

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# Trying To Beat The Heat

iving with, accepting, adjusting to those intense heat spells of summer isn't all new. Old-time lake dwellers and Vacationland visitorsalike had their ways. What ways?

• Tall trees and long docks - Original camps were often "buried in the trees," especially lofty pines. The trees provided a living space that was private, refreshing and cooling - sometimes too much so. That's when the long docks, longer than the shadows of the tall trees, came in. Walk out on a sunny dock to get warm again.

• Porches - Almost all cabins, camps and lodges had porches, open-sided structures broad enough to hold chairs aplenty, roofed over against the sun (and rain) and angled to catch the breeze.

•Shades, shutters, awnings and curtains - Definitely not just decoration, these were all variations of window covers used to shut out the sun. Some folks followed a routine of opening all their windows at night to let in the cool air and shutting them each morning to keep the cool air inside.

•Ice houses - Many personal camps, lodges and businesses had their own ice houses where a year's worth of ice harvested from the lake was stored.

•Detached kitchens - A fire precaution that also prevented the cook stove from heating the rest of the camp or main building.

•Breezeways - Open-sided, walkways inviting to the breeze, that lead to the detached kitchen, a woodshed, a detached bathroom or toilet facility or a laundry room.


•Hammocks - Fish-net style hammocks provided their own mini airconditioning from below, were popular outdoor retreats for napping or reading and could even be hung indoors for sleeping on super hot nights.

•Mosquito netting - The protection that allowed going outside to cool off or even to sleep outside without getting attacked by bugs.

•Dress for coolness - Broad-brimmed hats and floppy sunbonnets; Tight braids and upswept hair; Long, loose dresses and skirts and baggy shirts; White, white, white - Light colors reflect heat; Bare feet.

•No exercising after eating - This old wives' tale, now debunked, required dedicated downtime (resting, reading, napping) after eating but was also a great reason to stay quiet during the heat of the day.

•And then? - Swim, bath, immerse. Old-time lake dwellers and Vacationland visitors spent a lot of time in the water.

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
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# Rome's Dick LaBelle Awarded Boston Post Cane

The LaBelle family and residents and guests of the Town of Rome recently celebrated the amazing contributions and 50 plus years of service of resident Dick LaBelle. As Rome's oldest citizen Dick was awarded the prestigeous Boston Post Cane.

The tradition of the Boston Post Cane began in 1909 as a publicity stunt of the Boston Post newspaper when 700 ebony and gold canes were given to 700 towns in Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Maine and Rhode Island to present to the community's oldest citizen. The Boston Post went out of business in 1956, but many towns, including Rome, have continued the tradition.











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# **Colby Summer Scholars at 7 Lakes Alliance**

The Belgrade Lakes' watershed and to provide valuable research, education, and guidance to our partners and neighbors throughout the watershed.

Colby College has been instrumental in providing environmental interns who work throughout the academic year and summer to support various projects across the watershed. These interns play a crucial role in promoting environmentally sustainable practices to maintain the health and vitality of the lakes. Previously, the focus of the Summer Scholar program has been primarily on water quality with our lake science department.

This summer, we are pleased to have our first land conservation Summer Scholar at 7 Lakes Alliance, Abby Clothier, who has been working with our Lands department on a range of projects related to conservation and stewardship of protected lands in our watershed. Her work includes conducting ecological assessments, sustainable trail construction, assisting with land management plans, and visiting our current and future property sites. Abby is assisting with a land conservation project on a 270-acre parcel that was aggressively clearcut. She is helping to develop a restoration and

reforestation plan for the site. She is also working on a research project in which she is analyzing development and environmental factors using GIS mapping to analyze parcels with the greatest conservation potential in our watershed. This research will guide our future land acquisition strategies and enhance our targeted approach to conservation efforts.

The results of this project are aligned with our land conservation goals for the future in which we are focused on acquiring land that directly contributes to water quality and ecosystem health. As a nationally accredited land trust, land conservation is an integral part of the work 7 Lakes does to protect our watershed. Conserving land is essential for safeguarding water quality through natural filtration provided by land cover and forests, that minimizes runoff that ultimately can cause algal blooms.

