## A note about the information


The **Jobs with Limited Demand in Maine** table features **Estimated Employment** for selected occupations in Maine based upon the 2000-2010 Occupational Employment Projections. These occupations are sorted by **Employment Change (Net)**, and show those occupations <u>most likely</u> to lose jobs between 2000 and 2010.

Occupational Employment Projections are based on factors such as past employment trends and national trends. They are done every two years to keep current with changes in the labor market.

Those changes in the labor market of the future are being shaped by many factors, including social and demographic shifts. Technological advances have contributed to reductions in certain types of jobs. Some jobs will decrease because they are in an industry with declining employment.

Keep in mind that even occupations projected to decline in employment may still need workers to fill openings. It may also be worthwhile to examine both the *Employment Change (Net)* and the *Employment Change (Percent)* to gain a fuller perspective when researching job prospects.

While an occupation may be estimated to have limited demand, it may hold promise for an individual who has a special interest or skills in that area.
