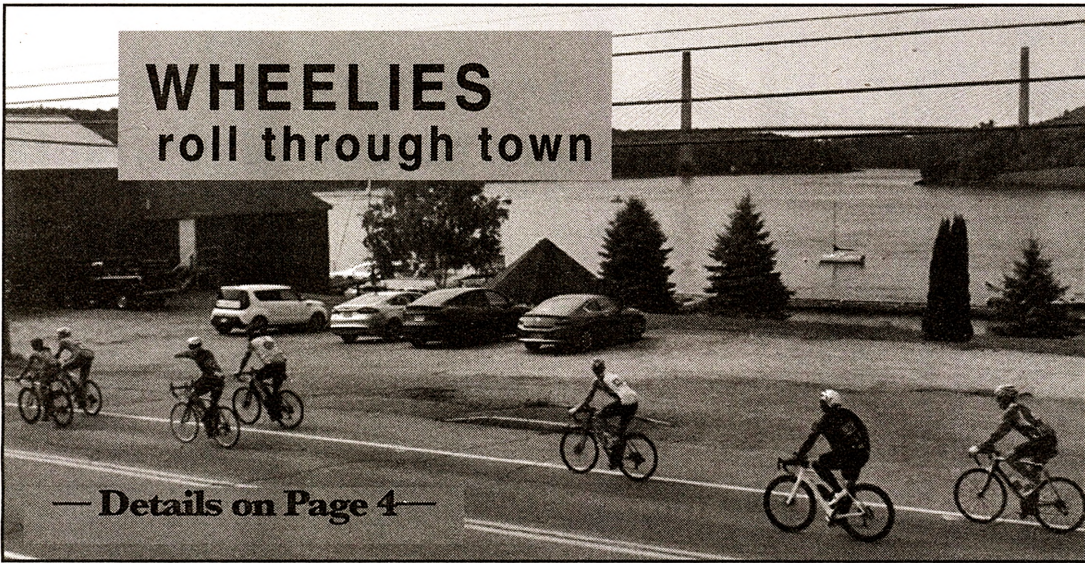

Texas firm buys Jed Prouty's business assets

BUCKSPORT — The Jed Prouty Retirement Home's business assets have been sold to Magnolia Assisted Living, a Texas-based chain of similar priorities. The firm now operates nine sites in Maine, of which some belong to the Chambers.

While Magnolia took over the operation of the business on Aug. 1, the building remains leased to John and Rhonda Chambers.

The Chambers bought the 19-room home at 57 Main Street about a decade ago, using a forgivable loan from the Town of Bucksport. That loan still has some five years to run. A sale at this point would have required the Chambers to pay back some of that loan.

The sale of the business assets also included those of the retirement home the Chambers built in a former school at 112

N. Searsport Road in Frankfort.

The couple through the years owned and operated retirement housing businesses, once employing from 65 to 85 people, in Jonesport, Pittsfield and Calais, and the Chambers have liquidated all of them.

The historic former inn on Bucksport's Main Street got some major facade work, a new furnace and last winter an estimated \$20,000 in electric system upgrades, according to Rhonda Chambers.

In an interview this week, she said, "it's been a true pleasure to work with the residents and their families, both here and elsewhere."

Shortly after buying the Jed Prouty the Chambers said they were interested in buying Wilson Hall here, too, but only if the town provided a six-figure sum to upgrade the utilities.

Marijuana shop rules ready

BUCKSPORT — The Town Council tonight (8/11) is expected to approve a first reading of the rules to be applied to any recreational marijuana shops that open here.

The final adoption of the rules will not occur until after a future public hearing to allow residents to comment.

Several local entrepreneurs

are awaiting the adoption of the rules, and one has purchased a potential site on U.S. Route 1. Different state rules apply to recreational marijuana sales than those governing medical marijuana distribution.

At this point the only shop in the immediate area is a medical marijuana business on Verona Island.

