## Invasive Aquatic Plants: How Safe Is Any Lake?

n the fall of last year the worst case scenario of the war on invasive aquatic plants in Maine took place not too far from the Belgrades. When the courtesy boat inspector arrived for the day at the boat launch on Lake Wesserunsett in East Madison, four out-of-state bass boaters had already launched their uninspected boats, presumably before dawn.

To put Lake Wesserunsett into perspective, it is roughly a half hour's drive from Smithfield or Oakland where the two headwaters of the Belgrades are located.

Lake Wesserunsett is known for Lakewood Theater - the longest continuously run summer theater in the nation, the prestigious Skowhegan School of Art, "Lake Wesserunsett Sunset" - a photograph featured in Reader's Digest and, now, it may be the first lake in the state of Maine to be infested with the invasive aquatic plant fanwort.

Upon inspection of the four trailers, the Lake Wesserunsett Association (LWA) inspector, the local warden and volunteers from LWA found plants hanging off all four. After the boaters returned the plants would be photographed, recorded, collected and bagged, refrigerated over the weekend and mailed to Lake Stewards of Maine (formerly Volunteer Lake Monitoring Program). Unfortunately, one of the plants was fanwort, an invasive so far not found in Maine.

When the boaters returned at 4:30 pm they were, according to LWA description, blase but cooperative although uncertain where they had been previously, citing out-of-state lakes and possibly one near Augusta.

Shortly after the incident, the lake association alerted its members to the potential introduction of fanwort and sent out a flyer published by the Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation. Not unlike with other invasive aquatic plants, fanwort's impacts on a lake include displacing native species, reducing biodiversity, hampering recreation, reducing real estate values, diminishing aesthetic values and decreasing water quality - certainly something for which lake users should on the lookout.

At the beginning of this year, Warden Jeremy Kemp from the Maine Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife traveled to Massachusetts and served summons on the four boaters. Hopefully, they will be fined. More hopefully, the word of the civil charge will deter other potential violators.

What next Wesserunsett? What next all the lakes and ponds that could be next? What next (fill in the blank with a favorite lake)?

On Saturday, July 6, the Lake Wesserunsett Association will hold its



annual meeting when an uptodate fanwort report will be featured on the agenda. All interested and possibly affected parties are encouraged to attend.

On Thursday, July 11, Lake Wesserunsett will hold a a comprehensive Invasive Aquatic Plant survey of the lake under the direction of the Department of Environmental Protection and Lake Stewards of Maine to look for fanwort and other invasives. The survey will begin at 9 am at the East Madison boat launch. Many volunteers will be required to complete

the survey in one day.

In October the lawsuit will go to court and is the first case in the state that will go through the fining process. The minimum fine is \$500; the maximum \$5,000. Publicity surrounding this first-ever case could be helpful to fight against invasive aquatic plants.

In the meantime, the Town of Madison has generously increased its contribution to the boat launch monitoring fund, the Wesserunsett Lake Association has increased the number of hours the boat launch is monitored and every lake lover who enjoys this beautiful, clear, unclogged lake - or perhaps attends a play at Lakewood and enjoys viewing the lake - can hope for the best case outcome.



## Friends of Messaloskee Partners With Mid-Maine Adult Ed to Help Save Maine Lakes

Educational, fun, outdoors! In a unique collaboration RSU 18 Messalonskee Office of Mid-Maine Regional Adult and Community Education is partnering with the lake association Friends of Messalonskee to offer summer classes in Plant ID Paddles and in Milfoil Removal.

Plant Identification Paddles are scheduled for Monday, July 22 and Monday, August 12, 10 am-12 noon. Learn to kayak and explore the lake's ecology with Mike Guarino, Maine Wilderness Tours Instructor and Friends of Messalonskee member. Prerequisite: know the basics of how to swim, wear water shoes, a bathing suit or shorts, sunglasses or polarized glasses, sunscreen and hat and bring extra clothing. Limit 8 students; must be 17 years of age. A rain date will be announced. Fee \$6; all equipment will be provided. Meet at the State of Maine boat launch on Route 27 in Belgrade across from Loon Ridge Cottages and near Hammond Lumber.

