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SECOND DAY OF THE COUNTY FAIR.
A Large Attendance Considering the Weather.

Yesterday, the second day of the Cumberland County Fair at Gorham, opened auspiciously for the great exhibition. 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EIGHTY REPORTED KILLED.

An Appalling Disaster on the Lehigh Valley Road.

Cars Crowded to the Doors With Excursions.

Overturned and Shattered by a Rapidly Moving Train.

Cars Roll Down an Embankment into the River Beneath.

While Others Are Hurled Against a Wall of Rock.

The Number of Dead Various Estimates in the Despatches.

Latest Reports Indicate That the First Were Not Exaggerated.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., Oct. 10.—A special train on the Lehigh Valley railroad, carrying the Wilkesbarre delegation home from the Father Mathew celebration at Hazleton, last evening was wrecked about Penn Haven near the town of Hazleton, Pa.

The train was crowded and the fatalities will run into great figures. All the physicians from White Haven and near by points are at the wreck as are all the Lehigh Valley officials from his city. The number killed is variously reported from 25 to 80 persons.

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THE DEMOCRATS AND THE TRUSTS.

President Cleveland's Aid to the Great Sugar Combination.

Democrats Managing the Big Combines in This Country.

Mr. Blaine Speaks of Trusts at Home and Abroad.

GOSHEM, Ind., Oct. 10.—Mr. Blaine left Grand Rapids last night and reached here early this morning. Not less than 5,000 citizens of Indiana waited for him on the trains and horseback to meet him in Goshen, and participate in the Republican demonstration.

It was the largest crowd Northern Indiana has ever seen, and was so warmly welcomed that the two speakers' stands had to be erected, and another meeting organized in the opera house.

The town was profusely decorated with flags and bunting. In the large square surrounding the City Hall, speeches were delivered by Gen. King, Gen. Murray, of Massachusetts, Hon. Hovey, Col. Bridgman, and Mr. Blaine.

Mr. Blaine said: "I have found a more excellent way in the South and they reserve peculiar contributions wholly for the Northern field. [Laughter.]

Fellow citizens, I have named five trusts in which all the evils that can come from trusts are conspicuously prominent. I pause now, and there is a Democrat in this assembly, I ask him to tell me one trust that the country controlled by Republicans with any political connection or to exert any power of the kind I have named.