The Planning Board has

endorsed the proposal that will come before the Town Council tonight (8/11) at 7 p.m. at the Town Offices. After several lengthy discussions, the Planning Board decided to leave background checks and other investigative tasks regarding applicants and enforcement to state authorities, rather than burden the local police with more duties.

Downtown plan likely to advance

BUCKSPORT — The Town Council appears poised to hire the TYLin engineering consultants to conduct a comprehensive assessment of the entire downtown area streetscape.

The Yarmouth branch of the national engineering consulting firm will partner with the razor landscape architects

of Falmouth. The two firms submitted the sole quote received for the study.

The report is a first step toward applying for \$5 million or more from the state Department of Transportation to carry out some or all of the improvements the consultants recommend.

Candidates surfacing for Town Council and RSU 25 board seats

BUCKSPORT — It may be mid-August, but some folks already are setting their election strategies for the Nov. 8 municipal election.

There are two Town Council seats and one on the RSU 25 School Board on the Bucksport ballot.

Tracy Hair of 126 Franklin Street and incumbent Edward Rankin, Jr. of 150 State Route 46 have taken out nomination papers for the council seats.

Keith Kneeland of 1149 Bucksmills Road will challenge the incumbent Peter Clair of 16 Mast Hill

Road for a Bucksport position on the RSU 25 School Board. This will be Kneeland's second attempt to unseat an incumbent on that panel. He ran in the last election.

The eight-member board includes four Bucksport residents, but only one of those posts is available this year.

Hair, the executive director of the H.O.M.E. social services agency in Orland, and several others ran unsuccessfully in the last highly-contested council election. She has remained active in monitoring local

government issues.

Councilor Kathy Downes of 514 Silver Lake Road previously has said she does not plan to seek reelection to the council. She also will relinquish her seat in the state House of Representatives when that term ends. She now wants to devote her time to other things.

Nomination papers are available from Town Clerk Jacob Gran at the Town Offices. Candidates have until Sept. 8 to return their completed papers.

RAMPED UP? — A Town Council committee tonight (8/11) again will discuss whether Bucksport needs a skate park and, if so, where it should be located. A half dozen parents and high school students want to place a park near the ballfield off Elm Street, using a donated skate ramp stored in Rye, NH. The group is seeking money to haul the ramp here and then install it. The ramp was used at a large indoor skate park that failed. The ramp backers will meet councilors at 5 p.m. at the Town Offices. The full council will hear a report on the idea when they gather at 7.

BUILDING INSPECTED — The code enforcement officer tonight (8/11) at 7 p.m. will tell the town councilors about code issues he believes exist at a property at 264 Central Street. Luke Chiavelli indicated he may need help in pursuing the situation.

IN THE SCHOOLS — The Bucksport Middle School has received a \$250,000 grant from the state to continue the Students Taking Alternative Routes to Success [STARS] program and further improve the new outdoor classroom and school garden. The project will expand the opportunities to explore a variety of educa-


tional interests by using a four-season greenhouse and kitchen/workspace. The greenhouse will house aquaponic tanks with several ecosystems for fish and plants.





Just a thought!

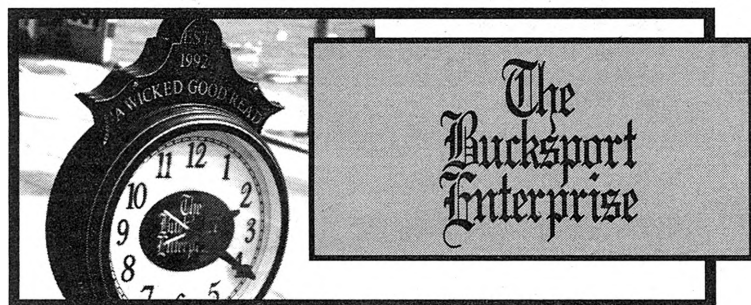
Pause for a word...