After taking the course, participants are encouraged to join the Milfoil Management Citizen Network and help the Friends of Messalonskee Lake Survey Team by learning to use a cell phone to report milfoil locations on the lake and add milfoil "hot spots" to the database via a cell phone geolocation app. To become part of this program call 618-8763, email friendsofmessalonskee@gmail.com or tell the Plant Paddle Instructor.

Milfoil Removal classes are scheduled for Saturday, July 13 and Saturday, August 10, 9 am to noon. Under the expert instruction of Danielle Boutin, Friends of Messalonskee Milfoil Program Coordinator, learn how to properly hand pull and dispose of the invasive aquatic species Variable Leaf Milfoil. The Friends of Messalonskee Watershed have been hard at work for many years keeping the lake clean and clear. Everyone can make a difference by learning how to remove milfoil. Limit 10 students; must be 17 years of age; no fee. Supply list and release form available on registration. Meet at Sidney Boat Launch, 451 Hosta Lane, Sidney.

On Friday, August 2, 9 am to noon, there will be a 3-hour tour of Messalonskee Lake offered through Adult Ed with Gary Benett of Snow Pond Cruises in his handicap accessible boat. Pre-register and read full course description on the Mid-Maine Adult Ed website.

### New Infestation of Curly-leaf Pondweed Found in North Pond

As the Belgrade Lakes Watershed prepares for its population to double from seasonal residents and visitors, there is one population that is rapidly decreasing—curly-leaf pondweed. Curly-leaf is an invasive aquatic plant native to parts of Europe and Asia that was unintentionally brought to North America by cargo ships. Unfortunately, this tenacious invasive plant has been found in two waterbodies in the Belgrade Lakes.

Like most invasive aquatic plants, curly-leaf lacks natural predators and competitors that keep it from spreading out of control. What sets curly-leaf pondweed apart from most aquatic plants is that it grows over winter and is dormant during the summer and early fall, when most water recreation is occurring. While many of our seasonal residents will never encounter curly-leaf due to its unusual growth cycle, native aquatic plants and wildlife suffer from the overabundance of curly-leaf growth due to competition over space, sunlight, and nutrients in the late spring, when native plants are just beginning to wake up from their winter dormancy. Native plants are important to lake health as they provide habitat, food, and oxygen to wildlife and aquatic plants absorb nutrients that would otherwise be used by algae. Curly-leaf pondweed reproduces primarily through turions, a type of winter bud that can remain dormant in lake sediments for up to five years and rhizomes, horizontal roots that send out "runners" like strawberry plants.

Just before Memorial Day weekend, the 7 Lakes Alliance's Invasive Aquatics team discovered several large patches of curly-leaf pondweed near the public boat launch in North Pond, Smithfield, Maine. Removal efforts began immediately as the plants were already at the surface of the water and ready to drop dozens of turions per plant. By June 10th, the rooted curly-leaf in North Pond started to show signs of decay. At the same time, the algae that has been present in haunting North Pond since 2018 started to rise from the sediments, making the visibility for divers removing plant material particularly challenging. Despite the unfavorable diving conditions, 7 Lakes divers were able to remove all of the curly-leaf found. By June 18th, the entire perimeter and ~50 feet offshore of North Pond was surveyed.

Fortunately, it appears (for now) that the curly-leaf infestation is isolated to the north end of North Pond. Specifically, some scattered patches were found on the west side of Pomleau Island and several large patches were found East of Pomleau Island to Leech Brook Cove. Given the size of the patches and the abundance of turions attached to the rooted plants, this new infestation is not likely to ever be eradicated from North Pond. We will, however, be able to manage the invasive plants in North Pond by removing new shoots growing from turions in November. All plants missed during the fall cleanup will be removed in April, before the plants *Continued on page 14...*

The fireworks, held at the Belgrade Central School, were fired out over the railroad tracks towards Messalonskee Lake. This arrangement continued for several years. The move to display the fireworks over Long Pond came later.