All six of our summer interns, five from Colby and one from Bates, will be presenting their research at our annual Summer Scholar Symposium on July 30th at the 7 Lakes building. We hope you will join us to learn about their work which is having a meaningful impact on our lakes and land.

# **Belgrade History Beyond Belgrade**

B elgrade has so much rich history that sometimes it flows beyond the town borders. As Town Historian, I have been trying to seek out some of this wayward history. Some Belgrade historical artifacts have found homes in local Maine museums, and some have traveled out of state. .

I hope to share some of this lost history and encourage readers to find history for themselves.


The first Belgrade historical artifact I encountered beyond Belgrade was the guide boat, Trixie III, at the Maine Maritime Museum in Bath. The Trixie III is a wooden Rangeley style fishing boat with three chair seats. It was built by well-known Belgrade boat builder, Ralph Stewart. The craft, Trixie III was built in the late 1920s or early 1930s for John Asher Lambert who owned Camp Liberty. The camp was located at the north end of Great Pond.

Among the items donated with the Trixie III was a lunch basket and tacked to the cover was a map of Great Pond, compliments of Johnson Marine Service. I recognized this map as the one on display at the Belgrade Historical Society. I knew that the Johnson family was very involved with boat building and repair in Belgrade Lakes Village, so I checked with fellow member of the society, Rod Johnson to find out more about this map.

Rod's recollection concerning the map, was that his father, Clifford had redrawn an earlier version of the map drawn by Everett Johnson who owned Johnson Marine Service. Karl Johnson, Everett's son, took over his dad's marina in the 1950s, which later became Day's Marina. The maps were often handed out at both locations -Clifford's boat building and repair shop by the dam (now Lakepoint Real Estate), and Karl's Marina (now the Post Office and 7Lake Alliance Annex).

In 1913, one of the earliest boat builders, Ernest Sola had built a 30x50 foot shop for the purpose of building wooden boats. He built at least 3 different boat designs, all of which were used as fishing boats on Great and Long Ponds. Ralph Stewart bought the building from Sola and continued to build wooden boats. Clifford Johnson became an apprentice to Stewart before and after WWII and later became the owner of the shop. As different materials





# Take It Outside

# **Counting Loons**

The third Saturday in July is the annual loon count L in Maine, coordinated by Maine Audubon. See: (https://www.maineaudubon.org/projects/loons/annual-loon*count/*). This year's count took place July 20th and was the 41st annual count in this important ongoing citizen-science project dedicated to better understanding one of Maine's most iconic birds. Every year over 1000 volunteers, of which I am one, attempt to count all the loons on over 300 Maine lakes at the same time. It's organized like a military operation, and I am the coordinator for the dozen or so volunteers on Long Pond, which is divided into 9 Survey Areas, with a 10th on Ingham Pond. Scott Chapman is my deputy coordi-

nator for Lower Long Pond. Scott is a second-generation counter. His late mother counted loons every year for decades, usually with young Scott in the boat. Early in the morning, all counters head for their assigned section of the lake to be in position to count all the adult loons and loon chicks in their area between 7:00 AM and 7:30 AM. This year the weather was perfect for counting loons: clear and sunny with light winds. This year I had two assistants, Fred Knight and Peter Alter. I picked them up at their respective docks on the way to our Survey Area.

Our assigned area was a cove that has been used for many years by a pair of loons that used to nest on a secluded

beach on a small peninsula and often lost their eggs to land-based and avian predators that found the nest and ate the loon eggs before they hatched. Five years ago, the Belgrade Lakes Association (BLA), as part of their ongoing study of loons on Great and Long Pond (more information in Dick Greenan's loon articles), built and installed a floating raft nest with an avian guard (to prevent predation by eagles, ravens,