It is a popular time of year for all disciplines to gather for seminars, workshops, professional development, by "experts". They cloak the obvious in flowery, polysyllabic words, words that make the trite seem somehow profound. The use of big words for small thoughts has become a necessity for writing grants, enhancing careers. They are too often used by those who (mistakenly) try to impress others (who may be new to) or as in education — concerned parents and not yet attuned to the buzz words specific to the discipline. The act of making someone uncomfortable with unfamiliar words is not the mark of intelligence. Let's not talk down to or over the heads of anyone, especially our children.

The world cries out for many synonyms for words like "awesome" and "incredible", words that have lost all meaning through misuse and overuse. Those who use them don't seem to be aware of the many alternatives, the options that better communicate what they're stumbling to say.

Let's encourage our children to build their vocabularies and do more than a few keystrokes laced with abbreviations on the internet. We'll all be the better for it.

A recent view of Bucksport from the observatory

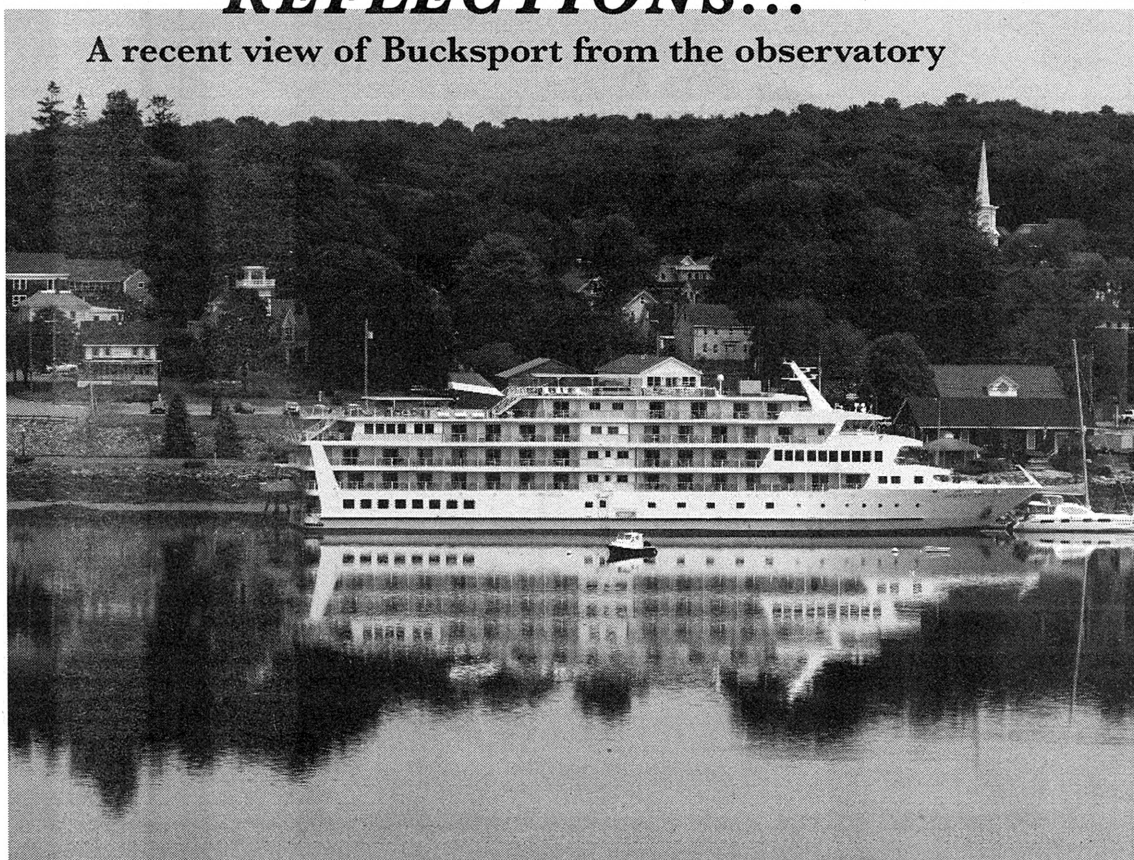

BUCKSPORT — They rolled through town by the hundreds, sometimes one or two and sometimes five, six, ten or more at a clip.

