Famous Legacies of Belgrade's Hidden Homestead




own a road once taken, through a field once mown, lies a house once lived in - a home filled with children and pets and art and food: food that was farmed on the property, harvested and put by to last a large household through the long, challenging Maine winters.

The house itself is a study in uniqueness. Owner-built in the style of Maine's legendary back-to-the-land homesteaders, Scott and Helen Nearing, authors of "Living the Good Life" at Harborside in Brooksville, Maine, the building was constructed by hand of thick fieldstone walls set in cement and intersected by beams in the manner of a European chalet. The center piece and a source of heat is a huge fieldstone fireplace and the granite foundation is believed to be from the 1831 Augusta House Hotel.

This Belgrade construction was prompted by the marriage break-up of artist Cecily Diamond, by her desire to homestead the 224-acre share she received in the division of their historic 1800s farm and by the need to have an art studio for herself and to raise her

four adopted children. And, as in all Maine fields, there was an abundance of stones available.

Embracing a lifestyle of landscaping the property with gardens and fruit trees, filling two huge freezers and a root cellar with all their own food, raising herding dogs and Scotch Highland cattle and giving her children a life of freedom, Cecily named the road to her property Freedom Road. Although her days were full of creative activities, painting portraits using local models and occasionally offering art classes at her home, Cecily rarely presented her work outside her house/studio.

Cecily's two younger sons, Nick and Toby, recall this as a happy although sometimes very cold pioneering experience, but with always large, healthy, home-cooked meals. When young, the children attended the day school in North Belgrade and later a school on the Plains Road in Readfield where the learning style was adapted to each child's pace and interests.

Integral to the successful lifestyle on Freedom Road was Cecily's partner Pal Tripp. Pal grew up on the Old Belgrade Road with 8 siblings and lived and worked in Belgrade all his life, including jobs at Gagne Cement, the Belgrade Transfer Station and in camp maintenance. He also was an avid gardener and with Cicely had one of Belgrade's best gardens.

Pal was the one who drove the children to school, went on shopping errands, handled repairs and patiently was a model for one of Cecily's most impressive portraits. He also was the beloved uncle of dozens of nephews and nieces and grandrelatives who often visited the Belgrade homestead which they knew well and have many happy memories of times spent there.

The Tripp family is a legend in Maine in regard to the state's shameful Malaga Island story, where in 1912 a community of black and mixed racial settlers on the island whose occupation went back a century were evicted to make way for a resort. Some of the victims were released on the mainland, some were committed to Pineland institution for the feeble-minded and some died or disappeared. None of them talked about it.

Pal's father, Harold Sr., was a young boy at the time of the eviction and although nobody knows what path led him to Belgrade, Pal's siblings and some of their offspring have returned to Malaga Island (now uninhabited)

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

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Water Quality's New Bad Actor

CGrath Pond in Oakland and Belgrade is a headwater for the Belgrade Lakes watershed. It flows into Salmon Lake, on into Great and Long Ponds and eventually exits through Lake Messalonskee and Messalonskee Stream into the Kennebec River.

McGrath Pond with is multi-recreational town park Pleasant Point and its bustling YMCA Camp Tracy, is one of 16 waterbodies in the state (so far) and of two in the Belgrades that is under advisory to avoid consuming lake water or eating fish caught there or in Salmon Lake.

McGrath Pond through the McGrath Pond-Salmon Lake Association (MPSLA), the 7 Lakes Alliance and the Maine Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) is dealing with the latest issue in water quality: PFAS.

PFAS, per- and poly-fluoroalkyl substances, or "forever chemicals" because they don't break down in the environment, have received a lot of publicity in Maine. They have forced roughly 50 farms to permanently shut down, 34 towns to be on a site advisory list, hundreds of wells and waterbodies to be tested starting in 2014 and certain sites (including former landfills) to be on a watch list. One of those former landfills is in the Town of Oakland just above McGrath Pond.

Since 2021, because of concerns that contaminants from the capped Oakland landfill have been leaching into surface and groundwater and reaching the lake, MPSLA has been monitoring McGrath Pond. Maine DEP became involved in 2022 and found very high concentrations of PFAS chemicals in both surface and ground water near the capped landfill and at between 9 and 12 parts per trillion (ppt) in the pond. The national standard is 4 ppt.


In samples of what the DEP calls "flesh fish," tested in the summer of 2022, the concentration of the constituent PFOS in McGrath Pond was approximately 10.8 and 12.8 ppt in black crappie and largemouth bass, respectively. As a result the CDC determined that they fell within the existing statewide mercury advisory of 2 meals per month.

Although 2023 results were not available for the spring MPSLA Water Quality Committee report, sampling data from the 7 Lakes Science Staff show the single PFAS constituent PFOA at 5.6 ppt in McGrath Pond and 3.6 ppt in Salmon Lake.

Based on those results and as a preliminary advisory certain cautions are recommended which include avoiding consuming lake water or eating fish caught in either lake. It is still safe to swim, fish and boat.

The next steps for the MPSLA will be spreading awareness, learning more about the contaminants and developing a plan for remediation.

Discovering a 7 Lakes Alliance Hidden Gem

Zakes Alliance has conserved more than 12,000 acres and maintains over 20 miles of trails in the Belgrade Lakes watershed, often with the cooperation of other organizations, like Maine's Bureau of Parks and Lands. Trails like The Mountain and Mt. Phillip are very popular and see year-round traffic from both locals and visitors.