and blue herons). The nest was moored about 20-feet offshore from the usual nesting site to provide the loons some protection from terrestrial predators such as racoons, minks, et al. When land-based predators have to cross water to reach the nest, the defensive advantage shifts strongly in the loons favor! For three of the past four years, the loons successfully used this nest but for some reason, were not successful this year. They laid two eggs but eventually abandoned them, possibly due to human interference (fishermen, paddleboards etc.). Bottom line, even with two assistants, we spotted no loons in Lynch Cove this year. As of press time, I had not received results from all of my counters, but it appears likely that chick numbers are significantly down from last year in Long Pond. There have been at least 8 eggs

abandoned, or washed into the water, probably due to high lake levels and boat wakes. One nest along the Ingham Stream, lost two eggs due to boat wakes. Under Maine boating laws, this entire stream is supposed to be a no-wake zone as it is less than 400-ft wide along its entire length! Alex Wall and Kathy Wall found three adults and Alex got some nice pictures with a large telephoto lens.

I did have my youngest grandson here this week. We got out fishing a bit and caught quite a few one-to-two-pound bass, I also spotted the Cutler Family from the Fairfield area landing their second pike of the day, They were putting them in the cooler for a fish fry later! Pike are very tasty, although a bit tricky to clean because of the y-bones. My friend Don Kowalsky was at his camp on Great Pond this week with his kids. They







# **Grand Celebration** of Life on the **Kennebec River**



such as aluminum and fiberglass began to be used in the construction of small watercrafts, the demand for wooden boats declined.

Clifford Johnson continued to repair wooden boats and offered fishing boat rentals among other services. The Boat Shop eventually was torn down and burned.

My visit to the Maine Maritime Museum took place a few years ago, so I checked with the museum about the status of the Trixie III prior to writing this article. Currently the Trixie III is NOT on public display but is still in the collection of the Maine Maritime Museum. However, the museum recently opened a special exhibit, Upta Camp. This exhibit investigates the history of Maine's sporting and leisure camp tradition. While the exhibit features Rangeley and Moosehead regions, Belgrade's history is very similar. I recently had an opportunity to visit this exhibit and would highly recommend it. If you are looking for a short-day trip away from Belgrade, the Maine Maritime Museum in Bath is a wonderful place to go. For more information visit their webpage at MaineMaritimeMuseum.org







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
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

# Call of the Loon

Summertime in the Belgrades

## The Process of Banding

s I write this week's column, we had a loon banding sea- ${
m A}$ son scheduled for last night with loon expert Lee Attix, two of Biodiversity Research Institute's renowned biologists along with our two Colby College interns, only to be thwarted by numerous scattered thunderstorms - again! UGH!!! At lot of preparation goes into a banding. First and foremost, we need at least six unbanded adult parents along with their chicks confirmed in the territory earlier that day, light and variable winds, complete darkness with no full moon or if so, cloud cover, availability of our Biodiversity Research Institute's biologists who hold the required permits for such work, along with our own loon expert Lee Attix. So, there is a lot of logistics that go into a night of banding but the rewards are immeasurable!

Loons are captured for determination of age, sex, and overall health by assessing weight, leg and beak lengths, blood and

feather analyses for heavy metals contaminants and banding for easier recognition on future surveys and to track successful nesting pairs. If all goes to plan, our banding team returns in the dark and approaches the territory with a spotlight and a binocular equipped observer. Once the adult(s) and chick are spotted and held in sight with the spotlight, they are carefully and very slowly approached while calling the birds in with a chick call. While following the light and call, the adults generally swim right up to the boat. Once alongside, they are picked up with a large net and secured by other crew whose responsibilities are to secure that head and deadly beak with a towel and tucking

under the arm pit of the volunteer holding the loon in his/her lap. Remarkably, these loons have a respiration rate similar to ours and can be quite docile in the arms of the crew but can also

in an instant, and without warning, kick out those powerful legs and wings in a raucous escape attempt!

It takes about thirty minutes to obtain two vials of blood, three feather samples, and the numerous measurements. During this period the chick(s) is either secured in a blanket lined box or held by a crew member which is a sobering experience enjoyed by all.



It wouldn't take much of a boat wake to wash out this loon's nest. Let's remember, they were here before us.

