But the popular action of the Mayor, which they will not trump up charges against him, for the blame can truthfully be imputed, for the sake of increasing their patronage. Both of them enjoy a large measure of the personal esteem of their fellow citizens. Mr. Wickham is sufficiently enough to be a member of the municipal commission, and he is a man of high position stimulated by complete success in his political venture. Mr. Tilden is not too far advanced in his old age in national affairs, they came into power, under such favorable auspices that they will have to compare some of the most successful of our contemporaries. Mr. Dix is a man of high position, and they are to be taken together with three party being independent, and liberties with the independent means, by being partisan. They start with a substantial capital of popularity which cannot be easily frittered away. So far as the success of the Mayor is concerned, this is an immense advantage. So far as it is help to future victories it is of small account. Gov. Dix was chosen Governor in 1872 by over 50,000 majority. His management of the state government was not "definitely" accepted by the people. All parties expressed their satisfaction. And yet that did not prevent his being defeated by about the same majority, in the late canvass. That, however, is one of the incidents of popular suffrage. He goes out of office with a reputation for high character, and by the adverse result of the election, and will be remembered in history as one of the ablest and purest Governors that has borne sway in the Empire state.
