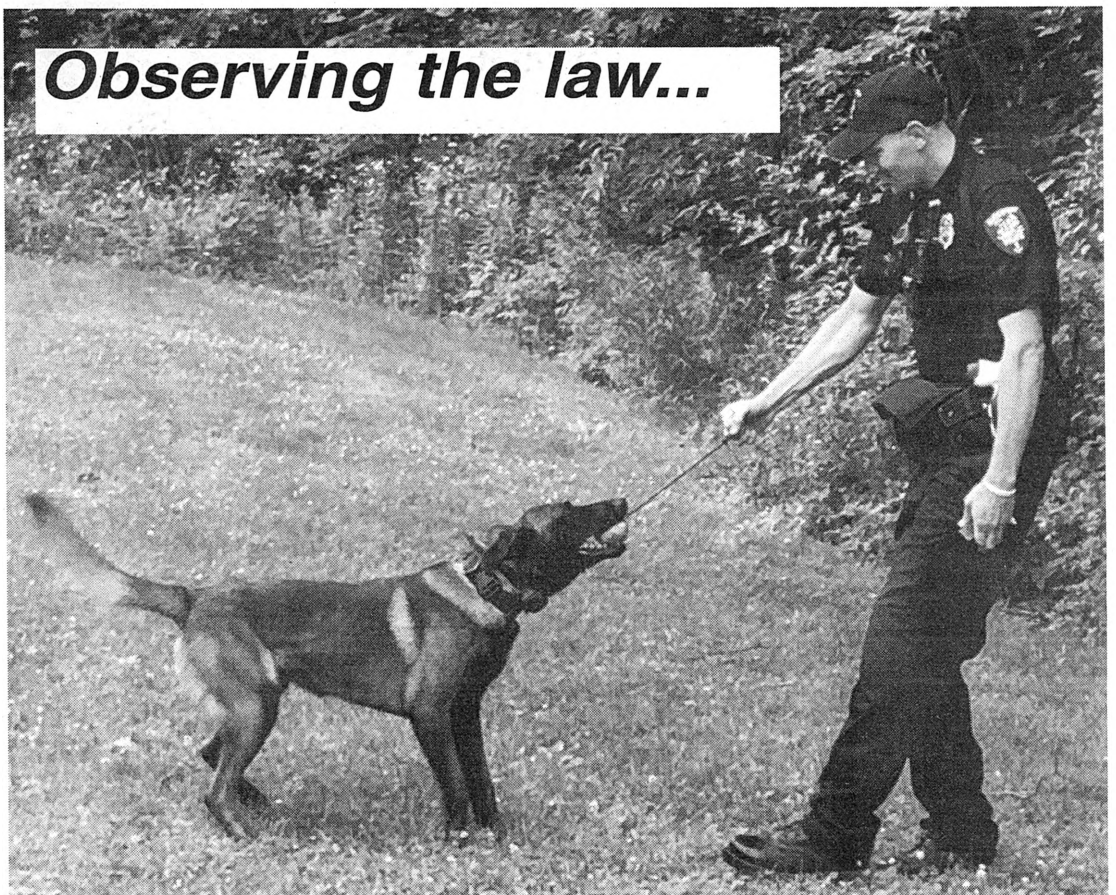
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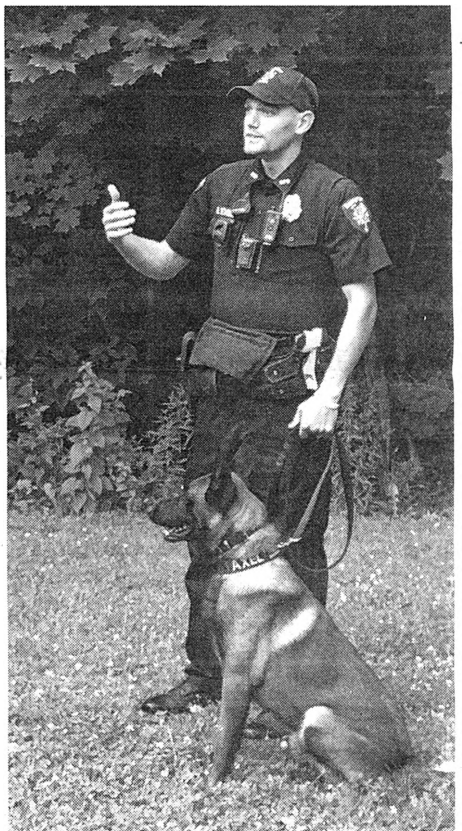

Plotting a strategy

BUCKSPORT -

The Bucksport Cemetery Committee did not meet this week for lack of a quorum, but the group is still seeking new members to increase the participation in a multi-year comprehensive program to upgrade and manage the town's cemeteries.

Meanwhile work continues in the Oak Hill Cemetery and the Moulton Cemetery with a crew straightening, resetting and repairing some of the most-ancient stones in those graveyards.

The Oak Hill, which was turned over to the town with a small endowment is considered the second most-visible cemetery in the town after the Jonathan Buck Cemetery on U.S. Route 1. The Moulton Cemetery is a private burial plot tucked away in the rural recesses of the Upper Long Pond Road near the Dedham line.

The cemetery committee wants to develop a plan for cataloging the burial lots and those interred in them, as well as provide a coordinated plan for at least twice-a-year maintenance.

While some of the plots are privately managed, the lack of both volunteers and income from investments could force more coordinated approaches to the maintenance issues in the future.

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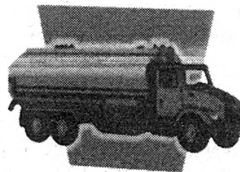

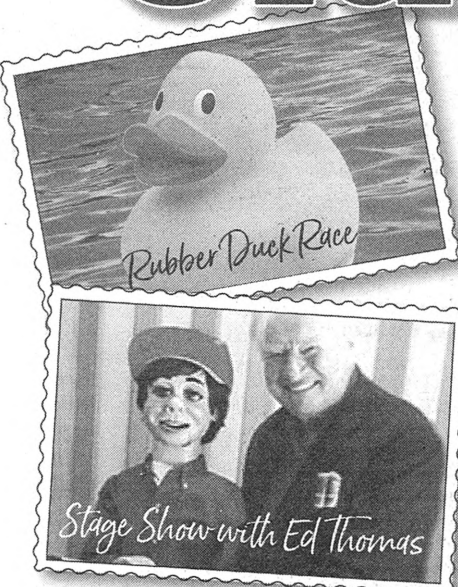