And, as if having to cancel and reschedule a night of banding wasn't enough to deal with, Jodie and Barlow, our two Colby College interns, discovered that the two eggs previously observed being expertly incubated by the parents two days ago were now as of this morning - floating in the water!!!! Yes, floating in the water!!!! That's a first for me. Which begs the question, why were they floating and not on the bottom as eggs have been found in the past? That will require further study but

for the time being, with the adult pair swimming nearby, the interns were advised to relocate the eggs back on the nest, fall back and observe the parent's behavior. Stay tuned for next week's edition of the Summertime to see how the two eggs faired.

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Another obvious concern is how did these eggs end up in the lake from a relatively level natural hummock nest? A large boat wake in this site was unlikely but not impossible. The 200 ft No Wake Zone is there for a myriad of reasons and we are hopeful that more and more folks wake up to that fact of life (no pun intended).

In 2022, we lost 8 eggs that were either abandoned or flooded out, last year we lost 5 eggs and this year we have already lost 8 eggs and were not quite done. Please help us in keeping our loon nesting sites secret, quiet and above all, observe the 200 ft, No Wake Zone. If you have a particular question regarding our Belgrade

Pulitzer Prize Winner Paul Harding begins this historic novel by describing the great flood on an island just nearby on the Kennebec River near Gardiner/Richmond. 

expression. How great that he was provided a stimulating place to move where his artistic talents were developed. All because of a caring summer school teacher.

The good, the bad and the ugly are all revealed in this historic novel. Maybe some of you saw the Malaga Island Exhibition at our Augusta State Museum before Covid? It took place 100 years after the island residents were forcefully removed. Relatives of island dwellers live in the Belgrade area and know this sad development in Maine history.

"None of the islanders or their ancestors had ever paid taxes or had a bank account...They'd just lived on the island for more than a century, neither much helped nor hindered by the people on the main." Official documents issued to the islanders to leave meant nothing to them. Some stuffed the government eviction notice under a rock where an ancient Sears catalogue was kept.

Supposedly the island was cleared by the government and cemetery moved in order to develop a resort. Too many residents were placed in inappropriate places like homes for imbeciles, etc. A very unfortunate Maine tale based on gov-

ernment encroachment and mishandling of an integrated society that worked in spite of its poverty.

The art work of individuals on the island was part of the Augusta Exhibition. I wish a few of these intricate drawings were included in this novel of island history. Perhaps I will now do an internet search. Always something new to learn and then go swimming in the lake.


As of this writing, it's been another roller coaster of a week with the daily scattered thunderstorms. I guess we shouldn't complain but it would be much preferred if they were only at night! In reality, we actually faired fairly well with the meager 0.9" of precipitation we did get over the past ten days. I know! There's no way we only got 0.9" with what seemed like gulley washers every other day but that's what our two rain gauges 'say'! The forecast is for just 0.47" for the next ten days so, if they are right, we are in for some more sunshine and hopefully less humidity.

The good news is that we are still holding our own and our ponds remain in excellent shape despite the afternoon challenges. In addition to the gulley washers, our computerized data loggers at the Village and Wings Mill Dams have both been down for a few days due most likely to the lightning storms. But they are back up and running and the Village dam, as of this writing, is exactly 3" above full pond with both gates completely closed. Long Pond, at the Wings Mill Dam, is 3.18" also above full with both gates also completely shut down. Upper Long Pond, nine miles north of the Wings Mill Dam is right at two inches above full so Long Pond, looks great as well. Snow Pond is 1.44" below the top of their spillway, which is well within the summer range considering our electricity requirements with all of this heat and humidity. Salmon and McGrath remain in great shape at 3" above full pond with the 1 cfs. calibrated valve still opened 15 turns. Good going Cam & Co. I met a long time resident from lower Long Pond early this week who told me that "you must be getting a lot of complaints about the water levels don't you?" With a guizzical look, I responded, "not really, our seasoned veterans on the Dams Committee give it their all despite what Mother Nature hands them and still maintain acceptable water levels, 24/7!" Which is the truth! They are the best in the field!