## Foraging and Educating

here were some rainy days last week, which reduced usage on lacktriangle our hiking trails a bit. On the bright side, the wet weather in June has been good for mushrooms and berries. I have found quite a few yellow chanterelle mushrooms, wild strawberries, and some red raspberries are beginning to appear. I have also been harvesting cattail spikes, the immature male flowers of cattails (Typha sp.), which taste like little corn cobs when boiled for a few minutes and served with butter and salt. We had a nice dinner last night of sauteed chanterelles, onions, peppers and garlic with fresh asparagus and pork chops cooked in a milk gravy accompanied by boiled cattail spikes.

The 7 Lakes Education and Outreach Team spent two days at Camp Tracy and used our new floating classroom to get about 100 campers, counselors, and staff from Camp Tracy out on McGrath Pond to learn about lakes and conduct

some hands-on lake science. Additionally, there were some land-based programs about aquatic plants and invertebrates. Check out the picture below of campers looking over Lake Scientist Matt Farragher's shoulder to see a projection of the microscope magnifying the zooplankton the kids had just collected in a plankton net. You





May the celebrations on the 4th of July go on




now and forever. The original purpose and reason to celebrate, was the independence of the United States from the British Empire some 248 years ago. As the centuries have passed, it has

### **MIFF Movies Preview**

re you looking for a cool place — both literal- $\mathbf{A}$ ly and figuratively — to escape July's heat? Do you want to watch the finest in new foreign and domestic movies? Or maybe you just have a hankering for "the best popcorn in the known universe?".

Look no further than the 27th annual Maine International Film Festival. Organized by the Maine Film Center, MIFF will present over 100 films (features + shorts) during its ten-day run, July 12–21, in downtown Waterville. This year's MIFF will premiere a wide range of independent films from Maine, the rest of the United States, and beyond. The festival will also present films by its two Achievement Award winners, and a few select older classics from other directors.

The festival has always promoted Maine filmmaking and Maine filmmakers. This year, MIFF will present three feature-length films that were made right here in the Pine Tree State: Carlo...and His Merry Band of Artists, a documentary about the late painter Carlo Pittore, as remembered by his friends and colleagues; The Ghost Trap, a drama about a young lobsterman whose happy life is in danger of coming undone when his girlfriend suffers a severe head injury and a rival lobstering crew becomes more menacing; and The Ruse, a thriller about a young woman who takes a job as live-in caregiver for elderly woman in a secluded seaside manse that may be haunted.

In addition, MIFF will also offer the world premiere of a movie based on a true Maine story but produced elsewhere. Lost on a Mountain in Maine is a dramatization of 12-year-old Donn Fendler's nine-day struggle for survival after getting lost on Mt. Katahdin, Maine's highest mountain, in 1939. One of the producers on the film is Waterville native Ryan Cook.

Besides those four features, the festival will also screen three compilations of Maine-made short films - Narrative, Documentary, and Music comprising 19 shorts altogether. Several of the shorts have a Central Maine connection. Read next week's article for details.

This year, MIFF is pleased to present, not one, but two Achievement Awards: a Lifetime award to Dutch Jos Stelling and a Midlife award to Canadian director Mary Harron. This will actually be Stelling's second "Lifetime" award from MIFF: when MIFF gave him his first award in 1999, he joked that it was really more of "midlife" honor he was in his mid-50s at the time. Indeed, in most years since, the award has been presented as a "Midlife

Achievement Award." At the festival, Stelling will present the North American premiere of Natasja's Dance, his self-proclaimed cinematic swan song in which a for-



Kingsley iconoclastic painter Salvador Dali. MIFF will also present her Charlie Says (2018), which presents "an unflinching profile of the women under Charles Manson's sway;" The Moth Diaries (2011), which offers "an unorthodox twist on a vampire story set in a girls' boarding school;" and cult classic American Psycho (2000),which stars unhinged Christian Bale in a tour de force role." (The

quotes in the preceding sentence all come from a MIFF press release.) Each festival includes a selection of "rediscoveries," critically acclaimed films — some enduringly popular, others largely forgotten — from cinema's storied past. All are worthy of a fresh look, and

some have been newly restored. By far the best known of this year's rediscoveries is Martin

