Mon Abner Coburn, Governor of Maine

Sir I have

(A) Son now in the 16th Maine Regiment Co I. he is nearly twenty one years of age he left the State as 2d Lieutenant was promoted by the recommendation of his superior officers after the battle of Fredericksburg to 1st Lieutenant, he is now in command of Co. C. 16th Maine, the officers of said Co. being either discharged or sick &c. his education is good, abilities, apparently as good as any young man of his age and advantages, rather quiet, social, good habits, and is not a coward — Colonel Farnham knows him as an officer much better than I can inform you, My other son Capt John W. Deering of Ship Armo of Boston — Met Col Farnham at the American House in Boston a few days since, he having been introduced to the Col a few months since, asked Col Farnham respecting George A. his reply was — he was active, prompt, and as good an officer considering his advantages as any in his Regiment — My object in writing is this — I wish to present him to your favorable consideration — if he is recommended for <sup>or</sup> his name is presented with others for promotion, I only ask for a favorable consideration of his merits, I do not ask for any particular favors he is young and ambitious, I told him when he left home anything I could do for him, after he had won Merit I would ~~charitably~~ do.