For more than an hour on Saturday the 550 bicyclists pedaled on, stopping here briefly on their trek from the urban bustle of Bangor to the pastoral calm of Castine.

They were embarked on the annual Gran Fondo Hincapie Series, an event that brings bicyclists, in the past, 700 or more, to share an out-of-door experience that's based more on fun than having a competition.

With rides of varying lengths, the longest can be a test of endurance, while the shorter trips are just plain pedaling for the fun of it along a scenic route.

This year the route wound through Penobscot and Hancock counties. The run will be repeated in each of the next two years, over new routes, but all of them beginning in Bangor.

The rides in what is described as a premier high-end event for bicyclists includes rides that are 80, 52 and 15 miles in length. Each of those who registered received an event jersey, a timing chip, SAG support, fully-stocked rest stops, a participant medal, participant photos, free catered food and bev-

erages at the Expo. The event is staged by the Hincapie family, the owners of a major supplier of high-end bicycling gear, with backing from the Bangor chamber of commerce and others in this region.

The first riders arrived at the Bucksport rest stop in the late-morning as the scorching temperatures and humidity began to make themselves known. The water in the riders' bottles never tasted so good!



There were few spectators here, mainly folks who didn't know the bicyclists were coming or why they were rolling through. Vehicular traffic on Main Street was very light, leaving plenty of space for those on bikes.

The riders' reactions to their first glimpse of Bucksport Bay, the Penobscot Narrows Bridge and Fort Knox as they rolled by *The Bucksport Enterprise* office was obvious. The most succinct was that of the fellow who alerted those behind him with one word: "Wow!"

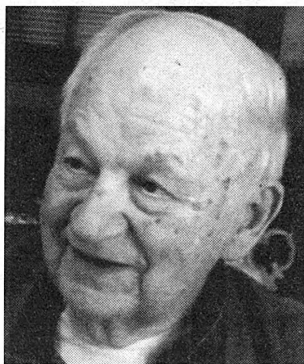
After the ride, the bicyclists made their way back to the Hincapie Family Fun Fest on the Bangor Waterfront.

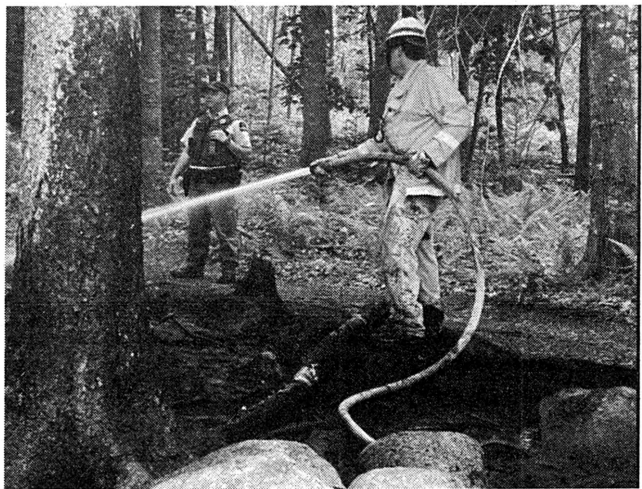

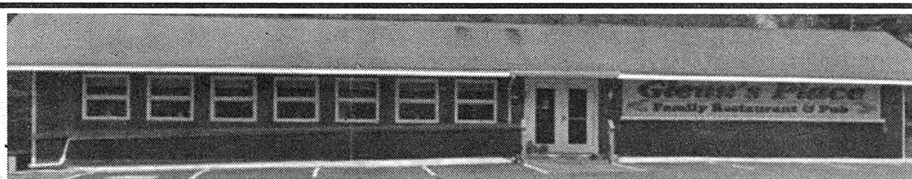