Scorsese's 1990 gangster flick, Goodfellas, which is widely considered his greatest film. Among the other rediscoveries are America – Everything You Ever Dreamed Of, a compilation of documentary shorts from the early 1970s by Rhody Streeter and Tony Ganz; Jean-Pierre Melville's Le Samouraï (France, 1967), a French film noir shot in color; and Victims of Sin (Mexico, 1951), a colorful spectacle shot in black and white about a cabaret dancer who takes in an

abandoned child and then has to protect him when his murderous father is released from prison.

Finally, This year's festival includes a special focus on new films from Rwanda. The international reputation of MIFF and the Maine Film Center has grown steadily over the years, such that in 2023, MFC Executive Director Mike Perreault was chosen a juror at the Mashariki African Film Festival in Kigali, Rwanda. As a result of the contacts he made there, MIFF will welcome Rwandan filmmakers Yuhi Amuli and Myriam Birara to give the Maine premieres of their films Citizen Kwame and The Bride, respectively, each of those films complemented by a short from a different director.



Together with Jodie Tsih, a fellow Colby student, we've been wrangling and untangling the many mysteries held by the loons on both Long and Great Pond. At Colby I am majoring in **Environmental Science focusing** on conservation and field biology

positions and then later work out the nuances and reasoning to track possible nesting pairs. Even when we think everything is under control, they like to deviate and seem to turn everything we thought upside down!

Over the course of my time here, I've learned how to approach and observe these birds safely, decipher what a majority of their behaviors mean, and what distinguishes individual loons from pairs or intruders. Additionally, I've become more familiar with the situations on both Great and Long Ponds, and hopefully, my assistance with this research can





uncover the reasoning behind the relatively low productivity rates and pair retention on these lakes.

Over the past week three chicks have hatched: two chicks on Great Pond near Robbins Mill Stream and one chick in the cove just north of the entrance to Ingham Stream. Overall we have a majority (12/14) of our territories on Great Pond housing nesting loons, but unfortunately, only territory on Long Pond has a nesting bird. Hopefully more will be nested and more chicks will hatch and survive in the coming weeks.

### Community Read The Frozen River


How fun to read an historic fiction murder mystery about the frozen Kennebec River during our hot summertime in the Belgrades. Right away I thought of Martha Ballard's Mid-Wife Tales that won a Pulitzer by Laurel Ulrich. My old copy is on our camp bookshelf from many years ago. History author Ulrich presented her Mid-Wife Tales in Augusta at the University of Maine campus. Many Belgrade readers attended that crowded event.

The detailed diaries are quoted at the beginning of each chapter and then translated and explained by Ulrich. The Frozen River offers an historic fiction rendition of the importance of Ballard's Diary as detailed evidence of a possible murder on the icy Kennebec.

My most vivid memory of the Pulitzer history is when Martha Ballard would cross the frozen Kennebec to help deliver a baby, even in the middle of the night. Her closely kept diary of healthy deliveries in the Hallowell area and beyond, better live birth statistics than Boston doctors at the time, made Martha Ballard's achievements to be unforgettable.

The Frozen River involves a death of a man on the Kennebec. Martha's accurate daily records are dismissed by certain men and she does not give up. She carefully surmised murder from her complete examination of the body before an outsider doctor arrived to take over. Dr. Cony was the local doctor in Hallowell who usually worked with Martha Ballard when required. (Cony High School is now located across the Kennebec from Augusta.) Her evidence of daily birthing's along with community happenings point to murder on the ice and not an accidental death.

How this all works out makes for fascinating summer reading. Remember our murder mystery last summer on Great Pond? That author had a packed audience, standing room only, at our large All Seasons Community Center. Many readers had penetrating questions and personal



comments for the very talented author of so many mysteries around Maine

Hoping our community read this summer brings out your curiosity about local, real life historic figure Martha Ballard. She is portrayed by Ariel Lawhon as an authentic character of strength and intellect. Her husband and children all ring true to the history in Ulrich's Pulitzer.

