UNJUST CRITICISMS BY BEHIND TIMES WRITERS.

Notwithstanding the round of dates on the farm as the seasons come and go, and what may sometimes seem like "bummers" work on the farm, yet there are in reality but few occupations in this country that have been subject to greater changes than farm life. It is true that many of these changes have been necessary to meet the changed conditions by which the farmer is surrounded, but the most of them have been made by his own volition and for the purpose of bettering his condition; and if the results of these changes have not at all times met his expectations, they have in the main afforded him a measure of satisfaction and made him a broader minded and more progressive man than before.

With the advancement in the conditions of farm life during the past generation, with the greater general intelligence that prevails among farmers, and with the better homes, dress, culture and the more refined tastes of the people in all parts of the country, I am surprised that writers upon farm life and farm topics will to-day draw the same kind of illustrations as a farmer as thirty years ago, and thereby bring discredit and ridicule upon farm life. It may be true that there are farmers who have made no progress, and who are working in old ruts, but they are exceptions, and it is unjust to hold them up to the public as examples of farmers of the present time. Instead of going to the "back places" and drawing pictures or making caricatures of this class of farmers, who are rough dressed and uncouth, and who are not in their personal appearance, why not go to some representative gathering of farmers like a country

or at the meeting of the state grange, or at the homes of the average farmers of almost any section of the country, and draw truthful pictures of what are there seen? From the very nature of the business, farmers do not always wear a laundered shirt with collar and cuffs. When engaged in their farm work they dress for comfort and convenience, and it is not the custom, as is sometimes stated, for this class of farmers to appear at the table with dirty clothes and uncombed hair, nor is it probable that they are among them. It has been my pleasure to have seen thousands of farm homes in all parts of the country and to have visited many of them in every part of the state in the Union, and while in all instances they were not ideal homes, yet in a large majority of them were evidence of as much good taste and refinement as is found in a majority of the homes in towns and cities. Among

the many advantages that have been used to push forward the wheel of progress among farmers, I know of none that have been so effective in their work as the grange. It has led the farmer into new fields of thought and action, it has given him a broader mind, and wider experience, it has given him courage, confidence, and that degree of self-esteem that was needed to make a man among men, and, best of all, it has brought his family out of the semi-isolation of farm life, and is giving them the enjoyment of social life and their rightful position in society.

CONDENSED MILK.
Every condensed milk manufactured in the country has increased its output by ten per cent this year, and is sold at a low price. There is no surplus at all, and prices are very firm. More people are using condensed milk than ever before, largely because of its cheapness as compared with fresh milk. In the dairy sections the consumption of condensed milk has increased to such an extent that it is being sold at a profit. In eight cents a quart for the fresh milk, the condensed variety is cheaper.

There are other reasons besides cheapness for the increased use of condensed milk. It is so convenient, it is so easy to use, and it is so good for the baby. It is a regular article of supply to the hunter and the camper out, and fills a place in their cuisine no other can fill as well.

The New York Produce Review and American Creamery give the receipts of butter for the month of June in that city as fourteen and a quarter per cent less than last year. There is also a slight falling off in Boston, Chicago and Philadelphia. This is contrary to expectations all around. Plainly there is not being so much butter produced as last year. In the dairy sections of the far West the attention of farmers has been turned more to the production of grain and the growing of corn than to the raising of dairy cattle. In Maine, large sales of cows have kept the number down. As a result of the falling off in the make of butter, the price has ranged one and a half to two cents higher than a year ago. The outlook for the dairy business is bright for the remainder of the season.

That the ratio between the number of cattle in growers' hands and the people of the country is widening there is no question. There are not so many cattle as several years ago while the population goes steadily on increasing. There can be only one result from this gradual and certain strengthening of the value of cattle and the price of beef. That stock farmers who catch on to this fact and shape their efforts to correspond will be the swiftest and ready to reap the advantages of the situation.

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INFLUENCE OF FOOD ON MILK.

A BRITISH DAIRYMAN'S CONCLUSIONS.
NORSE TOO MUCH BUTTER MADE—CONDENSED MILK FACTORIES REDUCE SUPPLIES.

Prof. F. J. Lloyd, consulting chemist of the British dairy farmers' association, recently read a paper before the organization on the influence of a cow's feed on her milk in which he said: In every milking cow two tendencies are at work. The one is to convert the nourishment supplied by the food into milk; the second to store up that nourishment in the body. In every milking animal there is a constant struggle between the two tendencies. Sometimes a comparatively slight or simple cause may upset the balance. An exceptionally cold night will cause a marked decline in the milk yield of a large herd. The materials have been utilized for maintenance, the demand for milk being for the time being having exercised a more powerful influence than that of milk production. The dairyman is therefore supplied with an animal may affect either tendency. A cow fed with an excess of starchy food, having used all that it requires for milk production, will still be left with a surplus of nutriment in the blood. This will be utilized by the tendency of the cow to fatten. In a similar manner the excess of starchy food, which, however, is far more rare—will produce a tendency to make flesh.

The ultimate result of a food excessively rich in nutriment is to increase the milk yield, but to diminish it. "When properly fed a dairy cow will neither gain nor lose in live weight, and under such conditions will produce the maximum quantity of milk. The physical conformation permits, and that milk will have its maximum quality; there will be a maximum epithelial growth. The food which produces such results is an ideal milk ration, and the nearest approach to it is the ration of a dairyman. It is a ration which will gradually outstrip the tendency for milk production. If a deficiency of nutriment be given, the body suffers first, and lastly the quantity. These results will be most marked when there is simultaneously an abundant supply of water. In many places, however, there will be a corresponding change in the quantity and quality of the milk, but it will not be immediate. Experiments have been made for many years, and the result was that the animals first utilized the food to replenish their emaciated bodies. Some interesting observations made by M. P. Fatio on the surgical treatment of wounds by birds were recently brought before the Physical Society of Geneva.
