Advice to Housekeepers.
Inexpensive housekeepers and even those who think they are so successful, need advice. It will do well to remember these simple rules when buying meat. To test beef press it down with the thumb. If it rises quickly, the meat is good. Beef should be fine grained, of a bright red color, with streaks of clean, white-looking fat. The meat will be tough unless there is plenty of fat. When beef is of the best quality, the fat is always free from coloring. Good mutton should be a deep red, except where it is freshly cut. Flabby, unwholesome-looking meat must never be bought.