As you drive to Augusta, look for the Ballard Stables on the right: same family. At Sam's in Augusta look for the Ballard barn up on the hill behind...The cemetery of Ballards is fenced in black near Barnes & Noble, Martha's remains unknown however. Jonathan Ballard kept his mother Martha at a lovely home not far from the Key Bank...On my many hospital visits a few summers ago I still saw Ballard Lane

along the way. Perhaps you remember the Manchester Ballard Meat Store from awhile back?

Fort Western has a Martha Ballard tour on occasions. Apparently the Ballard family reunion also happens around here somewhere near Great Pond.

The historic Pownalborough Courthouse in Dresden had Martha Ballard there more than once to testify, right on the Kennebec. John Adams even tried a case there back in his lawyer days according to David McCullough's John Adams, another Pulitzer. The marvelous model of winter ice cutting caught my eye when we found this stunning courthouse one summer day on our way to the coast. Imagine Kennebec ice packed in sawdust reaching India.

History surrounds us here in the Belgrades and so do good books about Martha Ballard. Visit our Belgrade Public Library for directions, news, monthly book group discussions, special programs for kids and everyone, all ages.

mature and produce new turions. Since curly-leaf primary spreads through turions, depleting the cache of turions in lake sediments and preventing the generation of new turions is the best way to control the infestation. 7 Lakes has been using these strategic methods to manage curly-leaf in The Serpentine, the stream that connects East Pond to North Pond, since 2021.

Since curly-leaf removal efforts began in The Serpentine, we have seen an 89% decrease in curly-leaf growth. This impressive decrease in the original infestation has been achieved by continuously weeding the infested area via SCUBA before the plants are able to produce new turions, excellent outreach and communication efforts by our partners at East Pond and North Pond Associations, and the financial support of the Maine Department of Environmental Protection. These fundamental tools for success will be used to control the curly-leaf in North Pond going forwards. Unlike the infestation in The Serpentine, the curly-leaf in North Pond has been found in areas of high motorboat traffic which makes this infestation

at high risk of spreading throughout North Pond and the watershed. While our divers can minimize the spread by removing plants before they grow tall enough to reach the water's surface, the best way to prevent the spread of all invasive species between waterbodies is to follow Clean, Drain, Dry practices. Clean off all boating and fishing equipment that contacts lake water before using the equipment in another waterbody. Drain your bilge in the tie-down area as you exit a boat launch, and if possible, allow your equipment to fully dry between trips.

If you are concerned about curly-leaf pondweed and all invasive aquatic plants, please join our team! Volunteers are always welcome to cover Courtesy Boat Inspector shifts at the public launches, survey for invasive plants (group paddles and independently), and) and donate to the cause. Weekly aquatic plant identification workshops will resume June 26th, every Wednesday 10-11 AM at 7 Lake's headquarters. Please email *sharon@7lakes.org* to get involved!

Daily data logger report

**T** A 7ith the Summer of 2024 in full swing, our pond water levels are **V** slightly above where we would ideally like them to be. As I pen this week's column, we had another downpour this afternoon – so what else is new?! According to our daily data logger reports (attached), the Village spillway dam is 3" above full pond with one gate opened 3'. With Long Pond, at least at the Wings Mill Dam, is 4.2" also above full with Gate one opened 2'6" as you can see on the datalogger below. Whereas at my dock, 9 miles north, we are 5" above full due to the recent deluges and Long Pond's steep watershed. Salmon/McGrath is doing well at 2.16", also above full and with its calibrated valve set at the minimum 1cfs mandate. Messalonskee, aka. Snow Pond is, as of this writing, 3.12" below full, due to their electricity generation needs and the fact that they can fortunately handle a ton of water!

If the weather forecasters are at least close, we are looking at only .82" for the next ten days - finally some Chamber of Commerce weather! It's about time and I think we all deserve it!


