The Speculators' Delight.
Thanks to Mr. Ward and Garfield, no
more time will be wasted in discussing Mr.
Kelley's 3.65 convertible bond scheme until
after the appropriation bills, or at least a part
of them, are disposed of. One not in Wash-
ington and appreciating the wants of the
country, would naturally suppose that the re-
sult of the recent elections would convince
the congressional mind in general that, what-
ever the country does want, it does not want
any more talk. Eight months of last year
that body both sickened and angered the
people by its talk. If Congress cannot
believe the newspapers on this point, the fact
that two-thirds of the representatives have
been changed in the recent election, ought
to satisfy the dullest man in Congress that the
country is thoroughly disgusted with the
ignorance and stupidity of the majority on the
important question of finance. The les-
sons of the elections, so very fresh, seem to
be forgotten; and once more the leaders of
the inflation wing plunge into an incoherent
advocacy of their scheme, the folly of which
is affirmed and re-affirmed by the history of
every nation. This these men do in the face
of the appeal and unanswerable arguments of
the Secretary of the Treasury and the recom-
mendations of the President. With these
recommendations are facts which are so
plain and unanswerable that it is perfectly
incomprehensible that an average body of
men can fail to appreciate their force.

For instance, the United States Govern-
ment has outstanding \$882,000,000 of over-
valued and dishonored paper, which, so far as
can make it, is the standard of values. This
paper money everybody knows is rather a
barometer than a standard of values. It is
forever rising and falling; yet as we insist
that it is a standard of values, its fluctuations
directly affect all productions, goods and
credits in the hands of all the people in the
country. The value of these productions, goods
and credits in the country aggregate
\$12,455,000,000; and all this vast amount of
property is changed daily by the fluctuations
in the market price of the \$882,000,000 Gov-
ernment notes as fixed by the gold-gamblers
in Wall Street. Every time a greenback dol-
lar falls a cent, this vast amount of property
is depreciated to the amount of \$124,550,000.

Time and time again the value of the whole
property of the country has been at the
mercy of the speculators on Wall Street.
They naturally desire to have these Govern-
ment notes continue to be the standard of
values, and the more this kind of standard is
increased, the greater will be the gains of the
speculators, and the more limited the field for
legitimate business and industry. Hence the
closed factories, the idle workmen, and pros-
trated business. Indeed, the fluctuations,
now only from three to five per cent., make
legitimate business partake of the nature of
speculation with all its hazards.

It does seem as if Congress might be able
to see the effect of this upon the prosperity of
the country and devise some method whereby
the money to whom he can say "Send me to
the United States Senate and I will place a
Democrat in the Governor's seat and thus you
will control the state. If you don't you will
have a Republican government and Republi-
cans will be elected in 1876." If this is
true, it is evident that Mr. Stearns has learned
the value of the self-seeker of the patron-
age of the Government of Florida by the
constitution which really makes him nearly
omnipotent. Mr. Stearns is a native of
Oxford county and quite a young man. As
we recall him as a member of the class of six-
ty-three at Waterville College, he did not
promise to prove a man who would achieve a
national reputation. He went into the army
in 1862, served in the Department of the Gulf,
and to Florida after the war, and now has
achieved such eminence that he seems to
have a senatorship in his hands by counting
in a Legislature to suit his purpose. Perhaps
Mr. Stearns has been slandered.

Should it turn out that Mr. Hamlin's election
was brought about in this way, Mr. Hamlin
and Mr. Blaine may find it a costly one.