The Fogg Island Trail, located off Spring Hill Road in Mount Vernon, is a hidden gem conserved by 7 Lakes. The property features a 2-mile, one way, trail that leads to Lower Long Pond. Along the way, hikers will pass through several distinct natural communities, including young deciduous forests, vibrant and diverse wetlands, and tall, dark stands of hemlock forest. The trail ends with a beautiful section of bog



bridging through a fragile vernal pool ecosystem, leading to a picnic area with scenic lake access. This trail can also be accessed from the water, if visitors would prefer to paddle to the picnic area and explore the preserve from the lake.

The Fogg Island Preserve is more than 650 acres in total, and its undeveloped shoreline helps to safeguard water quality in Long Pond. This wetland ecosystem provides fantastic

wildlife habitat and open space for outdoor recreation, including hiking, paddling, and skiing. For more information on 7 Lakes trails and conserved land, visit *7lakesal-liance.org*. New trail maps are available at the 7 Lakes Alliance building at 137 Main Street in Belgrade Lakes.



Belgrade History Beyond Belgrade

Some of Belgrade's history is designed to leave the area. I am referring to souvenirs of Belgrade. A souvenir is defined as any object that can be collected, purchased, and transported home by the traveler as a memento of a visit. Be it a postcard, coffee mug, T-shirt or any item that indicates it was from Belgrade would be considered a souvenir. Over the years, Belgrade had numerous stores, shops, hotels, restaurants and even camps where souvenirs could be purchased. Gift Shops, such as the Brass Knocker, Maine Made Shop, Village Peddler, and Enchanted Swan primarily sold items intended to be souvenirs. Often the souvenir finds a new home far from Belgrade.

Some souvenirs become family heirlooms that are passed down to future generations. The Belgrade Historical Society received a glass paperweight with an 1890 photograph of the Central House in Belgrade Mills, (after 1900, the name was changed to Belgrade Lakes), from Jim Lantow of Minnesota. He stated that the paperweight had always been on his grandfather's desk. Accompanying the paperweight, was a marriage certificate for Samuel H. Page of Belgrade and Minnie Mae Rollins of Belgrade, dated Oct. 2, 1897. They were married in Belgrade by Rev.

J.S. Cummings and spent their honeymoon at the Central House before beginning their new life in Waverly, Iowa.

The Central House was originally the home of Charles and Abby Lord Austin. In 1874, they opened their home in the center of Belgrade Mills to young men coming to fish in the Belgrade Lakes region. They called this "inn" with beds and meals, the Central House thus establishing the beginning of tourism in the Belgrade Lakes. In subsequent years, the barn was converted to bedrooms and a three-story separate addition was added. As families began to come to Belgrade, the Central House added a four-story annex with a large dining room overlooking Long Pond and larger bedrooms, and finally around 1902, an additional three-story annex with more bedrooms was added. Charles Austin died in 1915 and the Central House was sold in 1916 to a consortium that renamed it The Lakeshore Hotel. Ultimately, it closed in the summer of 1962. A portion of the hotel remains as a private home.

The paperweight and accompanying documents have finished their travels, and Belgrade Historical Society is honored to be entrusted with these irreplaceable treasures





Fall Trip for Seniors to Fort Knox and the Penobscot Narrows Observatory



The problem was that there was a loon just 40 yards away watching the entire scene. So, you ask, why is this loon still by 'their' floating nest when the breeding season is supposed to be over? Because, until

they fly off in November, this is still 'their' nest and 'their' territory which we just happen to be sharing. If this intrusion just happens once every two or three weeks, we may not flush the bird from its nest but every other day, which is happening more and more, we will lose that nesting pair and nest! Both of our floating nests in upper Long Pond never nested this year and

human interference was confirmed multiple times in both cases. On a nearby natural island nest, it too was abandoned due to numerous visits by a small fishing skiff, inquisitive paddle boards, kayaks and swimmers.

Their nests are 'theirs' from Memorial Day through October and we need to recognize that and give


them their space. While I was out, I twice approached nests from a distance of about 40 yds (I use 10x42 binoculars) and in both instances as I approached, I never saw a loon BUT when I was leaving the area, up pops a loon in both instances that had me in their sights the entire time. So, what is the take away here? Basically, a nest is off limits whether there is a loon sitting on it or not. If you are out in your kayak and a loon comes over, it might very well be catching your attention to follow it out and away from where you were spotted. They are particularly adept at getting your attention and leading you away from their nest, chick, or just being "In Their Face"!!!! They are not coming over to say Hi!

So why don't we just put out a

sign on a tree or a floating sign nearby to keep people away from the nests? Do we really think that a sign is going to deter the majority of people or, attract more sightseers? It's a double edge sword. Public education such as the Summertime In The Belgrades provides an excellent service in getting the word out, but it takes the ongoing efforts of all of us and the community that loves these lakes and wildlife and wants to preserve what we have. It is a fragile ecosystem!

Remember, we have collected 11 abandoned eggs this year which should have been chicks!

ing. Waters are ruled by weather.



The recent nationwide settlement involving the National Association of ■ Realtors (NAR) and local real estate organizations represents a significant shift in the real estate industry towards greater transparency in transactions. This settlement mandates that both buyers and sellers must now sign agreements that clearly outline how their real estate agents are compensated, ensuring that all parties are fully aware of the financial aspects of the transaction before they engage in buying or selling a home.


Traditionally, the sellers' listing agents would share their commission with the buyers' agents as a way to incentivize other agents to bring potential buyers to view the property. While this practice will continue, the key change is that the details of such compensation arrangements must now be explicitly agreed upon by both the buyer and the seller in advance.
