The undersigned respectfully states, the enclosed bills were  
Contracted under the following Circum-  
stances

A. S. Wilson of Company H. 20<sup>th</sup> Regiment  
V.M. Capt Morrison - was sent to my house  
Sick the 1<sup>st</sup> of September the day before his  
Regiment left being unable to proceed  
with them. There then was no Hospital or  
accommodations at the Camp. I had  
previously while the Regiment was in  
Camp had other members of the Regime-  
nt Sick at my House all of which bills  
were approved by the Surgeon of the Regiment.  
The necessary absence of the Surgeon with his  
Regiment explains why this bill is not ap-  
proved by him. Mr Wilson remained with  
me until his death which occurred Sunday  
October 12<sup>th</sup> and on Monday the 13<sup>th</sup> instant  
the Funeral Ceremonies were performed  
and the Remains were taken from my  
House

I will refer you to Mr. Hall Secretary  
of State who I think can give you some  
information in regard to the circumstan-  
ces of the case as he was present the day  
of Mr. Wilson's death. The disease of Mr. Wilson  
was a great portion of the time very sick  
and required constant attention day  
and night. I had to employ an extra  
Nurse and board them more than half  
the time, besides the attention of my  
family and visitors was extended  
during the whole time of Mr. Wilson's sick-  
ness.
